road decided to dig, by hand labor, a well in search of a deeper spring and more water for their locomotives.

According to the late Harry Allen, who manned the pumps for the railroad, the job of digging the well was contracted and Mr. Tom Robin, of Santa Anna, Texas, was named supervisor. Mr. Allen also worked on this well.

This unusually large well is twenty-five feet in diameter, fifty feet deep and round in shape. The walls are sheared with timbers, mortar and rocks. At one time, a boat was lowered into the well and a workman sat in the boat to repair its crumbling walls. The well was dug at the north end of the reservoir about thirty

feet from the water's edge.
A constantly flowing spring found at the bottom of the well and this water, supplemented with the reservoir water, was used for the steam locomotives until 1915. The railroad continued to grow and the well and reservoir could not supply the needed amount of water to service the trains, so a larger supply of water was stored in Lake Merritt, five miles to the north of Goldthwaite. In 1915, the old dam was broken and the reservoir drained, ending years of swim-ming for the young boys of the city. A cut was made in the southern end of the dam, about twenty-five feet across and to a depth of a few feet below the bed of the reservoir, approximately thirty-five feet. Both the well and the reservoir were abandoned by the railroad at the same time. However, after city acquired the land in 1952, the old well again was put to use to fill the city swimming pool and to water the

county park.

The natural terrain of the site in no way helped with the building of the dam, and the entire dam was built by muleteam and hand labor. The dam embankment was first constructed by placing sandstone rock, one upon the other, until the rock structure reached eight to ten feet in height and the remainder of the dam was constructed by dirt being piled on top of the rocks. The old dam still contains the original structure, and large pecan and willow trees grow at its base. It is now a part of the Mills County Park, which is the pride of the county. The little stream, called "Spring Brook" and formed by one of the original springs, runs through the park and on through the break in the dam to reveal the hand-cut

stones that were placed there ninety years ago.
The Santa Fe Railroad still uses this original track, and many of their modern trains

pass those old sites each day. The Mills County Historical Commission and the citizens of the county wanted this site declared a "Recorded Texas Landmark" for our future generations, so they might know and realize the significant part the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad played in the founding and settlement of our town. 

Diseases of peaches plums are common in Mills County, and control programs are a year-long effort because fruits are subject to different diseases which occur throughout the season.

Sprays applied at only speci-fic periods control only cer-tain diseases and allow the rest to develop and destroy the

In 1975 above average rainfall during the fruit development period caused increased losses due to brown rot. Homeowners must start early and follow a continued program if such diseases are to be controlled.

Fungicides such as captan, sulfur or Benlate are effective for controlling disease fruit trees. These should be used on a two-week program starting at bloom and ending with an application one day prior to harvest. The fungicides can be mixed with insecticides, thus reducing the total number of spray applicati applications required

Sanitation is important in disease control. Remove diseased fruit from trees and the soil surface below trees. Also thin the fruit load on trees so that fruit does not touch. Fruit should be spaced on the limb about four to six inches apart.

Fruit can be an important part in any home garden, but a disease control program is necessary to produce a healthy crop.

Control of nematodes in the home garden and flower beds is a problem that homeowners must deal with year after year. These microscopic organisms attack and feed on the root systems of most of our garden vegetables and flowers.

The most commonly found nematode is the root knot nematode. It gets its name from the enlarged knots or galls it forms on plant roots. Above ground symptoms include general loss of vigor and color. Plants many times wilt and die even though adequate soil mois-

ture is available. Prior to this year, homeown ers did not have much with which to combat the nematode. Certain granular nematicides containing the material DBCP were on the market but could not be used on all crops because of the broming residue problem. Methyl braide amigation was also available but was quite dangerous to the applicator and also posed a bromine residue problem.

A new soil fumigant suitable for broad spectrum soil fum-igation by the homeowner has now been cleared for use. The material is presently sold under the trade name of Vapam by the Stauffer Chemical Com-

The material is sprayed on the soil at the rate of one quart per 100 square feet of surface and watered into the soil immediately. Fumigation will be aided if some type of covering can then be pulled over the soil for 3 or 4 days. The covering can then be removed, the soil tilled and allowed to aerate at least 2 weeks before planting.

This product has clearance for all garden crops and residues should not be a problem. Extension demonstrations utilizing this product in numerous Texas counties in 1975 showed excellent control of nematodes as well as many other soil organisms.

This product is presently available from many home garden supply stores in gallon containers. Follow all label instructions carefully, as all pesticides are potentially dan-


