

# Remembering Jones Valley

the Cobbs - William, Beulah, Stella, Elvera

around the turn of the century, moved from Williamson to Hanna Valley in Mills County, January 1, 1898. They bought about one hundred acres of the last available school land in that area, paying \$1.00 an acre, at \$1.00 a month. The help of Mr. Dick Edgerton they built a log cabin which we lived for almost ten years.

May 3, 1898, the Caudell men, Lula, Dahlia, Kite and orphaned nieces and nephews of our father, came to live us. Then a lean-to was built on the log cabin. After farming land seemed nearer the river. In 1904 father bought the Wash place about fifteen miles from Goldthwaite on the Colorado River. We left Hanna and moved to the little community known as Jones Valley, most of the time called Mr. A boom was on. There were two grocery stores where you could buy Arbuckle coffee, flour, salt and Brown tobacco. There was a room schoolhouse which served as a church. Mr. Willis had a cotton gin and a mill for grinding corn. It was all powered by a water wheel operated by a low water across the Colorado River. There was a long cable from the water wheel to the river running up to the mill on top of the river. The wheel was thrown in out of gear when it was necessary to stop and start again. Mr. Albert Willis' son, Mr. Bill Willis, had a hard and winery at Ratler in the turn of the century revenue stamps were used.

nearest neighbor in Ratler was Mr. Austin Cooke. He had a telephone (rural line) operator. When anyone in the phone, all the phones in the line rang. We had to different rings so we could know who was being called. There were two long and a short, however, when the line rang, everyone with a receiver on the line listened. That was the way the people of the community kept up with what was going on. Until we got our own, we had to go to Mr. Cooke's when we needed a doctor or something else important.

families of our little community were farming folks. They got together at threshing time, the men trading work, women preparing good ole meals. Some families had cotton-picking work as well. Cotton was ready to pick same time. We traded picking with the Harvey family. Mr. Harvey was a great picker and how we had to keep near enough to the old hymns and southern tunes. After a hot day's work there was a plunge into the river, cool waters of the Colorado. Occasionally we took a Saturday afternoon to go to the Colorado River was not a place to swim and many hours we've spent in a stick in the ground edge of the swift, dangerous water the measure of speed with which it was and to determine if or we should get the team and buggy ready for our belongings to highland. Twice we had to do it. For a week or more, the pasture under shade we camped until the subsided and settled back on banks. This was a way along the banks of the Colorado.

there was pretty much you would expect in a rural community in those days. Besides the work in the field in which parents and children alike took part, there were dozens of chores that had to be done. Water to be in the home had to be in large barrels from the river. Wood had to be cut; this became a big chore in winter. Every home had a place for heating and a stove for cooking. Every house had to take its turn keeping a supply of wood for the schoolhouse. There were cows to be milked, chickens to be raised, and some butchering time - cutting down of hams and rendering lard, and making soap. But then, after all, there were the delicacies of bread, liver hash and cheese sauce!

Remembering Jones Valley to mind those sturdy families who hauled corn, and oats into

Goldthwaite, usually eking out a bare living, but always hoping to get a little ahead. But in case of hard, hard times, there was always the Trent State Bank in Goldthwaite to see us through to another year. Some will recall these names: Curtis, Wilcox, Hale, Harvey, McFarland, Freeman, Wood, Shotwell, Partridge, Marsh, Westerman, Robinson, Willis, Jernigan, Cooke, and Cobb. And we all felt that the Wallace and Ledbetters from across the river were part of our people.

Children of these families got their first bit of formal education in a one-room schoolhouse, with one teacher dividing her time among about thirty pupils in classes from the first through the seventh grades. Whatever we pupils accomplished in life, much credit is due to the teachers who hammered away at reading, writing, and arithmetic in our early lives. Those boys and girls of some sixty or seventy years ago grew up to be young men and women any community would be proud to claim. They chose to go into useful fields of work. Both World War I and World War II dipped into this group and took some of our boys into the navy and some into the army. Women and girls who had never touched a knitting needle learned to knit, and they spent many hours folding bandages.

Social life in the Valley was closely connected with religious activities. There was Sunday School, preaching services part of the time; Brother Bynum preached and led the singing; Katherine McFarland played the organ. An occasional revival was held. Box suppers brought us together to raise a little money. The crowd came in buggies, wagons and on horseback. The real treat came when we had a picnic dinner on the schoolhouse grounds after church. Parties for the young folks and kodaking were rare, but sure entertainment.

During the years we spent on the Colorado River we had a very close relationship with our father and mother. Deprived of an education, their goal was to do everything in their power to help their children get an education, grow up to be responsible citizens, and to help those in need. Then, thinking of them as they grew older, we remember a father and mother who lived quietly and frugally. Even though their education consisted only of the study of the Blue-Back Speller and McGuffey's First and Second Readers, they read much and were interested in politics, education, literature, religion, history, labor and government; that interest was transmitted to their children and grandchildren. They believed in young people, and we believed in them.

Two years ago (in 1973) three of us went back to Ratler to visit scenes of our childhood. The terrain has all changed. It is mostly ranching land now. The Colorado River has been dammed here and there; the shoals are gone; the schoolhouse is gone; the gate near the old mill is marked "DO NOT ENTER". The principal purpose of our trip back was to find the grave of a baby sister who died September 6, 1907. We knew pretty well where the cemetery should be, but all gates were marked "PRIVATE". One of the few people living in the area directed us through his pasture to a field, laid by in sandy furrows, surrounding the small grove with thirty or forty graves. A few graves were marked with moldered tombstones, names illegible; others were marked with native stones, no names. We found the grave we were looking for, marked with shells, fourteen of them still as perfect as the day they were gathered from the shoals of the Colorado River and placed on the grave by our mother some sixty-six years before. We were told by a member of one of the two families having familiar names, Hale and Jernigan, and living in the area, that no one had been buried out there in some thirty or forty years; although there would be one more burial. A little old lady in a nursing home somewhere had asked to be brought back home someday to Jones Valley.

Perhaps before too much time has passed we shall again go to the Valley that some call Ratler. And there will be still more changes, for time changes all things except the memories of childhood and the vast rich heritage that a child

## Council, Board Of Equalization Review City Tax Books

The Goldthwaite City Council met May 3rd in regular session. The City Tax Equalization Board reported its findings and preliminary conclusions regarding real property values and basis for taxation within the city. During the course of the Board's study, all real property in the city was examined by members of the Board, evaluated in terms of established criteria and market value placed on the property. Rendition sheets have been reviewed in an effort to be fair and impartial to all property. The market value of property within Goldthwaite, arrived at by the Board, was \$13,672,650. To fund the preliminary City budget needs of \$25,000, a 10 percent assessment of market values would be required, providing a taxable loss of almost 1.4 million dollars and a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

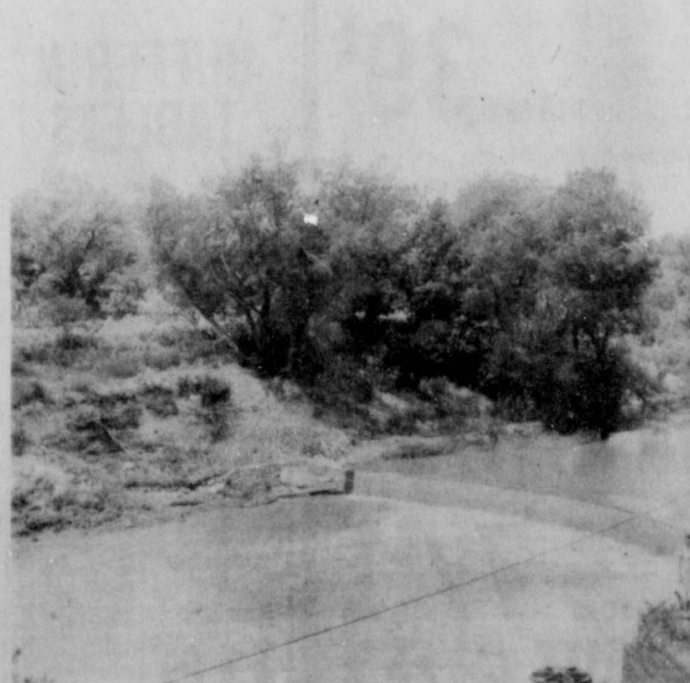
The Council also: Acted to donate \$10 to charity organizations such as Boy Scouts, Salvation Army, etc., as in past years.

Employ two summer workers. Purchase a filing cabinet. Share with the park board problems and possible solutions regarding care and maintenance of the park site.

Decline participation in Mental Health Center fund drive. Approved paid bills list and operations report.

# Brooks, Roberts Re-Elected; Crawford Precinct 3 Comm.

Voting in Mills County Saturday was above average in all nine Mills County voting boxes with a total of 1732 registered voters casting ballots. Mills County has approximately 2685 registered voters.

H. G. (Horace) Brooks was re-elected to the office of Sheriff Tax Assessor-Collector for Mills County by a wide margin. He polled a total of 1227 votes while his opponent, John Robert Mauney, received 505 votes.

Incumbent Burthel B. Roberts was re-elected by the voters of Mills County to serve as Commissioner of Precinct 1 for another term. Roberts received 939 votes to W. G. (Bill) Bishop's 752.

Two new faces were vying for the position of Commissioner, Precinct 3. William Glenn Crawford took the title with a total of 969 votes to that of his opponent, W. E. (Bill) Murray, with 757.

A. M. Pribble, unopposed in the race for County Attorney, polled a total of 1473 votes in Saturday's election.

Dr. T. C. Graves was elected as County Democratic Chairman with a total of 1450 votes. Write-in votes for the position were Owen Yarborough, 3 votes; Tom Duren, 5; Carroll Berry, 1; Mrs. M. E. Holland, 1; Leo Townsend, 1; and J. E. Dryman, 3.

Arthur C. (Cappy) Eads, who was favored over Bob Odum in Mills County by a slim margin of 795 votes to 710, was victorious in the election for District Attorney of the 27th Judicial District.

Don Busby, District Judge, 27th Judicial District, unopposed in the 1976 Democratic Primary, polled 1296 votes. Also unopposed was Bob Shannon, Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, who received 1239 Mills County votes.

San Schlueter took the Mills County vote for State Representative, 43rd District, over incumbent Camm Lary, Jr. by only seven votes, 803 to 796.

Another close race in Mills County was that for State Senator, 24th District. Grant Jones, who was re-elected to that post, fell fifteen votes behind opponent Joe Gibson in the Mills County race. Gibson polled 799 Mills County votes to Jones' 784.

W. T. Phillips was favored in Mills County for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Unexpired Term, by a vote of 719. Carl Dally polled 382 votes and Jim Vollers received 170 in that race.

Truman Roberts took the race for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals with 977 votes. Jerome Chamberlain polled 389 Mills County votes in that race.

John F. Onion, unopposed for the office of Presiding Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, polled 1172 local votes.

Jack Pope, unopposed in the Associate Justice Supreme Court, Place 1, received 1052 Mills County votes. For place 2, Associate Justice Supreme Court, Don Yarborough polled 940 votes to that of Charles W. Barrow with 573. James G. Denton received 1149 votes for Associate Justice Supreme Court, Place 3 position.

Lane Denton took the local lead in the Railroad Commissioners race with a total of 428 votes. Others vying for the position were Jerry Sadler, 400; Jon Newton, 383; Robert (Bob) Wood, 129; Terence L. O'Rourke, 52; David Finney, 45; Woodrow Wilson Bean, 37; and R. W. Williams, 29.

County voters favored Poage by 1022 votes against Steve S. Alexander's 468 in the race for U. S. Representative of the 11th District.

Lloyd Bentsen took the county lead in the race for U. S. Senator with a total of 852 votes. Others in the race were Phil Gramm, 569 votes; Hugh Wilson, 116; and Leon Dugi, 20.

In the nomination for delegates to the National Convention, local voting went as follows: For Jimmy Carter - Harold Straughn, 827; Jeanine Hicks, 826; W. E. Lessing, 772.

For George C. Wallace - James DeZales, 271; Shawn Sullivan, 268; Betty Smith, 265. For Lloyd Bentsen - David Kultzgen, 196; Nancy Perkins, 186; Coke Mills, 185.

For Fred Harris - Dewey Pinckney, 28; Bridget Vardaman, 25; Belinda Snyder Wilson, 21.

## Dam And Hand Dug Well Historical Landmark Dedication

Dedication ceremonies were held for an Official Texas Historical Marker, the Dam and Hand Dug Well, located in Mills County Park, on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. A fine group of interested citizens attended the ceremonies.

This is the first historical marker to be dedicated in Mills County for a number of years. The program was staged on the east side of the park at the location of the old well and the new rock and masonry based historical marker.

The program included the Pledge of Allegiance, the invocation by Rev. Dan Connally, pastor of the Goldthwaite First Baptist Church, and a welcome by Goldthwaite Mayor J. D. Harper. W. P. Duren gave the history of the site, and Mrs. M. F. Horton, chairman of the Mills County Historical Commission, introduced Judge Herbert Faulkner; Highway Engineer Buddy Morgan; City Manager Max Pitts; members of the historical commission, and members of the historical marker committee.

The beginning of the historical commission for Mills County was through the office of Judge Faulkner and he has been an active member of the committee. Buddy Morgan and his highway men built the attractive stone and mortar base

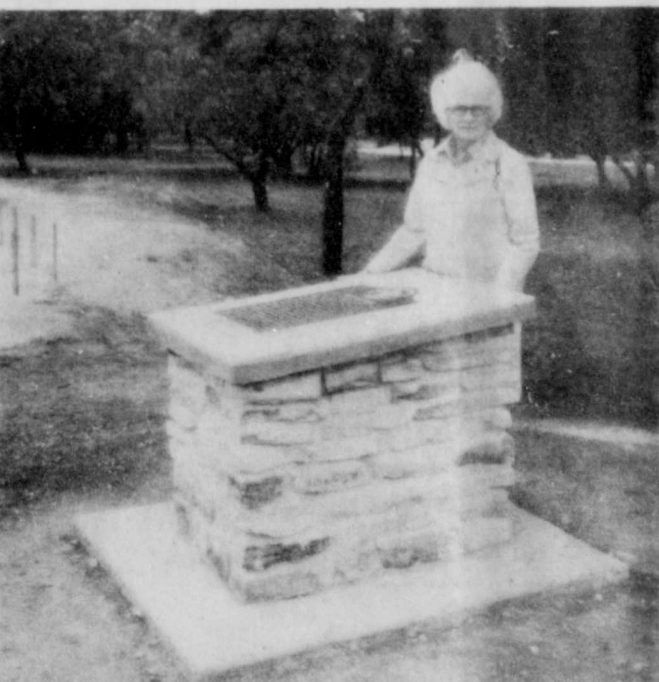
for the marker and graded and marked off a parking area nearby. Mr. Pitts and his city workers have done much work in the park in recent days to make it more attractive.

Mrs. Horton, Mrs. W. P. Duren, and Mrs. Gerald Head unveiled the marker. The program was closed with the benediction given by Rev. Edwin Young, pastor of the Goldthwaite Church of Christ, and the viewing of the marker by all who attended.

The following inscription is engraved on the marker:

DAM AND WELL

When the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad reached this area in 1855, Company officials platted the town of Goldthwaite and built a reservoir to supply water for steam locomotives. A 25 foot high dam near this site stored water from several springs, creating a pond that became a favorite swimming spot. The railroad dug a 50 foot deep, spring fed well at this site in 1906 to provide more water. In 1915, when these sources became inadequate, the dam was broken and reservoir drained. Today the springs form a stream which runs through Mills County Park, and the well is used by the City.

## Bloodmobile Schedules Visit May 12th

Rev. Dan Connally has announced that the bloodmobile from the blood bank which supplies blood for the people in this area will be here next Wednesday, May 12, from 12 noon till 6:00 p.m. The bloodmobile makes three annual trips to Goldthwaite, and so far the response has been very good.

Our local hospital has used sixty units of blood this year and our aim is to replace the amount of blood we use. According to Charles Childress, medical technologist at the hospital, there is a severe shortage of blood, and for the first time that he can remember he was unable to get some types of blood when calling the blood bank this past month. He went on to say that our volunteer system of blood donors is the most desirable, but if the shortage is not relieved by volunteers we might have to go back to paid donors which is an expensive

blood for patients who cannot usually afford it.

We have a situation here in Mills County that is unusual, in that a lot of people who receive blood do not have relatives close-by to replace the blood, so we must rely upon volunteers.

Rev. Connally again reminds everyone that our blood replacement program is set up for the people in this county and their blood needs will be taken care of wherever they may happen to need blood.

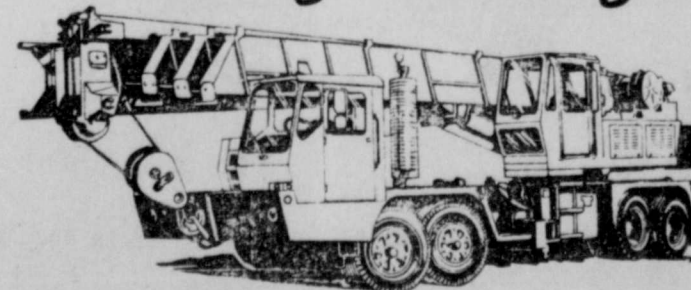

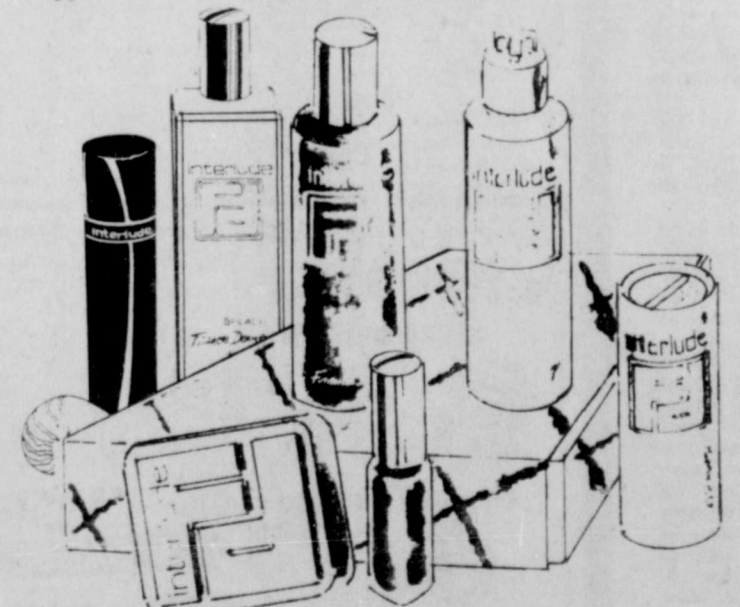
