The Way It Was

An Indian Scout Saves A Community

An Early Thanksgiving

As told many years ago by Robert Miller, an Indian Scout

The duties of an Indian Scout were many and dangerous. He had to have a fair idea of the country around him. He had to be cunning, stealthy, and a lover of nature, for so was the enemy he scouted, the Indian; and to beat a man day after day you must be better than he, no matter what the challenge.

The Indian's naturally inherited knowledge of the wilderness and his acquired knowledge of the ways of the Indian Scout, as protector of the early settlers, a serious responsibility.

He must be a cunning tracker and be able to spot the slightest sign that Indians were in the community; he must know by the signs which direction they were traveling and the length of time they had spent there; he must know if this was a war party or a group of Indians traveling with their women and children. He must be ever on the alert and know very much about the habits of the people in his community so a warning could be sent to them wherever they might be.

Such a man was Robert Miller of the Center City and Long Branch communities during the last days of Indian raids in Mills County. Robert was the son of Levi Miller, an early pioneer settler in this area. He was a bachelor which allowed him much time in the woods for scouting; he was of small stature, not being much taller than five feet, with a soft voice and a walk equally as soft, perhaps from his long months of slipping about in the woods. As I remember him, he always used a twine string instead of a belt to hold up his trousers, and always had a smile for everyone. He spent much of his time at the J. T. Owens home in his later years, and delighted the Owens children, as well as other neighborhood children, with stories of his days of Indian scouting. There was one story that particularly liked to tell; the story of how he and three other scouts saved a whole community from possible annihilation by the Indians.

Robert Miller's Story: It was Sunday morning when Robert heard the tell-tale signs that an Indian war-party was close by. All the people of the community had gathered at a little log school house that stood on Long Branch. How long it had been there and who built it no one knew, but it was thought that the very early settlers had built it around 1855. Robert and three other scouts were outside, one man being posted at each corner of the building, while the crowd inside sang their favorite hymn. The Circuit Rider had arrived only moments before from Lampasas, armed with his loaded gun belted around him, and everyone was preparing for a day of joyous singing and preaching. They had arrived that morning carrying loads of food; some had walked, others rode horses, but most had arrived in ox drawn wagons. Every man there had brought a loaded gun, and stood it against the wall just inside the church. This was a necessity and customarily done, even by the Circuit Riders.

Suddenly Robert heard the call of a crow, and across the branch the answering "caw". Perhaps the average person would not have noticed, but to the trained ear of the Indian Scout this meant only one thing—Indians and trouble. The four guards rushed inside and warned the people that a probable Indian raid was at hand. The Scout was instantly set into

motion. Women and children piled the benches, made of logs, against the door and were told to lie flat upon the dirt floor and make no sound at all. The men, grabbing their loaded guns, led the oxen as close to the church as possible, and tied them to pegs that were built into the outside of the building for that purpose. The horses were tied to the wagon wheels. Then the men hastily decided on a defense that probably saved their lives. They climbed trees, Circuit Rider included, and hid in the leafy branches. Some older men who could not climb hid in the lower brush. All was quiet, both inside and out. Birds were chirping in the trees, and the rustle of the oxen moving about made noises unusually loud to the ears of the frightened women and children lying quietly on the dirt floor of the little log church.

To the women, the wait was long and agonizing. It seemed that time went on forever. They were fearful that their husbands had been killed by the Indian's silent arrows. Suddenly, it seemed to the men that the whole world had turned to Indians. They came from two directions, running and whooping like they were on fire. They were shooting arrows in all directions, plastering the walls of the little house with them. It seemed that all bedlam had broken loose that day on Long Branch. Horses were standing on their hind feet, screaming in terror, as the arrows sunk into their flesh. The oxen were bellowing and tearing against the walls to break loose, yet the women heard no shots. They could tell by the yells that the Indians were drawing closer, yet there had been no sound from their husbands. Where were their men, and why hadn't they shot? The men had made their strategic decision at the last moment, and the women were ignorant of the plan. The men waited until the Indians were close and in good range before they made their position known. The Indians had gathered at the front door, thinking everyone was in the house, and were just ready to strike a flint to burn the building down when — as one man-fifteen guns rang out and fifteen Indians fell dead. Again the guns filled the air with smoke, and more Indians fell. The Indians, not knowing how many white men were there (they outnumbered the white men two to one), made a hasty retreat, dragging their dead and wounded out of gun range, and disappeared into the woods.

After the men were sure the Indians were gone for good, they climbed down from their ambush and quieted their animals, pulling the arrows from their flesh. They then went back inside the little church, and without a word every person knelt and bowed their heads in prayers of thanksgiving. The trained ear of the Indian Scout had surely saved many pioneers that day.

Fun Times In Goldthwaite

On the lot adjoining the Saylor Hotel to the north, was an early open-air theatre, the first such theatre in Goldthwaite, and was called "The Air Dome Theatre". This theatre showed the first movie film ever run in Goldthwaite, and the first most everyone in Goldthwaite had ever seen. It was owned and operated by Milton Cline and his son, William. It was enclosed with walls, and benches

were built for people to sit upon and view the silent movies in the open breezes. Mrs. Lloyd Reynolds remembers her mother assuring her, as a little girl, not to be frightened when the train came through town while she was at the show, explaining to her that there was no way the train could get over to the theatre.

The Dixie Theatre was eventually sold to Will Pence, and he soon moved the theatre to a new location. It was put in a modern building on the square adjoining Clements Drug Store to the east, and the name was changed to "The Melba". Mr. Pence later sold the show to Miss Annie Coleman, who was proprietor for several years, and then the Melba was sold

to Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Nichols, who operated it for the next twenty-seven years, when it was closed.

The most memorable days of the Melba Theatre started during the days of the depression, when it was owned by Miss Coleman, and continued for some time under the ownership of the Nichols. These were the unforgettable "Bank Nights", when money was hard to come by and harder to keep. Bank Night started with \$25.00 being put in a "pot" and drawn for on Friday night. Both Thursday and Friday nights were Bank Nights, but the drawing took place only on Friday night. If you were there on Thursday night, you merely signed your name in a book to become eligible for the money. Buying a ticket, or attending the show was not required. At times the jack-pots became enormous, especially for the depression days, and the largest sum ever given away was \$1000.00. The theatre was full, and overflowed into the street on drawing nights, with everyone hoping desperately that their name might be the one drawn. Hammond Bodkin was Mayor of Goldthwaite at the time, and came down to draw the name from the box every Friday night until his death. If he couldn't be present, Julian Evans was asked to do the drawing. Later Mr. and Mrs. Nichols picked someone at random to draw the name.

These were exciting times, and Mrs. Nichols relates that the pot had reached \$350.00 when a name was drawn that no one knew. He had signed the book on Thursday night, and apparently vanished. She searched for months, trying to find him, when twenty months later he walked into the theatre one day and asked if his name had been drawn, and collected his money. He was a drifting cowboy, and had not been in Goldthwaite again since that lucky Thursday night.

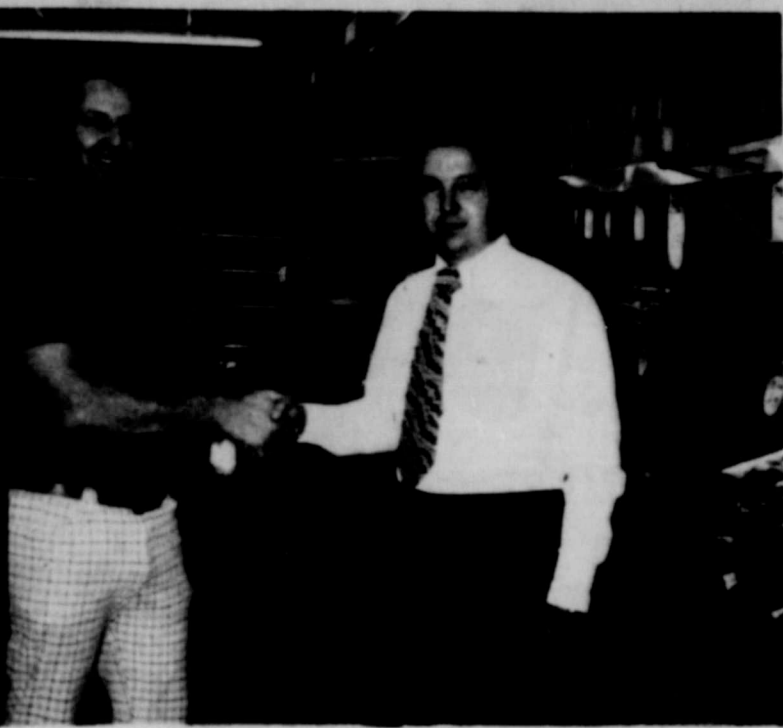

Faulkner, Watson Attend Revenue Sharing Meeting In Washington

County Judge Herbert Faulkner and County Commissioner Lewis Watson were in Washington, D. C., Monday and Tuesday where they participated in a rally of counties to try and salvage the revenue sharing project, library improvements and sheriff department equipment.

Faulkner stated that all 254 counties of Texas were represented by approximately 275 Texans.

Revenue Sharing was started in 1972 for a four year period. To date, Mills County has received \$148,287.73.

"Revenue Sharing, a government program, is our own hard earned tax dollars that have been sent to Washington. Every

citizen in Mills County benefits from this program since every cent of it is put into the county's budget," stated Judge Faulkner.

A few of the ways the money has been used in the county so far are: right of way purchases, building improvements, courthouse lawn beautification project, library improvements and sheriff department equipment.

Faulkner and Watson visited in the office of Congressman W. R. Poage and Senator John Tower. Senator Lloyd Bentson addressed the group and William Simon, Secretary of the Treasury, informed the group he was very much in favor of renewing the revenue sharing project. Faulkner and Watson are both satisfied that their mission was accomplished.

"The county needs a certain amount of funds on which to operate and in order not to be taxed for more money. Revenue Sharing is a great means for us to reuse our tax dollars already sent to Washington," stated Faulkner.

Delegates To Attend FB Convention

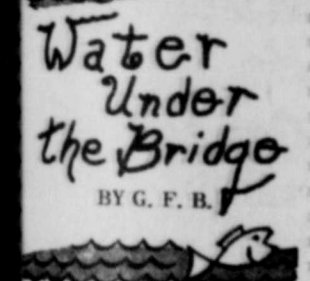

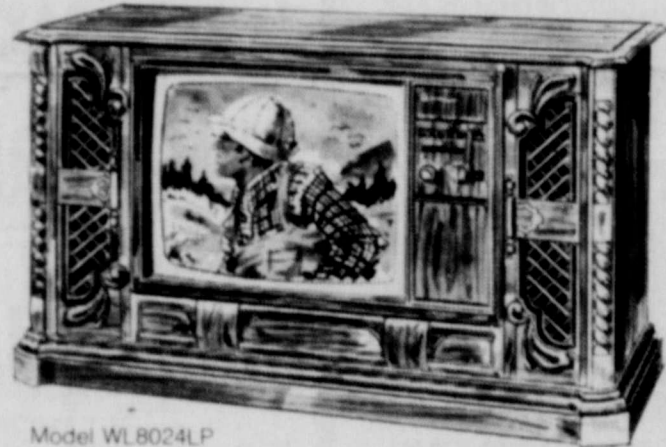

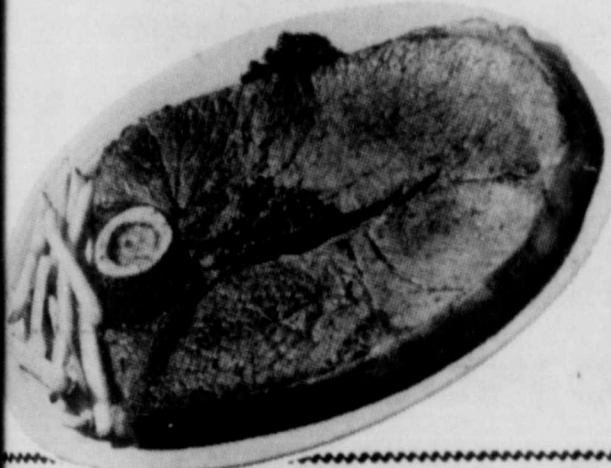
