In 1905 the little school burned and an empty store building, built by a Mr. Adams, was used until another could be built. school was always known as the Minor School District and came to Goldthwaite in 1937, then consolidated with Lometa in 1943. Some of the teachers were Sally Reeves, Mae Stockton, Rothe Goldman, Addie Hudson, Rosie Keese, Roy Simpson, Snow Reid, Nanny Nelson, Muriel and Thelma Linkenhoger, Minnie Jenkins, Myra Kuykendall, Harley Hanes Black, Marvel Ford, Fields Hines, Freda Hines, and the

last teacher, Lloyd Laughlin. In 1912, when so many stockmen and area ranchers were shipping their cattle by rail to markets north and the old cattle drives had come to an end, the railroad built a spur and stock pens about two miles north of Antelope Gap. The post office was moved to that location and the name of the little village was changed to Scallorn.

The name "Scallorn" was for "Gid" Scallorn, who was foreman of the old C - Ranch when it was owned by the Ware Brothers. Uncle Gid, as he was affectionately called, is remembered for many things, but one thing in particular comes to mind when his name is mentioned. He was a bachelor and all household chores were his to do alone. It is told that he put the cream for making butter in a half-gallon fruit iar, tied it to the back of his saddle, and went out to ride the fences or round up cattle. When he returned home, the butter was churned.

In 1914, a new Baptist Church was built beside the post office. The post office and general were first operated by Mr. and Mrs. Talley; then John H. Kuykendall ran the post office, general store, and barber shop until the early 1930's. C. H. (Cap) Black was the first section foreman for the rail-

road at Scallorn. Early families living in Scallorn were the Robert Evans, the Cap Blacks, Gus Fords, Ed Ringers, Winter Stevensons, Joe Morgans, Tom Elliotts, Sam Kuykendalls, Tom Hufstut-lers, "Dem" Fords, D. J. Smiths, Frank Hines, Laughlins, C. H. Hortons, Luther Jernigans, W. W. Say-

lors and Brian Ware. Later came the Lamar Mc-Leans, Henry Bristers, Buck Schulers, Johnny Crawfords the Harris family, the Varnells, R. Jordans, C. H. Blacks, Layton and Theresa Black Dutch and Rena Smith, the Lloyd Kings, the Weddells, Bill Hightowers, the Bill Bishops, the James Hortons, the Wayne Henrys, Flo and Dick Hughes, and

Thomas E. Winters. The early settlers had to depend on each other for so many things; there has never been a community in the county or any other place for that matter where neighbors are better, more fun has been had, and life is enjoyed more than Scallorn. 



Austin-The Comptroller's auditors and enforcement officers routinely conduct examinations of the books of Texas businesses every day, so there's no reason for a businessman to get uptight when he's notified of an impending audit.

Most taxpayers are audited on a regular basis and a businessman should not feel his account is under suspicion for any tax liabilities when he gets word our auditors are planning to drop in on him.

Our procedure is always to cooperate with the businessman so that a routine audit examination of his business records may be scheduled so as to minimize inconvenience.

As a practical matter the Comptroller has authority under state law to examine all books, records, papers, and equipment of a business, as well as to investigate the nature of the business, to determine if taxes are owed to the state.

Our Field Auditors and Enforcement Officers are professionally trained and competent to apply the law to each specific type of business. As a result of that

professional training, a

businessman can be assured that the auditor or enforcement officer will conduct an impartial examination of all necessary records. To perform an audit, it will be necessary for the

Comptroller's Office

personnel to examine records

normally kept by each business. An auditor or enforcement officer is authorized to employ one of several types of auditing procedures. After an examination of a portion of the business records, the auditor or enforcement officer has the option of conducting either "detailed" or "sample" audit

examination. In a detailed audit, the auditor or enforcement officer reviews and examines all business records for the entire audit period. In a sample audit, the Comptroller's examiner will employ standard American Institute of Certified Public Accountant projection and

sampling techniques. Under this method of auditing errors found in representative samples of business records are projected throughout the entire audit period. This auditing procedure

serves two purposes: it minimizes both the state's cost of conducting audits and the cost to taxpayers of providing detailed records for the entire period of the audit, while insuring statistically accurate tax assessment. Regardless of the type of audit procedure chosen, the

final choice will always be

based on the idea that the

audit must be fair and

equitable to the taxpayer. A businessman who has questions about his tax account with the Comptroller of Public Accounts should contact the auditor or enforcement officer handling the audit. A businessman who needs assistance prior to the scheduled audit date or who has any concerns during the course of the audit, should






