# Co. Judge Resigns; Successor Appointed

The Mills County Commissioners Court has been busy this past week, accepting the resignation of County Judge Herbert Faulkner and finding and selecting his successor, James Ledbetter.

Faulkner resigned on Friday, with the resignation becoming effective on Nov. 6. Ledbetter was named to the post on Tuesday by the Court.

The Judge's position will be on the ballot in the elections next year.

Ledbetter is a Mills County native and a graduate of

Goldthwaite High School. He also graduated from Texas Tech University. He has been associated with the Mills County State Bank for the past seven years.

"I want to thank the Commissioners for this appointment," Ledbetter said Tuesday, and "I ask the people of the county to support me."

He and his wife, Pam, have a six month old son, Tab.

He will assume duties at the Courthouse shortly.

The following statement was received by the Eagle Office from County Judge Herbert Faulkner on Monday:

"Herbert S. Faulkner resigned his position as County Judge of Mills County, Texas in a special called session of the Commissioners' Court on October 28, 1977 to become effective November 6, 1977, due to his upcoming employment in the Mills County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service. He will assume his duties there on November 7, 1977.

Faulkner stated, "It has been rewarding to have served the people of Mills County as their County Judge." He would like to thank those who voted for, and supported him. It is his strongest feelings that you will not feel that he has let you down by resigning.

He stated that he was proud of the achievements he had accomplished while County Judge, especially his leadership as Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, and the projects that were implemented and are still being carried out. His leadership was instrumental in securing a building for a Senior Citizens Center for the people of Mills County, and the re-alignment of the Commissioners', Justice of the Peace, and Voting Precincts.

Faulkner stated that he will always be interested in County Government, and that in this day and time, it has a need for change, to become a better organized, and a better channel of communication between each elected official.

May the Lord bless each of you."

# Eagles Best Dublin 22-18; Play Season Finale Friday

The best offense is a good defense...

Don't know if Coach Smokey Brister used this old cliché last Friday night in his pre-game remarks, but he probably said something like it.

The Goldthwaite Eagles, using blistering tackles, and sharp eyes, stunned the Dublin Lions 22-18 at Eagle Field, ending the 1977 home stand on a jubilant note.

The Eagles defense picked off four errant Lion aeriels and scooped up four fumbles to hold the Lions to only nine first downs.

Aided by a seven yard punt, the Eagles took the ball from the Dublin 35 yard line the first time they got the ball and marched right down the field for the score. Right end sweeps by quarterback Mike Lee netted all of the yardage down to the three, when stout freshman full-back David Livingston took the ball home. The kick for the point after failed.

Again a bad punt, this one stopped on the 36, set the Eagles in motion for their next tally. On first down the Eagles burned the Lions with a nifty pass from Lee to end Eddy Welch, who made an over-the-head, one handed, grab and then easily pranced into the end zone. Livingston took the ball home from the 1 1/2 for the two point conversion. Dublin was off-sides on the first try that failed.

This made the score 14-0 with just over three minutes to go in the first quarter. But the Lions weren't sleeping. They recovered an Eagle fumble in the second quarter, and on the second play from scrimmage the Dublin quarterback kept right and cut back against the grain all the way for a 45 yard touchdown. Jett Johnson slipped in to block the extra point.

This is the way the half ended, 14-6. And the field was turned over to the Eagle band, drill team and twirlers, who, as usual, put on a fine performance.

The Lions came out to play in the second half, and following a fourth and eight gamble that worked, the Lions made it 14-12, but the Eagles defense held and the

two point conversion failed.

No one need be reminded of the turn-around in the Eagles and Ranger contest here a couple of weeks ago. And that is what was appearing on the horizon for the Eagles as Dublin intercepted an Eagle pass, and on the next play completed a 37 yard pass for a touchdown. This made the score 18-14. Again, however, the Lions plans for the two point conversion was missed.

But the Eagles offensive unit rose to the occasion and marched 47 yards in eight plays, and aided by a couple of Lion penalties, paved the way for Livingston's two yard plunge over right guard for the score. Lee's keeper to the right side came up short, and with 6:40 to go in the game the Eagles had regained the lead.

The next couple of minutes was a game of musical football.

The Eagles Jett Johnson intercepted a Lion pass. Then the Lions recovered an Eagle fumble. And then to cap it off "Choddy" Davis recovered a Lion fumble, on the Lion 20 yard line.

From this point the Eagles couldn't make a first down, and the ball went over to Dublin.

On first down Johnny Duncan came crashing through to drop the Dublin quarterback for a 12 yard loss. And on the next play Randy White did the same thing, but this time in the end zone, netting a safety, making the score 22-18 in favor of the Eagles. It wasn't the points, it was the defensive uplift that helped the Eagles.

The final time the Lions garnered the ball, Jett Johnson intercepted a pass with only nine seconds to play. One play and the game was over.

Dublin had some dreams of a share in the District 10-A title, having lost only to DeLeon by one point, and with three games to play. The loss to the Eagles just about eliminated them from contention.

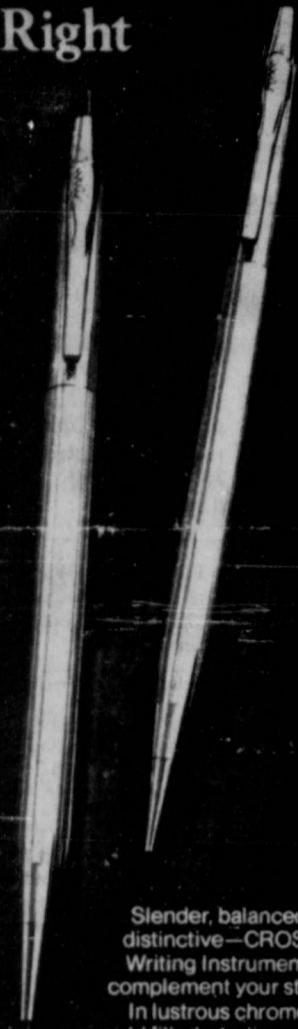

**GREETINGS:** AUSTIN, TEXAS

Veterans Day will be observed by all citizens of Texas on November 11, 1977. The men and women who served in the uniform of our Country have made a major contribution not only to the preservation of America's freedom but also toward the attainment and preservation of freedom throughout the world. The gallant Americans serving in today's armed forces continue to demonstrate the unselfish willingness of our Nation to meet the challenge of those forces wishing to defeat through armed conflict the cause of individual determination. The Nation and the free world are eternally grateful for the contributions of American veterans to the advancement of the cause of an honorable world peace. THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby call upon all citizens to observe Friday, November 11, 1977, as VETERANS DAY, and ask that the day be observed with appropriate ceremonies in honor of those who have borne the burden in defense of our freedom. ## Seven Constitutional Amendments Vote Set In Texas November 8

A Texas Constitutional Amendment Election will be held November 8, 1977 to determine the fate of seven proposed changes to the state constitution.

Mills County voters will all

vote in one box, which will be in the Commissioners Courtroom at the Courthouse, Goldthwaite. Mrs. Myra D. Holland will be the Election Judge. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Tuesday, November 8, 1977.

The seven amendments being voted on are among 15 proposed constitutional changes approved for placement on the ballot. The remaining eight will be voted on during the general election on November 7, 1978.

Proposed amendments on which voters will be casting ballots on November 8 are as follows:

No. 1 — Proposing an amendment to Article V of the Texas Constitution to provide for a court of criminal appeals with nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

No. 2 — Amending Article III, Section 49-b, of the Texas Constitution, to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for a Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving spouses of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

No. 3 — Authorizing the denial of bail to a person accused of a felony under certain circumstances.

No. 4 — Amending Article VIII of the Texas Constitution by adding Section 1-f, relating to tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical or natural history resources.

No. 5 — Adding Section 68 to Article XVI of the Texas Constitution to grant the legislature the power to authorize agricultural pro-

ducers to form associations for the collection of assessments on their product sales.

No. 6 — Vesting the legislature with power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices at remote locations; requiring the legislature to provide for the sharing of such electronic devices among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

No. 7 — Proposing an amendment to Article V, Section 1-a, of the Texas Constitution, changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission and relating to the membership, powers, and proceedings of that commission, a master, and the supreme court for the suspension, censure, removal or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace.

Eyes Have Seen The Glory", followed by the benediction.

The inscription on the marker reads: The Goldthwaite Eagle. In 1885 William H. Thompson (1842-1896) started a weekly newspaper, "The Mountaineer", which closed but was re-established in 1894. He sold it in 1896 to R. M. Thompson, his nephew, who renamed it "The Goldthwaite Eagle". At that time eagles still lived in the hills of Mills County. The paper was bought in 1920 by Dr. E. M. Wilson. It changed hands between the Wilson and Thompson families until 1950, when Charlie T. Wilson sold it to H. R. Ekins. A merger with "The Mullin Enterprise" made it the county's only newspaper. In 1971 Frank Bridges purchased "The Eagle" from Victor E. Koleber.
