store was a counter for gro-ceries; down the middle of the store were tables overflowing with bolts of cloth; and on the other wall were boxes stacked to the ceiling packed with shoes, long-handled underwear, socks, blue denim shirts and

There could be found washpots, milk buckets, cotton batts, milk crocks, churns, milk coolers, kerosene lamps and just about anything the pioneer woman could ask for. Farther back in the store was the store-keeper's little office stuffed keeper's little office stuffed with a huge roll-top desk and swivel chair, and on the wall was an opening through which people paid their bills. Arranged at different places over the store were kegs and barrels of all sizes. They were brimming with sugar flow.

brimming with sugar, flour, vinegar, pickles, salt, molass nails and bolts. In some es, hans and doits. In some stores, especially those in settlements of German ances-try, there was always a barrel of pickled herring ready for the taking.

The center of the store was

a place of importance for there stood the pot-bellied stove. It was around this stove that people were inevitably drawn to visit, sit in a circle on old rawhide or rope-bottomed chairs and talk the time away, spending the good part of a morning or afternoon. A pan of ashes in front of the stove served as a spittoon and was missed more than it was hit. A big cracker barrel stood nearby, usually, and the warmth of the stove kept the crackers crisp. They gathered around the cold stove in the summer months, too. It was their one place to sit and talk.

Pioneer women often went to town with their husbands, and for them this occasional visit was a happy break from their monotonous and lonely lives. They fondled bolts of materials - calico and muslin; pored over the finer silks -sighed and walked away. There was usually a bench near the front door where women often sat and chatted together about the ills of their children, how their gardens grew and per-haps complimented each other on a new calico dress or a ruffled bonnet. They seldom

when the husband had finished with his visit and learned of the community, all the news of the community, he gathered what supplies he could afford to buy and drove into the sunset to once again take up the task of making some sort of living for the family. Probably the storekeep-er added another sum to the already mounting bill, hoping as he did that rain would come soon, or that the price of cotton be he could then feed and clothe his own family.

Dove Season Opens Here September 1st

For any who might need to be reminded, dove season opens September 1. Traditional noon to sunset shooting hours must be observed during the continuous morning dove season Sept. 1 through Oct. 14 in the North Zone and in the first portion of the season established recently by the Texas Parks and

Wildlife Commission. Daily bag on the mourning dove is 10 birds with possession limit of 20. This applies to all Texas dove seasons.


North Zone beginning Jan. 1 and runs through Jan. 16 when the shooting hours start 30 minutes before sunrise and will end at sunset.

Last year an experimental all-day season was tried in the winter segment of the South Zone with no appreciable change in dove harvest. Hunters contacted by the TP&WD generally were pleased with the additional hunting opportunity whether hunting opportunity whether they took more doves or not

According to Clyde Holt, TP &WD biologist in Decatur, the opening of dove season will probably be a little "slower" than normal for the North Central Texas area. Holt said it is strictly a food situation and at this early date we have no abundance of dove feed. As the croton (dove weed), sunflowers and milk weed matures our dove population should build up where this type of situation ex-ists. Holt also advised hunters to keep a close watch on the harvest of grain fields because under the right conditions they provide some of the very best dove hunting.

influence of alcoholic beverages on the premises of Goldthwaite Schools is absolutely prohibited and will be punished by a three day expulsion and exclusion from all extracurricular activities for six weeks, or as otherwise deemed appropriate by the school administrative offi-

"The possession, use or influence of any alcholic bever-

sponsored or school-related activity, in or about any other "The possession, use, or school district's facility, contest, meeting or program, or on any off-campus school sanctioned trip is prohibited. Punishment for violation of this rule will be expulsion for three days and exclusion from all extracurricular activities for six weeks, or as otherwise deemed appropriate.

"Any drug used in any manner by any student for any reason on school premises or schoolsponsored or sanctioned activities must be properly identified. Its use must be supervised by the school nurse, classroom teacher, or proper school representative. Non-prescription drugs must be in properly labeled containers and accompanied by a verifiable signed note from the student's parent or guardian giving permission and instructions for the drug's use. A prescription drug must be in the originally dispensed container which must be labeled with accurate instructions for use. Prescription drugs should be taken with the consent and under the supervision of the school nurse, classroom teacher, or other proper school official. Prescription drugs are also subject to verification by parents, pharmacist, or physician. Any drug not properly identified or without adequate directions for use, or without written parental or guardian consent for its use, will be confiscated. The drug will be confiscated, if possible. in the presence of a responsible and recorded witness. It will be labeled with the student's name and the date and place of confiscation. It will be placed in a sealed container and stored by the principal or superintendent for future reference. The offending student's parents or guardian will be summoned as rapidly as possible, if possible. Unless the drug is readily identifiable without doubt by parent, guardian, physician, or pharmacist by name and use, appropriate law officials will be su to take charge of the contrand and the situation.

school's punishment for a drug violation will be entirely independent of that determined by the laws of the state and nation. A drug violation will be punished by expulsion indefinitely and forfeiture of participation in all extracurricular activites for a minimum of six weeks, or as otherwise deemed appropriate for the specific offense by school administration. The term "drug", as used

in this policy statement, applies in the broadest sense of the word to include substances used orally, by injection, suppositories, topical preparations, inhalents, and smokable sub-'Any student who willfully

withholds evidence or information about drug or alcohol violations may be punished for their negligance and complicity as

demanded by the incident. "Violation of the drug alcohol policies of the Goldth waite Schools will also result in the automatic loss of all class and organization offices, leadership positions and the privilege of school representation for the remainder of the school year."



for homesewing is more than just picking up a package of needles and finding thread to match the fabric color. Kind and size of needle and

thread necessary depend upon fiber, fabric construction and purpose for stitching.

Selecting needles and threads

For example, in buying need-les, choose ball point needles when sewing knits and sharp needles when sewing woven fabrics.

Specialists recommend using 100 per cent polyester or cottoncovered polyester thread for polyester or polyester blend fabrics. These threads have elasticity and do not shrink in wash-

Because of their irregulari-American-made ties, today's polyester or cotton covered polyester threads are not sized like 100 per cent cotton thread. Consequently, larger size(size 14 or 16) needles are necessary

when sewing with this thread to prevent breaking, tangling and uneven tension. The eye of the needle must be large enough for the largest part of the thread to pass through. Some Swiss - made polyester

threads are more uniform in shape, and they are sized. A fine needle may be used when sewing with fine thread.

Thread for topstitching, com monly called buttonhole twist, is available in polyester or in cotton. It is heavier and thicker than regular thread. Choose the kind which is most campatible to the fabric being used. size 16 or 18 needle, used when sewing with buttonhole twist, al-lows the thread to move through the eye freely without fraying.

Swiss-made cotton buttonhol twist may be preshrunk on the spool before used in stitching on polyester, polyester blends or cotton fabrics. Cotton thread

has a higher luster than polyester.

If your machine does not sew with heavy threads or buttonhole twist, use two stands of thread for topstitching.

Wind some thread on a second bobbin and thread it and the spool thread together on top. Separate the two threads at the tension disc if your machine has a top tension regulator.

Thread both threads through the needle. This provides a heavier looking topstitching than one strand and resembles buttonhole
