
CENTER CITY COMMUNITY Settled in 1854 by the families of William Jenkins and David Morris (1811-89), this community was called "Hughes Store" after W. C. Hughes and his wife opened a store here in the 1870's. They platted a townsite in 1876, hoping to attract the railroad and to become county seat. An ancient live

oak (100 yds. S), by tradi-tion once considered the center of Texas, was site temporary court and school sessions and religious services. Renamed "Center City", this thriving town boasted several stores and businesses until the railroad bypassed it in 1885. The post office remained until 1920.







Screwworm Conference Feb. 24

A group of cattlemen from Mills County will be among the more than 1,000 producers from across Texas participating in the Governor's Conference on "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms", in Austin Feb. 24.

The special conference has been called by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to launch a campaign to eradicate screwworms from Texas in 1977; points out Danny Long, county agent with the Texas points Agricultural Extension Service. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Municipal Audi-

torium. The conference program will feature a welcome by Gov. Briscoe, remarks by a representative of the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and the Mexico Secretary of Agriculture, and discussions lo on various phases of the screwworm eradication program by officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Ani-mal Health Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Re search Foundation, the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service and the Mission Screwworm Lab.

The special campaign is being launched this year because the potential is high for dealing a final death blow to screwworms, those flesh eating pests that cause mil-lions of dollars in losses to livestock producers each

year. Three factors exist that can make this special eradi-cation effort a reality:

- - The cold winter will reduce the number of screwworm flies this spring. The new screwworm

plant in Tuxtla Gutierrez, Mexico, which opened last July will double the sterile fly production capacity. - - A new strain of sterile

flies has been developed which should be a significant improvement over earlier flies.

years has been supported by a massive increase in oil and gas revenues, over 125 percent since 1972. Current figures show that probable tax revenues will decline. starting next year, as our oil and gas production dwindles.

The Legislature is left with two choices, raise taxes or lower our expendi-tures. I favor the latter. It is my hope that this Session of the Legislature will force reduction in our spending levels by a reduction in our tax income. My proposals are to remove the sales tax from utilities and lower the inheritance tax.

The Legislature is tempted to spend whatever we have in the revenue coffers. If these proposals are passed it will return more money to the pockets of the consumers and leave less money for the Legislature to spend. My office was visited this week by the junior and senior classes of Holland High School and the government classes of Burnet High School. I was pleased that these young people showed enough interest in their government to travel to Austin and watch the Legislature in Session.

If any other groups from the district plan to visit Austin they can contact my office and we will arrange a wide variety of programs.

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City Sales Tax Rebates Increase Over 1975

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Thursday that Texas cities received a total of \$302.9 million in city sales tax rebates last year, a 14 percent increase over the 1975 calendar year.

The cities received \$264.5 million in 1975.

Goldthwaite received \$28,399.12 in 1976 as com-pared to \$26,258.61 in 1975. This amounted to an 8 percent increase. The totals are included in

an analysis prepared by Bullock's office showing the total rebates received by Texas cities for the calendar years 1975 and 1976. The City of Houston led

the state in total rebates with a total of \$62.6 million in 1976. Dallas collected \$35.3 million, San Antonio \$18.9

million, Fort Worth \$12.3 and Austin \$9.1 million million.

The City of Sachse topped the list with collections up 444 percent last year. The cities of Krugerville, Roa-noke, and Windom all re-ceived increases in excess of 100 percent.

The one percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the four percent state sales tax and is returned to the cities by the Comptroller's Office on a monthly basis.

in this last section of the report on the Concerned Citizens' meeting on cheat-ing, we will discuss the suggestions made to teachers. This topic was left purposely to the last, for the comment has been made more than once that the problem of cheating is a school problem. It is hoped that the preceeding articles in this series have shown that the problem is to be jointly accepted and fought by students, parents, and teachers alike. In fact, if the probiem is looked at as only a school problem, then, in the opinion of this writer, cheating becomes a game in which

to outwit the other. This can have no result but disaster for all concerned. Now, first, it was the opinion of all present that need to strive teachers constantly to become good or better teachers. Enthusiasm on the part of the teacher, humor in the class-room, thorough preparation, etc. can all help to "turn

And then students want teachers who are scrupulously fair, at least to the best of their understanding of a problem. teachers and school there should be penalfies for cheating when it is discovered, not harsh or cruel, but realistic and sure. Everyone realizes that cheating in many cases is hard to prove, but supervision should be maintained. Certainly a teacher should not walk out of the room or bury himself in a book during a test. If the teacher shows concern for the problem of cheating, more can fairly.

Pasture Soils Need Lime

Four million acres of sture soils in Texas need lime, according to a recent summary of thousan soil samples. Even thou the major portion of this area is located in East Texas, lime is still a pro-duction tool which should not be overlooked in areas. High rates of nitro-gen improve forage growth, production and profits; but excessive nitrogen can also coat acid conditions in soils. Soils have elements which are acid, such as hydrog and aluminum. Soils also have chemicals which are basic such as calcium, m nesium, potassium and sod ium. When the acid chemi cals outnumber the basic chemicals, the soil becomes

acid in nature. Soil acidity is caused by several factors, including the removal of bases by growing forage plants, weathering of soil minerals, leaching of bases and ammonium nitrogen fertilizers.
