The school was officially consolidated with Goldthwaite Public Schools in

1946. The building stood idle for several years, and some had visions of using it for a community center, but it was finally sold to Dr. M. A. Childress and moved to his ranch across the Bayou. All that is left of Rock Springs is the cemetery, the bubbling springs and memories.

There were many singing schools in the summer months. At times the school lasted two weeks, and singers came from Williams Ranch and Regency; some wonderful singing took place.

Most youngsters had to help with the crops, so fun times came on Saturday nights. We had community singings at the schoolhouse once each month and there were always playparties to look forward to. Many times young people came to the J. C. Stark home - gathered around the piano and sang until midnight.

In those days, the word "neighbor" had a true meaning. When sickness struck, neigh bors went to help for as long as they were needed. When a death occured, men in the community gathered to dig the grave. When a crop needed planting or a field needed breaking, men went with planters and plows and got it done. We grew most of our food. We killed hogs for meat; fruit was canned or dried on tin roofs; cabbage was chopped, made into sauerkraut and stored in five gallon stone jars in the storm cellar; corn was made into hominy; cotton was ginned and the seed brought home for cattle feed; pumpkins and kershaws were buried in the cottonseed so they wouldn't freeze. A pit was dug and lined with straw for sweet potatoes and turnips - corn tops were ricked over the potatoes, and sheets of tin or boards were piled on top of the ricks to keep the whole thing dry.

There was an abundance of milk, butter, buttermilk, cream, chicken and eggs - always. There was honey from which pies and cakes were made when sugar was scarce. We never once dreamed of going to the grocery store everyday as people do now. An occasional trip for staples and a few treats was all that was necessary.

Inspections Should Be Made For Sorghum Midge & Army Worms

Mills County Farmers and Ranchers should be making careful and regular inspections of pastures and grain sorghum fields. This past week has shown a marked increase in the in festation rates of two potentially destructive insects; the Grain Sorghum Midge and the Army Worm. The sorghum midge has been very active in many fields the past few days and this insect can do considerable damage to a sorghum crop. The danger period for grain sorghum is during the bloom stage when the heads are in pollination. Once the pollination period has past and the heads begin to form seed, the sorghum midge can no longer be considered a threat. The problem we are having now is that many fields are matur-ing irregularly. We have a percentage of heads already past pollination, some now in polli-nation and some just beginning to pollinate, in the same field. This makes the decision regarding chemical control one of percentages. It is considered feasspray grain sorghum if a field has as many as 20-30

percent of the heads in pollina-tion and if you can find one sorghum midge adult per head.

The army worm is now be coming active in our county al-We recommend that all producers be on the careful watch for this very destructive insect. The army worm is a very destructive yet easily killed insect. The most important facet of control is timing and thorough cov-erage. Fields should be inspeced regularly to avoid loosing forage.

We are also preserving his-tory by placing historical markers on historical sites, buildings, cemeteries, etc. We have placed one at Mills County Park, formerly a Santa Fe landmark. The coming of the railroad was the beginning of Goldthwaite in 1885. A marker has also been placed at North Brown Cemetery, one of the earliest cemeteries in the county. A marker will be installed soon at Mullin on their United Methodist Church. The congregation met first and organized in 1857. A marker to be placed at Williams Ranch Cemetery at the grave of John Williams who founded the settlement of Williams Ranch. Also, a marker is to be placed on the highway in Mullin at the intersection of the Williams Ranch road, marking the Williams Ranch settlement. It was one of the first towns on the old Fort Phantom Road.

A historical marker also has been designated for the Regency Suspension Bridge, a rarity left in Texas. This marker will be placed in Goldthwaite at the intersection of Farm Road 574 that leads to the Regency Bridge. A historical marker for

Center City and the Oak Tree, which is famous in a lot of Texas books, is in the hands of the Research Committee at the State Commission Office in Austin. Mrs. Deloce Parlamer, a research person, is trying to find evidence that Center City is the center of Texas. A marker for Pleasant Grove Cemetery has been applied for and if sent, it will be placed at the entrance of the cemetery.

The Historical Commission was appointed by the County Court, May 28, 1975. Officers are changed every two years. We have had full cooperation from everyone, so let's keep preserving history and give the Museum full cooperation, also.
