

Kirkpatrick who acquired much of the land around Mullin in the early years when the Republic of Texas gave this land to his brother, Dr. J. D. Kirkpatrick, in re-Army. Dr. W. D. Kirkpatrick later bought this land. Young Dr. Jim Kirkpatrick, the son of Dr. W. D. Kirkpatrick, delivered the first baby born Mullin. The first death in this new town was untimely and sad when John Tuggle was killed by a train on the eve of his wedding day. Mr. Edgar Burkett was among the first to be born in Mullin, and is still active and lives within two blocks of the post office.

In 1857 a family named Mullin was moving westward when they came upon a little creek filled with clear spring water. They liked the fertile soil and rolling hills surrounding the creek and settled there, thereby beginning a community in southern fringes of Brown County which later became a part of Mills County. The Mullin family was followed by others, and soon there were four white families and one Negro family

living in the vicinity.

When it became known that a railroad would pass through this area and that a new county would be formed, three new townsites were established, all hoping to be elected as the new county seat. One of these sites was located three miles north of the already thriving town of Williams Ranch and was to later be known as Mullin.

As the railroad was being built in 1885, this site was known only as "The Switch" for a short time because of a railroad switching point located there; but shortly a group of citizens gathered and named the town Mullin in honor of the Mullin family, the first settlers on the little creek that still bears their name.

When the election was held for the county seat, Mullin lost by a mere thirteen votes, but the disappointing setback didn't stop the little town. It soon began to grow and progressed from a single business housed under a tent to a thriving community and town in the 1880's, 1890's and 1900's.

The first building in the town was a barber shop owned by B. J. White. In the spring of 1885, Messrs. Lee and Ware opened the first business places - a saloon and a hotel. Several other businesses followed in 1885, and Mullin continued to progress until on its streets could be found three hotels, a drug store, five combination dry-goods stores, several grocery stores, a band, a lumber yard, a hardware and furniture store, a number of blacksmith shops and numerous other businesses. Cottom became king of the economy and at one time Mullin could boast of three gins; the ginners were Fairman, Scarborough, Casey, Martin and Dorbandt.

If one could go back in years and see Mullin at this state of its development they would see its streets filled with wagons, buggies, hacks, surries, wooden sidewalks and a generally happy group of people. One might find any of the

following early settlers at a gathering in Mullin: the Kirkpatricks, Caseys, Fishers, Abshers, Fairmans, Summys, Chessers, Wares, Pyeatts, Burketts, Whites, Tysons, Durens, Williams, Guthries, Roberts, Reeds,

had a public well. People went there to haul water to their homes and businesses. It also furnished water for the many horses that were usually town. Hitching posts were in front of every place of business, and the public horse trough served several purposes other than for watering horses. It was a dunking pond for pranksters when someone was caught unaware; it was used by the law to sober someone that might have over-indulged himself at the bar; at times a new groom found himself in the horse trough just after the wedding if he didn't hide fast enough. The well was located in the middle of the street near the old bank building and is now covered with a farm-to-market road.

The first windmill in Mullin was owned by Mose Kirkpatrick, and people from near and far and near to see this "thing" that brought water up from the

Other citizens who played an important part in the founding Mullin were the Brockenboughs, Wards, Reynolds, Cole-mans and the Woods.

As an illustration of the hardships which were endured by these early settlers of Mullin community, on June 10, 1877, when the corn was in the silk and tassel, there came a killing frost that destroyed all the crops. On January 8, 1888, a blizzard struck that killed many head of livestock and was almost the death of several people in the area.

These are but two of the many hardships our forefathers had to overcome when they came here; a place many said was a bad place to settle. But settle they did, and today Mullin is a thriving little town and proud of its heritage.

Duck Dieoff Reported At Proctor Lake During December

An estimated 1,000 to 1,100 waterfowl have been found dead during the second week of December at Proctor Lake in

Comanche County.

Parks & Wildlife Department
personnel of Brownwood were
called to the scene when the
ducks were found by Corp of
Engineers personnel while
making a routine inspection of

the 4,600 acre lake.

The men began stacking and burning ducks for fear of a possible disease spread. Several ducks were immediately carried to the pathology department at Texas A&M for analysis. Later reports revealed dis-

ease was not a likely cause.
A mold that occurs on peanuts under certain weather con-

ditions, called Aflatoxin, was a prime suspect; however, a thorough investigation was also being conducted in other areas.

Aflatoxin was first discovered in 1951 and very little is known about it except that it is extremely toxic and could affect waterfowl, livestock and even humans.

Proctor Lake is in the heart of the peanut growing industry. This makes it a tremendous attraction to waterfowl, and madlard hunting there is reported to be the best in the state.


