

Farm Life - A Summer Eve

(NOTE: For the next few weeks we will run a series of articles entitled, "Farm Life". They will not depict any particular homestead or family, but hopefully they will bring back many childhood memories about the way life was on the farm in Mills County. All names will be fictitious, but actual facts will be taken from memories of various people in the county.)

The days were long in summer - they seemed to never end, but when a day was finally over it was time for resting both the mind and body.

Nothing is lovelier than a summer twilight on the farm when all the chores are finished, the cows milked and the calves have had their fill. After the milk had been strained into crocks and set in the milk cooler under a dripping canvas, supper was over, the kitchen cleaned, feet and faces washed to a shine - that was the time for resting.

It was then that the entire family gathered on the front porch to enjoy a deep softness which seemed to settle just before dark.

At first there was a glow from the setting sun that touched softly upon everything, but gradually all things began to blur and the trees seemed to telescope into themselves until they dissolved into a solid mass of deep, long shadow.

As we sat silently - tired from a long hot summer day - we could hear the occasional flapping of wings when the chickens flew up to roost; they looked like scraps of paper against the darkness of the trees if we happened to glance their way.

Mama was out in the garden doing the last bit of hoeing while the coolness of night settled in. Just an afternoon or two before she had been up on a ladder in the trees where the chickens roost with a paint brush and a bucket of lube oil in her hand. She was coating the limbs of the trees with a vengeance, but there was hopelessness in her voice when she muttered, "These ole' bluebugs! I don't know what I'm going to do with them. Every hen has her wings draggin' now." But she continued to paint back and forth as if the hrush itself might kill every bluebug there. Within a week, she would catch those hens and paint beneath their wings with a mixture of bacon grease, kerosene and sulphur to rid them of the "bloomin' bluebugs".

Suddenly, when we were least expecting it, the beautiful glow of evening changed into night. The katydids began their song and we heard the garden gate bang as Mama decided to call it a day; soon she would join us on the porch.

Night had descended upon the earth; a great distance away we heard a cow low and fireflies left bright streaks as they dashed about the yard. The light evening breeze brought odors of cedar and honeysuckle drifting by.

Grandpa, sitting in the one big porch rocker, suddenly broke the quietness with, "You know, I remember the time me and my brother started out to drive a bunch of steers down to South Texas", but Grandma interrupted with, "Not that ole' tale again, Henry. We've heard it a thousand times before", but Grandpa reckoned it wouldn't hurt anybody to hear it again so he went on with his story about camping out nights, thieves raiding camp and how much the steers brought at the end of the journey.

Papa had brought a pillow with him from the inside of the house to the porch and lay half propped against the wall in a state of complete relaxation that only the very tired and contented can attain.

Suddenly there was a loud call of a hoot owl down on

branch and another answered from far away. Mama said that was the sign of rain.

We hoped we wouldn't hear the call of a screech owl. Aunt Mae said it was the sign of a death in the family to hear a screech owl in the night. The burning of salt was supposed to break the spell, so she always got out of bed, regardless of the time of night or year, and built a fire in the wood stove to burn the salt and save some member of the family.

I usually felt a little uneasy for two or three days after I heard a screech owl in the night. Mama said she didn't believe Aunt Mae, so she wouldn't get up to burn salt; but then, we had to be careful what we did at Aunt Mae's house. She thought it would bring bad luck if we stepped over a broom handle, swept the floor after sundown, put a hat on the bed, walked under a ladder, or took a salt shaker out of anybody's hand - you really had to be careful at Aunt Mae's house to keep from bringing bad luck.

The fireflies continued to flit across the darkness until a brother or sister said, "I'll bet I can catch more lightnin' bugs than you can." The race was on and soon the yard was filled with running bare feet. Match boxes in hand, we stuffed them full of fireflies to be counted later on the kitchen floor to see who won.

When we saw Grandpa abandon his rocker, stretch and yawn, we knew it was time for bed. We turned toward the yellow coal oil light left burning in the kitchen and knew another summer evening had come to an end.

Effective Oct. 1

Precinct 1 Commissioner Burthel Roberts Resigns

Mills County Precinct 2 Commissioner Burthel B. Roberts submitted a letter of resignation Monday, Sept. 26.

Roberts, whose resignation will become effective on

October 1, has been ill for several months, having suffered a stroke. He had served one year into his third four-year term as Commissioner of Precinct 1.

County Judge Herb Faulk-

ner read the letter with "deep regret." The letter of resignation was accepted by the Commissioners Court at the regular meeting Monday.

Judge Faulkner will appoint a successor to Robert's position this Friday, Sept. 30, during a special meeting of the Court. The appointee will be named at the 9 a.m. session.

In other county matters Monday, the court set the date of November 8, 1977 as the day for the Constitutional Amendment election. Only one box will be available for county voters, box 19, located at the Courthouse. Myra D. Holland will be the election judge for the general election.

This will be the last election held in the courthouse, as all others will come under the new re-districting plan.

Commissioners named J. D. "Bud" Robertson of Goldthwaite as the Veterans Service Officer for Mills County. He will meet on Tuesdays of each week at the Senior Citizens Center to handle veterans and other related questions. He will be paid a salary of \$150 per month.

The commissioners authorized Sheriff H. G. Brooks to transport and put prisoners in adjoining jails at his discretion. This is brought about by the fact that law requires a jailer be on duty 24 hours a day, and Mills County does not have such an officer.

Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department Chief Roger Horton and Goldthwaite City Manager Dale Allen met with the Commissioners. They discussed what the county is to pay for the upkeep of the fire truck used for fires out in the county. The discussion will be continued later.

Eagles Come From Behind To Defeat Florence, 15-14

Dist. Opener With Early Friday

Some people say that Class A football games in Texas are just about as exciting as watching the grass grow . . . but the Goldthwaite fans of last Friday night will argue the point with those people.

Scoring first, then losing the lead to a strong Florence eleven, the Eagles of Goldthwaite High School had to play air tight defense and heads up offense in the second half to pull off the win.

The Eagles scored first in the contest with only 4:55 to go in the first quarter when a wobbly pass was "taken" from a Florence defender by Eddy Welch on the five yard line and then Eddy legged it in for the six pointer. Jett Johnson's kick for the extra point was good.

but the lead was short-lived, as the Buffaloes came back after the kickoff and scored, using a nifty reverse that caught the Eagle defensive unit unawares. A kick for the PAT knotted the score

with 1:48 to go in the initial stanza.

Following a couple of punt exchanges, Florence again mounted the offense and aided by a 34 yard screen pass, and another one of those disturbing reverses, the Buffs left for the intermission with a 14-7 advantage.

It was evident the Eagles came out in the second half to play ball, but onlookers were beginning to wonder if scoring was part of the plan. The locals moved the ball to the Florence 17, then to the 35, then to the 33 and even to the 28 without scoring.

But finally, the Eagles put together the right combination of plays to score. The key play in the drive was a 30 yard aerial strike from quarterback Mike Lee to Welch for a first down on the 10 yard line. On the next play, another pass from Lee, this time to Randy Benningfield, netted the score. It was completed at the end zone

line, in a crowd of Buff defenders.

This, of course, set the score at 14-13, still in favor of Florence. And, of course, the Eagles elected to go for the two points and the win, instead of the tie.

Using a play that had moved the chain several times in the game, quarterback Lee called on halfback Stephen Coronado for a right end sweep. It was good for the three yards and the two point conversion.

Needless to say, this is the point when the fans rose to their feet in hysterical cheering for the Eagles. This quickly turned to a co-op yell of "defense," as there was still 2:23 on the clock.

And defend they did . . . taking over on downs on the Eagle 24 yard line. From that point it was easy to run out the remaining minute.

Overall enthusiasm was the deciding factor in the game for the Eagles. The spirit of togetherness and the desire of the team, lacking somewhat in previous '77 contests, brought the Eagles through some trying times in the game, against an unbeaten team this year.

City Receives Notification Of Water Ok

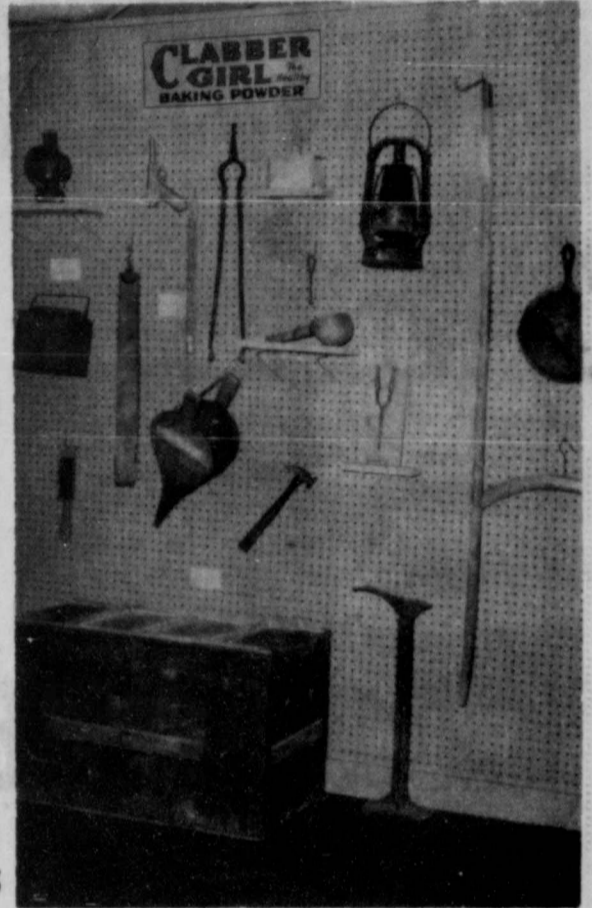
The City of Goldthwaite received a letter last week notifying the City that local water meets chemical limits established by the Texas Department of Health.

Samples of Goldthwaite water were taken recently and sampled for chemical analysis by the Texas Department of Health Resources in Austin.

The report said "water being supplied by this system (Goldthwaite) meets the chemical limits established by Sections III-A, III-B, III-C, and XIV of this Department's 'Drinking Water Standards'. These Standards were promulgated in accordance with the requirements of Public Law 93-523, the Federal 'Safe Drinking Water Act', and became effective July 1, 1977."

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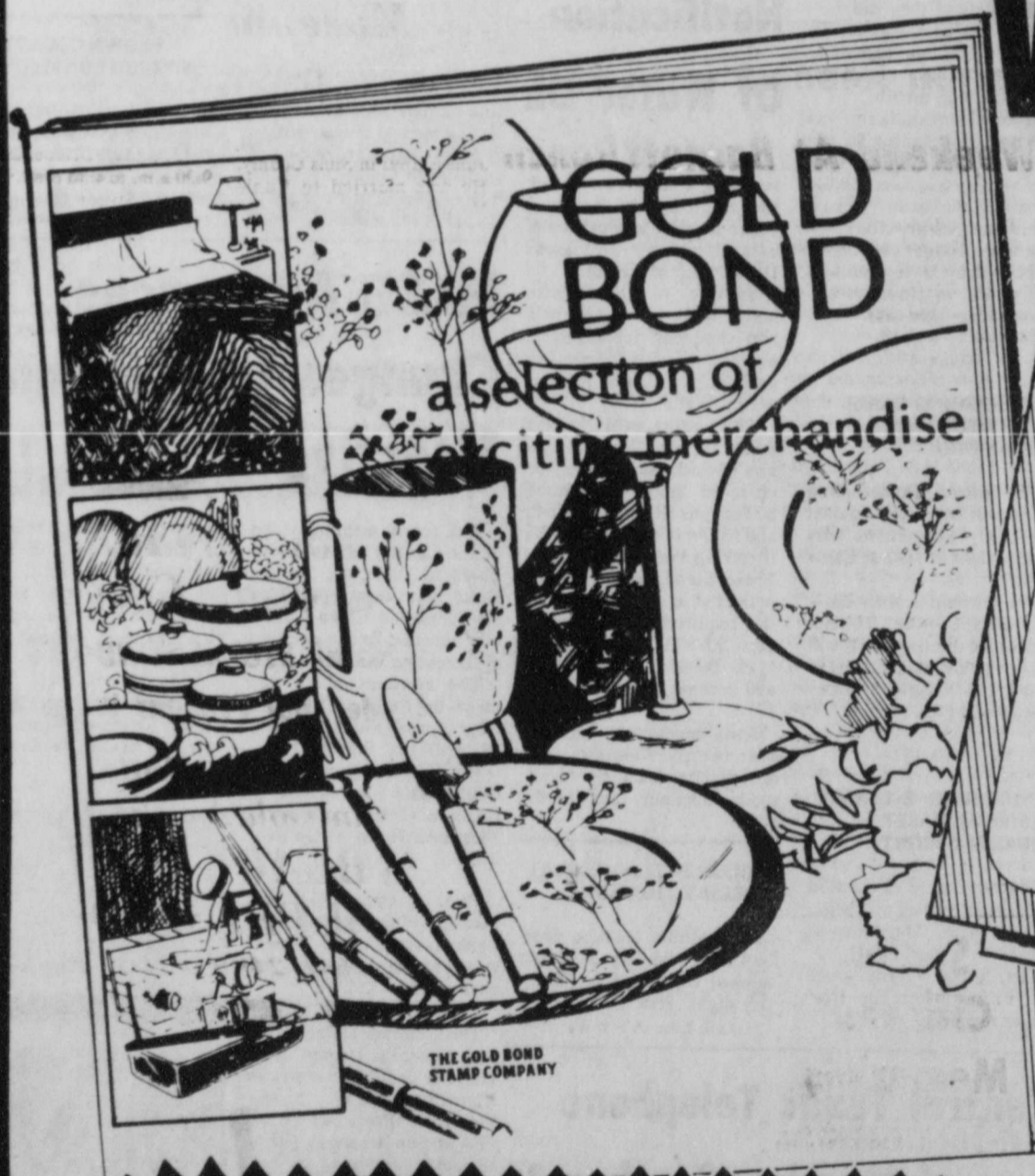

Meth. 'Pony Express' Gets Underway Sun.

A "trail boss" breakfast and worship service Sunday will signal the start of a Pony Express "run" at the Goldthwaite United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Ben Welch, pastor, said he expects 157 members filling the roles of trail bosses and station agents to be on hand for the breakfast briefing.

Church families on the Pony Express run will be realying stewardship saddlebags to gather "estimate of giving" cards.

Glynn Collier, general manager of the stewardship campaign, will hand out the saddlebags and run route lists at the breakfast.

A relay of the saddlebags among church members will begin immediately after morning worship, he said.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 10 church families. A family fills in a giving estimate card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag pouch and then hand carries the saddlebag to another of the families on the route.

"We're excited because of the enthusiastic reception the plan has received thus far, he said.

"There's a spirit of teamwork and, at the same time, competition," he said the teamwork is similar to that of the Pony Express riders of a century ago, knowing they can count on the next rider to relay the mail to its next destination.

The competition, he said, comes in the eagerness of some trail bosses to see that their "run" is completed before another's is finished.

"It's good, healthy competition for a good cause," he said.

Each trail boss is responsible for supervision of the relaying of one saddlebag to 10 families. The trail bosses report periodically to station agents.

"Texans are hungry for an effective gubernatorial spokesman on energy policy. They are frustrated that our governor hasn't been able to get the Texas viewpoint across in Washington. They are wondering, 'too why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleaguered farms and ranches.'"

"I fully agree with the people's assessment; that's why I'm seeking the office of Governor."

"I'm proud of my record as Attorney General and Secretary of State. It shows that I'm not afraid to roll up my sleeves and work hard. It indicates that I have the ability to assemble a capable staff, that I prefer to work closely with people, and that I'm not reluctant to make changes when they can benefit the state. I'll be this kind of governor, given the job."

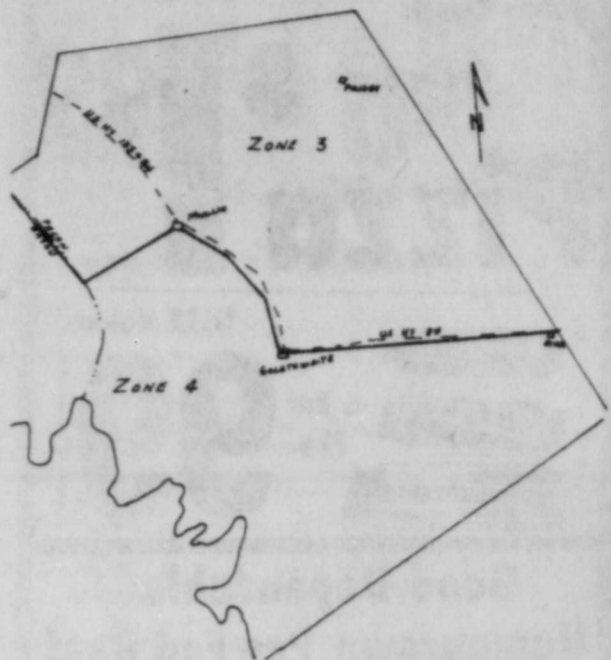

Soil and Water Conservation District Directors serve a term of five years.

The position of a director on local boards is becoming an even more important job than in the past to local landowners and land users. With the passage of several environmental laws involving soil, water and plants, local units of government, especially conservation districts, will be in a position to exert considerable influence in the implementation of these environmental laws.

In controlling pests and disease the most important fact to remember is that both the top and bottom surface of the leaves must be reached by the spray or dust.

Hostesses for the day were: Mrs. Jack Elms, Mrs. Allen Campbell and Mrs. Robert McCoy.

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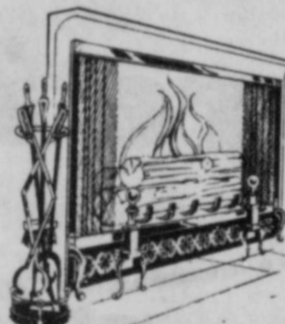

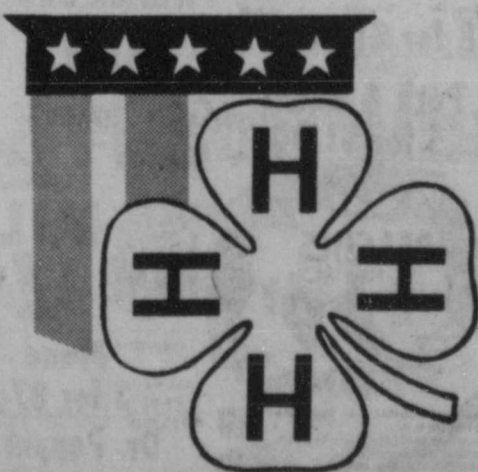

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Rep. Schlueter's Legislative ★ Outlook ★

There are a few issues in government which provoke more interest than taxation. As a member of the committee on Ways and Means, which determines the state's tax policy, a large portion of the questionnaire which my office mailed out during the past legislative session was dedicated to the issue of revenues.

Basically, the voters of the Forty-Third Legislative District agreed with the fiscally conservative approach which I advocated during the past session.

Evidence of the trend towards regulated spending can be found in the response to the proposition that an election should be required before any long-term debt can be assumed by a governmental unit. 965 voters favored such a policy as opposed to 186 who did not.

Of the polled households which responded, 780 agreed with Gov. Briscoe's "no-new-taxes" approach to government while 289 disagreed. One of the main issues of concern, which showed up on the questionnaire, was tax reform. 782 respondents wanted to enact a statewide program to insure equality in property valuation as opposed to 369 who did not favor such a proposal.

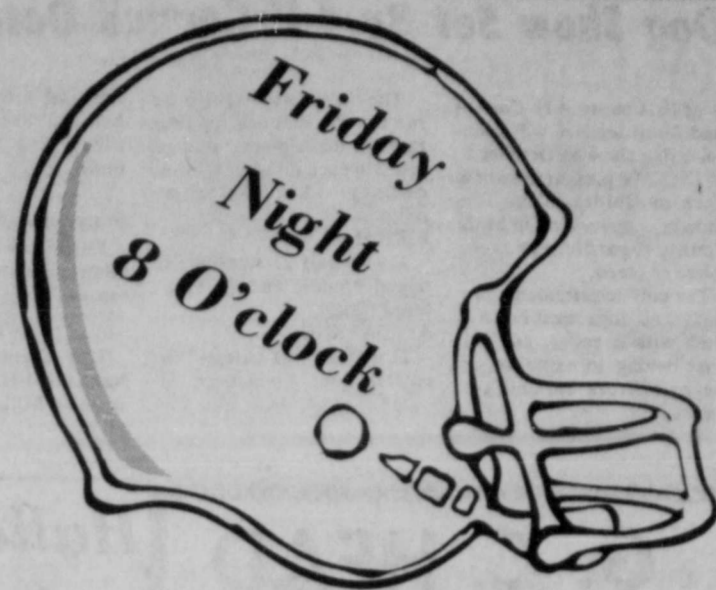

... Will Not Seek Re-election

Congressman Poage Decides To Retire

W. R. (Bob) Poage, who has represented Mills County for the past five years in the United States Congress as the representative from the 12th Congressional District, announced Saturday that he will not be a candidate for reelection in 1977.

Speaking from the front porch of his home in Waco, Poage said the announcement was being made at this early date "in fairness to all prospective candidates" and noted that he delayed the announcement so as not to reduce his effectiveness as a 'Lame Duck' representative in Washington.

Poage spent more than five decades in public office, first entering the Texas House of Representatives in 1925 and later serving six years in the Texas Senate before being elected to the 75th Congress in 1936 and being reelected to each succeeding Congress through the 95th Congress.

He is currently the second senior member of the House of Representatives and has served as chairman and vice-chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture since 1953.

Changing sentiments in government were cited by Poage as one of his principal reasons for retiring from office.

"In recent years I have seen the sentiment of the country and of the country's representatives change," he said. "Many people seem to believe that government can and should give them all of the good things of life. I cannot consistently represent such views. I believe government cannot change economic law. I believe we must work for a better life. I believe in the Biblical injunction, 'In the sweat of thy brow shall you eat bread.' I have seen what an overdose of socialism has done for the once proud people in Great Britain. I do not want to be a party to leading my country down that primrose path."

Poage said he has reached the conclusion "that my efforts to move our country in what I consider to be the right direction may not be as effective as those of a new face would be."

"Several competent individuals have expressed an interest in assuming the responsibility when I lay it down. I have no desire to select my successor. I think that the people of this District have proven that

they are quite able to do that."

The outgoing Congressman said he would "vote for the candidate I consider best

qualified" and pledged to "work with, and if I can, to assist anyone our people select."

In his service to the 11th

District of Texas, Poage played a vital role in building Fort Hood, the munitions plant at McGregor, a number of projects in Waco, the Federal Building, the Research Center and the agricultural agencies in Temple, and he sponsored and passed legislation resulting in the development and control of the Brazos River system with Possum Kingdom, Whitney, Belton, Waco, Stillhouse Hollow and the San Gabriel dams; rural telephone program, rural water systems, upstream flood control and the Rural Development Act of 1974.

Henry Nipps, age 68, passed away Monday, September 26, 1977, at Childress Hospital in Goldthwaite.

Mr. Nipps was born in Gainesville, Mo. in 1909. He was married to Leila Crane on July 5, 1930 in Aransas Pass, Texas. They moved to Goldthwaite from Austin in 1960. He was a Baptist.

Mr. Nipps was preceded in death by one grandson.

Survivors include: His wife Leila; one daughter, Sedalie

Hyatt, of Georgetown; 8 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren; and one sister, Etta Tucker, of Aransas Pass.
