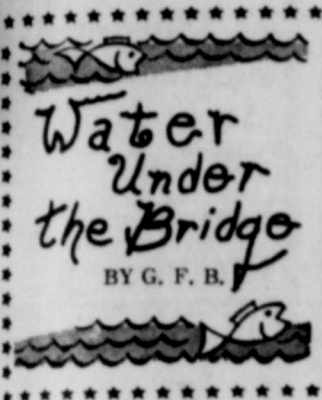

City Council Passes Gas Rate Hike On First Reading



Hawley Jernigan, County Commissioner of Precinct Two of Mills County, said he had a frost last week. The thermometer showed a temp of 38 degrees and Hawley had to scrape the fine ice crystals off his windshield.

The Jernigan place, located on the Colorado River in the western part of the county, is about 300 feet lower than the beautiful downtown area of Goldthwaite.

Another first for Mills County this year is the fact that Jerry Walker of Goldthwaite was the first to pay his county taxes for 1975. Jerry paid his state and county taxes at the local courthouse last week. Tax collection has been a brisk business hereabouts of late.

And speaking of beautiful downtown Goldthwaite, the area was besieged last week by an attack of tear gas. There was no riot, and no criminal attacker was wanted off. . . . a safety tear gas bomb attached to an old safe at Woody Phair's was dislodged when the safe was being moved. All that resulted was a lot of sore eyes and a few nauseated stomachs—and a lot of good old West Texas "Ho-raws" over the incident.

One local minister was walking by the establishment just as it happened and was told to go into the drug store and see the old antiques that had been uncovered with the remodeling. He exited a lot faster than he had made his entrance. . . .

A sports note . . . Coach Gene Auldridge says that the Cross Plains bunch hits hard and should bring a lot of spirit here following their rousing defeat at the hands of state-ranked DeLeon. The game, the first district contest for the local Eagle clan, is set to begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the local gridiron.

The Goldthwaite City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, passed on the first reading an ordinance granting Lone Star Gas a rate increase. Lone Star recently received permission from the Railroad Commission of Texas to charge a higher rate because of the higher cost of gas from producing and gathering companies.

The rate increase, set to be about \$1.00 per month per customer, could take effect January 1, 1976, if the proposition passes on two more readings of the council.

The vote was 3-2 on the proposal, with aldermen Howard Campbell, Loy Long and Frank Bridges voting "Yes" to the raise and councilmen Jimmy Smith and James Carter voting "No."

The raise will give Lone Star no additional profits from its operation in Goldthwaite, according to figures furnished in a financial statement of Lone Star. Lone Star presently makes a return of 5.46 percent on its plant investment for the Goldthwaite operation.

Lone Star Gas was presented with a letter from Mayor J. D. Harper and the council this past month asking for a better service operation for Goldthwaite. The reply was given at the meeting and items pointed out were the small number of customers in Goldthwaite and the fact that a full time serviceman for Goldthwaite would not be practical, as it

would add about \$2 to every statement each month. At present, gas company service calls are handled by a part-time local man and the full time employee of the San Saba operation.

The letter brought a promise of complete cooperation and a guarantee of better service communications between customers and the utility.

SURPLUS LANDFILL LAND TO BE SOLD

The Council voted unanimously to accept sealed bids for the sale of some 132 acres of surplus land adjacent to the sanitary landfill operation. The land, about 3 miles west of town on FM 574, includes a house. Details can be found in an advertisement in this week's Eagle.

The Council originally purchased over 150 acres for the landfill operation, closing an existing open dump ground. The money spent on this large purchase has left the general fund somewhat strained, and the return of some of the money is expected to improve the City's overall financial picture.

In other matters, the Council: - - Approved the quarterly treasurer's report as submitted by Acting City Manager Dale Allen.

- - Recommended that the City draw up an ordinance asking law enforcement officials to enforce no parking zones within the city limits. Areas designated by the yellow paint are the areas of concern. A new area to be painted yellow will be that in front of Frazier's Grocery. The Highway Department may, at its discretion, make a right turn lane off U.S. 183 to FM 574 at that intersection for the southbound lane.

- - Unanimously passed a commendation for the many years of service rendered by retired City Secretary Glynn Collier. His faithful service in the accomplishment of his appointed duties will long be remembered by those connected with Goldthwaite city government. Mrs. Owen Taylor has been hired to replace Collier as city secretary.

Heard from Jesse Clyde Cochrum, a spokesman for a group of tennis enthusiasts who have begun work, in cooperation with the Goldthwaite schools, on the renovation and repaving of the double tennis court at the school grounds. Cochrum asked the City to handle the pay meter for the lighting of the courts. Action was held off, pending further study.

- - Approved the regular monthly operations report.

A Good Thing Turns Bad

The Mobs - Part II

During the terrible reign of the mobs, beginning in the 1870's, one dared to hardly speak. Every family was in danger, and one never knew when he might anger a member of the mobs and unknowingly place himself and his family in grave danger. Neither did he know when some member of the mobs might begrudge him his land, and decide to take it by threats of death if the man didn't leave the country.

At this time, the grapevine sometimes dared to whisper a warning to a person when his name was added to the list of the mob.

One day it was whispered that Leroy Beck was in danger. Why, no one knew, because Mr. Beck was a peaceful, law-abiding citizen of the Big Valley Community. When many of the citizens heard these rumors about themselves they would leave, not to return until the mobs had died down, if at all. However, Mr. Beck chose to ignore the whispers of the grapevine and went about his daily business. One morning he stopped at a neighbor's house to chat while on his way to pick up his little girl in another community. The neighbor, Mr. Woods Miller, asked him, "Leroy, do you carry a gun?" He too, had heard the warning. Mr. Beck replied, "No, because if they want to kill me, I won't have a chance," and he continued on his journey to get his little girl.

On his way home in the afternoon, he was joined by another friend, Fred Peck, who also lived in the Valley. They rode along together, talking of the topics of the day, never dreaming that danger lurked so near. Suddenly, they heard horses running. This alarmed Mr. Beck and he dashed off in another direction to get out of sight, but Mr. Beck and his daughter kept to the road. In a few moments, Mr. Peck, who could not be seen from the road, and two boys working in a field nearby, heard five shots ring out. A Dr. Pond lived close by, and when the riderless horse came running up to his front gate he became alarmed and went to the scene. There they found Mr. Beck dead, and his little daughter lying upon the ground pretending that she, too, was dead. No one ever knew exactly why Leroy Beck was killed, but it was thought that he had unwittingly happened upon something too dangerous to know.

Another good citizen of Big Valley was ordered to leave at the same time, which he did, and did not return until the mob rule had been quelled. He lived for many years in this community and reared a large family there.

Nick Anthony received orders one night to leave the country. Not knowing where to go, he decided to hide out at the home of a cousin. One night five young men were spending the night with the cousin when the mob suddenly appeared at the door. Each man was called outside, one at a time, to be interviewed by the mob. Nick was the last to be called, never to return. His body was found the next day, riddled with bullets and a rope around his neck. He had not been hanged, so it was thought he had put up a terrific fight and had finally been shot.

Tom Snipes, a young man in his 20's, was a neighbor of the Virden Family in Pleasant Grove Community. He had been to his uncle's place working cattle one day and was returning home when he was seized by the mob, gagged, and hung from a tree. His body was then carried across the

Payne Gap Mountain and found just before dark by a posse that had been formed. Part of the posse went for help, while the other members of the posse stayed at the scene. Just after dark a group of men rode up, but in the darkness not a person could be identified. The posse knew that these men were members of the mob. Feelings were tense, and danger was near. Finally, the aged uncle of Tom spoke up and said, "Men, Tom is gone - hold your tempers or others will be killed." The mob rode away. Tom Snipes is buried in the Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

In 1883 Mr. Phil H. Clements, a prominent citizen of William Ranch, owned a drug store there. One morning a man whispered to Mr. Clements that he would like them to meet at a designated place and time. The meeting was held, and Mr. Clements was told that the mob planned to kill Henry Atkinson, Houston Roberts and a Mr. Renfro that night. Mr. Renfro lived close to Regency, and the other two men lived along the Pecan Bayou. The whisper was spread, a runner was sent, and a killing was prevented that night. However, Mr. Roberts was not to be so lucky the next time. Not long after that, he was sitting at the end of his field one day watching his sons plow when a shot rang out behind him and he died instantly. Again, no one knew why or by whom.

Bawled from a million pulpits, lasciviously crooned from a hundred million loud speakers, it becomes an outrage to good taste and decent feeling, an obscenity that one hesitates to pronounce, and yet, one must pronounce it because love is the first word, the last word, and the only word."

Plato said that "love is a grave mental disease". The philosopher Nietzsche said: "Love is a state of mind in which man sees things as they

most decidedly are not". Napoleon said: "In love, victory goes to the man who runs away." C. K. 4-H boys and girls throughout Texas and the nation will join in a salute to America's Bicentennial celebration during National 4-H Week, Oct. 5-11.

The annual observance, with this year's theme of "4-H '76 - Spirit of Tomorrow", is designed to accent the history, ideals and goals of the 4-H program, points out Dr. Don Stormer, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Many county groups are planning special events, service projects and recruitment drives during National 4-H Week," notes Stormer. "It's a special time when 4-H is recognized for its contributions to the growth and development of youth."

The 4-H program is active in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands as well as in more than 80 countries. It is administered by the Co-operative Extension Service, and Extension professionals play an active role in recruit-

ing, training and assisting volunteer leaders who help with local 4-H activities.

According to Stormer, some 7.2 million youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are currently enrolled in 4-H, with more than 21,000 volunteer adult and youth leaders to assist with local 4-H programs in the state.

"Although the majority of 4-H members still live on farms and in rural communities, 24 percent now come from larger urban and suburban areas," notes the 4-H leader. "Well over half the Texas 4-Hers live on farms or in towns of under 10,000 population."

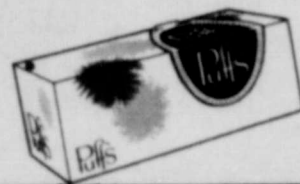
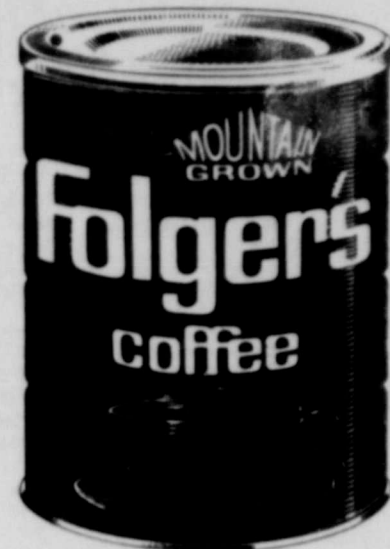
