

In the report of the Con-cerned Citizens' meeting on cheating that was in last week's paper, the emphasis was on the pressures that are on the student to cheat. This report will concern itself with the suggestions of things students can do to

First, the student can simply summon the moral courage to say "no" to all cheating, and then take the consequences as they come, This demands on the part of the student that he have a great deal of self-respect and self-reliance. These, parents should note, are in stilled best in the child at

a very early age.
Then, a unanimous opinion by all students present at the meeting was that parents should allow students to take their own lumps or praise, as the case may be, with parents keeping strictly out of it. Only in this way can a student learn to stand on his own two feet, and then incidently learn that he is strong enough not to need to cheat.

Now, more specifically, the student might turn in his homework papers to teachers immediately on reaching school. Also, the student can ask the teacher for a different seating arrangement on the day of the test. (These two suggestions might be noted by teachers.)

And then lastly, if more stress was put on the stu-dent's need to be prepared for each day's lesson, and the teachers checked on this preparation by board work, class discussions, short essays, etc. the possibilities for cheating would be almost eliminated. Tests and formal homework could be de-emphasized, while the student would be forced to take the time to comprehend and learn the material in order to take part in the next day's

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





Mrs. C. M. Featherston of Brownwood sent in the following article. It was written by her father, John S. Chesser, who was District Clerk at that time, and by Jim and Henry Rahl.

May 9, 1925

Editor G'waite Eagle:

I and Henry Rahl and others went out to what is now known as the Mohler Cemetery last Sunday to assist in digging the grave of Alex Shaw, a young man just in the prime of life, Saturday night with pneumonia. This young man has the inction or honor of being the first man in Mills County volunteer to cross the waters when the trouble came up between the United States and Germany in what is known as the World War; and another real good thing have frequently heard of him that no one who knew ever heard him speak disrespectful of any man, woman or child. He would give the last cent he had to man, woman or child that he thought needed it, or that was down and out. This redeeming character or feature is worthy of all our imitation, according to the

Upon arriving at the cemetery where this young man was to be laid away by the side of his father, Mr. Tay-lor Shaw, Henry Rahl and myself looking around came the tomb marked Geo. W. Joy, age 92 years, who was the father of Robert Joy who pre-empted the Robert Joy place now known as the Mohler place. Your humble servant and Jim Rahl were both present at the burial and funeral of this man, Geo. W. about 1871 or possibly 1872, it being our first fun-eral. Neither of us have forgotten, but neither knew the other was there until we met there last Sunday evening and got to talking of old times. Geo. W. Joy is the great grandfather of John S. Chesser of Goldthwaite, Texas, and while barefooted boys, Henry Rahl. Jim Rahl and myself were present at this neral of Robert Joy.

Also on last Sunday evening at the same place after having wandered here and there over Mills and San Saba counties about 53 years from that time, you know it was interesting to us to read the marks like these on the tombs of pioneer citizens of Mills County who have passed to the Great Beyond. It brings back to our minds olden times which we all as a rule like to think over as we pass through this world, ch as going to the graves of our buried loved ones, among whom are these tombs and marks: Eliza J. Epley, wife of Geo.
