growth of our rural areas - the peddlers and the traders.

D. D. Kemper with his Watkins wares - dispensing liniment, extracts, cold pills, salves and ointments, along with his good humor and gossip from outer communities - was always welcomed in the rural homes. A place to eat and sleep and a stall for his horse was a reward for his many good stories.

The cattle buyers made it around on horseback, buying and collecting cattle, sheep, and hogs in the community. They bought a few here, a few there, a few farther down the road, and finally drove them through the country to a focal point to be shipped to terminal markets in Fort Worth and San Antonio. Those men were as essential to early communities as the truck and auctions are today.

Most of the old cattle buyers are gone now, to wherever good cattle buyers go when they depart this life. A few names I recall that made our community of Washboard were Wallace Head, a cattleman; Ed Blue, a sheep and goat buyer; and Albert Cunningham and Otis Brazier, cattle, horse and mule buyers. They made their rounds regularly and whittled and haggled the morning away over the ranchers' stock and what they were worth. Finally, they were a man down and left him with

## Jr. Varsity Flies By Dublin

Goldthwaite's Junior Varsity did an outstanding job last Thursday night as they defeated Dublin 36-8. The hometown team chalked up a total of 332 yards rushing and 8 first downs.

Leading rusher was Mike Ervin with 125 yards; Dean Humphries rallied for 123 yards; Keith Williams 60; and James Green 30.

Humphries came through for the first Eagle score on a 44 yard run around right end. Ervin made the two point conversion from three yards out.

Humphries took the pigskin on a 17 yard run around left end for the second Eagle TD of the game. He also made the two point conversion.

Humphries rallied again, this time on a 23 yard run around left end for the six pointer. Greff was credited with the extra points.

Ervin came through for the Eagles as he scored on a 66 yard run. The point following failed. Ervin put another six pointer on the board following a 19 yard touchdown run. Again the point after failed.

Outstanding defensive players were Carson Padgett, Lester Saathoff, Charles Davis, Johnny Duncan and Scott Ward.

The schoolhouse was the focal point of the community. Not having a church building, community meetings, parties, plays, picnics and ball games in season were held at the schoolhouse. Community problems were generally worked out without consulting Austin or Washington. Boyhood problems were worked out behind the schoolhouse, with the teacher always the winner.

Washboard stabilized from about 1900 until 1915; then the boll weevil came and took his toll. The cotton farmers started slowly moving away. Clean tillage without knowledge of conservation took its toll, and share croppers were soon a part of history.

The war years, poor crops, poor prices, and the long depression just about finished the little community. In the middle 1930's the school folded, going to Priddy. Carl Hein and Inez Corey taught the last school in 1934-35. Earlier teachers at Washboard had been Dolly Burton, Luther Caudie, Pearl Montgomery, Addie Hudson, Flora Gatlin, Flora Reeves and Alice Ball.

World War II came on in the 1940's and most young men moved away, never to return to the community.

This period of time brought an end to a group of people who played an interesting and major part in the economy and

a little cash, a lot of long stories, and hopes that maybe prices would be better the next time around. Life was a little better because they came by.

It is said that history repeats itself. As I take another look down the Washboard, I wonder if the Washboard needs to repeat. It served well when it was needed. I hope a hundred years from now they can say the same for my generation.

Following a scoreless first period of play, Goldthwaite got in the groove and was able to skunk the Dublin Lions 31-0.

During the middle of the second quarter, Mike Lee intercepted a pass which was taken four plays later by Tim Spradley from the four for the first touchdown of the game. Jim Smith kicked the extra point which made the score 7-0.

After the kickoff on the first play, Dublin's pass was intercepted by Eagle Jett Johnson. On the first down Johnson hit David Miller on a 60-yard pass, with Miller doing an excellent job of running for the six pointer. A pass for the two-point conversion failed, leaving the score at halftime 13-0.

The third period was scoreless.

Goldthwaite began a scoring drive of 66 yards, which Mike Williams capped with a 2-yard run, early in the fourth quarter. The extra point try again failed, making the score 19-0.

The Eagles' next score was set up by a good punt return of 90 yards by Lee to the Dublin 28 yard line. Miller put the final touches to the drive by scoring on a 17 yard reverse. The extra point attempt was blocked.

After the kickoff, Dublin's first play was a pass that Eagle Johnson intercepted. This started a scoring drive for Goldthwaite from the 45 yard line. The six-pointer was made with Johnson scoring from six yards out. The extra point attempt failed, ending the game 31-0.

"Our defense played extremely well," commented Coach Smokey Brister. "Sixty of Dublin's seventy total yards came on one play that went to the Goldthwaite 10-yard line. The ball carrier was caught from behind by Williams. From the three plays netted from four yards out on the fourth down Goldthwaite recovered a fumble to preserve the shut-out."

The five pass interceptions were made by Lee, who made two; Johnson, with two; and

Mike Connally, one.

Offensively, Williams rushed 20 times for 131 yards; Spradley 11 for 52 yards; Johnson 6 for 42 yards; and Miller 1 for 17 yards.

Williams came very close to becoming a 1,000 yard rusher. He now has a total of 970 yards. During the game Friday he would have gone over the 1,000 yard mark, but a 40-yard touch-

down run was called back because of a penalty.

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## Athletic Budget Figures Released

The office of the Goldthwaite Schools Superintendent has released figures concerning the athletic budgeting and receipts and expenditures of the athletic council for Goldthwaite Independent School District.

Supt. Gilbert Davis released the report in response to many recent inquiries as to the operation of the athletic council.

The figures are taken from the last complete year of the council, 1975-76, and overall show that expenses overshadowed incomes by over \$500.

Receipts were listed at \$11,874.85 and expenditures were \$12,397 for the year. Davis pointed out that the figures show all the income for the athletic operation, but all the expenses cannot be shown because of utilities and transportation to and from games, which are not itemized.

These figures, Davis said, would greatly increase the deficits in the athletic council funds, which are simply absorbed by the regular monies of the district.

In conclusion, Davis said that the athletic departments of the district are still going well, with the money being well spent for the enhancement of the students involved and the enthusiasm that is generated.

Construction began last week at the Heritage Nursing Home on a new 40-bed wing. The new wing will also include a new kitchen, dining area, living room, space for activities, and administrative offices.

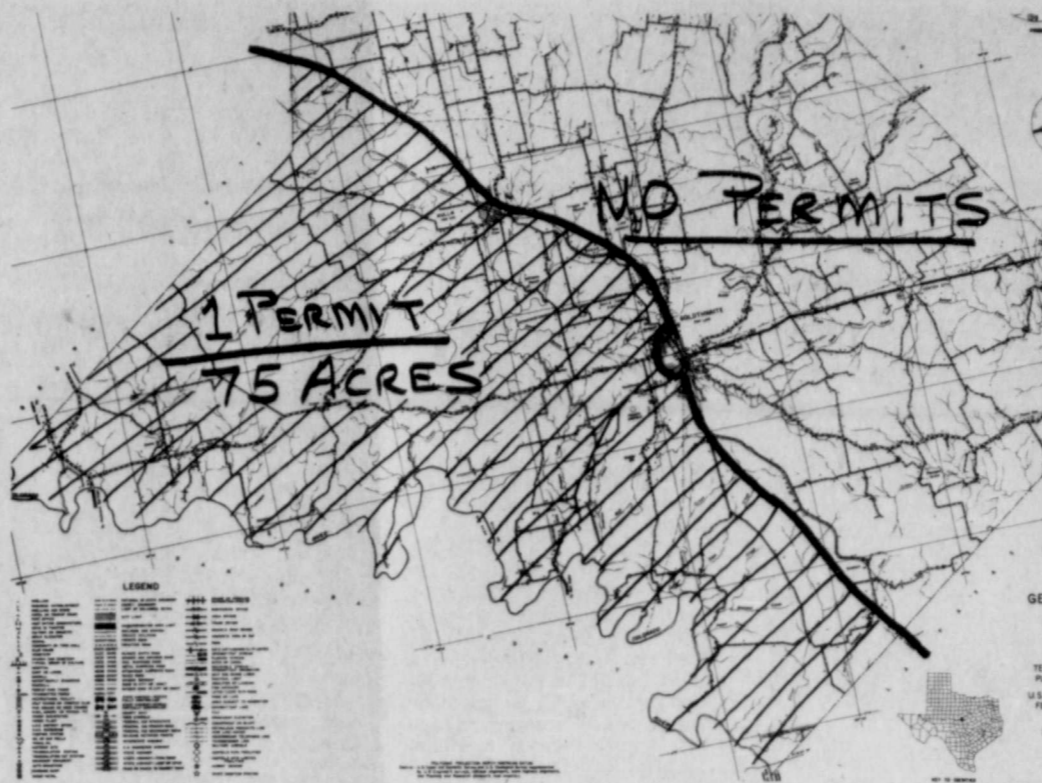

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits in Mills County on November 3, 4 and 5. The permits will be issued at the Mills County Courthouse between the hours

of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily. They will be issued on the basis of one permit per 75 acres, and landowners applying for the permits must have full amount of acreage to be eligible. The above map shows the areas that can apply for

permits. The shaded area in the southern part of the county is the only area that can apply for the permits. Deer season opens in Mills County on Nov. 15th, according to local game warden Benny R. Schriver.

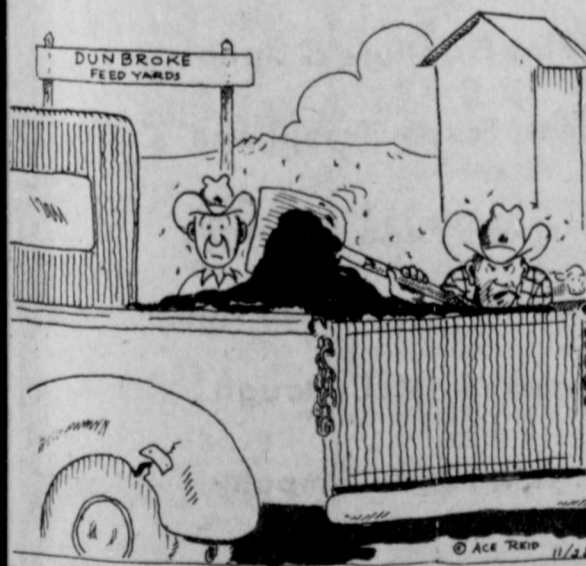

The U.S. Dollar is somewhat like the U.S. commodity market. Supply and demand control the price of both the commodities and the money market. The big difference in the two is that the commodity market just has a certain amount that is produced by the farmers each year and this is effected by the elements. The money market is controlled by the Federal Reserve Bank. We call it the Fed. The Fed has a number of ways it can control the money supply, and what it chooses to do - either increase it or shrink it - affects every person in the country.

If the money supply is allowed to grow too rapidly, and interest rates go down sharply, there is the possibility that this so-called "cheap" money will set off another round of inflation. On the other hand, if the Fed gets too tight with the money supply, and the cost of money goes up, then there is the danger of recession. Because money becomes too expensive for industry to borrow for increased production, and thereby creating fewer new jobs.

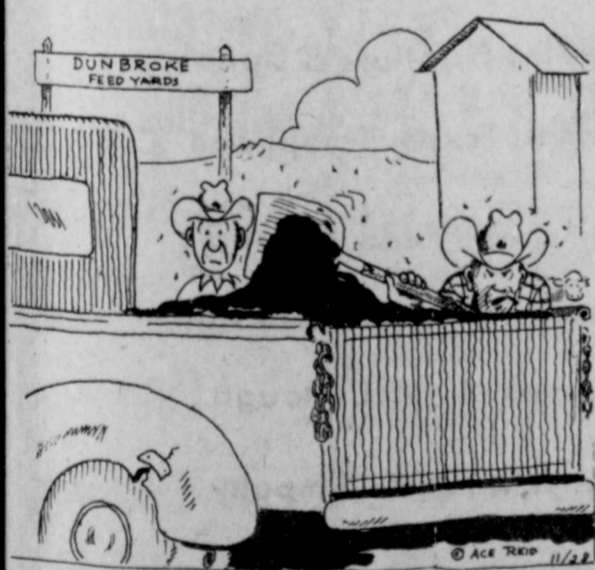

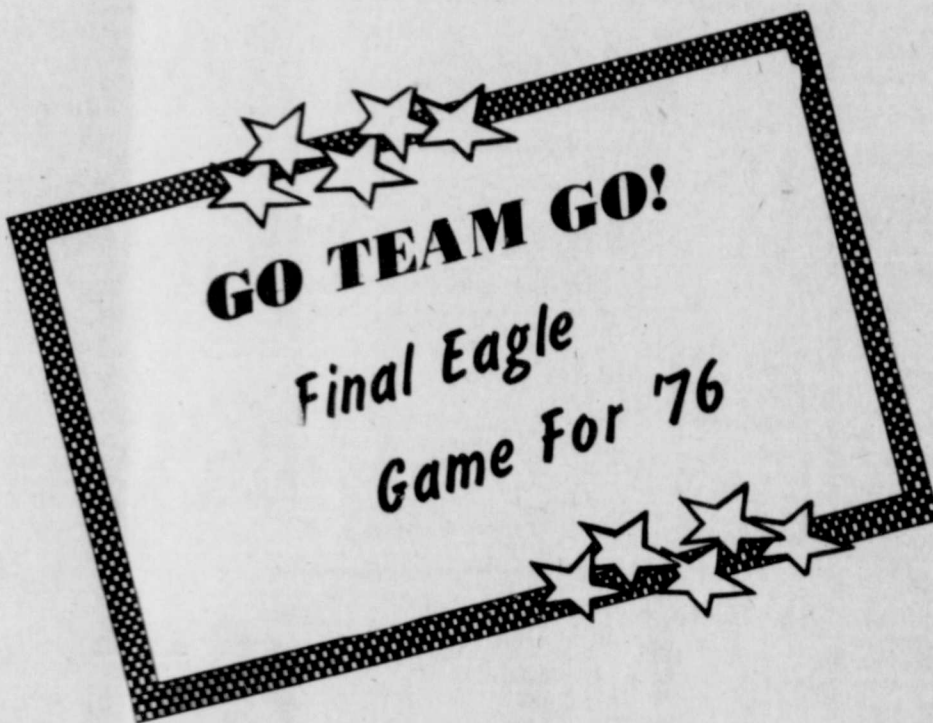
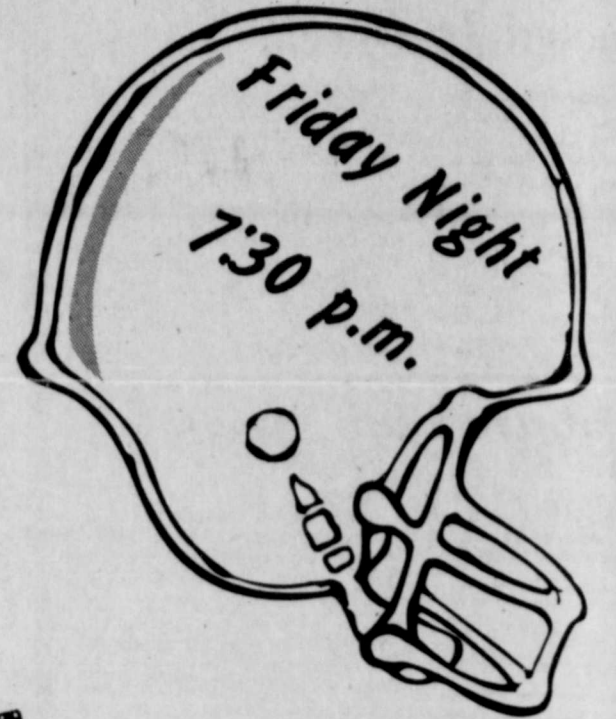

## Approval Received For Community Food & Nutrition Program

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced approval of a \$10,000 Community Services Administration grant to Hill County Community Action Association, Inc., in San Saba.

The grant is for a Community Food and Nutrition Program, and is effective retroactively to Oct. 1, 1976. It is funded under Title II of the Head Start, Economic Opportunity, and Community Partnership Act of 1974.

The CFNP funds are being used for a voucher system to

provide food on an emergency basis in the counties of Mills, Llano, San Saba, Mansfield, Hamilton, Lampasas, Coryell, Bell and Milam; to provide food stamp outreach and nutrition education to the poor in these counties; to provide prenatal vitamins and education on prenatal care in coordination with the Family Planning Program; and to provide training and technical assistance to communities to establish food banks, hunger action centers or feeding programs.

Grant processing and program liaison are through the Economic Opportunity Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

## Extension Highlights

The pyracantha has a long and famous history of beautiful fall landscapes with its heavy stems of bright red berries. The pyracantha is a well-known and widely-used landscape plant for Texas. Some people like it, others do not. Granted, it is thorny, has outrageous growth habits, but in the fall when its branches are laden with a heavy coat of colorful red berries, it would be hard to deny it to a place in the landscape.

One of the myths of the pyracantha is that the berries are poisonous. If you've ever watched a bird feast on a branch of pyracantha berries, perhaps you have wondered if they were indeed poisonous.

The fact is, pyracantha berries are entirely edible and there is at least one recipe I've discovered for pyracantha jelly.

So, if you have a surplus of pyracantha berries this fall, and would just as soon the birds did not rob you of all of them, you might enjoy the taste of pyracantha jelly. It is quite tasty, much like apple jelly in appearance and flavor. Here it is for you aspiring cooks:

**PYRACANTHA JELLY**  
To extract the juice, boil 1/2 pound of berries in 3/4 cup of water for one minute. Strain the juice through clean cloth. To one cup juice add one teaspoon lemon juice and 1/2 package powdered pectin. Bring it to a hard boil; add 3/4 cup sugar and continue rolling boil

## The Mills Minister

True conversion to Jesus Christ is based on conviction - not convenience. Likewise, faithfulness to Christ is based on conviction - not convenience. It is a sad spectacle, therefore, to observe so many professed believers in Christ who are following Jesus according to convenience rather than conviction. The tragic part about it is that such church members are not truly converted to the Lord, because if they were really converted on the basis of their conviction they would faithfully obey Christ out of the same conviction.

Somewhere along the way, somehow these casual church members have led themselves to believe that while Christianity in theory represents their religious profession, it is optional whether they practice it or not. Such have been deceived into believing there is an easy, comfortable and convenient way to Heaven. They have never soberly meditated upon the far-reaching implications of statements made by Jesus, such as: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." (Luke 9:23)

Self-denial is essential to true discipleship; further, it must be a daily relationship with the Lord - not seasonal. His will must be foremost in the Christian's heart - above every consideration, whether it be family, health, finances, occupation or pleasure (Luke 14:26-35). It was this demanding call for self-sacrifice that led many disciples of Jesus to turn away from the Master. They thought his teachings were too hard. (John 6:60-66) They were not willing to pay the price of true discipleship.

Likewise, today men are not willing to pay the price of true discipleship. For example, worship has ceased to be a privilege and has become a burden to many. When the time comes

for the saints to assemble to worship, it is inconvenient to turn off the television set and leave the comforts of a nice home. Yes, from the purely selfish viewpoint, it is inconvenient - just as a daily religion is more inconvenient for selfish people than a seasonal religion.

Jesus did not find the path to Calvary's mountain easy or comfortable or convenient. No, Jesus suffered, "leaving us an example, that we would follow his steps." (1 Peter 2:21) If the Master's Way was challenging, costly, demanding and self-denying, those who follow in His steps should not expect a soft, convenient and unchallenging way. "Verily, verily, I say unto you, the Servant is not greater than his Lord." (John 13:16)

Our Lord never taught or practiced a half-hearted, watered-down, spineless, inoffensive, word-only religion. It is time for all believers to realize that Christ is the author of eternal salvation to all who obey Him (Hebrews 5:8-9) and who lived dedicated lives of faithful service to His honor and glory even unto death. (Revelation 2:10)

When faith works by love, service is not inconvenient nor burdensome: "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments; and his commandments are not grievous." (1 John 5:3)
