Texas farms as of the first of the year, including Angora and other breeds, is estimated at 1,150,000 with a total state wide value of more than \$15 million.

The average price received by Texas farmers for all goats January 1 was \$13.20 per head compared to \$14.50 at the first of 1974.

Mills County farmers also produced a total of 330,000 pounds of mohair in 1974. Tecas as a whole is the source of all the nation's mohair and produced 8,400,000 pounds last year, 1,530,000 less than in 1973. # Fifty-Two Attend Berry Reunion

The annual Berry reunion was held July 19 and 20 at the American Legion Hall in Goldthwaite with 52 people attending.

After ice cream and cake on Saturday night, Elton Geeslin presented a well assembled and researched film entitled "Berry Pickin". This film traced the Berry clan back six generations to 1844 in Jackson County, Alabama. Of course, some individuals were traced back farther than that, but for a good starting place where records are still available the original homesite of William Berry was pinpointed.

Elton and Waunitta Geeslin visited the exact spot a few months ago of the William Berry cotton plantation, traveling by jeep to the Plateau where remnants of the chimney and log cabin could still be found. At the present time this area is grown up in timber, and pulp wood is being harvested from it.

This prompted the Geeslins to return to the Jackson county seat once more for further research. Such interesting things as livestock sales, land transactions, births, and marriages were uncovered. Photostats were made of many of these happenings. A community near the plantation was called Pleasant Grove. Many feel that this led to the naming of Pleasant Grove in Mills County, Texas some twenty-five or thirty years before the turn of the century.

At the business meeting Saturday night, donations were made to defray expenses. To raise additional money, small rocks mounted in plastic were auctioned off. These small rocks were taken from a larger rock secured by the Geeslins while visiting the site of the old plantation. These rocks were used in the chimney built some 150 years ago.






