The Way It Was

Story Of Poor "Charley Noyes"

As written in a letter to Mr. Phil Clements, by Mrs. Fannie Reese Pugh November 24, 1921.

In the early fall of 1885, my husband, Dr. Thomas Pugh, concluded to locate, soon after we were married, in the new town of Goldthwaite, then in Brown County, now in Mills County.

Dr. Pugh was one of the two pioneer doctors of the place. One day he was called to see a charity case; an old man who came to Goldthwaite as a tramp, friendless, destitute and too ill to give a very clear account of himself. My husband, telling me about him, said, "This old man has pneumonia and is going to die. I wish you would go with me to see him, and see if you can learn anything about his relatives. He says his name is C. W. Noyes and that he was once the owner of a circus."

At once, I recalled the name "C. W. Noyes" and remembered that he was the proprietor of a wonderful circus I had seen in Arkansas in my childhood. Of course, I went to him, and talked with him. It pleased him that I had seen his show, and especially that I remembered the boy, Woody Cook, his favorite bare-back rider.

He was very ill; too ill to talk much, and not inclined to talk about his family. However, he did show me a letter from his daughter who lived in New York, but she had failed to sign her last name to give her address. The ladies of Goldthwaite assisted me in making his last hours as comfortable as possible, but death claimed him in the back room of a business house. (Thought to be the J. H. Randolph Store) Dr. Pugh and I were the only attendants at his burial, save for the few men needed to lay him away.

There were no ministers in Goldthwaite at the time, and no burial services were held over his remains. There was not lacking, however, the tribute of a sympathetic tear by the Doctor and myself; the woman, who as a child, had seen the famous old circus with its funny clowns, its bare-back riders, its wild man without legs who was captured in some far-away country, the fierce animals in gilded cages and the pink lemonade. No other "Greatest Show on Earth" has ever provided for her the keen enjoyment, nor blotted from her memory the recollection of Charley Noyes and his Crescent City Circus when it came up Black River on the old "Fairy Queen" and unloaded at Birds Point, Ark.

Some effort was made to locate his daughter, but without success. The fact remains that poor Charley Noyes sleeps in an unmarked grave on the East side of the Railroad in Goldthwaite. (The grave site is known to be in the vicinity of the backyard of the late Roach Fox Residence.)

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE WRITER OF THIS LETTER, MRS. FANNIE PUGH

Mrs. Pugh established and taught the first school in Goldthwaite in her residence on Fisher Street. Later, she taught in a business house on Fisher Street, and was co-principal with Prof. J. R. Murry in the first Goldthwaite School Building. She was a Methodist, and was instrumental in forming the first Methodist Sunday School and Church in Goldthwaite. Her name was on the list of names placed in the corner stone of the first Methodist Church building. She later moved to Hearne, Texas, with her husband, and there was elected secretary to the Chamber of Commerce, the first woman in Texas to hold such a position. She later became the first woman secretary to the State Chamber of Commerce, helping to blaze the way for the rights of women.

Goldthwaite Public Schools will open their doors on Monday, August 11th, for the 1975-76 school year. The first week August 11 - 15 will be in-service week for teachers.

First day of classes for students will be Monday, August 18. This will be a regular school day with buses running and lunches being served.

Registration for juniors and seniors will be on Thursday, August 14, and freshmen and sophomores will register Friday, August 15. Additional information on registration will appear in next week's issue of the paper.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis reminds parents that all students must have immunizations that are required by the State of Texas. Shots required by the state are: Diphtheria-Tetanus (three shots); measles (one shot); and Rubella (one shot). Students must have had one of these shots in the past ten years.

Students wishing to leave the school grounds to go home or elsewhere for lunch or for any other reason must have a written excuse from his parents or guardian. Also a written excuse from students' parents or guardian must be received at the superintendent's office if the student wishes to drive his own vehicle to school.

Good, balanced meals will be served at the school cafeteria each day for the students. The menus will be checked by the Texas Education Agency.

Mills County Among Top Ten In Angora Production

Angora breed is 190,000 fewer than that for January 1, 1974 and almost one and one half million less than in 1970.

Total number of goats on Texas farms as of the first of the year, including Angora and other breeds, is estimated at 1,150,000 with a total statewide value of more than \$15 million.

The average price received by Texas farmers for all goats on January 1 was \$13.20 per head compared to \$14.50 at the first of 1974.

Mills County farmers also produced a total of 330,000 pounds of mohair in 1974. Texas as a whole is the source of all the nation's mohair and produced 8,400,000 pounds last year, 1,530,000 less than in 1973. Average price per pound was \$1.37 in 1974, compared to \$1.87 a year earlier. Total value of the state's mohair production reached \$11,508,000 last year.

Former G'waite Man Dies In Truck Accident

J. T. (Black) Towernton, 40, of Lometa, truck driver for Schuman Truck Lines of Goldthwaite, was killed around 2:30 a.m. Tuesday morning when his semi-trailer truck was in a head-on collision with another semi-trailer truck.

The accident which occurred about 12 miles west of Del Rio on U. S. 90 also claimed the lives of three other persons, Sheldon J. Phillips, 54, of Carlton, also in the Schuman Truck and Virgilio Garza, 23, driver of the other truck and his passenger, Samuel Cuellar, 45, both of Del Rio.

Towernton and Phillips reportedly loaded cattle into the truck Monday afternoon in San Antonio and were en route to California when the accident occurred.

Towernton, a former resident of Goldthwaite, is survived by his wife and two children.

As of press time Wednesday morning, services for Towernton were pending at Briggs & Samuel Funeral Home, Lometa.



Photostats were made of many of these happenings. A community near the plantation was called Pleasant Grove. These small rocks were taken from a larger rock secured by the Geeslins while visiting the site of the old plantation. These rocks were used in the chimney built some 150 years ago.


