beaten a path to his doorstep at 611 Bouldin Ave. because the National Traffic Safety Administration has not set any standards for brakewarning systems. For the government, all that's required is that the brake lights come on when the brake pedal is depressed.

Yet for more than a decade McNiel has worked at turning the brake lights on when the driver suddenly lifts his foot from the gas pedal.

The device does not trigger the lighting system unless there is an abrupt deceleration movement from the gas pedal. A driver could ease his foot off the gas without signaling a stop to other drivers.

From a series of tests, McNiel figures the average driver takes a quarter second to move his foot from the accelerator to the brake in an emergency. At 30 mph, a vehicle will travel 11 feet in that quarter second, and at highway speeds of 55 mph, the travel distance is 20 feet,

The extra 11 or 20 feet could prevent the kind of chain reaction collisions that take such a highway toll.

"Eleven feet at 30 mph, that'll save grills and fenders. The extra distance at 55, that'll save lives," he

McNiel, a retired Texas Parks and Wildlife Department employee, says he got the idea for the invention during long bumper - to bumper trips to work over the Congress Avenue bridge. Those trips were plagued by traffic jams from rear-end collisions that he felt could have been prevented had there been more warning

From 1964, when he built his first imperfect model that triggered the brake lights at every deceleration, until he perfected the device, McNiel tried by himself to sell the government on requiring the device on all cars. He has put it on his and his family's cars since 1972.

But apparently he didn't have the stroke in Washington to get anything done.

So he took on retired auto dealer C.B. Smith as a partner. They went to Washington recently for a presentation of the gadget McNiel says he can produce for about \$5. Installation costs would be "less than turn indicators," he said, estimating \$30 to \$50.






