George Matthews, Pastor Star & Center City United Methodist Churches

"Whoever of you will be the chiefest, shall be servant of all. For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." Mark 10:44-45

Yes, "The laborer is worthy of his hire" (Luke 10:7); but there is labor so important that it merits a lifetime of toil, and even one's life blood, without any hire.

Needed are persons who came to minister, ministering families, basin and towel churches, the higher selfless patriotism, world citizenship of mercy and good will.

After Jesus taught how the cruelly secular portion of mankind live as those who came to be ministered unto and to exercise proud authority, he said, "But so shall it not be among you: but whoever will be great among you, shall be your minister." (Mark 10:43)



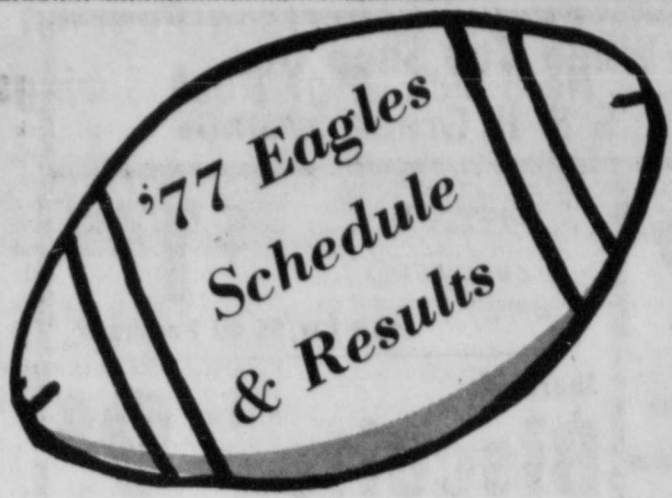

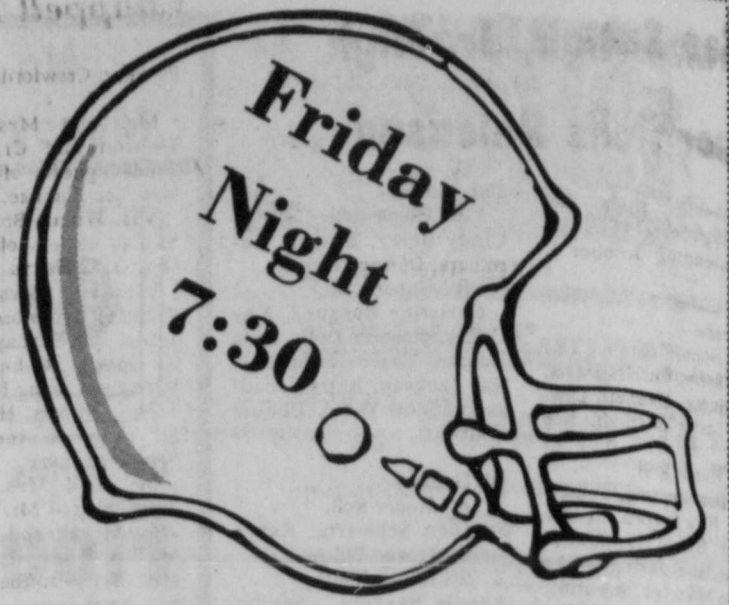
