

The "Boom" of The Twenties

The sound of the '20s was heard over the entire country. The 18th Amendment made prohibition the law, but who cared.

"Yes, We Have No Bananas" was the song hit of the times. But there was plenty of everything — nothing beautiful, murder trials, crazy dances, sports events, real estate booms and short skirts.

Contest in endless variety appeared in the '20s. Anyone could do anything better and longer than anyone else was a hero. It didn't matter what — swimming, flying, riding on flag poles, sitting on street corners, dancing for days without let up until a serious couple was the last left standing. One dance marathon in Chicago lasted 27 hours, with the dejected couple finally collapsing on the dance floor.

There was an 84-day jog from Los Angeles to New York City. The most shocking feat in the '20s was flagpole sitting. The record was set by "Shipwreck" Kelly when he sat atop a 100 ft. pole for 23 days and 7 hours. Those were the days of fads, fashion and mass hysteria.

Louis Armstrong from New Orleans became famous with his jazz band; couples danced to his music at a frantic pace with girls in long skirts bouncing and legs flying.

The most publicized and exciting single event to hit the press and the American people happened when Charles A. Lindbergh took flight, May 20, 1927 to try to fly the Atlantic Ocean. He landed in Paris in his single engine plane. The entire town held its breath and waited for word of him and his craft. When his plane "The Spirit of St. Louis" landed in Paris, after buffeting high winds, rain and sleet, the New York Times headlines read — "TO PARIS IN 33 1/2 HOURS".

When Lindy came home, he was given a ticker parade and dumped 1,800 tons of confetti along his route through New York City.

Meanwhile, back on the farm in Mills County, people were vaguely aware of the happenings outside their immediate realm and talking themselves about the exciting events; but they were too concerned with keeping their children in school, paying for the farm and hoping would someday be them independent, and trying to maintain their orchards and schools to be worried about what happened in Chicago, New York, or elsewhere.

The thrasher still ran on kerosene in summers; housewives still cooked huge meals for the crews. Gardens were carefully cared for; fruits and vegetables were canned and neatly placed on cellar shelves to ease living costs.

Men still came home at night for milking; fields were plowed, planted and harvested; fruits were seen hanging on roofs of smokestacks in summer months.

Whiffs of smoke could be seen coming from the same chimneys in winter months as hams and sides of meat hung inside.

Most everyone had a shiny car by the middle '20s. Hassles arose between family members on Saturday night about who would get to drive.

Housewives slyly watched their hens through the fence to find their nests; the eggs they raised were marketed, come fall. Everyone went to town on Saturday mornings to buy the weekly supply of staples and there usually a little cream, butter and a few eggs to sell.

Families attended church on Sunday and loved singings on Sunday afternoons.

It is doubtful if a single person in Mills County owned a share of stock on Wall Street in 1928 and 1929; it is also doubtful if they knew that in 1928 Wright Aeronautics rose from 69 to 289, Montgomery Ward from 117 to 440, and Radio Corporation of America, the symbol of the great bull market, went from 85 to 420.

At first, large banks bought bonds seeking better interest rates, but in 1928 individual speculation soared. The margin rate on Wall Street was a mere 10%, and sale of stocks was pushed by every bank and brokerage house in large cities.

The market was going up and brokers thought it would keep going. Their sales pitch sounded as if the market could never go down — and most of them honestly believed it wouldn't. Small investors plunged in with every penny they had and all they could borrow. In fact, the essential ingredient needed to keep the low margin system going was a constantly rising market. One million dollars in stocks could be purchased for \$100,000.

A prominent banker in New York went for a haircut one day and was told that his barber had made \$500,000 on the stock market and retired. Trust executors and small banks in many places shifted funds out of business loans and government bonds into stocks. The Moguls on Wall Street said they could not lose, but lose they did.

City Council Hears Tax Payers May Call Special Session

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session on Thursday, August 4, 1977. All members were present. Manager Dale Allen shared the operations report for July and stated the fuel charge would be about 20.5 mills for August. There was no reason given by LCRA for the increase.

Dean Bagley shared with the Council the plans of microwave cable television, stating that it is expected to have consistently good reception on Channels 2, 3 and 4. Cecil Derrick will be serving this area cable system and is available by phone if problems arise.

E. B. Lane gave his views and concerns about taxes with the Council. Mr. Lane stated he felt the same tax levied on large cars and small cars was unfair and not equal. Mayor Harper explained the intent of the Council is to develop a tax program that will be fair and equal - although that goal has not been attained yet. Another facet of the discussion dealt with location of property, such as motor homes, boats and trailers.

City Attorney Clyde Cockrum noted the determination of taxable personal property must consider the "permanent" residence of the property, not the owner.

Warren Duren shared his concerns with the Council regarding rendition of bank shares. Duren stated he had reviewed the tax rolls and found the assessed values of real property in the city to be very closely related. He requested, on behalf of the bank directors and stockholders, that an evaluation of \$100 per share be placed on the rendition rolls and the tax notice be sent to the share owners in care of the bank.

After lengthy discussion of the tax matter, Alderman Tom Cody Graves suggested the Council deal with items on the agenda for this

meeting and call a special meeting for tax discussion if warranted. Alderman Wright suggested the Equalization Board should be represented at tax matter discussions. There was consensus on this suggestion.

City Manager Allen shared a new federal program whereby senior citizens, or other eligible persons, may have their utility costs paid by a one-time federal source. After discussion, the Council acted to participate in this program for this year.

Senate Bill 543 has amended the Texas Municipal Retirement System for employees of various Texas cities. The benefit would be

based on employees salary prior to retirement, and cost would be about \$18 per month. The Council agreed to participate in this increased benefit program for employees.

A fire hazard was reported at the land fill due to burning trash. Manager Allen reported that the fire burning has been delayed because of the dryness. A fire lane around the land fill was recommended.

The City Manager reported the following work programs in progress:

- Personnel additions.
- Mr. McCann, Brownwood cable TV called to express his regrets that he was unable to attend this Council meeting.
- Recommendation was made that City Manager Allen contact the State Fire Marshall regarding fire hazard property within the city and ask if his office could be used to correspond with property owners asking for rehabilitation.
- Water filter plant has a new chlorinator.
- Sewer plant repairs completed.
- Miscellaneous work projects including paving, street sealing, water and electric connections, etc.

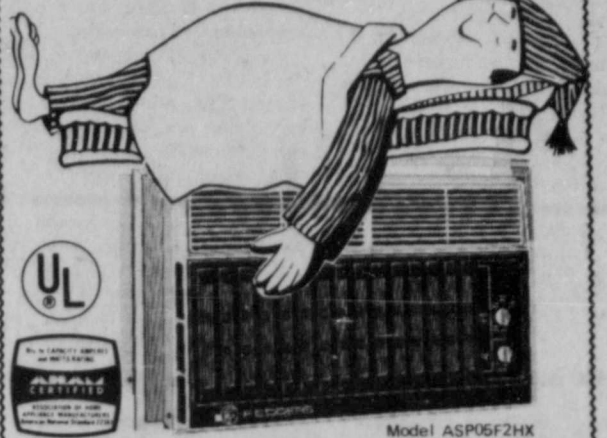

Summer Youth Program Gains Recognition

The Central Texas Manpower Consortium, composed of the counties of Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills and San Saba, has just concluded its 1977 Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youth. Youth ages 14-21 participated in the program, which is funded by the Department of Labor through its regional office in Dallas.

The 1977 Program had several innovations, including classroom training in prevocational skills and field trips, along with work experience. Some participants engaged in summer youth on-the-job training with private businesses and industries, while some others lived on a college campus, earning college credit in the

Early Admission Program. Because of these innovative features, the Summer Program has received regional and national recognition. During the course of the summer, a special monitoring team from the Dept. of Labor visited the Consortium area. A slide-tape presentation was prepared and has been viewed by elected officials of the seven county Consortium and by the regional office of the Dept. of Labor, and will be shown to a task force from Washington, D. C.

A number of institutions, programs, agencies, and individuals contributed to the success of the 1977 Summer Program.

Independent School Districts provided space and recommended instructional personnel. Many local professional and business people were called on to speak to participants about subjects related to the world of work and everyday economics.

Field trips included visits to Fran Smith and Sons, and Rainbo Bakery, in Waco; American Desk Mfg. Co., Temple; Ft. Hood, Killeen; Bergstrom AFB, the LBJ Library, the Capitol, the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, Austin; and LBJ State Park, Johnson City.

Films were secured through regional Education Service Centers. Some materials were provided by the Texas Employment Commission. Work experience sites were located in city, county, state, federal and other non-profit agencies.

In Mills County, classroom training was conducted at Goldthwaite High School by Mrs. Dolores Humphries. From all reports, the youth greatly benefited from their experiences in the 1977 Summer Program.

Special recognition is due the members of the Consortium Board for approving and supporting the Program. The Board is composed of one representative from each Commissioners Court. The representative for Mills County is Judge Herbert Faulkner.
