pect their river to rise at intervals. They know the floods will come as surely as the sun will rise, so they recognize the signs and prepare for them. They also know and accept the fact that they are forever in danger of their property being flooded or washed away and know the devastation of a big flood. But no one expected, or even dreamed a flood could be so great as the one they ex-perienced on the Colorado in 1936. As the waters crept higher and higher, people placed markers at the edge of the rising water to measure the speed of the rising. This is a common practice with the river folk. Marker after marker disappeared beneath the murky waters. Finally, as the water reached record heights, lands never before flooded became muddy seas. Houses, barns, farm machinery and animals were seen floating away. Wet and bedrabbled chickens and turkeys went down stream perched atop houses and debri. The main stream of the river broke across fields and laid waste to vast acres of fertile soil. Homesteads that had stood on the river banks for decades

were gone with the vicious

current. Such is the way of life along the Colorado River.

The Bell Story

father, Richard Bell, drove to Goldthwaite from their home in DeLeon looking for land to buy. In Goldthwaite they heard about a place for sale on the Colorado River. They drove to Jones Valley (Ratler), looked over the land, and talked to the owner, J. W. Hill. That night, Mr. Hill went back to DeLeon with the Bells, and Richard Bell agreed to trade the merchandise in his general dry-goods store for the land. That night, before the contract was signed, Mr. Hill loaded his car with goods from the store and took them back to Goldthwaite. That was in those 'good ole days' when a man's

word was his bond.
On February 27, 1922, O.
B Bell, with his wife Anna Mae and daughter, Grenetta (Mrs. J. D. Berry) moved all their possessions in a horsedrawn wagon to their new home on the Colorado River. They soon heard stories about the rampages of the river and how it could get out of its banks, and these stories became a reality to the Bells the very first year. The river got up in their garden, and when began to recede O. B. Bell found a fish lodged against his garden fence. His father, Richard, had a good time telling everyone in DeLeon about his son catching a fish in his

But an unbelievable flood was

to strike the Bells, as well as everyone else along the Colorado, that will never be for-

The Bells built a new rock house that year from stones found on their place and still live there today. On September 20, 1936, only two weeks after they had moved into their new home, the river began to rise. As the water crept closer and closer, the Bells became alarmed and built a dam around the new house. But soon the water came pouring over the dam and on into the house. Mr. and Mrs. Bell and some of their neighbors, stayed far into the night putting their possessions in the attic. Windows were opened to let the water flow through. As water poured into their basement, a little daughter, Vera, cried, "The water is getting into my playhouse." The piano was jacked up to the ceiling, but water eventually covered the foot-pedals. The daughter, Vera, now Mrs. Jack Simpson, still has the piano in good condition.

Mrs. Bell cooked supper in her flooding home that night on a wood-burning stove, wading in water, for all those helping. Soon the neighbors began warning the Bells that they should leave before someone was drowned. As they left the house, Mrs. Bell was carrying a coal oil burning lantern so every one could see. As she stepped off the front porch, water came up to her shoulders. The river finally rose to sixty-seven feet. and was forty-two inches above the floor level of the Bell home. Mr. Rell made a mark on the rocks on the side of the house showing the height of the water.

When the water began to re-

cede, Mr. Bell returned to the house to sweep the water away, carrying much of the mud out with it. He later stated he felt so lonesome in the house with all that mud and water that he got a neighbor, Charlie Griffith, to help him. When the flood went down, three inches of mud stood under the Many people asked the Bells if the water got in the basement, as if by some way wouldn't. The floors were made of hardwood and they didn't build a second floor under the top floor as some people did. Some of the boards buckled, but the same floor is used today. The absence of the second floor probably saved the floor, because it finally dried out. They had wallpaper on most of the walls, but in a short time even the water line faded away, and visitors could not believe the wallpaper had been through

When O. B. Bell's brother, Dee, who lived in DeLeon, heard of the devastating flood, he and his wife Minnie started to the Bell place. When they reached the Pecan Bayou they couldn't cross and returned home. A short time later, Mr. Bell's father said he knew a way to get there, and they came by way of Mullin and through the back pastures to finally reach the Bell place. When he got there, Mrs. Bell and her daughters began to cry. He said, "Don't cry. We are just glad

you are alive.' The river has never again reached the Bell house; however, it came into the field again in 1938, and we hope to never, never, have another flood like the one that swept through the beautiful lands along the Colorado River in 1936.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT HIGH **BLOOD PRESSURE**

Treating high blood pressure takes more than one person. It is a combination of the patient, the physician and the pharmacist.

1. If you don't know whether you have high blood pressure, ask your doctor to check your pressure, or go to your nearest clinic or health center for a pressure check. You should do this even if you feel well, because high blood pressure may not have any noticeable symptoms.

2. If you have high blood pressure, follow your doctor's instructions about taking medicine, diet-including weight loss if you are overweight-and changes in general health habits, such as rest and recreation. These measures will reduce the risk of stroke, heart attack, kidney failure and heart failure.

3. When your physician prescribes medications, keep taking them whether you feel well or not, and whether you think the drugs are helping or hurting. Report exactly how you feel to your doctor. He can then make any suitable changes needed in your treatment program, or he can ask us to dispense a different medication that may be more suitable to your individual condition.

4. Cooperate with the health team of physician and pharmicist. Working together, blood pressure can be kept under control.

Protecting pecan trees from a host of diseases require carefully-timed spray progra Pecan scab and stricky shu are two serious diseases that can be treated with the fungicide Benomyl.

Pecan scab is a fungal disease which causes blacklesions the size of a match head appear on pecan shucks. causes heavy pecan losses and premature loss of leaves.

The most effective treats for scab is to apply Benome when the foliage is approximate ly one-third grown. Repeat the treatment in two weeks a two weeks during periods intermittent rainfall.

Sticky shuck causes pecan losses in late July early August but does not affect the foliage. Black lesions fr one-half to one inch on pe shucks characterize th






