marvelous growth over the nation in the 20s stemmed, in large part, with the invention of the Model T and other cars. This prompted the rapid sale of many other cars.

Every hand there were things to buy -- land, automobiles, new houses, electric and gas appliances, and season foods shipped far and preserved by canning.

Prosperity was everywhere. Mills County graduated to enjoy it as prices increased. The cost of livestock improved. The price of wool and grain warehouses were built to market the products. Fur houses were established to market the skins and grain prices better.

People with money in bank, the '20s was a time to be alive; they bought new cars, a little land, and ready-made clothes.

They cut their hair for the time in men's barber shops in the '20s. Bobbed hair was looked on with scorn, but almost every lady finally went along with the new fad. Dresses were shortened, then shortened again and again, until the popular length was well below the knee; this, too, was a shameful to some.

The motion picture business thrived. People were with their new cars to several miles to view and enjoy a few hours of motion. Western movies were popular and so were the silent stars, William S. Hart, Tom Mix and Broncho Billy.

Spit comedy was enjoyed by Mills County youngsters and oldsters, as they will remember the boys of seeing Fatty Arbuckle and Mack Sennett's "Keystone Cops".

How with her "cupie lips" was the IT girl of the time.

Goldthwaite's first theatre called THE AIRDOME was owned by Milton Williams Cline. The first school theatre was called CROWN and owned by William Cline; another theatre called Mills County Citizens remember was THE AIRDOME, owned in the '20's by Evans.

Other industries that thrived during the '20s, added millions to the pocketbooks everywhere. The spread of electricity, the oil boom, the automobile industry to make for the millions of new automobiles off the assembly line, the steel industry that needed the material to manufacture them, the gas that fixed them and the tourist courts that attracted the travelers.

The decade wore on, the cost of spending and prices increased.

By Sunday was preached, this supercharged sermon during the '20s, as was the Simple McPherson. Lapone and his rival preachers were making the most of the Prohibition Act which was supposed to make U.S. a dry nation. The preachers ran rampant over the land and other cities -- died violent deaths at the hands.

Warren G. Harding was president of the country and he cared little about the foundation of the economy as long as everybody had him. He was followed by Calvin Coolidge in the White House.

The Ku Klux Klan was rising in the south and it bore into the hearts of the people; Ernest Hemingway writing from abroad; the circus, musicals

and dramas were doing well on the road.

The trucking industry was in its infancy and school buses were just beginning to be made.

The Saturday Evening Post with its unforgettable Norman Rockwell covers was the magazine most families read, but McFadden's "True Story" magazine sold 2 million copies in 1926. Most Mills County girls were forbidden by their mothers to read them, but many were concealed under the mattress when mother's footsteps were heard outside the door.

Sports were quickly coming into view and enjoyed by all. Football began to draw huge crowds; golf and tennis had grown in popularity at a phenomenal speed by 1930.

The Dempsey - Tunney fight in 1926 drew 120,000 fans, who paid \$1.8 million dollars to see Dempsey dethroned.

The '20s were the golden years of baseball. Tens of millions followed the career of the lovable "Babe" Ruth. Mills County people loved baseball and rooted for the Yankees and White Sox; they kept up with baseball scores by phoning Western Union at the Depot.

The decade of the '20s was called the "Jazz Age". The Charleston was the going dance of the day; youngsters worked long hours in their living rooms with the victrola playing "Ain't She Sweet" to learn the difficult dance.

In short, the flapper age was here and with it came women with bobbed hair, short dresses, lipstick, rouge, heavy mascara, and cigarette smoking. The cosmetic industry boomed, cigarette sales increased, women wobbled about on high heels and everywhere there was gaiety.

Summer vacation will be over for students of Mills County schools this month. Mullin students will report for classes August 22 - Priddy on August 25 - and Goldthwaite and Star on August 29.

GOLDTHWAITE

Goldthwaite teachers, aides, etc., begin in service August 22 through 26. Students report for classes Monday, August 29 and need to be in their classrooms by 8:10 a.m. Classes will be promptly started at 8:20 a.m. School will dismiss at 3:30 p.m.

Goldthwaite students will observe their first holiday from school on Monday, September 5, Labor Day.

Mr. Davis, the superintendent, stated that kindergarten will be conducted on a 1/2 day basis -- with one-half of the students attending in the morning and one-half coming in the afternoon.

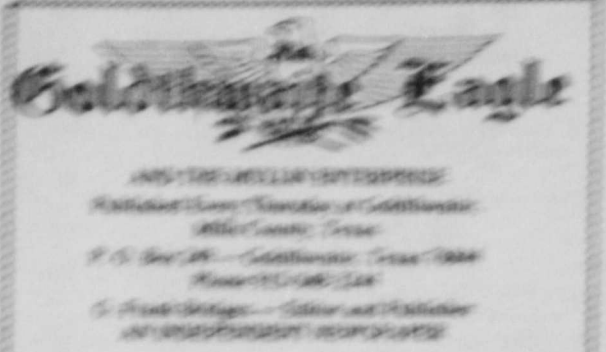

The pecan weevil is a common pest of pecans in several areas of Texas. It was first seen in Goldthwaite in 1952. Since then, it has become a major pest of the pecan crop.

Feeding of adult weevils causes the nuts to be water-soaked and inedible. The damage is done during the summer months. The weevils lay their eggs in the nuts, and the eggs hatch into larvae. The larvae feed on the nuts, causing them to be water-soaked and inedible.

To accomplish this, there is a large sheet under a tree and for the birds to be gathered (pecan weevils will fly to the ground and remain underneath the sheet) period of time. Having emergency cages under the sheet will collect them and periodically recording catch is the best method of deterring the pest of adult emergence and the weevil population density. This information will aid in making correct decisions as to when and how long to continue protective spray applications in relation to the maturity of the crop.

Control of the weevil can be accomplished with applications of Gove 90% W.P. at the rate of 2-3 lbs. per 100 gallons of water. Repeat at 14-day intervals as long as weevils are still present.
