Important Constitution Election Stage Set For Tuesday, Nov. 4

Texas voters go to the polls Tuesday to decide if the state needs a new constitution. Polls in Mills County will open at 8 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m.

Local voters will cast their ballots in the ten (10) voting

boxes: Goldthwaite, 1 and 19; Center City, 4; Star, 6; Caradan, 7; Mullin, 8; Priddy, 10; Big Valley, 11; Ridge, 16; and the absentee voting box.

Propositions to vote on (for or against) are as follows:

No. 1 - The constitutional

amendment revising the separation of powers, legislative, and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 2 - The constitutional amendment revising the judicial provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 3 - The constitutional amendment revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 4 - The constitutional amendment revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 5 - The constitutional amendment revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 6 - The constitutional amendment revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution.

No. 7 - The constitutional amendment revising the general provisions of the Texas

Constitution.

No. 8 - The constitutional amendment revising the model of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution.

Mills County Receives Much Needed Rain

Goldthwaite, still on a non-winning streak in district play, was defeated 39 - 12 by Ranger last Friday night. Goldthwaite could not muster a single score until the final two minutes of the last quarter.

Byron Landrum went 60 yards on a pass interception for the first Eagle TD, and David Miller, following a recovered on-side kick, drove the ball over the goal line from four yards out for the second touchdown.

"Ranger's runs were set up by Eagle fumbles and pass interceptions. We made too many mistakes, and our playing was very inconsistent," commented Head Coach Gene Aldridge.

Landrum carried the ball 8 times for a total of 22 yards; Tim Spradley, 10 for 30; Ray Frazier, 9 for 39; and Benningfield, 3 for 27.

Law Officers Continue To Uncover Facts

Layers are still being uncovered in the solving of five burglaries in Mills County.

Sheriff Horace Brooks says Joyce Kincheloe has made bond following her arrest and arraignment in Justice of the Peace Troy Williams' court. She is charged with burglary. Her bond was set at \$2,000 by Williams.

A warrant for the arrest of Billy Wayne Kincheloe, 23, has been issued, according to Brooks, and as of press time Wednesday Kincheloe is still at large.

The pair allegedly burglarized Yarborough's on October 21, 1974; Head Electric and D Bar T Western Wear on Jan. 1, 1975; and Bosse Grocery of Priddy and Yarborough's again on February 16, 1975.

A large quantity of merchandise has been recovered from the burglaries, and a lot more is expected to turn up as time progresses, according to Brooks.

Southern Savings' local office is located at 105 Parker with other offices in Brownwood, Comanche and DeLeon. The Association opened for business in July of 1959.

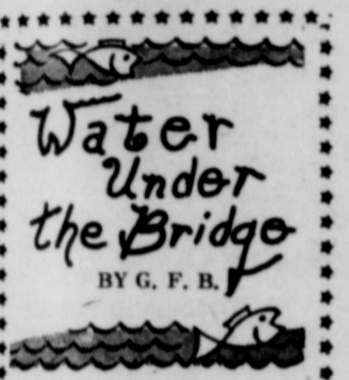
FB Church 90th Birthday In November

Governor Dolph Briscoe says in a news release today that in 1949 he was in favor of a new constitution, "to meet the demands of the era of the Fifties for the people of the State of Texas."

But today, his mind has been changed, because, we think, the heart of the great State of Texas is his heart, and the betterment of our government is uppermost in his mind.

"The state has neither suffered nor been held back because the Constitution was not rewritten in 1949," Briscoe asserted.

Again, this is a matter of debate. Some say we could have all the "advantages" of other states. I challenge anyone to point out a place where the living is better all year long than in the great State of Texas.

And Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County, a Goldthwaite transplant, says that "proposed new tax structures would have a drastic effect on cities, schools, and other political subdivisions, and there is no way you, or I, can predict the implications and consequences which will result if this new proposed constitution is adopted by the voters."

The new constitution would be a liberal's dream house, with wide-open rooms and large halls adjoining these rooms.

The conservative has but one choice to make . . . and that is to vote NO to all eight provisions in the election Tuesday, Nov. 4.

But then . . . not everyone is conservative . . .

The report of cotton ginned in Mills County prior to Oct. 18 shows 3,409 bales of the 1935 crop, as compared to 4,116 bales up to the same date last year.

Mr. W. A. Teague died at his home in Star Wednesday night, and his remains were interred in Hurst Ranch Cemetery. Mr. Teague was a pioneer of that part of the

county. He had been in ill health for a long time, but had reached the good old age of 80 years.

In the passing of Walter Elliott, the Mullin community suffered a great loss. Mr. Elliott died at his home in Mullin Friday, Oct. 25. For some 12 years he had directed the music activities in the Mullin School and community.

The turkey buyers are preparing for the opening of the turkey market, which is only about a week away. The turkey crop is reported to be very short and the birds are not in extra condition. There are very few large flocks of turkeys, but most farms have some that will be put on the market.

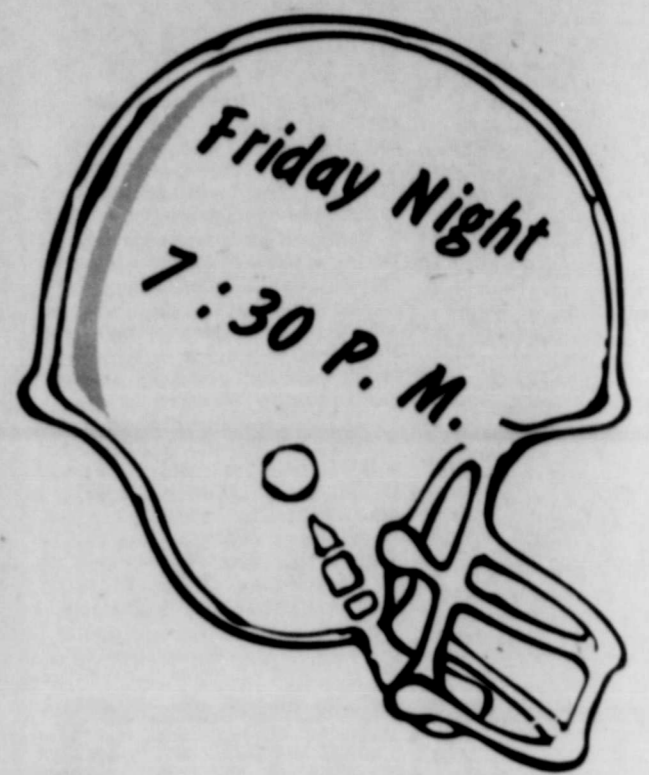

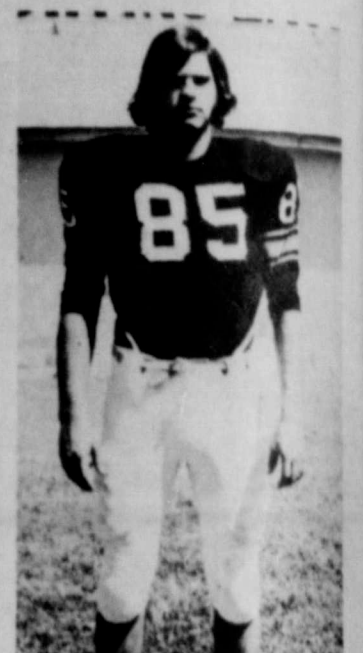

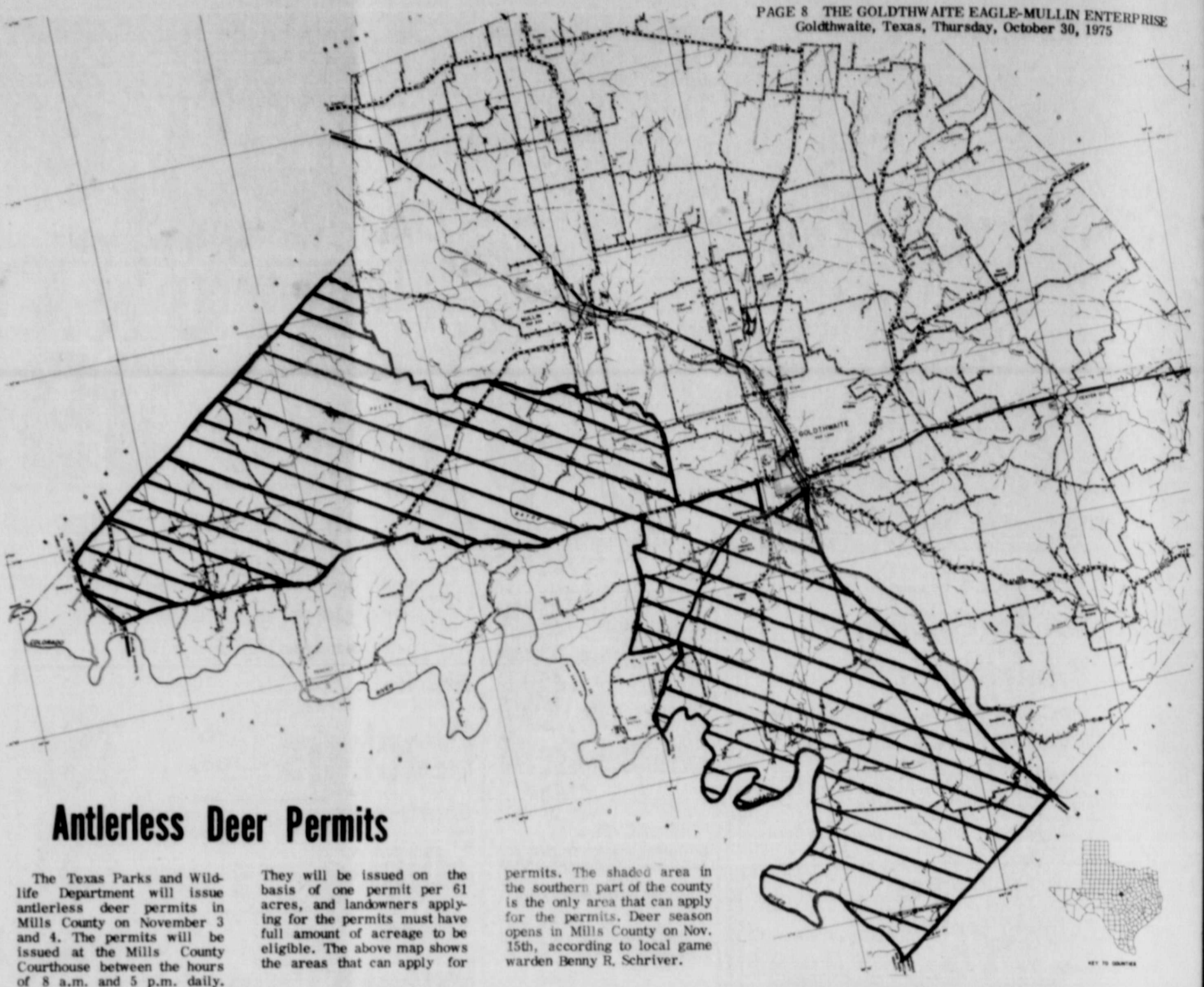
Six events will be run in the following order: cones, playday poles, potato ball race, double bucket flag race, straight-a-way barrels, and cloverleaf barrels.

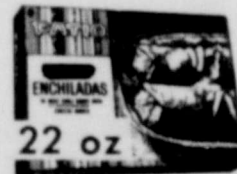

The Mills County Crops and Livestock Committee has planned a Sheep and Goat Production Meeting for November 4, 1975. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Mills County State Bank meeting room.

Dr. George Alschwede will be on hand to present the program. Dr. Alschwede is the Texas Sheep and Goat Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service stationed at San Angelo.

The meeting is open to the general public and we encourage producer attendance. Dr. Alschwede will discuss various production aspects of the sheep and goat industry. Producers will also have the opportunity to ask questions and visit with Dr. Alschwede concerning production problems.

A recent statewide hearing on brucellosis in Austin offered an opportunity for many livestock producers and market operators to voice their views on the present program and the changes proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Many of the beef cattle producers and market operators felt that the proposed changes would pose undue economic hardship to the cattle industry, while several dairymen felt that the Texas animal health authorities should carry out a program to eradicate the disease as soon as possible.

The nine-member commission, representing all segments of the industry, voted not to adopt the proposed changes after evaluating the testimony presented. The present program will continue until industry leaders determine future changes that may become necessary.

In conjunction with brucellosis eradication and the current depressed livestock market, producers should attempt to cull low producing animals or those affected with diseases. The present indemnification is \$40 for grade and \$80 for registered animals found to have brucellosis when tested on the farm or ranch. In addition, producers with livestock in areas where brucellosis is more prevalent should consider using the calfhood brucella vaccine in all replacement heifer calves. However, accurate vaccination records should be maintained.

Every gardener worth the title has a few packets of flower or vegetable seeds left from spring and summer planting. Or they may have collected seed from their own or from their neighbor's plants. Although old seed often has a lower germination rate as

well as reduced vigor, especially if left in a hot shed or storage area, the temptation is to try to save it for next year. Proper storage can greatly increase the shelf life of many seeds.

The seed should be air-dried before placing in tightly sealed containers. It should then be kept in a refrigerator or cool basement at a temperature range of 35 to 50 degrees F. When collecting seeds from garden plants, remember that many of the new improved varieties are hybrids and will seldom come true. This means that the offspring will have little or no resemblance to the parent plant.

Healthy trees are valuable in any landscape and they should be protected and cared for.

Homeowners should be on the lookout for possible damage to their trees and should know how to protect trees and correct damage.

Any cut or break in the bark of a tree leaves it open to insects and diseases. First, clean the wound and get rid of loose bark, then apply a special pruning compound. This will dry hard and prevent insect or disease entry.

We discourage wrapping a wire or metal band tightly around a tree trunk. This breaks the bark and cuts off the flow of food from the leaves to the roots. If the band is left on, the tree will eventually die.

Since a tree's main "feeder" roots are in the top 15 to 18 inches of the soil, care should be used to avoid packing the soil. Soil that is compacted by automobiles or pedestrians can prevent normal root development. If possible, try to reroute traffic around the tree by fencing or by using plantings.

Landscape fills or the addition of more than four to six inches of soil around the base of a tree can be especially harmful. It suffocates the tree by keeping out water and air. If a shallow fill is essential, it's best to use sand or gravel soils that let in air and water.

One way of protecting a tree from a fill is to build a brick or stone well two to three feet out from the trunk.

The first step is to remove all vegetation within the well-area around the tree. Then install agricultural drain tile out and down from the trunk in a spokelike pattern. Build the well around the tree and fill it gradually over two or three years with coarse sand and gravel.

Once the well is constructed, the outside grade can be raised as desired.

The best way to protect trees is to prevent damage before it occurs.

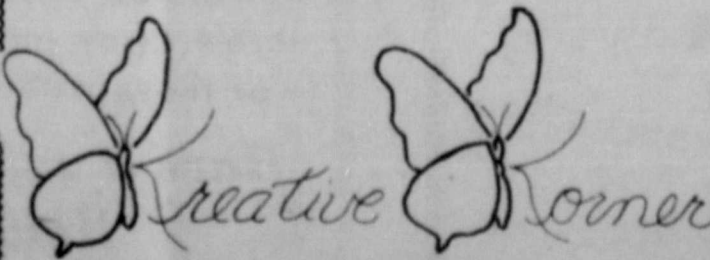

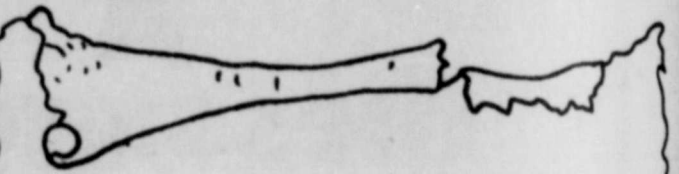
