

Democratic Balloting Here Saturday

Many Races Contested

Mills County voters will have wide choices in a number of races in the Democratic Primary Election this Saturday, May 6th. Dr. T. C. Graves, Mills County Democratic Chairman, announced this week that the polls will open at 7 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m. in all of the boxes of the county.

VOTERS WILL cast their ballots in one of the eleven boxes located over the county. The boxes are: 1. Baptist Youth Center, Goldthwaite; 2. Senior Citizens Building, Goldthwaite; 3. Mt. Olive Church, Caradan; 4. Methodist Youth Center, Center City; 5. Star School, Star; 6. Priddy School, Priddy; 7. Church House, Democrat; 8. Community Center, Mullin; 9. High School, Goldthwaite; 10. Baptist Church, Big Valley, and 11. Ridge School, Ridge.

Absentee voting has been heavy in the county this year, according to county clerk Walter A. Bryant. Although not a record absentee turnout, the 140 votes cast is nearly fifty more than in the last primary election.

Indications are that this year will feature a bountiful number of voters at the polls, because of the tremendous impact of the candidates. A five-man Governor's race and also a five-man Congressional race highlight the area scene.

THE LOCAL races of County Judge, between James W. Ledbetter and Billy B. Hale, the County Clerk race between Walter A. "Toby" Bryant and Cynthia Carr, and the Treasurer's race, being sought by Evelyn Smith, Dee Harris and Peggy Jenkins, will draw many to the polls.

Three County Commissioner races are being run without opposition. Precinct One Commissioner Bill Bishop, Precinct Two Commissioner Lewis Watson, and Precinct Four Commissioner Hawley Jernigan have no opponent.

ONE RACE in Precinct One, the contest for Justice of the Peace, finds Ernest Thorne and Marvin Lindsay in opposition.

Another highlight of this election is a referendum vote on two different items. The first on the ballot is a referendum on the Legislature's being able to authorize higher interest on loans under \$5,000. The second item is receiving the most play in the state. It is a referendum authorizing the Legislature to enact a law to permit pari-mutuel wagering on horse races by county local option. This item has been defeated seven times in the past. The referendum votes are "non-binding," and have no basis in law. They are merely inserted in the ballot to test public opinion on the matters in question.

MILLS COUNTY voters will vote at different boxes in many cases on Saturday, following the Commissioner's Court redistricting of one year ago. Commissioners will be elected from their individual precincts only, and not on a county-wide basis.

The changing of the precinct boundaries is expected to cause some trouble for election workers this year, because of people showing up at the wrong polling place. Election officials urge all the prospective voters of the county to make sure of their polling place before coming in to vote. This will avoid a lot of confusion and delay on election day.

VOTERS WITH the new yellow voter's registration certificates will find that their particular voting box number (1 thru 11) is printed on the certificate. The list of polling places has already been listed in this article.

Because of the changes in the precinct lines voters are reminded again to check their voting boxes to make sure they will cast their ballots in the correct box.

PRECINCT BOUNDARIES that run through the City of Goldthwaite were changed drastically by the redistricting. Precinct One takes a slice out of the center of the city on a north and south line. Precinct Four takes in most of the western part of the city and Precinct Two takes in most of the eastern part of the city limits.

The boundary between Precinct One and Four is a line entering the city down Highway 16 (San Saba Highway) to the southwest. The line runs to McIntosh Street. This is the street located between the Jesse Hammond residence and the Hoover Veterinary Clinic. The Hammonds are in Precinct Four and the Clinic is located in Precinct One.

The line runs down McIntosh Street to Sixth Street. It then goes back to the northeast until it intersects Reynolds. It follows Reynolds to the north until it dead ends into Little Street. The boundary then goes one block west to Cline Street, and then one-half block south to the street in front of the elementary school. It then goes west to Earl and then south, intersecting Hanna Valley Road. The boundary then runs west on Hanna Valley Road out of the City Limits.

THE EASTERN boundary of Precinct One will enter the city limits on Eighth Street, in the southeast corner of the city. This is around the housing units in that area. The line travels west to the Santa Fe railroad tracks, and then north on the railroad out of the city limits.

All the area to the east of this line will vote in Precinct Two. The voting box for this area will be the Senior Citizens Building.

City voters residing in Precinct One will vote at the Baptist Church Youth Center. Precinct Four voters will cast their ballots in the High School Auditorium.

Precinct Three voters will vote exactly as in the past.

Commissioner's Precinct One will vote in only one box, the Number 1 box, located at the Baptist Youth Center. Commissioner's Precinct Two has four voting boxes, 2 thru 5. Commissioner's Precinct Three voters will vote in boxes 6, 7 and 8. Boxes 9, 10, and 11 will receive ballots for Commissioner's Precinct Four.

A SAMPLE Ballot, published as a public service by a number of local businesses and individuals, can be found in this week's Eagle, and although it does not reflect all the ballots printed in separate precincts, most of the races are intact, excluding commissioner and justice precinct races.

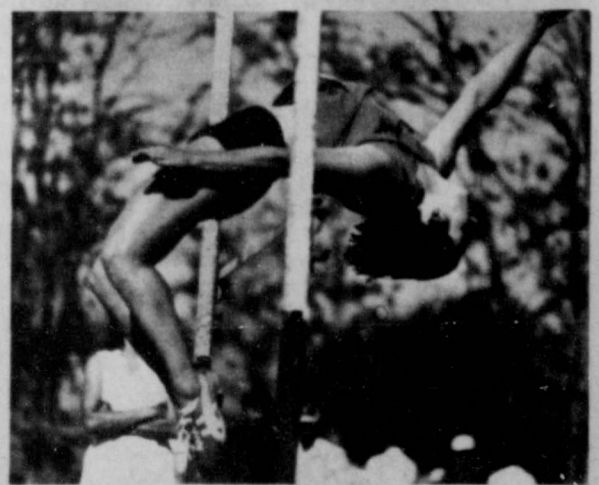

Sheep & Goat Raisers Report —

Predator Problem Hearing Set May 25 At San Angelo

It's by no means too early for producers to begin planning their whereabouts for Thursday, May 25. That's the day the government boys will be in San Angelo to talk predators.

The hearing, one of four designed to gain information about the predator problem, is scheduled for Houston Harte Center, Angelo State University May 25. Other sessions will be in Boise, Idaho, Casper, Wyoming and Washington, D.C. It is all part of an Interior Department re-evaluation of predator control and the government's role in the endeavor.

Heading the reevaluation effort is the Interior - appointed Animal Damage Control Policy Study Advisory Committee. (Now you know why they insist on reducing names to initials). The ADCPSAC is made up of government, industry, environmental and academic representatives, and will be charged with interpreting both research and public hearing data; the outcome will supposedly be used to direct the thrust of predator control efforts in the future.

The government says of its program:
 "The analysis will produce two products -- a report and option paper. The report will bring together, in an analytical framework, relevant information and data relating

to the topic as identified in this study plan. (Mammal predation on western livestock) The option paper, derived from the report, will be used as a basic decision making aid at the Secretarial level."

Translated, the latter portion of the statement above means that, if the Interior Secretary hears what he wants to hear, it will be used to justify his doing what he had planned to do in the first place. At least that's the skeptic's way of looking at it, and Interior secretaries the last few years have been very successful at fostering Skepticism.

The committee, probably to help generate comment, has been working on a "first draft report" of their suggestions prior to the hearings. The report is to be made available May 5 to interested parties, which should include everyone west of the Mississippi River.

The report will thus be available in plenty of time before the hearings to allow thorough study; reliable accounts indicate that the document may contain some astounding and hair-raising proposals.

The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Assn. suggests that all interested parties first write for copies of the first draft report (do it now-don't wait until May 5 and depend

on getting it through the mail in time for study), then prepare written testimony for the San Angelo hearing. The Association and the entire industry are especially interested in giving the committee factual, non-emotional testimony capable of adequately demonstrating our problems with predators.

Particularly needed is testimony from former sheep or goat producers driven out of the business by predation. Again, we need facts -- emotional carryings-on and fanciful dramatizations are the province of propredator forces and are counter-productive.

PRICE AND WAGE CONTROLS OR WHAT CONTROLS?

In the past when inflation began to get out of hand there came the idea of employing "Price and Wage Controls". Never has inflation been rising so rapidly as it has during the past few years - yet no price and wage controls. 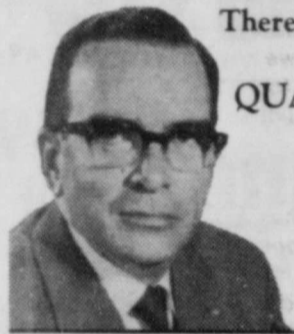

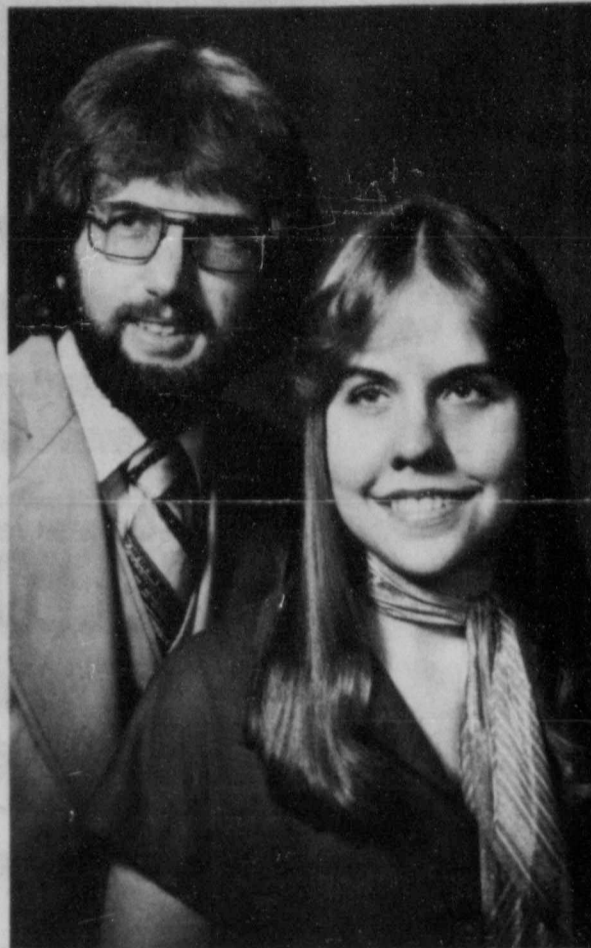

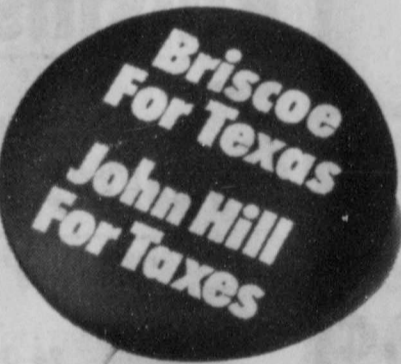

marriages, hurts children, destroys careers and sends otherwise honest men into crime."

The low income families will suffer the most. Gambling exploits the little man. Statistics prove that those who can least afford to lose, suffer the most with gambling. The price tag for legalized gambling in Texas is the life of our homes.

What will pari-mutuel gambling do for our community? Dependence on gambling revenue has led many other states to exploit the weakness of their own citizens, neglect the development of more equitable forms of taxation, and thereby, further erode citizens' confidence in government.

If you own a business, know for certain the drain of legitimate monies will go from your business to the lugging us at the polls in a referendum vote. In reality, this could decide whether or not there will be legalized race track gambling in Texas.

Mrs. Richeson made history last fall when she became the first woman ever named by TDQTA as a director. She was appointed then to fill the balance of a term left vacant when a Board member resigned. Now, she has been elected to a full three-year term by members of the Association.

Mrs. Richeson and her husband are among the top 10 largest operators of Dairy Queen restaurants in the state. Their company, Richeson Restaurants, Inc., owns 20 DQs in 19 Texas cities, and the Richesons were honored at the convention as the operators who had the greatest expansion in the state during 1977.

General Telephone Makes Plans For Changes In Rural Service

All rural eight-party customers served by General Telephone Company of the Southwest will have access to 4-party, or better, telephone service by the end of 1982. Other improvements in service are scheduled as a result of a rural action plan inaugurated early in 1978.

General Telephone has budgeted in excess of \$24 million to accomplish this five-year program. The plan is an acceleration of a long-time effort to provide rural customers with the same quality and type of service now available to urban customers. The program is already completed in over 64 percent of the company's 295 Texas exchanges.

As new or improved rural telephone facilities become available, the company seeks approval to eliminate eight-party service offerings and/or restrict 8-party service to existing eight-party customers.

Other rural service improvement programs under the plan include: Engineering all new and expanded rural facilities for no more than four customers to a line.

Inauguration of new rural forecasting techniques involving marketing and engineering departments which allows the company to have facilities available when and where needed.

Placing one-party facilities in fast-growing rural areas, usually adjacent to urban areas, where the expected customer group will want single party service. This will make one-party rural facilities ready prior to the projected need.

Existing equipment is constantly being reviewed to assure efficient use of all facilities in order to provide as economically as possible one-two, or four-party service.

With a few exceptions, familiar rural steel telephone lines (open wire lines) are being phased out. All new line construction is being restricted to the buried type unless aerial facilities provide better service, or unfavorable terrain prevents economical use of buried lines.

Dates for individual exchange conversions are subject to change; however, the overall plan to complete has been approved. The tentative action plan calls for elimination by the end of 1979 rural 8-party service in the com-

pany's Southern Area, covering roughly the area of South Texas inside a line from Laredo to San Antonio to Waco to the Louisiana border. The Northern Area, extending from the Dallas/Ft. Worth Area to Sherman, is expected to be completed by the end of 1980.

The sprawling Western Area, covering an area from Del Rio to Amarillo and from New Mexico to Fort Worth, is scheduled for completion by the end of 1982. This large area will be the most costly with over \$15 million of the \$24 million going to improve and upgrade service in this area.

Except for one exchange scheduled in 1982, the Eastern Area serving Texas east of Dallas/Ft. Worth, will be completed in 1980.

COG Holds Executive Meet

The Executive Committee of the Central Texas Council of Governments held its regular monthly meeting Thursday, April 20, at the CTCOG offices in Belton. Included on the agenda was the Committee's adoption of local land resource and zoning policies required by HUD for certification and continuation of "701" Comprehensive Planning and Management Assistance Findings. The Committee also authorized the President of CTCOG to forward the documents to the U.S. Department of HUD and to all member entities within the Central Texas State Planning Region.

Executive Director Walton R. Reedy reported to the Committee on the evaluation of Texas Councils of Government by the U.S. Dept. of HUD. CTCOG rated ninth among 24 Councils and will receive the same amount of funding as last year - \$50,000.

Projects reviewed by the Executive Committee included:

--An application by Heart O' Texas Goodwill Industries for expansion of an existing facility at Harker Heights.

--An application by the City of Temple to the Texas Department of Community Affairs for IPA Personnel Assistance Act - Personnel Improvement Program.

--An application by the Kempner Water Supply Corporation to FmHA for water system improvements. This was limited by the condition that any problems with the City of Copperas Cove would be worked out before funding is made available.

--An application by the Central Texas Youth Services Bureau to HEW for Project "Option" (services for run-aways and their families).

--An application by Hill Country Community Action Agency to the Community

Services Administration for an Emergency Energy Conservation Program.

--An application by Hill Country Community Action Agency to the Governor's Committee on Aging for the continuation and expansion of the Nutrition for the Elderly project under Title VII of the Older Americans Act of 1965.

--An application by Hill Country Community Action Agency to the Community Services Administration to assist low income and elderly individuals and families who have encountered an emergency situation (flood, fire, blizzard) or where fuel costs have increased more than 20 percent during the last 12 months.

--An application by Mills County to the Texas Criminal Justice Division for funds to employ an architect for Phase II of necessary renovation of the existing Mills County jail facility.

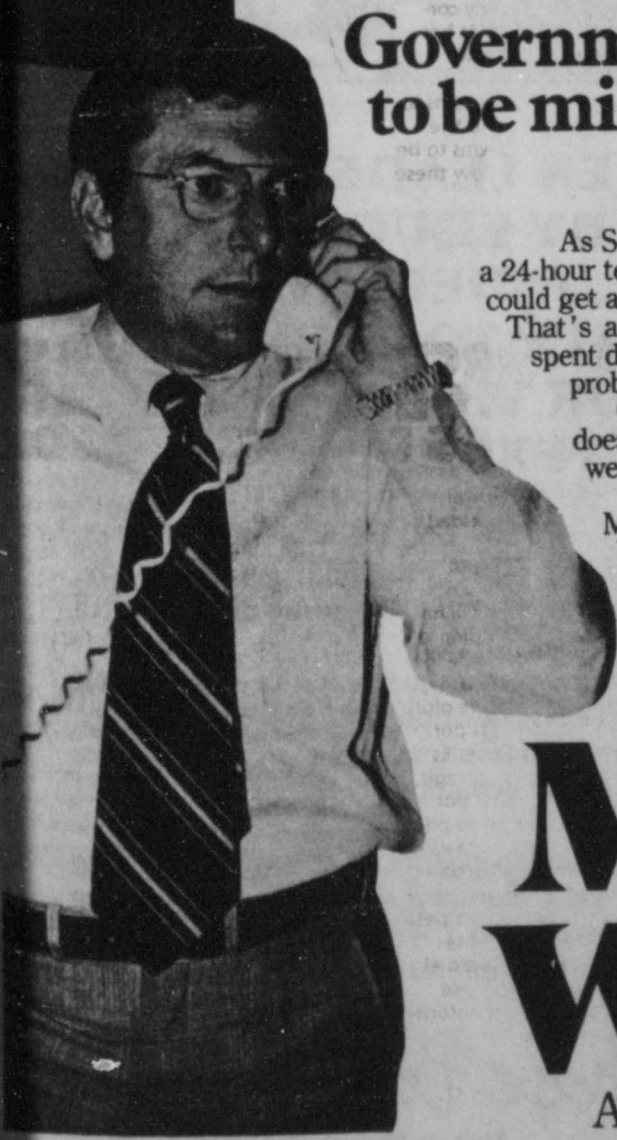

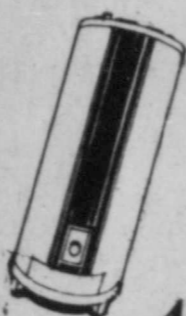

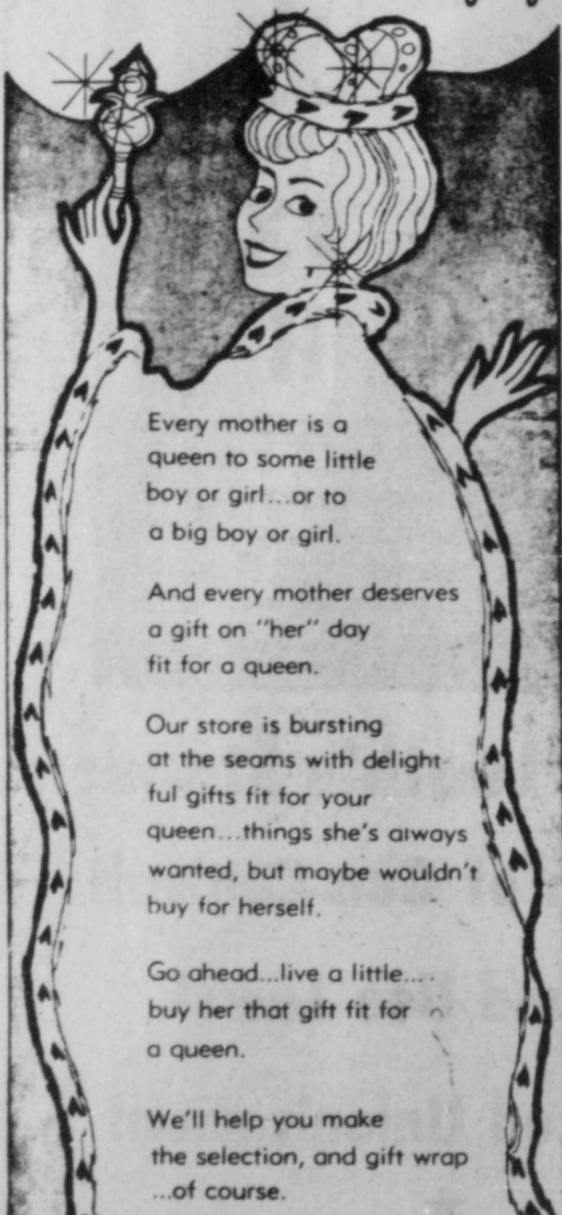
