be exempt from State Sales Tax effective August 29,
nding to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts.
The new law H.B. 694 reads effective August 29, 1977: "Sale
ewspapers, whether sold or distributed by individual copy,
ow exempt from the Sales Tax." The bill defines the
wspapers as "a publication printed on newsprint
average sales price per copy over a 30-day period does
not exceed seventy-five cents and which is printed and distributed
ically at daily, weekly or other short intervals for the dis-
ution of news of a general character and of a general
est."
The Eagle will not be taxed on either single copy sales or
al subscriptions, effective with the issue of Thursday,
ember 1, 1977.

Commissioners Court Approves New Precinct Boundaries

The Mills County Commissioners Court met in a special session Tuesday to finalize redistricting plans for the county's precincts and voting boxes. The new commissioners precincts and justice of the peace boundaries will take effect on Sept. 1, 1977. This was done following the abolition of the old lines by the court. This will also be the time that the justice of the peace lines will change. Voting box changes will

not take official action until March 1, 1978. At this time new boxes will be created in Precinct 1, Mills County Youth Center; Precinct 2, Mills County Senior Citizens Building; Precinct 4, Goldthwaite High School; Precinct 3 will add a new box, located at the Democrat church. This will leave a total of 11 boxes for the county. At the present time, 9 boxes are used in general elections.

The rest of the voting boxes in the county will remain unchanged. The action by the commissioners court comes as a result of notification by the United States Department of Justice (Attorney General) that no objection could be found to the plan as submitted by Mills County. This notification did not, however, prohibit the Justice Department from further testing of the proposition.

The original cornerstone dated 1896 and the one dated 1920 form an integral part of the exterior wall of the present church. Much of the building material from the original church was salvaged and used on the new one. The bell used in the old church hangs in the tower and can be heard on Sunday morning.

Several members donated square and arched stained glass windows as memorials. The interior has been made more comfortable by installing thermostatically controlled heat and cooling. Those of us who remember the one, pot-bellied wood and coal burning cast iron heater setting in the center aisle to heat the entire building, are delighted with the new system. Carpet and a lowered ceiling improved the acoustics.

A few descendants and family members of the men instrumental in the organization and building of the churches are still active in

The interperative plaque was given in memory of the late A. G. Wasserman by his wife, Edna, and three daughters, Ima Jean Smith, Bonez Collier, and Wynona Head.

The inscription on the marker reads:

MULLIN UNITED
METHODIST CHURCH

Charles Mullins, for whom this town was later named, came here with cattle in 1857. By tradition, a Methodist circuit rider preached at his home. The date of the Church's founding is uncertain. Worship was held in Mullin schoolhouse for years. In 1893, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Martin gave this site and in 1896 a building was constructed under leadership of the Rev. Marion Mills. After a 1919 cyclone wrecked that building the present native stone church was erected in 1920, using much material from the original structure.
