## City Manager Discusses Elections, Dances and Other Public Gatherings

It's election time again. Mayor Galen Hromas has ordered an election on May 3, 2003, for the three councilmen seats up for election this year.

Applications for a place on the ballot are available at city hall from February 17 through March 19. Early voting will be conducted each weekday at city hall,

between the hours of 8-11 a.m., closed at lunch, and 1-5 p.m. beginning April 16 and ending April 29.

On election day, May 3, the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Bovina EMS Building at 109 3rd Street in Bovina. I have been asked by several people concerned about recent events. , "What can I do to help" or "What can I do to ensure that things are working correctly at city hall?" My answer is, "Get Involved!" This is one of the ways. Run for

election. Try it. You might like it! Last week the council revisited the ordinance on dance permits. It was decided to separate the ordinance into two sections: one dealing with the actual dance permit and the other dealing with security requirements for a public

gathering. Every person, group, organization or firm sponsoring a public dance within the corporate limits of Bovina shall apply and receive a dance permit at least 72 hours prior to the

beginning of the dance. Cost of the permit is \$1. Any public gathering, defined as any assembly of 75 or more people and includes, but is not limited to any party, dance or other assembly to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access, either through invitation or through any form of paid admission within the corporate limits of the city and where alcohol is consumed shall be guarded and secured by an off duty licensed police officer or licensed

What does this mean? Simple...if you have a dance, come to city hall and get a dance permit. It will cost you \$1. If you have a public gathering of 75 or more "adults" AND alcohol is served and/or consumed you must have a licensed security

guard for public safety considerations. I am still getting questions about the city's past financial problems that were in the paper. Instead of talking about the past, I encourage everyone who has an interest to come to city hall and ask the staff to show you what improvements have been done since the summer of 2001. We've made great strides, and we would love to tell you about them. We'd be glad to hear your suggestions for continued improvement too.

## How Girls' B.B. Has

WHILE RESEARCHING old basketball records for a piece I Bull TOWN was writing on the number of times the Friona girls (woops, the Squaws) had been in the playoffs, Ye Editor let his mind wander a bit down memory lane, and realized just how much the sport of girls basketball has changed since Bill Ellis

he's been following the sport. Being reminded that the Squaws went to their state tournament six times between 1941 and 1948, I realized that girls basketball has changed significantly since the 1940s.

Before the UIL finally decided that it was okay for girls to play basketball, and sanctioned a playoff structure, a few hundred schools had already been playing the sport, thank you, in the High School Basketball League of Texas.

Also called the "McCamey League" in honor of the man who envisioned girls basketball on a statewide basis, there were some great teams going to the state tournament in Hillsboro, which is the hometown of none other than Ron Carr.

R.L. Bates took three Friona teams to the state meet. His girls placed second in the 1946 tournament with a season record of 30-3, and third the following year, in spite of posting an eye-popping record of 44-1, and had to settle for third place. That's a lot of basketball games, especially for the "weaker sex" to be playing.

During the 1940s, schools competed on a county basis. They would play a round-robin schedule, and then hold a county tournament.

Winners of the county tournament would then qualify for the "district tournament." In the Texas Panhandle, most of the counties from Dallam to Parmer and eastward to the Oklahoma border, sent their county champ.

It would take about a week to determine the "district champs." And there had to be a number of "districts" across the state, and these winners (ten or 12?) would descend upon Hillsboro for their state meet.

There were no classifications. Everyone competed together, go full-court for 32 minutes (I'm not sure how many of the

# Commissioners Take Step Toward New Jail Building

Last week the Parmer 49-bed facility is planned. A not pan out. A separate County Commissioners took sketch of the plan (which has sheriff's office would not solve the next major step at slightly changed) was constructing a new jail.

They voted unanimously to schedule a meeting on March 10 to authorize issuing Certificates of obligation not to exceed \$3.2 million for the jail.

The commissioners have yet to vote on building a new jail. Instead, they have used a process of finding out where the county stands financially stands regarding the cost of a new jail before the final goahead is given. At the March 10 meeting, the commissioners will finally vote on whether or not to construct a new jail.

On Monday, February 10, the commissioners first reviewed the design development plan for the jail with architect Kenny Burns, of Burns, Fletcher, Gill Architects, of Fort Worth. A

published in a recent issue of the Blade. Burns will return for the March 24 meeting with the completed design.

The commissioners then met to go that route. with Vince Viaille, of First Southwest Co., of Lubbock, which has contracted with the county for financial advisory services.

Viaille plans to contact the county's five banking institutions (two in Farwell, one in Bovina and two in Friona) to invite them to participate in the bond sale. Twenty-year notes will be offered. Viaille said the bonds will be sold on an equitable

The county will give the hospital district some acreage along Third Street while an area north of the current courthouse is being given to the county. It's not an 'even-up" swap because the county will get more land than it is giving up.

\*Authorized Sheriff Geries to move ahead with an agreement between Parmer and Curry counties to house Curry County, N.M., inmates in the Parmer County Jail. The recommended cost would be \$36.50 per day. Curry County has an excess of inmates and has been sending them to jails as far away as the other side of Lubbock. The pact still must be approved by Curry

\*Decided to caliche portions of two county roads because they will receive more traffic due to prospective dairies coming in. One portion, in the Lazbuddie district, consists of .8 mile east of State Hwy 214 on County Road W. The other portion, in the Friona district, consists of 1 mile north of Hwy. 60 on County Road 25. Judge Clayton-Heald said the costs would be shared with the property owners.

\*Was told that the Texas Department of Public Transportation has removed three miles of county road. Starting in 1991, road miles in every Texas county was certified because some state monies are received by the counties based on how many road miles they contain.

In 1991, Parmer County was listed with 1,044 road miles. Then, due to better technology, the total was increased to 1,063 a couple of years back. The latest total, with even newer technology, put the county's road mile

To begin with, after one team scored, the ball was brought to center court, where the other team would in-bound the ball for their offensive series. If one of your player's defensive members was fouled, a designated player on offense would take your free throws.

Some years later, the defensive players would in-bound the ball after a score by the other team, and work the ball upcourt and pass it to an offensive teammate across the

centercourt line.

But they still had to stay on their end of the court, and if they were fouled, their designated shooter would take the free throws. That might help explain how Charlotte Nettles set the record for free throws for a Friona girl of 397 in one season, 80.3 per cent, and 595 for her career. In Friona's 1964 championship year, Nettles made 20 of 20

FT shots at the regional tourney to help beat Spearman, and had 36 straight "hits" during that time period. Despite all those "freebies," Nettles wasn't the team's leading scorer. That

would be Teto Jennings Milner, with 2049 career points, 723 Even after the UIL took over the girls' sport and established districts for the girls, the UIL chiefs reasoned that girls in the larger schools probably weren't interested in playing basketball, and had districts only for classes B, A and

Still later, some larger schools petitioned to be able to compete, and were finally allowed to do so. But they had to play in a class 2A district which was nearby.

Realizing that 44-1 wasn't good enough to win state, Friona finally broke its "jinx" in 1964, and had an undefeated record of 35-0 under Coach Baker Duggins. It is noteworthy that at that year's state tournament, the Squaws had to play (and beat) Mineral Wells, which was a class 4A school, and League City Clear Creek, near Houston, which is now a 5A school.

In the 1970s, it was proposed to let the girls play "full court," like their male counterparts, and trim their teams to five players. As you'd expect, some folks argued that the girls couldn't







## **Common Costly Misconceptions About Carpet Cleaning**

Part 2 of a series

#3: One method of carpet cleaning is as good an another.

No. The dry cleaning methods - which are dry foam, dry chem and dry compound -- do not rinse your carpet in any way. Instead they leave a residue. You might say they clean your carpet only halfway. The most effective cleaning method is hot water extraction.

Hot water extraction means a hot water cleaning solution, under high pressure, is forced into your carpet and then extracted out of your carpet. Shaw Industries, the world's largest carpet manufacturer, recommends hot water extraction as the primary method of cleaning carpets.

Carpet cleaners use one of the two types of hot water extraction. If they use a large unit that operates from a van or truck outside your facility it's called truck mount extraction. If they use a small unit that can be brought inside, it's called portable extraction. Shaw's first choice is the truck mounted unit - and it recommends the small, portable unit in areas where the truck

The truck mount extraction cleans much better because it heats the solution to a higher temperature - and shoots the cleaning solution into the carpet at higher pressures, which breaks up the dirt, bacteria, chemicals and pollens in the carpet. Then the machine uses high suction to draw the dirt and chemicals out of your carpet.

#4: Having the right equipment is all a company needs to clean your carpets properly.

Not true. Many companies own hot water cleaners but very few companies teach their employees how to use them properly. This is why it's important that you choose your carpet cleaner carefully. The best cleaning companies are those that have been certified by the Institute of Inspection, Cleaning and Restoration Certification, known as IICRC. On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues associated with VALOR's surcharge application are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee.

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$.99 for residential customers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.

Participating teams will be from Hereford, Friona, Bovina, Clovis, Portales and Muleshoe.






