Eagles Overpower Hornets Last Friday

Following three consecutive weeks of losses, the Goldth-waite Eagles made up for lost ground by dumping the Lometa Hornets 40-0 last Friday night

at Eagle Field. The Eagles let the local fans know they had come to play football early in the contest, as on the second play from scrimmage Eagle halfback Tim Spradley raced through the left tackle spot and out into the clear for a 60 yard touchdown run. Only 38 seconds had elapsed on the stadium clock. Byron Landrum

booted the extra point. Another booming play came off the passing arm of quarterback Ray Frazier about midway in the second quarter. He hit Spradley on about the 25 yard line and the speedy back raced in for paydirt. Again Landrum's kick was

Another unexpected turn of events placed lineman Frank Berrera in the right place at the right time. He picked off an errant Lometa pass and raced down the left sideline for over 70 yards for the score. Landrum's good kick made the score 21-0 at the intermission.

All the time the Eagles offense was generating power, the staunch defensive unit was busy curtailing the Lometa machine. The Hornets were scarcely able to get a first down in the first half.

A screen pass from Frazier to Spradley with 9:32 to go in the third period netted the Eagles their next TD. The play covered 37 yards. Landrum's PAT was good. Freshman running back

Randy Benningfield plowed in from three yards out for the Eagles fifth tally, A run for the conversion failed.

Reserve quarterback Jett Johnson came in during the waning minutes of the game and did a creditable job of maneuvering the Eagles' of fense. One of his passes hit end Jay Sims who raced in for a touchdown with 2:46 remaining. It was a well executed play on both ends, the passer and the receiver. Another run try failed for the two point PAT. This made the final

score 40-0. An apparent early whistle robbed the Eagles of another touchdown, Johnson took the snap and faked into the line with Delbert Berry as the intended ball carrier. But as the play had been designed Johnson pulled the ball out at the last minute and set out around right end. But the fake was so well executed that the referee had already blown the whistle. It would have been smooth sailing for Jett all the way to the goal line. It was a good thing for the ref that the Eagles were 34 points ahead at the time.

"The boys' playing Friday night was more uniform than it had been in the three preceding games," stated Head Coach Gene Auldridge. "Lometa never was a serious offensive threat to us any time during the game. The defense played a real good game.'

This week the Eagles are doing some general practicing. Next week they will be working extra hard in order to meet their first conference
