The Way It Was Mills County Story Of The 'Wagon Yards'

As long as I can remember the name "wagon yard" was occasionally mentioned in old-time stories at home. This name went along with others such as "Georgia Stock", and "milk cooler" — were linked to the past. Somewhere along the way I formed a dim opinion of a wagon yard looked like I envisioned a large, open enclosure with a fence and that country folks with their wagons and teams and left them when they went to town to trade with the city merchants. Recently, I talked to various ladies and gentlemen, some old-timers of Mills County, and the truth about wagon yards came to light. Wagon yards were very necessary establishments to the day towns; they were located close to the center of the city as possible so people wouldn't have far to go to carry their purchases as they often covered as much as half a block in a town the size of Goldthwaite. When teams of horses or oxen were driven into a wagon yard, the proprietor or his helpers eagerly came forward to unhitch and feed the animal with a bucket of oats in a stall — for a fee. The wagons were left in the dry of the wagon yard in case of rain, and the shade helped on hot summer days. A rider on a horse, mule or a jack could leave his animal there, too. There was a row of horse stalls along the sides of most wagon yards under the edge of the roof, and there was an opening or passageway at the end; a watering trough which could be named among the accoutrements of a wagon yard, as well as racks, a few ropes, harnesses and an enclosure saddles and saddle blankets and an out and feed bin was usually located near the rear of the structure. I knew that drifters with money and men that stayed too long at a local bar and slept in the wagon yard, but I didn't know that wagon yards had a room built especially for people to spend the night at no charge. They brought their wagons and teams and paid for their

stays in the rooms were large, while others were small. They offered varying degrees of accommodations to their customers; some had cots, very few had beds, while most offered a room with a bare room with a few old chairs and a table or a table standing against the wall; but they all had one thing in common — privacy. Curtis Long remembered that once, not long after he and Curtis were married, they went on a trip to England. They got as far as Wood the first day and went to the wagon yard to spend the night. Mrs. Long said for people we noticed the beds, but when my husband turned the wagon back we were horrified at the condition of the sheets. They were absolutely filthy, and looked as if they had never been changed. We left there right away." Mrs. Minnie Stark recalled that her family, the John Whitts, spent the night in a wagon yard at Lampasas; the people-room there offered nothing but a dirty bare floor, but they spread their own quilts and slept there anyway. Mrs. Lottie Rudd told about a trip with her parents, the John Carters, when they went to Lampasas to trade. They took a wagon load of cotton with them, and all the Carter younguns' rode on the cotton. Mrs. Rudd (my Mom) said, "People with a large family of children couldn't afford to go to a hotel to spend the night, so they either camped on the edge of town, or went to the wagon yard; on this trip we went to the wagon yard. The room there was long; a family had already taken one end and another had taken the middle, so we took the other end. There were no partitions for privacy; we all slept on our own quilts. Not a single family knew the other."

Another lady recalled that once her family stopped in Lampasas at a wagon yard just at dusk. This particular yard was full of wagons and the family could hardly find room for their own. Almost every wagon was full of people making down beds to spend the night in their wagons, since this yard offered no room for people. The lady said "There were four of us children and not enough room for the entire family to sleep on the wagon floor, so we double decked it with frames built for that purpose. Quilts were spread on the bed of the wagon for the children, and the mattress we had carried along was put on the frame that rested on top of the wagon sides. Mama, Papa and the baby slept up there; I was scared half out of my wits all night with so many strangers sleeping close by."

After thinking over all these interesting stories, I could imagine all the mosquitoes and other insects that surely slept in the wagon yard, too, but they came out at night to buzz and bite. Then I thought of the horses stamping and snorting all night long, and of all the other sounds that must have gone on, and I wondered how people that lived in "the days of the wagon yards" and spent nights there slept a wink.

The first wagon yard was built in Goldthwaite in 1886, when the city was in its infancy, and was called "Lane's Wagon Yard." It was located where Johnson's Laundry is now located, and ran more than half a block toward 4th Street. The next wagon yard, and probably the largest in Goldthwaite, was built before the turn of the century by Methias McGirk. It was located on Reynolds Street, between 3rd and 4th Streets, and was just behind the (See WAGONS, Page 4)

The purpose of the meeting will be to provide participants the opportunity to receive certification for the use of restricted pesticides under new regulations which will become effective October 21, 1977. We encourage all pro-

ducers and homeowners to obtain certification for the use of restricted chemicals. The EPA will specify all chemicals as either general use or restricted use after October 21st. All persons using restricted use chemicals after this date will be required to have completed certification requirements. As to which chemicals will be labeled restricted use, and which will be general

use, no one will know until the EPA releases this information. Certification can also be

attained through a home study option. Study materials are available in the County Extension Agents Office.

Community involvements include membership in the Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, Rotary Club, the Salvation Army, Sight Conservation for the Blind and the Boy Scouts, as well as president of several different Ministerial Associations. He and his wife, Linda, have two grown children, a daughter and a son.

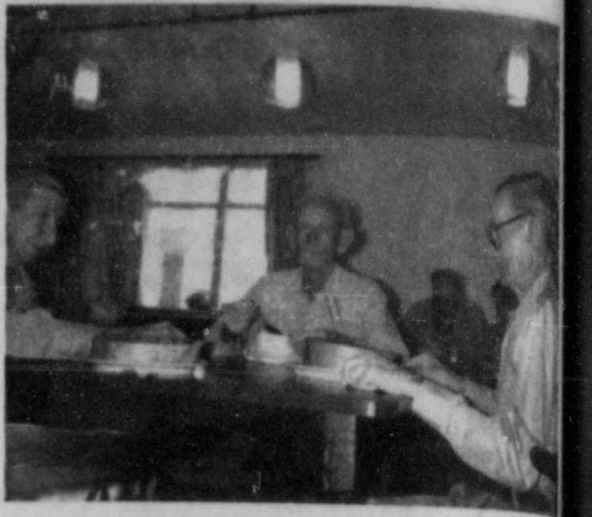

AUSTIN -- Texas watermelon and cantaloupe are one of the best buys on the market right now, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "Supplies are abundant," Brown explained, "due to transportation problems which have hampered Texas producers from marketing their melons out of state. While we hate to see our farmers shut out of the higher priced out-of-state markets, the Texas consumer can cash in on a good summertime buy."

Brown also said Texas melons were more plentiful than earlier anticipated. "Preliminary estimates indicated that this year's harvest would be very limited, but the crop has come in increasingly strong," he noted.

present postoffice and the Mills County Locker Plant; it ran the entire length of the block.
According to Mr. Grover Dalton, a Goldthwaite gentleman with a remarkable memory, the McGirk Wagon Yard had a room for people on the southeast corner and everybody was expected to bring their own bedding. Stalls ran along the sides of the yard with a passage between; later a shed for the protection of wagons was added.

I do not know the exact year this wagon yard that played an important part in the history of Goldthwaite was torn down. Harry Oglesby, a gentleman that lived most of his life in Big Valley community, says he knows it was there in 1919. Harry had made two bales of cotton that year and he and his younger brother, Chester, brought the cotton to town in two wagons late one afternoon. They drove into McGirks Wagon Yard to spend the night. Both boys slept in one wagon. Late in the night, they were awakened by a loud and thunderous snoring. Upon investigation, they found that a neighbor named Trowbridge had crawled into their other wagon sometime in the night and was peacefully snoozing away.

Harry said, "The next morning John Burnett offered me 40 cents for my cotton. When I hesitated, he said, "Harry, you better sell because cotton is going down", so I sold. Before two days had passed, and before Burnett could resell the cotton, the price had dropped so much that he lost over \$50 on the two bales, but I took home \$402.00, due to his good advice."

Mrs. Bertha Rost said, "I remember driving down to Goldthwaite with my parents, the Kunkels, from Priddy, when I was a little girl, and we left our wagon in McGirks Wagon Yard and walked to Clements Drug Store to eat ice cream. I thought there was never anything so good as that ice cream."
The Ford Wagon Yard was the last one built in Goldthwaite. It was located where Schwartz Grocery and parking lot now stands, including the location of Johnny Vaughan's Barber Shop.

Wagon yards are now a part of yesteryear and most of us cannot remember, or never saw one; but undoubtedly they were as important to people in early days as the filling stations and motels are to us today.

Handle Fish With Care If Releasing

When returning a hook fish to the water the watchman should be handled with care. The fish is a delicate creature and few can survive improper handling by anglers who merely well and release underzoned unneeded fish.
Proper way to handle fish which do not have sharp teeth to grasp the lower jaw between thumb and forefinger. This technique can be used on largemouth bass, crappie, catfish.

Don't lift the fish out of water, if possible. Hold the lower jaw and leave the fish the water to support its body and internal organs. Remove the hook and release the fish. Toothed fish such as walleye, saltwater speckled trout, many other marine fish, will lacerate thumbs. To release the fish grasp them across the gill covers with a wet hand while removing the hook. This should be done while the fish partially submerged.

A wet hand will prevent loss of the protective layer of skin which covers the fish's body and guards against disease infections.

Christ is the saviour of his body, the church that he gave himself for, showing that he loved the church more than he loved himself. He teaches that we are to have the same love for his church, as we present our bodies as a living sacrifice. (Eph. 5:23).

We encourage all to study carefully the book of Ephesians, and see the many advantages of being in Christ, and then enter into Christ and enjoy all these many wonderful blessings that are found in Him.
