of farm products. Through better grassland management the ranchers could graze more head of livestock per acre. Thus there was an increase of the use of the bridge in the late 40's and early 50's until farm-to-market roads were built. Large crops of peanuts in both counties in-

creased the travel over the road as there were peanut marketing centers in Richland Springs, Comanche, and Brady. On the other hand, as the operators increased the size of their trucks and trailers for hauling products and livestock, the weight capacity of the bridge altered its

Since the construction of the bridge in 1939, it has served local residents with a minimum amount of maintenance, and it remains sound and should continue to serve its surrounding area. It has been checked and kept in tip top condition by the county commissioners who serve this precinct, After World War II. Camp Bowie was declared an open range for a period of time for grazing livestock. There was so much travel over this bridge during this period that the floor had to be replaced. This project was completed September 21, 1944.

The San Saba County part of the road was well maintained until Farm Road No. 500 was built to connect Farm Road No. 45 with State Highway No. 16. After that time it was inconvenient for the commissioner to carry the maintainer so far to keep the small portion of dirt road, approxi-mately one mile, and for that reason it is ill kept. In Mills County all roads in the bridge area are unpaved and are well maintained to the bridge by Mills County No. 4. Mr. Hawley Jernigan, brother of the boy who was killed, is serving as its commissioner at the present time.

During World War II, Camp Bowie was only about five miles from the bridge area. The people were not permitted to pass through Camp Bowie except at certain locations. and this cut the residents of the Regency area off. It made it imperative for Mills County residents to use the suspension bridge to get to San Saba for marketing their products or for other reasons. During this time, boys who were stationed at Camp Bowie came to the Regency store. They also went across the river by way of the bridge into the Locker and Spring Creek communities. Families of the Locker community often extended hospitality to these boys, thus the bridge was a weekend meeting place for the young people of both count-ies. They visited, took pictures with their Kodaks, sang, played musical instruments, **County Ranchers Presented** and often danced on the bridge. Many names are carved on the whereabouts of that area. 
### Dear Sirs:
