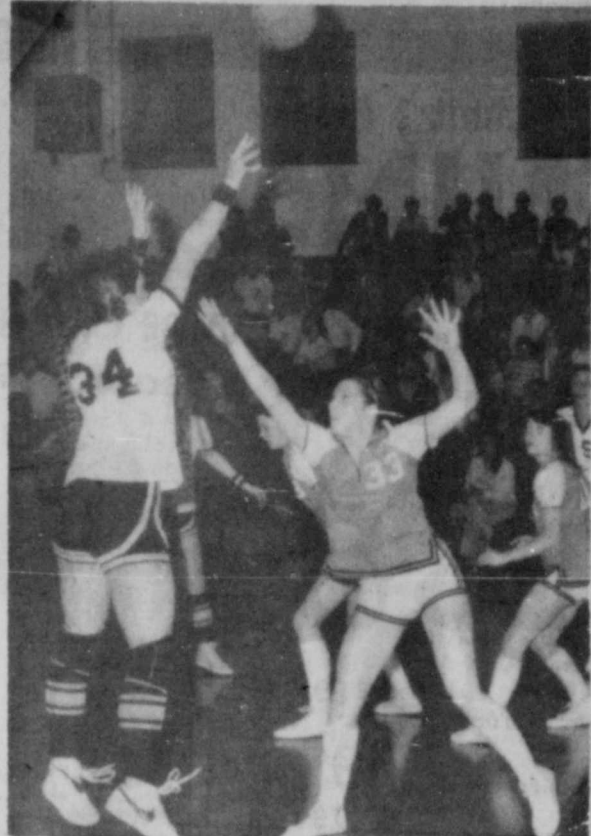

Ruth Ann Johnson scored 20 points and had 3 rebounds; Sandra Derrick had 14 points and one rebound; Sheila Vaughan had 2 points and 1 steal. The score by quarters was 4 - 10; 18 - 30; 27 - 46; 36 - 57.

DeAnna Henry pulled down 5 rebounds; Cynthia Berry had 4 rebounds; Karen Studer had 2; Karla Henry had 1; and Tina Studer had one steal.

GISD Board Holds Slated Session Mon.

The Goldthwaite Independent School District Board of Trustees held a regular meeting on Monday night at the high school.

The trustees voted to advertise for bids for the construction of a bus shed to house school buses. The Board also voted to buy two IBM electric typewriters.

In other action, the trustees rehired all teachers for the coming year. The Title I, Migrant and Special Education personnel were also hired, subject to the funding of the programs.

The board also approved the purchase of two storage

buildings, one for the high school and one for the elementary school.

The Mills County Crops and Livestock Subcommittee has scheduled a County Grain Sorghum Production Workshop for Tuesday, March 14, 1978. The one night meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom of the County Courthouse.

The purpose of this meeting will be to assist producers of grain sorghum in

management and cultural practices. The topics to be covered during the meeting will include seedbed preparation, planting, weed control, fertilization and insect pest control and management. Those attending will have the opportunity to visit with two Extension Specialists on specific production problems.

Dr. George Alston, Area

Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Dr. Clifford Hoelscher, Area Entomologist with the Extension Service will be on hand to present the program and answer any questions.

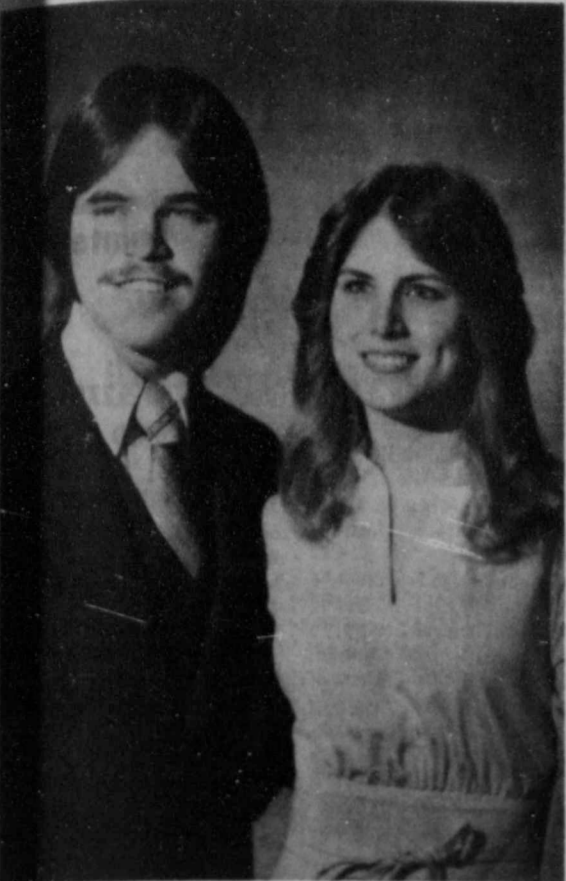

FmHA "Weatherizing" Loans Now Available In This Area

Eligible rural homeowners
can now contact participating
public utilities, in addition to
rural electric cooperative
associations, to apply for
U.S. Department of Agriculture
loans, Assistant Secretary of
Agriculture Alex Mercure said
today.

The weatherizing loan
program was introduced last
year by USDA's Farmers
Home Administration -
(FmHA), in cooperation with
USDA's Rural Electrification
Administration and the National
Rural Electric Co-
operatives Association. The
FmHA program serves low
and moderate-income home-
owners through any partici-
pating electric, gas, or water
system.

A USDA's rural credit
agency, FmHA administers a
\$4.3 billion-a-year credit
program for rural housing in
the countryside and in towns
with populations up to 10,000
or up to 20,000 if the towns
are outside a Standard Metro-
politan Statistical Area.

Eligible homeowners un-
able to obtain credit except
through FmHA may arrange to
have insulation and other
weatherizing improvements
financed through participat-
ing utilities. Borrowers may
repay such home-repair
loans by installments added
to their monthly utility service
bills. The individual
homeowner's loan limit is
\$1,500 in all states except
Alaska, where the limit is
\$3,000. The maximum re-
payment term is five years.
Loans will bear the prevail-
ing FmHA rural housing
interest rate which presently
is 8 percent.

Loans may include funds
to pay utility organizations
for costs of providing techni-
cal service to homeowners
on weatherproofing of their
homes, and for inspection
service; to assure that work
is completed satisfactorily.
Those service charges will be
limited to \$25, plus one
percent of the total cost of
improvement.

FmHA Administrator Gordon
Cavanaugh said utility
organizations may enter a

greements with FmHA state
directors to provide the
weatherizing service with
FmHA credit. FmHA will
reimburse the utility for any
payments made to contract-
ors for completed jobs. The
utilities will relay home-
owners' installment pay-
ments back to FmHA.

The moderate - income
ceiling that affects eligibility
for FmHA rural housing
credit is an adjusted annual
family income of \$15,600 in
all states or territories except
Alaska (\$23,400) and Hawaii
and Guam (\$18,500). A
family's adjusted income is
determined by deducting
from their gross salary
income or net business
income an amount equal to 5
percent plus an additional

\$300 deduction for each
minor in the home.

Mr. Cavanaugh said
FmHA home improvement
loans for weatherizing pur-
poses will continue to be
available directly from
FmHA county offices in all
areas, although homeowners
may find it more convenient
to be served through utility
systems. Also, very low
income families unable to
afford payments on the
above described weatheriza-
tion loan should contact the
local FmHA office to check
on the loans made at one-
percent interest for essential
home improvement, and
grants for this purpose to
very low - income senior
very low income senior citi-
zens.

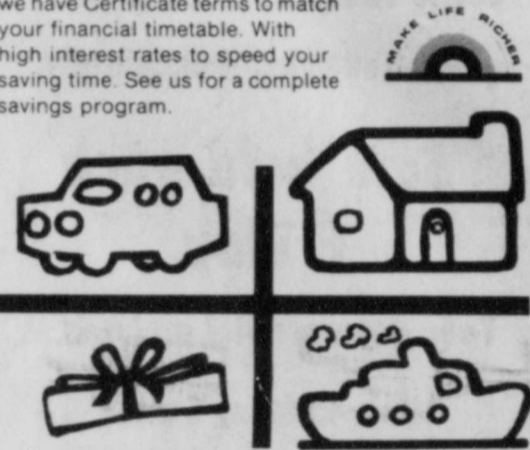

**Mills FB President Berry
Attends Waco Conference**

The County Farm Bureau Presidents in Texas met recently in Waco to discuss the critical farm situation.

They voted to support legislation which will provide higher payment incentives for cutting acreage of wheat, feed grains and cotton this year. In turn, the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors adopted a recommendation to the American Farm Bureau Federation which states "We support higher target prices and set aside such as those proposed in the Dole Bill".

According to Troy Berry, it is the intent of the County Presidents to get a workable program that will pump money immediately into farmers and ranchers pockets, reduce production and not be too costly to the taxpayers.

The Dole Bill provides a formula of variable government set target prices for set aside acres. The more a farmer sets aside, based on past history, the higher his target price would be. The government would pay the farmer the difference between the market price and the target price.

Theoretically, the program should not be costly to the taxpayers. If production is cut enough, market prices would rise and the "deficiency" payments would be minimal.

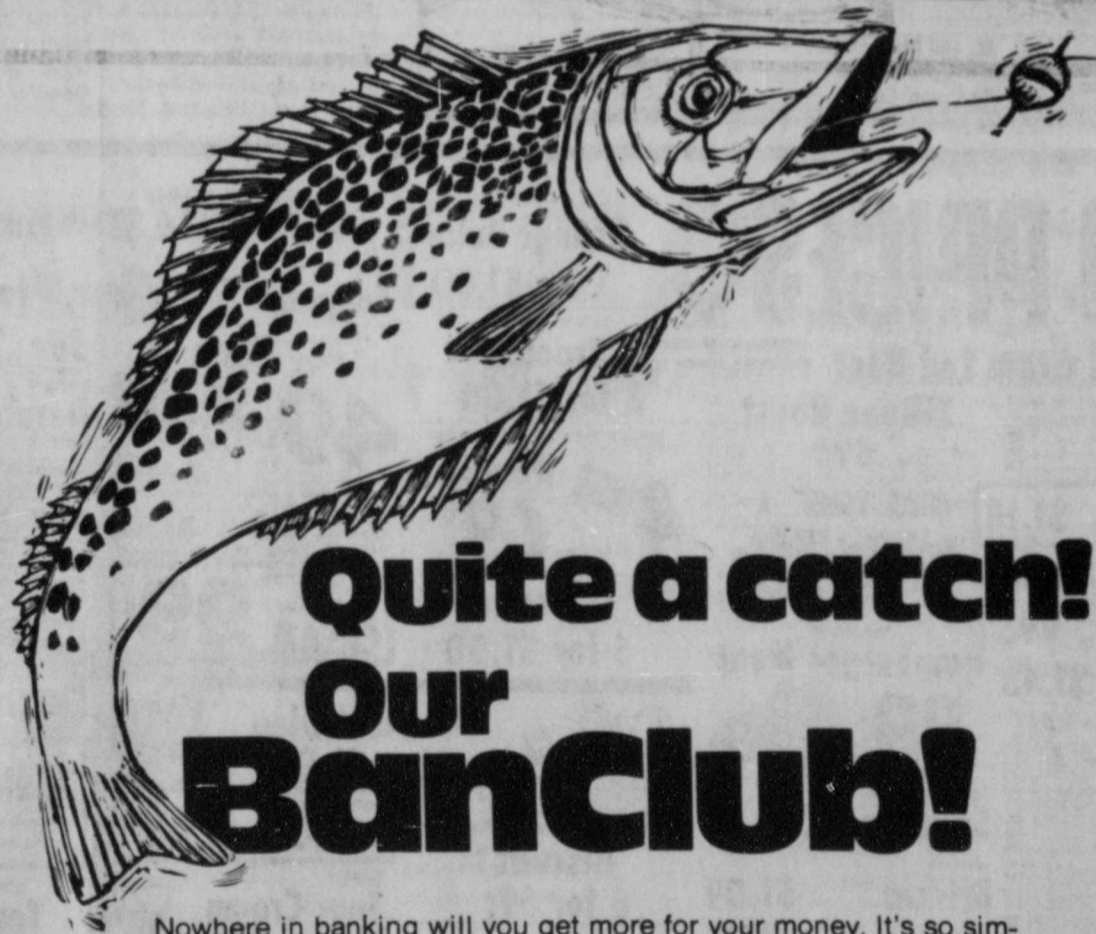
