

Adequate fertility is essential for profitable crop production when commodity prices are low.

Plant nutrient requirements can be supplied from native soil reserves, residual fertility or applied fertilizers. Once the decision is made to grow the crop, an attempt to reduce production costs by keeping fertilization below that needed for the most profitable production level can eliminate profits.

Seed, land preparation, harvesting and most other production costs remain constant so that plant nutrients, at today's cost, must be used at the most profitable rate. variety of opportunities to






