

Wilson Head, dedication speaker, gave a vivid description of the first years of the little settlement of Center City, and also gave highlights of its development through time.

Mr. Hardy Collier, lifelong resident of Center City. assisted by his two daughters, Mrs. Vestus (Mildred) Horton and Mrs. Darrell (Edna) Head, unveiled the marker.

Mr. Sherwood Owens, also a lifelong resident of Center City, read the marker inscription. Dayton House gave the benediction.

Mrs. Monroe Geeslin, 95 years old, and a descendant of one of the two first settlers at Center City, was recognized as the oldest person present

> IF THIS OLD TREE COULD SPEAK

If this old tree could speak, it would tell everything. It would tell endless stories of our pioneer ancestors, their success and their failures, their work and their laughter, and of the courage it took to mold this

It would tell about the Indians that roamed along Bennett Creek when this land was theirs, not ours. It would tell about the first white man who came this way and, perhaps, stopped to rest it its shade; it would tell of the raging blizzards of winters past, of floods on Bennett Creek and about the tornado that roared across

this land in 1904. It would tell about the struggles of the first settlers, of Indian fights and of the building of the first log cabins close by. There would be tales of stage coaches that stopped under its branches to change passengers and

teams of horses. There would be accounts of many people, rich and poor, good men and bad men, and countless families that crossed this community Most of them went on their way, but a few of those people saw the beauty of this countryside and planted their roots deep in its soil to remain for many years, or for

the rest of their lives. There were courts of law held around the roots of this old tree when there was no other place to hold a court; there were school classes taught here in summer months when there was no schoolhouse; church services were held here when there were no churches. Our pioneer grandparents and great-grandparents sat on this very spot to offer earnest prayers and sing praises to God. In our mind's eye, we can see their faces as they sat here so long ago.

If this old tree could speak, it would tell of wagons loaded with lumber rolling in from Waco, and of the sound of hammers and saws as the men of the community built the first combination school, Masonic Lodge and church up on the hill.

It would tell of the school bell ringing on cold, frosty winter mornings, signaling the beginning of another school day. It would tell us about boys shooting marbles and girls jumping ropes in its shade while their parents bought supplies at the nearby store.

There would be sad stories, too-stories about homemade caskets carried or wagon beds as they passed by on their way to the cemetery at the end of the

Predatory Control Program

Mills County farmers and rancher met in a county meeting on May 24, 1977, to discuss the predatory animal control problems in the county and to take necessary actions to decrease losses of livestock through all possible alternatives.

A report on the past programs which have been in practice in the county was given and general discussion followed, which led to the formation of a new predatory animal control program in the county.

The new program will be known as the Mills County Predatory Animal Control Association and will entail two primary facets: the government trapper and a bounty system. This new program will go into effect on June 15, 1977

The Mills County Program **Building Organization will** combine its efforts into this new organization to form a single unit in an effort to concentrate all control practices under one organization. A three member committee composed of County Judge Herbert Faulkner, Mr. Don Rudd, with Wool & Mohair House, and County Agent Danny Long, will be responsible for keeping records and making all disbursements relative to the proper functioning of the program.

Under this new program, producers will be asked to support the efforts through contributions to the Association. Government trapper salary and bounty payments will be made out of this fund in part. The Mills County Commissioners' Court has given the new organization their support. Producers in the county may, if they so desire, designate whether their contributions be used to support the trapper, or the bounty system, or if they so desire their contributions will be used to support the total

The bounty system will offer a \$50.00 bounty on grown coyotes, \$25.00 on grown bobcats and red fox, and \$12.50 for bobcat kittens and pups. Bounty payments will be made on predatory animals which have been certified as having been taken on land belonging to a contributor to the program only. If a bounty is paid on any other land, a member of the association must certify that said animal was taken and he must submit a certificate to the fact plus a check made payable to the Mills County Predatory Animal Control Assoc. in the amount of 25% of the

The Government Trapper will function as in the past. Any producer who contributes to the Association will he entitled to the services of

the government trapper. We encourage all Mills County producers, Merchants and the general public



Benjamin Franklin Gholson, Texan

The following account of a part of his life was told to me by Mr. Gholson at his old ranch home a few days ago.

I was been Nov. 17, 1842, in the days of the Republic of Texas in Robertson's Colony. now Falls County. I am the second son of Albert G. Ghoison, a son of Col. Samuel Gholson.

Col. Samuel Gholson, my grandfather, was a colonel in Gen. Jackson's army and led a regiment of soldiers known as the Kentucky Riffemen in the Battle of New Orleans.

This Samuel Gholson was born in Kentucky about 1772. My father, Albert G. Gholwas also born in Kentucky, on a farm near Paducah, May 25, 1818. He moved with his parents to Madison County, Tenn., in

From that place he and his father came to Texas with a train of immigrants, leaving Jackson, Tenn. on April 3, 1832, and landing at San Felipe, Texas, about July 29 of that year. The immigrants were members of Robertson's Colony, then being settled under the Government of Mexico.

When the war broke out between the Americans and the Govt. of Mexico, my father enlisted in Capt. Cary White's company of volunteers. He participated in several battles. He was in the battle at San Antonio (known as the five-day fighting at San Antonio), led by Ben Milam, who was killed there.

When the army was ordered to fall back to Gonzales, father obeyed. During this time there were many companies being organized for the service by the Americans

Capt. Tom Barron enlisted a company of volunteers at or near Fort Washington. These volunteers elected their officers and a majority vote was cast for Albert G. Gholson for First Lieutenant under Capt. Barron.

Father was not at that time present, but was transferred from Capt. White's to Capt. Barron's company. He received his comm took his place in Capt. Barron's company.


