# Priddy And Its History

Eighteen miles to the north of Goldthwaite rests a peaceful little town called Priddy, named for an early-day settler, Thomas Jefferson Priddy, who was once a Texas Ranger.

In the fall of 1886, Mr. Priddy moved his family north through a raging blizzard and stopped for shelter at a little log schoolhouse where a few families of German ancestry had already settled.

In the late 1870's and early 1880's, the first permanent settlers came to the lovely and productive community with its black loamy soil, surrounded by a line of blue hills and drained by the headwaters of the Cowhouse Creek. The Niemans, Kunkles, Schlee family, Davis, Schusters, Schults, Gromatzky, Hoshertz and Bufe families were early settlers. There were also the Meyers, Phluggers, Drueckhammers, Hillers and later the Priddys.

Soon the need for a little log schoolhouse became a necessity and it was built by citizens of the community in 1888, two miles south of the present town. Homes were built and lumber was hauled in from Waco by horse-drawn freighters.

Indians were still making occasional forays in the western part of the area at the time, but Priddy never had an Indian raid; however, evidence is conclusive that they lived for decades in the area of Priddy before the early settlers arrived.

In the beginning of the settlement, pioneers grazed the countryside with cattle and a few sheep, but soon ranching gave way to farming and much of the community began to grow beautiful fields of cotton. Neighbor helped neighbor in work, sickness and in worship.

When there became a necessity for a cemetery, land was chosen close to the church and early pioneer men platted the cemetery and planted evergreen cedar trees to form a cross; the trees still live and thrive today.

The devastating drought of 1886-1887 almost wiped out the little settlement, as water was far away and had to be hauled for home use from either the Cowhouse Creek or a spring some miles away. Cattle were driven long distances to water and many died.

About 1900, fields could be seen laid by in neat furrows and Priddy became known as a community of tidy homes, thrifty people and productive soil. Industry flourished, as it does in most communities of German ancestry. Traditions from the old country from which their parents and some of the early settlers of Priddy were born, were carried on.

It was not unusual for a few large families to pick close to one-hundred bales of cotton from their own fields in one year. Jim Lewis built the first gin one mile west of Priddy in 1892. It was soon moved to town and the town developed.

Hawley Phluger owned a double gin at one time, and Mrs. Carl Schwartz cooked for the gin hands. The Shipp gin operated for many years, until it finally burned in 1957 - the last gin to operate in Mills County.

The postoffice was established in the home of T. J. Priddy about 1892, and he was postmaster until the streets of the new town were laid off and business buildings became active. It was then moved into town.

The early day one-teacher school of Mountain Creek, Bismark, and Becker Mountain were consolidated with Priddy and later Chappel Hill, Washboard and a part of Mountain View district consolidated to make Priddy a fine accredited school in a new rock and brick building. Today the school is active, with two buildings and a gymnasium. Rosie Keese and a Mr. Cunningham were early teachers.

Early church services were held in the little log school houses, but soon the Zion Lutheran and St. John Congregations of the American Lutherans had separate churches of their own, and held services for many years, until 1929, when they united and built a nice, new brick church which stands today.

It is in this church, and the early churches before it, that many young Priddy brides, for generations, have marched down the aisle on their father's arm to be given in marriage. A wedding is looked forward to by the whole community, and the bride's family plans for months ahead for the wedding feast. Calves are fattened, dresses are lovingly hand sewn, and at the last

moment much baking of pastries and cakes is done. As a rule, the whole community arrives at the wedding dinner bearing gifts for the bride and groom and stay for the wedding dance which follows.

The Baptists built a church in 1914 in Priddy, and the church is active today.

Several mercantile establishments sprang up in Priddy between 1900 and 1920. The Farmers and Merchants Bank was chartered on May 17, 1917 by C. F. Jeske; he also owned and operated a store for many years. The store is closed now, but the bank is still operated by a daughter, Eleanor Jeske Gromatzky. Her husband, Arthur Gromatzky, was sent to the State Legislature from this district at one time and now operates an insurance company.

A cafe was operated by Mrs. Fritz Reinke for many years, and a barber shop was operated by Otto Kerscher; then by Otto and Emil Schuster. Later, Coney McDonald was the barber. A blacksmith shop was operated by Mr. Walters and a drug store was owned and operated by Emil Meyer.

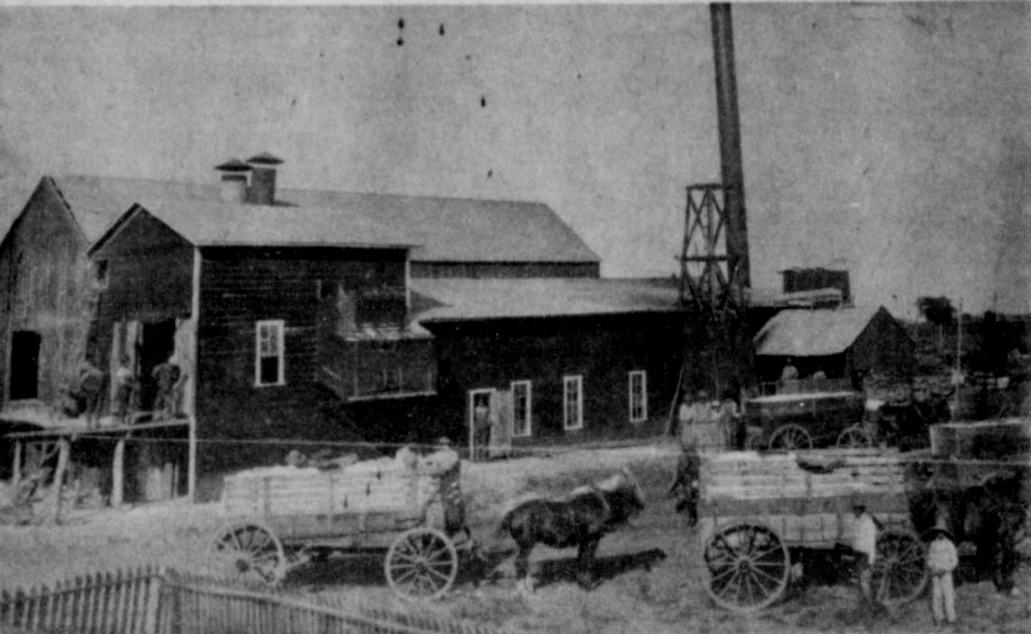
Other early families in the Priddy community were the Janners, Kunkels, Lubkes, Marwitz, Stankes and Tischlers.

Later came the Dearsons, Wagners, Schumanns, Tiemanns, Steimanns, Hillers, Jeskes, Stegemollers, Seiders, Pax, Eilers, and Hoppers.

There are now the Felsts, Goerdels, Grelle, Nelsons, Ivys, the Partins, Ray Priddys, Reinerts, Schrank, Bosse, Selheimers, the Sengers, Weispapes, Strumplers, and many, many others.

A well-remembered event in the Priddy community during my childhood were the many community picnics. Women of the homes cooked for several days, so there was food fit for kings. Baseball was a well-loved game in Priddy for men and boys, and the women and girls loved to watch. Medicine shows and school plays were also enjoyed.

Generation after generation of people from Priddy stay in their community, expressing their love for the soil, their loyalty to the community and gratitude to their pioneer ancestors.

# Tuesday, November 2nd General Election

According to announcement from the County Clerk's office, Mills County Courthouse, as of Monday, October 25, approximately seventy absentee votes had been cast for the General Election which is scheduled to

take place in Mills County next week, Tuesday, November 2nd.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m. Mills County voters will cast their ballots in ten (10) voting boxes, which includes the absentee voting box. Voting will be held at the following places: Box No. 1 - Goldthwaite, District Courthouse, Mills Co. Courthouse

Box No. 4 - Center City, Methodist Youth Center

Box No. 6 - Star, Star School

Box No. 7 - Caradan, Caradan Church

Box No. 8 - Mullin, Mullin Community Center

Box No. 10 - Priddy, Educational Bldg., Lutheran Church

Being a presidential election year, a record number of voters are expected to turn out for the election Tuesday.

The ballot for Mills County this year contains seven columns with the first column listing the offices and the others in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Raza Unida Party, American Party, Socialist Workers Party, Independent, and Write-In.

Also, two proposed constitutional amendments will be voted on in the election Tuesday.

The Democratic Party has a full list of candidates for all offices to be filled from president down to the precinct level. Candidates for president and vice-president are:

Democratic Party - Jimmy Carter, pres., and Walter Mondale, vice-pres.; Republican - Gerald R. Ford, pres., and Robert Dole, vice-pres.; American Party - Thomas J. Anderson, pres., and Rufus Shackelford,

vice-pres.; Socialist Workers Party - Peter Camejo, pres., and Willie Mae Reid, vice-pres.; Independent - Eugene J. McCarthy, pres.

Candidates for United States Senate are:

Democratic Party - Lloyd Bentsen; Republican Party - Alan Steelman; American Party - Marjorie P. Gallion; and Socialist Workers Party - Pedro Vasquez.

W. R. (Bob) Poage, Democrat, and Jack Burgess, Republican, are contestants in the United States Representative, District 11, race.

Railroad Commissioner contestants are Jon Newton - Democratic Party; Walter Wendlandt - Republican Party; Fred Rodriguez Garza - Raza Unida Party; and Pat O'Reilly - Socialist Workers Party.

Grant Jones, Democratic Party candidate, will be the contestant for the office of State Senator, District No. 24, and Stan Schluter, also a Democrat, will be on the ballot for State Representative, District No. 43.

Democratic Party candidate Bob Shannon will be on the ballot for Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals. Also on the Democratic ticket will be Don Busby, District Judge, District 27, and Arthur C. (Cappy) Eads, District Attorney, District 27.

## 4-H Gold Star Winners Named

Charlotte Montgomery, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Montgomery of Goldthwaite, has been named Mills County Gold Star Girl for 1976. She is a member of the Goldthwaite 4-H Club and has been a 4-H member three years.

Ray Owens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Davis Owens of Star, has been named Gold Star Boy. He is a member of the Star 4-H Club and has been in 4-H four years.

The Gold Star Award is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Two gold star awards per county, one to be awarded to a 4-H Club boy and one to a girl, are presented each year. This is the highest county award a 4-H member may receive.

The purpose of the award is to recognize outstanding achievement, leadership, and contribution to the county 4-H program, and to stimulate gold

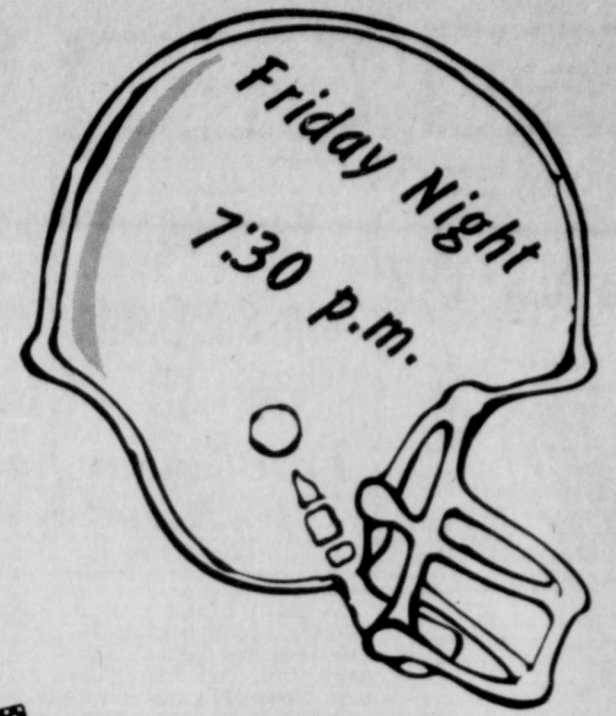

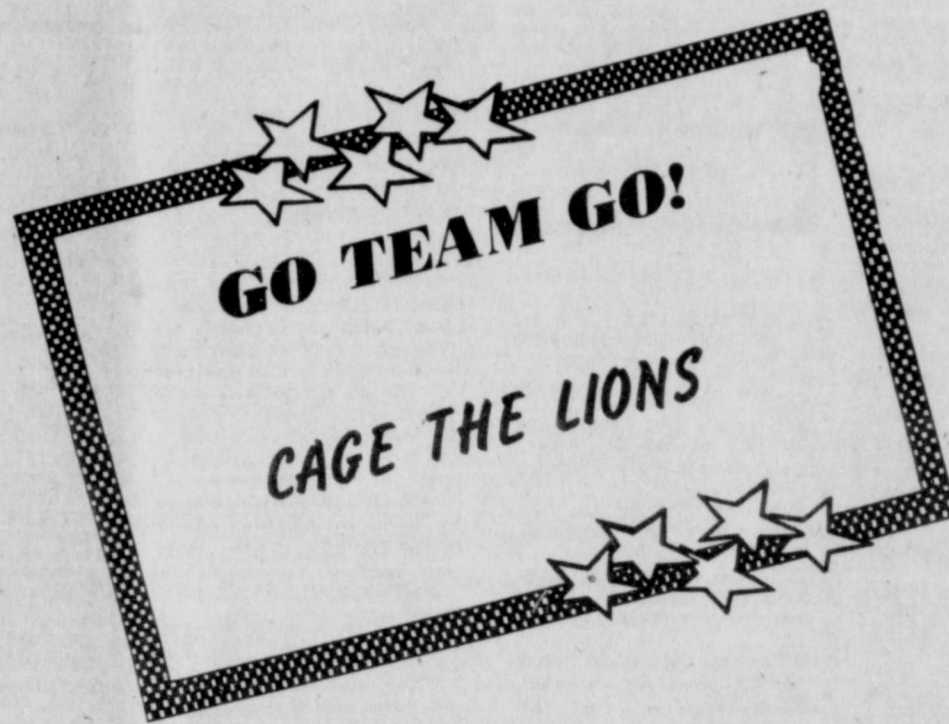

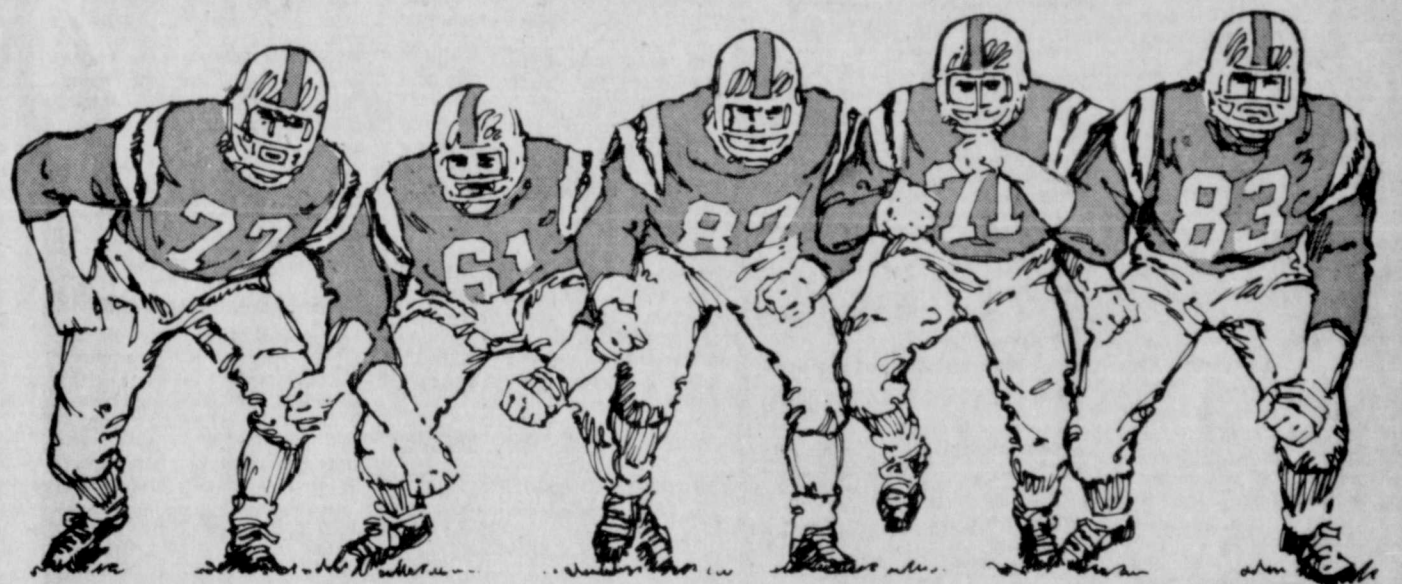

## Extension Highlights

Halloween is a children's playday that should be fun and practical. Instead of buying Halloween paraphernalia, consider letting children make their own. Here are some do-it-yourself projects:

Halloween Cat - cut a large cat's head, body and tail from black construction paper. Glue egg carton cups with glass marble centers on the cat's head for wild eyes. Attach the head, body and tail with brass brads. Change the cat's position to make him look as if he is falling, running, frightened or just scary.

Jack-O-Lantern Mobile - Cut an irregular ring out of heavy orange paper. Cut three triangles and one moon-shape out of heavy black paper for the eyes, nose and mouth. Don't forget the stem for the pumpkin. Hang the eyes, nose and mouth on strings to dangle inside the orange ring. Hang the mobile by a longer string attached to the stem of the pumpkin.

Paper Plate Mask - Draw a scary face on a heavy paper plate. Cut out and (or) paint the facial features on the plate. Use rag yarn or straw for hair. Punch a hole above the ears on each side of the plate. Attach a shoe lace on each side and tie around the head.

Noise Makers - Large, dried gourds painted with scary faces make excellent Halloween noise makers.

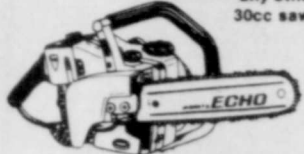

## Child Day Care Licensing Program

Anyone who regularly babysits in their home is required by state law to register with the Department of Public Welfare (DPW) according to Department officials.

The new Child Care Licensing Act, which is more lenient than the previous law, provides for parental, rather than DPW, supervision of in-home child care.

Registered babysitters are

provided forms to give to the parents informing them of the standards by which the babysitters must abide. The babysitters are also provided

medical and enrollment forms for the parents to complete and keep on file with the babysitter so that medical and emergency situations can be handled properly.

Registration assures parents that babysitters have complied with the state health and fire inspections, immunizations for the children and other requirements.

Although there are civil and criminal penalties if babysitters do not register, those who babysit in the child's home, for relatives or only occasionally for a friend or neighbor are not required to register.

People who care for more than six children regularly must be licensed by the DPW rather than simply registered.

Dr. Turman, executive director of the University Consortium of Abilene, Inc., will be formally honored at the Oct. 11 "Evening With ACU" in Abilene.

## Remodeling Of Future Museum Home Underway

The Palmer Building, future home of the Mills County Historical Museum, is beginning to show results of the efforts of interested volunteers and donors who believe that Mills County needs and can support a museum. The generosity of those who have contributed by donations, memorials and hours of planning is making it possible to have a lasting memorial to our forefathers by the collection and display of artifacts relating to the history of our great county.

Recent improvements include rearranging existing ducts for better economy in heating and cooling. 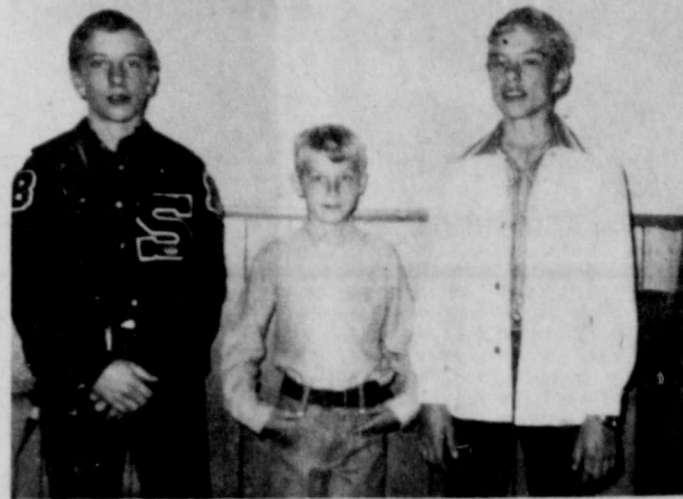
