Other families soon followed the Paynes and found a beautiful spring with a flat bed-rock bottom, now on the Orb Duncan place, flowing from the side of the mountain. But they also found Indian tracks around the spring and knew it was an Indian watering place, so they passed on. The spring was to later furnish water for the Duncan and Hunt families for many years.

There are two wells on the Jack Elms place that have always been a mystery, yet unsolved. When the wells were dug is beyond the remembrance of anyone living today. They are hand-dug to a depth of about fifteen feet and have never been known to go dry. One well is about three feet from the other, and the mystery is - why two wells so close together? It is known that pioneers over the community hauled water for home use, and that women of the community went there to do their washing. They gathered around the wells on wash day with their washpots, washboards, tubs and lye soap to spend most of the day chatting, washing, and visiting while their children played nearby.

There was once a postoffice in Payne Gap on the T. E. Duncan place, and the first postmaster was Richard Jenkins, the grandfather of Willie and Jessie Duncan. Later Sam and Callie Higgins ran the postoffice for many years. There was a school in Payne Gap, and one of the teachers was Mrs. Willie Steel. There was a blacksmith shop, and a store operated by a Mr. Taylor. Later another was operated by Wayne Hensley. But as was the fate of most small communities in Mills County, population began to dwindle and the small town faded into the past. There is only one small rock schoolhouse standing in Payne Gap today to show a country village ever existed there.

Settlers in the community were the Dodsons, W. F. Hortons, who settled there in 1874, Higgins, the Hearnss, Ervins, Tom and L. B. Hunts, Johnsons, Jenkins, Paynes, Wilkies, Arwoods, and the Baughs. The J. T. Owens family has owned the 'Pigfoot Pasture' in the community for almost a century.

Later came the Duncans, Arthur and Jack Elms, the Wigleys, Bairds, Howards, Willis Horton and his family, who were born there, and the Whites.

There were also the Franklins, Hallenbecks, Ramseys and many others.

Mrs. Willie and Jessie Duncan, sisters, live today near the gap in the mountain not far distant from the spot where their great-grandfather Brazilla Payne, was killed. The children of Laura Miller Saylor were also great grandchildren of this pioneer man. Their names were Jacob, Wellie, Claude, Kelly, Blaine, Mack, Dane, Ella, Consoella, Tillie, and Carrie Saylor - so his offspring number in the hundreds today. Mr. Payne's attempt to tame and settle this part of the wild and unsettled Texas was not in vain.

will never know when Payne first realized that he was surrounded. It was evidence that he was in his sheep up the side of the mountain, coming ever to an ambush where they were hiding behind large rocks that dot the hillside. We also know that Payne, being the rugged man that he was, went down his empty rifle against the two great. The battle was left fatherless. A depression in the mountain not far from where all, and the community, including it, has from that forward been known as Payne Gap.

Payn was followed in the very next year by his wife, who moved here with her husband. She was originally from North Carolina.

T. E. Duncan has the original license issued to him by T. Jenkins and Martha Jenkins, a daughter of Brazilla Payne, issued by Judge Williams of Lampasas on September 30, 1858.

Orb Duncan has the original papers her great-grandfather Brazilla Payne received when his land was patented in 1857. The papers contained the following sworn statement:

STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF LAMPASAS  
I, T. E. Duncan, do hereby certify that I was a bonafide settler on vacant land within the limits of the Pacific Railroad Reservation of the Act of August 1856 - repealing said reservation - and have continued to reside on the same in the county of Lampasas - State of Texas from August 26th, 1856 to the present time of 22 January,




