still had work for him to do. He has come out of retirement to serve the Tenth Avenue United Methodist Church in Amarillo. He accepted that appointment in June of this year.

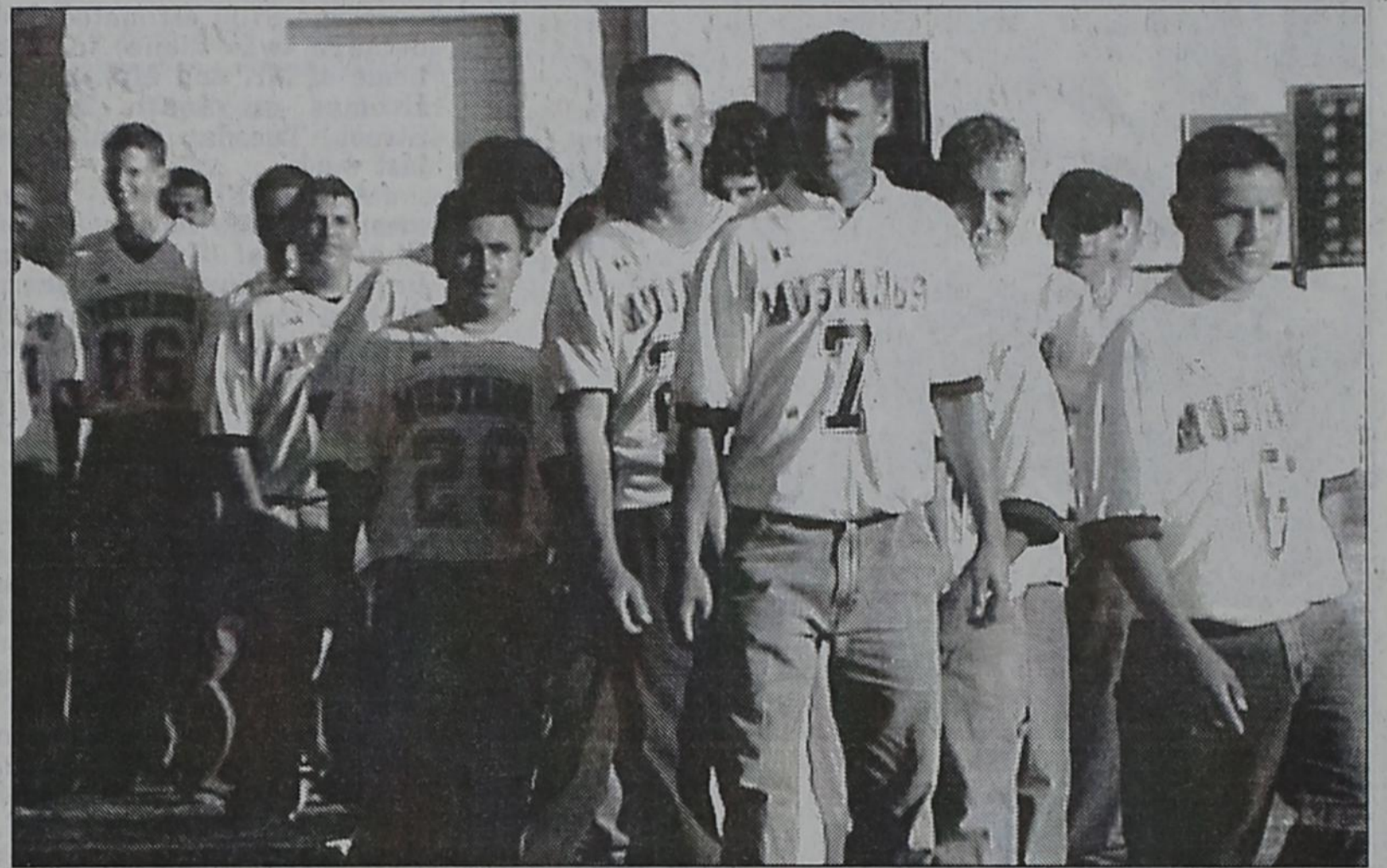
Tommy married JoAnn McCaslin in 1951. They have two daughters, Sharon Boland and Karen Kaiser, six grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Texico Deals Mustangs Opening Loss 24-0

The Bovina Mustangs took the field in Texico last Friday with mostly new, untested talent.

The Wolverines went to the New Mexico 1A state finals last year while the Mustangs struggled with a 1-9 record.

Texico scored on three of its first four possessions, including two 10-play marches. Senior Texico running back Adrian Loera rushed 29 times for 194 yards and four touchdowns.

Bovina's sophomore quarter back Jeffrey Casas, in his first varsity start, went 0-3 through the air and led the Mustangs to 171 yards rushing on the night.

Coach Bruce Scroggins said "They beat us up pretty good up front. We're pretty young and made a lot of mistakes. Hopefully we can get them corrected."

Scroggins, who coached Texico to a state title in 1990 before taking over the reins at Bovina 5 years ago,

single out seniors Mike Olvera on offense and Nemecio Rodriguez on defense as Players-of-the-Week. He also praised Jake Steelman for his special teams play.

Rodriguez had 13 tackles, one fumble recovery and gained 87 yards on 13 carries at running back.

Olvera had 7 tackles and did outstanding blocking from his offensive line position. Mike Nieto added 6 tackles for the Mustangs and B. J. Shepherd had an interception.

In his first start at running back, John Nelson contributed 53 yards on 10 carries, Casas carried 4 times for 40 and Nieto one time for two yards.

In a case of first game jitters, Bovina was penalized nine times for 66 yards and Texico got 10 penalties for 95 yards.

Bovina hosts Lorenzo tonight (Friday September 6) in its homecoming game. Game time is 7:30 p.m. and

the homecoming activities will take place on the field prior to the game.

In this first week, ten contestants had 10 correct picks. Remember that it is important to play every week to stay in the hunt for the grand prize.

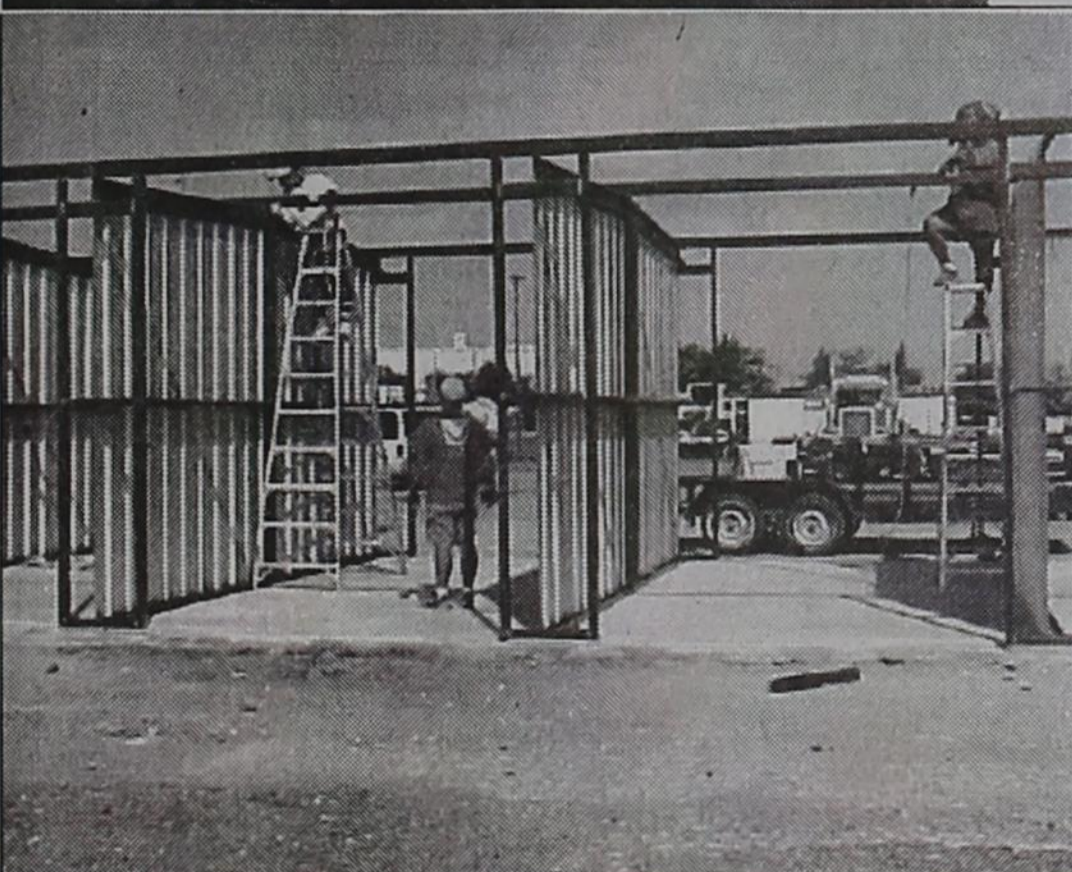
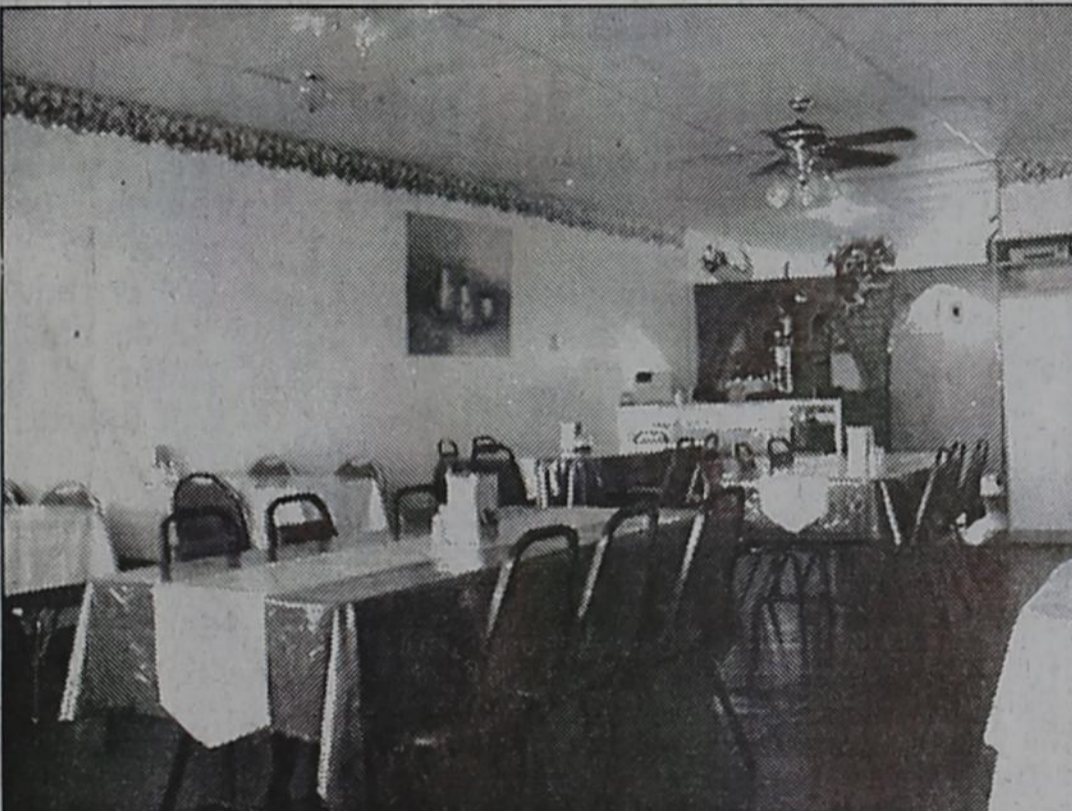

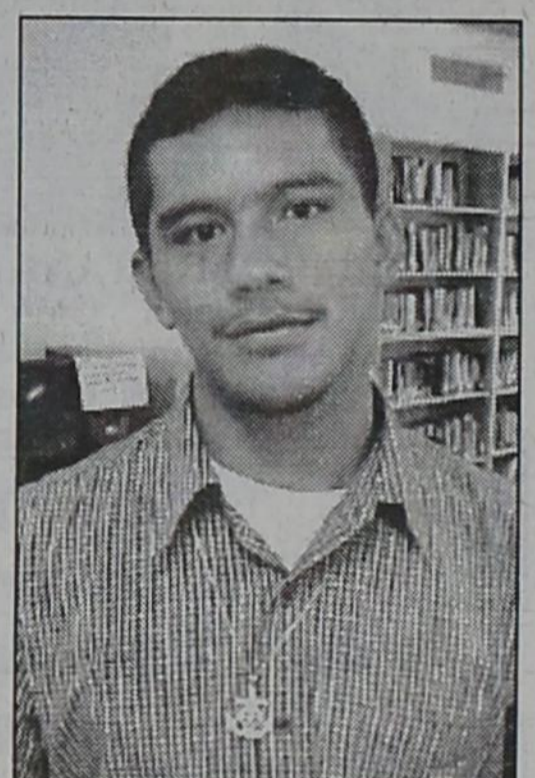

45 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 4, 1957
Bids for the construction of Bovina's long-awaited paving, curbing and guttering are now being accepted at the City Hall.

Some \$700 estimated fire damage was done to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Hromas on South Eighth Street, Tuesday evening of last week.

At a Saturday noon meeting of the Bovina Junior Chamber of Commerce in Bovina Restaurant, members decided to accept a proposal from Claborn Funeral Home, Friona, to drive an ambulance belonging to that firm to all home football games during the 1957 season.

A.W. Anthony, Jr., who lives and farms six miles north of Friona, has been named conservation farmer of the year in the Parmer County Soil Conservation District.

For the second time in about 18 months, Keith McCutchan, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E.E. McCutchan, has broken his right arm. He had undergone three operations since the first break.

40 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 5, 1962
Burglars got only trouble for their efforts when they robbed Bovina Post Office and Bovina Variety early Sunday morning. Alertness of two Bovina men, Bill Don and Darrell Read, kept the burglars from getting away with five sacks and a pouch of incoming mail and several hundred dollars worth of variety store merchandise.

Parmer County's first 1962 loads of milo were delivered to Bovina Thursday of last week. The August 30 delivery date was believed to be one of the earliest, if not the earliest, since irrigation came to the area.

Karolyn Parker Langham, 19, of Amarillo, sustained a broken jaw as the result of an accident north of Oklahoma Lane on Farm Road 1731, Sunday afternoon.

For the first time in the opening day history, enrollment of Bovina Schools soared over the 500 mark Tuesday, the first day of school. The total was some 50 or more higher than school officials had anticipated.

35 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 6, 1967
This week marks the beginning of the eighth consecutive Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest.

A three-day Fiesta on September 14-16 will be held for the first time in Bovina to commemorate the 157th anniversary of Mexico's Independence.

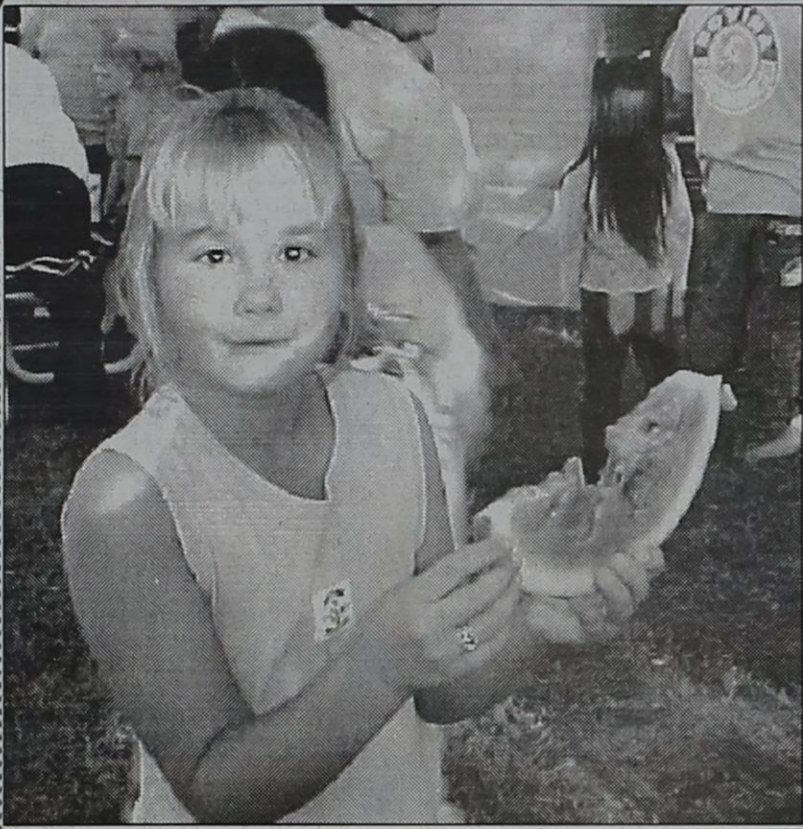
Serving hours will be 6:30-8:30 a.m. The cost will be \$5 for adults and \$3 for children under 12.

"Celebrate Life Wednesday"

September 11 is next Wednesday.

I predict that by September 12, we will all be sick and tired of hearing about September 11.

There is no doubt that America changed a year ago. Terror, Al Qaeda, Osama bin Laden and erosion of civil rights became part of our daily lives.

But its been a year. There is more terror now than before. Many millions of radical fundamental Islamic Muslims hate you and want to kill you.

Al Qaeda and suspected Al Qaeda are everywhere, maybe right next door to you. So says Attorney General John Ashcroft.

Osama bin Laden? I can only remember Dubya's partiotic rallying cry: "We are going to smoke 'em out, and get 'em running, and then we're gonna get 'em." Dead or alive, he said.

Guess what. We ain't got 'em. They aren't runnin' anymore. We don't know where they are. Couldn't even catch a one-eyed Afghan mullah. I say Osama is alive and happy. He'll be back.

Dubya and Secretary of Defense Donald "Rummy" Rumsfeld, don't seem to be too interested in Osama anymore. That's all we heard about a year ago. Osama this, Osama that, he can run but he can't hide. Guess what. I think he did.

And I have actually seen supposedly intelligent white, brown and black people, some even with suits and ties, saying on national TV that it is okay for American citizens to give up some civil rights and liberties if it helps fight terrorism.

That's not good. But most Americans don't care. So here we are. A few

days away from September 11. I predict that before Wednesday arrives most of us will be tired of hearing about it all over again.

Now, before you start sending me patriotic hate mail or branding me un-American, let me assure you that I am proud to be an American. (I'm even prouder to be a Texan, but that is another story.)

I sympathize with those who lost loved ones in the attacks. I can't imagine what it must be like to have your husband, wife, son or daughter simply disappear from the face of the earth.

Many families had no remains to bury. Their friends and loved ones disintegrated in the jet fuel fires or torn to bits in piles of fallen wreckage.

It is not pleasant to remember those final terrible minutes of a person's life.

No doubt many survivors left behind are still dealing with grief and anger this year later. The tragic reality set in long ago that he or she was simply not coming home.

We like to say "we will never forget." That's true I suppose. We have not forgotten Pearl Harbor where over 1,000 sailors are still entombed in the wreckage of the USS Arizona, only feet below the memorial which now marks its watery resting place.

And yet December 7 is not a national holiday. Its not remembered as much now but that is probably because it happened 60 years ago.

Next Wednesday, September 11, America will once again be in a somber reflective mood, caused mainly by the national media. If you turn on your TV early that day, you will

see almost nothing but the tragedy all day and into the night.

Many advertisers will not advertise on Wednesday. They say it would be irreverent somehow. Airlines had to resort to giving away seats that day because no one was making reservations to fly. Scared I guess. Or superstitious.

Almost every organized group and religion is scheduling some kind of memorial service. Some call it celebration.

No doubt the politicians will bow their heads and pledge their allegiance to America and the war on terror. They'll do that because not to do it could cost them reelection.

Yet many of the wives and parents of victims have asked the TV networks publicly to minimize how many times they show the footage of the buildings falling and the fire and dust and smoke.

Today when one of the networks say they are going to have another heroic survivor story on, I change the channel. I'm not cold-hearted. I just don't want to hear about it over and over until the day I die.

It is too much already. I know the story. I saw it live and on millions of replays. I have seen the story through the eyes of more than enough people.

And I still don't understand why the federal government felt it necessary to take tax dollars and try to bribe the families to keep them from suing the airlines. Most haven't taken the government money.

No doubt the September 11 events changed America forever. We are in a war which will never be won.

Even America cannot eliminate terrorists and hate from the earth.

I think the biggest tribute we could have for September 11 would be to go about our lives and our business as usual. It should never be declared a national holiday so people could mourn at the beach or Disneyland.

Leave it alone. Let's get on with life. Say a prayer for the dead, but celebrate the living.

If we don't, then wherever Osama is, he won.

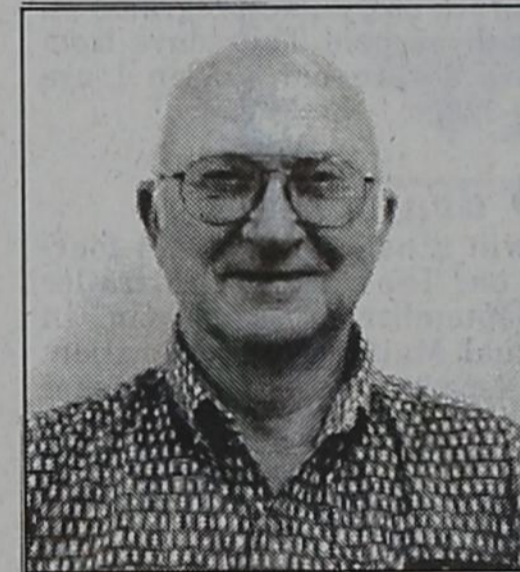

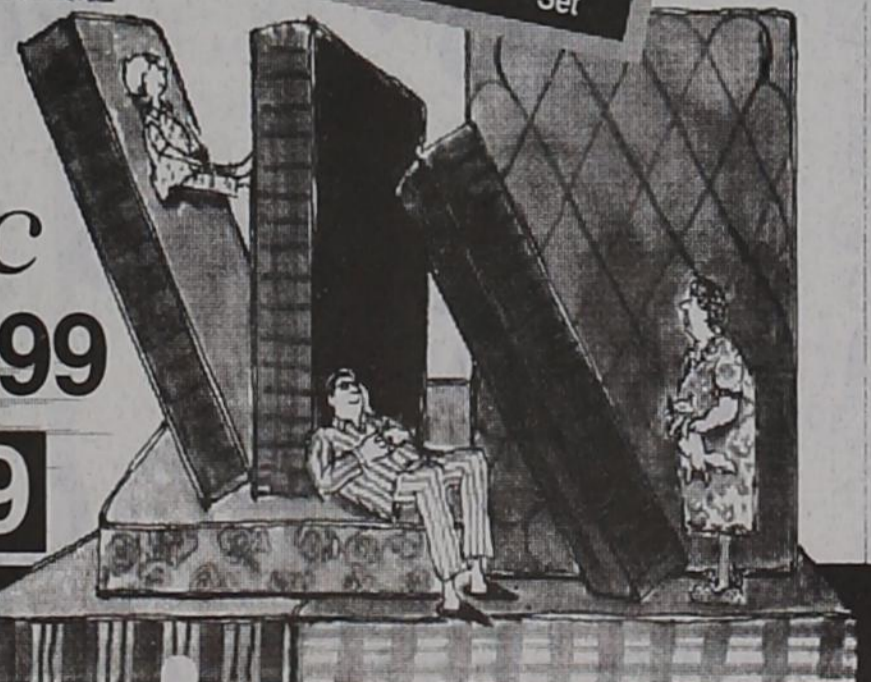

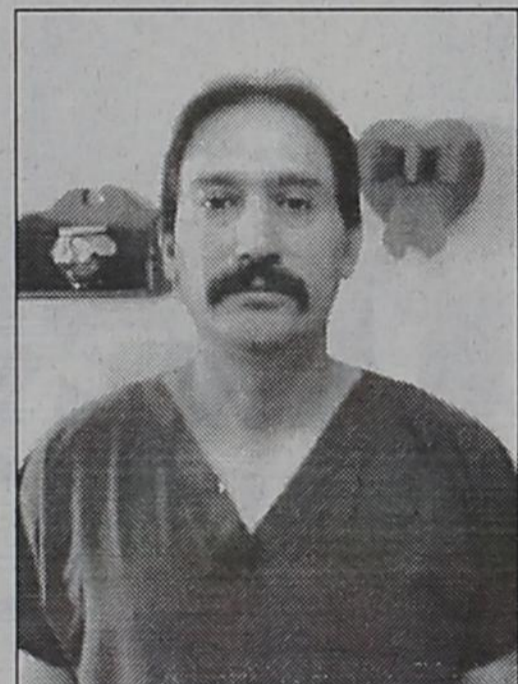
Free Trees Are Offered

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Odis White.

I was born October 23, 1907 in Washington, Oklahoma, thirty miles from Oklahoma City, to James and Molly White. I had an older brother, Hubert, and a younger sister, Lucille, both are now deceased.

My dad ran a grocery store in Oklahoma. Then we moved to Amarillo and he ran one there. I drove a truck delivering groceries from Amarillo to Clovis, New Mexico and all the little towns in between, when I got older.

Dad lived to be 82 and mother was only 66 when she passed away.

I graduated from the eighth grade in Erick, Oklahoma. I always said, "If I hadn't been so smart, I might of had a more intelligent life."

I moved to Bovina and did a little of everything. I did some farming, learned electrical work and also learned how to be a mechanic.

I met Lula Kelly in 1939 in Bovina. After a whirlwind romance of three months, we were married on November 6, 1939. She had a nine year old son, Bob. I always enjoyed watching Bob play ball and never missed one of his games.

We were married for sixty years when Lula passed away in May of 1999.

From 1939 until 1940 I worked for the railroad as a mechanic. The section where I worked was called the Gandy Gang, we kept the steam engines running.

When World War II broke out, Lula and I moved to Amarillo and I went to work for the Pantex plant from 1941 to 1943. I drove the truck hauling explosives away from the plant. I would drive five miles an hour when the truck was fully

loaded with 500 pounds of explosives.

In 1943, when I was 36 years old, I went into the USAF and did mechanical work on airplanes. I also did alot of KP duty. I was stationed in New Guinea for two years. In 1945, I got out of the service and Lula and I moved back to Bovina.

I started working on wiring houses all over Parmer County for electricity. Lula ran the spudnut shop in Bovina for 21 years and I would go down and help her roll and cut out the spudnuts. That was back when Bovina was a thriving town. Those were the good ole days.

My hobbies are fishing and I am an avid football fan of West Texas University and the Dallas Cowboys.

I have one son, one granddaughter and one great-grandson.

I moved to Prairie Acres on February 18, 2002.
