The Way It Was "The Circuit Riders"

By Hartal Langford Blackwell

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Saint Paul's eagerness to carry the gospel to all the people makes a good comparison to the early circuit riders of Mills County. Their days were long, their devotion profound and their dangers many.

One circuit rider, Reverend G. W. Templin, had four past-orates. He rode to one on Saturday night - on to another on Sunday morning - then to the next to preach at 3 p.m. on Sunday afternoon and finally finished his circuit on Sunday Often they rode for night. miles without seeing house or human

There was a discipline about the circuit riders that was amazing. They were always on time, always ready to help and always enthusiastic wherever a few people gathered to hear their message.' There was a compulsion from within that drove them on, no matter how great the odds against them. There were not many

log cabin or the shade of a tree would do as well for delivering a sermon. There were no parsonages, church commit-tees, conferences or electric organs, but there were souls to be saved and they said, one to the other, "What are we waiting for?" And on they went. Indians lurked beside many of their trails and at times men tried the very souls of

those early ministers just to see how sincere the "preachers" really were; the elements, their nights in the open, rain, snow and the scorching heat a part of their lives. Many times early ministers and circuit riders were forced to arm themselves for protection against a lawless land. At early meetings, guns were leaned against walls just inside doors of the little log churches.

People may ask, "How did they stand it?" The answer is, "Many of them didn't." Many died under it. They either died from exposure, burned themselves out with the strenuous pace they set for them-

lves, or were killed by Indians and lawless men.

Perhaps the words Jesus gave the Desciples when he said, "Take no gold, or silver, nor copper in your purses; no bag for your journey, nor two tunics, nor sandals, nor staff", as they started to go forth on their ministry parallels closely the mission of the circuit riders. Money they did not have - their clothes were few and they never saw a staff. The one exception would be the bag, for a bag they did have - a saddlebag. There is no way to describe

the fantastic storage of a west-ern saddlebag. The circuit riders' saddlebags were magic for out of them came Sunday Schools, churches, marriages, homes, conversions and most importantly came the strengthened lives of men and women. From those saddlebags came hope and encouragement to the lonely, deprived and homesick pioneers in Mills County when the land was wild and untamed An old circuit rider might well have made the following tribute to the two old saddle-

bags he had carried across his saddle for uncountable miles and many years. "These old saddlebags are worn

wrinkled, and so am I. If you want to know what caused the wrinkles, ask the cold nights, stormy winds and pelting rains ask the red splattering mud of Hanna Valley or the black sticky mud of Pleasant Grove. Ask the water that flows down Bennett Creek or the Pecan Bayou. Ask a certain bank on the Colorado River where these old bags washed ashore when my horse and I were trying to swim that swollen stream. These saddlebags were once my traveling library, wardrobe and often my cupboard; at times they held my horse's oats. They often were stuffed with Bibles, a side of bacor. Treshly ground sausage or a dressed wild turkey. They were filled to overflowing many times with fresh vegetables, lye soap, sauerkraut, fruits and berries and even honey. All this was a circuit rider's pay when there was no gold or silver or copper to give. This was our "support". Some of these wrinkles tell of laughter, mis-takes, and a few tell of sadness in our life, but most tell of our many, many triumphs." By 1855 people of all Protestant faiths and a few Catholics were moving into Mills County. The first congregation meet and hear a circuit

rider was in the cabin home of Charles Mullin in 1857 on

school at Lane's Chappel. He wrote in a journal of his life the following:

"There was preaching once a month by some circuit rider preacher, and I remen Brother Davis who walked from Goldthwaite - twenty miles away. He would wade the Pecan Bayou, and sometimes when the Bayou was up he would undress and wade across, holding his clothes high above his head. Another old-time minister was Uncle Johnny Hanna, preacher and Indian Ranger, a man small in stature. He was a typical westerner. All the preachers wore boots. The songs were from old hymnals with no notes, and all songs were sung to two meters - long and short. Another preacher, Brother Vest, used to scare me with his portrayal of the story of Noah and the flood. Brother Benningfield was a very pious and good man. Brother Jarrett was a Missionary Baptist, and he and his family often came our house for dinner and they were fed first - so we children had to wait for the second table and get what was left. We usually had fried chicken on Sundays when the preachers came.

Early circuit riders and ministers were M. N. Weatherby, Methodist; Thomas Burrows, Baptist; Charles H. Miles, Baptist; H. Childress, Metho-J. Vann, Baptist; L. dist; L. L. Hays, Baptist; J. W. Kelly, Methodist; D. I. Haralson, Baptist; J. R. Wilmeth, Church of Christ; Reverend Wyatt, Holi ness; Randolph Smith, Church of Christ; J. S. Bowles, Meth-odist; J. M. Mickle, Baptist; C. W. Templin, Methodist; M. Gilliam, Presbyterian; Kelly Father Kelly and Father O'Hara, Catholic; M. J. O'Quinn Methodist; J. C. Combs, Baptist; Billy Green Shaw, Baptist; W. J. Weems, Church of Christ; Joe Benningfield, Methodist; G. A. Jarrett, Baptist; and Rev-

erend Bynum, Baptist. Not all the above men were circuit riders. Most of them were early pastors in small pioneer churches, but the rewards of their ministry are seen today in the churches and lives of people in Mills County.

Often, the early-day ministers of all denominations gathered at various places over the county - especially along the Colorado, and large congregations of people arrived in covered wagons, hacks and horseback for a long protracted camp meeting. When people reached this shady retreat, they were in no hurry to leave, for the camp meetings were looked forward to for months. It is hard for us today to

realize the large part they played in the life of the pioeers and the religious life of the people. There were joyous greetings

as family after family arrived, and immediately set up camp. It was a time for worship talking of religion, and visiting - all three a rare treat to people of the frontier who

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





