

years of work finally beginning to pay off," he said. "However, although this move is encouraging, we must realize that it is just a first step. The bill still must pass on the floor of the

The bill accomplishes three things: (1). It reverses the present formula, allowing beef imports to decrease when domestic production is high. The present formula causes domestic markets to be swamped with foreign meat at a time when domestic production increases, (2). The legislation includes all processed meats in the quota system. At present, the law includes only boned, chilled meat. (3). Presidential authority to suspend quotas would be reduced unless a hand as defined by the National Emergency Act.
