Ledbetter, Bryant Win County Posts; Runoff Set June 3 For Treasurer's Office

Leath, Denton Face Runoff For Congressional Seat

Hawley Jernigan, Precinct 4 were nominated.

The close race for County Treasurer resulted in a runoff between Evelyn Smith and Dee Harris. Voting was Smith 628, Harris 591, and Peggy Jenkins 317. The runoff will be held on June 3 here.

The race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, was decided by only 50 votes. Incumbent Ernest Thorne defeated Marvin Lindsay 264 to 214.

Walter A. Bryant outdistanced Cynthia Carr for a repeat as County-District Clerk. He polled 1213 votes to Mrs. Carr's 427.

Mills County voters turned out in very good numbers for the election. Approximately 1650 ballots were deposited in the 11 boxes scattered throughout the county. This figure represents about 62 per cent of the registered voters. This compares to about a 50 per cent level statewide.

Mills County voters did their part in setting up a June 3 runoff election between Lane Denton and Marvin Leath for the 11th Congressional District seat now held by W. R. (Bob) Poage, who will be retiring in January after 42 years on The Hill in Washington, D.C. As with the voters in the sprawling 19-county 11th District, the local voters also picked those two candidates over three others to meet in an additional election to determine who will face off against Republican Jack Burgess in the November

General election. Latest results available Monday morning gave Denton 38,000 votes compared to 33,414 for Leath, and 16,699 for Olson with three of the 19 counties still incomplete.

In heavily populated McLennan County (Waco), Denton picked up 14,318 votes compared to 10,714 for Leath and 5,397 for Olson, while the margin was even closer in Bell County where Denton polled 7,731 votes. Leath received 6,919 and Olson received 2,438.

Leath drew the larger vote total in Brown, Falls, Hood, Lampasas and McCulloch counties while Olson carried only one county, Bosque, with Denton taking the others in the unofficial and incomplete returns.

Mills Countians gave Denton a small edge over Leath, going with the grain that was apparent in most of the other counties in the district which stretches from Waco to Stephenville.

The Marlin businessman, Leath, garnered 611 votes in Mills County, while the former State Legislator, Denton, picked up 690 votes in the 11 county boxes.



The first Democratic Primary election is history, and with the exception of a few recounts, is official.

Mills County and Texas will have the first runoff in several years, with the balloting set for June 3.

This is a "second chance" for many voters to really pay attention to the candidates, and try to truly discover what difference, if any, they will make if they are nominated. Information is not impossible to gather, and the truth can be found if one is diligent in his efforts.

Many times, people are elected to high offices and are immediately criticized after their inauguration for ineffectiveness or some sort of mistrust or general loss of confidence. It usually isn't the candidate's fault when this occurs. It's the fault of those who put him (or her) there. The voters should have been well enough informed to make a logical, and correct, decision as to his competency. Don't be caught up in the personality issues, consider the man first. Is he known by his friends to be straight forward and had he had some experience in life other than in the political arena. The experiences gained in politics and while serving in elected capacities are often not in the least related to the minds of the public. The wishes of the voters, after all is the primary fact of life of an elected official. He should always ask himself, "What would best benefit most of the people of my district?"

And if he doesn't have close personal ties with people out here, then he will fail, because he can't possibly make the decision. He can only yield to the influences of those close to him.

Please take time to do a little research, at least ask someone you know, and trust, what the real issues are.

One of our county's finest resources is our fine group of senior citizens.

And the organizations they represent exhibit a lot of enthusiasm and life in an area that causes distress to some areas of the country.

May has been designated Older Americans Month in the county, and next week has been proclaimed Nursing Home Week. It would be a very good time to visit in the local nursing homes, and if you are already a regular visitor, plan something special for that certain someone.

No joy, happiness, or event is worth a plug nickle if it isn't shared with someone.

City Council Approves Big Budget For Upcoming Year

The City Council of Goldthwaite tentatively approved a record \$775,058.22 budget at its meeting last Thursday night.

A public hearing on the budget will be held at the June 1 meeting of the Council. This hearing is to gather citizen input before the council votes to accept or reject the budget.

The largest increase in the budget is \$90,000 in the electric department. Growth in the city and increased electric usage brought about the increase.

The amount of money needed to be collected from property taxes for the coming year will be \$37,000, up from \$30,000 this year. The tax roll will not include vehicles as in 1978.

The council heard a report on the outcome of the reworking of two of the city's wells, located north of the city limits. Between the two, approximately 200 gallons of water a minute can be pumped. The wells tested out at about 270 gallons per minute. The pumping capacity was dropped to prevent overloading. This water will begin entering the system within the near future, as soon as new motors and pumps can be installed.

The council opened sealed bids on these pumps and motors. Crown Pump Co. of De Leon was awarded the bid on setting up the systems for both wells. Total costs of the pumps and motors plus other specifications was \$6930.51. This was the low bid on the

The council reviewed the status of other wells in the system. The test hole, dug on City property at the warehouse off Old Priddy Road should bring in another 50-60 gallons per minute. It will require only a short pipe line to reach the small water storage facility near the ball park.

Another well, not yet undertaken, was discussed. It has been determined that a well might be dug on the airport property north of town. It is speculated that this area would be a good source of water. The council, however, chose not to pursue this well at the present time, due to high pipe line cost because of the distance from storage, and the fact that the land would have to be purchased for the site.

Another site, located on the L. B. Burnham property, adjacent to the city's filter plant in the southwest corner of the city has been discussed. This well would require little piping, but it is thought to be a much weaker well than some others.

In the final analysis, the council approved going ahead with the casing and complete testing of the warehouse well.

If developed at a reasonable level, this would give the city a total of about 250 gallons per minute of potential water from well sources.

This amount, according to City Manager Dale Allen, would carry the entire city about five months a year. And in the other months, the

er would give ample water to customers without strain. The river system would be allowed to rest and would be better suited for repairs.

CM Allen also mentioned that with the addition of the well water, that the city might be eligible for approval by the Texas Health Department.

In other water matters, the council unanimously approved the passage of a water rate increase ordinance. Customers will notice a \$1.00 increase in the minimum billing. The rate per thousand gallons was left at \$1.50.

In other matters, the council unanimously passed a preliminary application for a Community Block Grant for water and other improvements in three different areas of the city. The city could be eligible for \$250,000 through the Housing and Urban Development agency if the grant is awarded.

The council also voted to expand the housing opportunity plan for the city. This plan consists of housing assistance payments in the form of rent subsidies, upgrading of housing by repairs and insulation, and other items. The program is administered by the Central Texas Council of Governments.

Mills County Park came under the eye of the Council. A new park board was appointed and a drive to help in the maintenance of the park will be held soon. The City has received funds from

organizations to help in the park program. The total cost is usually about three times what is collected in the drive, but the extra funds are certainly appreciated by the council.

Sanitary land fill operations were reviewed once again by the council. New operating procedures were implemented last meeting and have been well received, according to city employees.

Mayor J. D. Harper named council committees for the coming year.

Hill Wins Demo Nomination, But Dolph Wins Mills
Mills County voters followed statewide trends in all but the Governor's race. Dolph Briscoe carried the county by an 832 to 492 margin. John Hill was the narrow victor in the statewide balloting. Incumbent Briscoe failed in his attempt for a third term as Attorney General. Hill used large metropolitan majorities to pull ahead in the late stages of the tallying Saturday night. Star, Big Valley and Ridge boxes were carried by Hill in Mills County. In the two non-binding referendum propositions on the ballot, local voters also followed statewide trends. Mills County voters voted both proposals, voting for higher interest rates by a walloping 1328 to 100 vote margin. The voting for the petroleum gambling question was voted down 1000 to 518. These two issues failed on the statewide level, but not by margins as great as in Mills County. The race for Railroad Commissioner was headed for a possible runoff on June 3, according to late tabulations. Jerry Sadler was the leader locally and statewide, polling 726 votes here. John H. Poerner polled 279 in Mills County, but did considerably better over Texas to gain enough support to enter a runoff.

Funeral services for John Rufus Mitchell, who passed away May 1, 1978 at Ft. Stockton, were conducted Wednesday, May 3, at Ranger, Texas with burial in Bullock Cemetery.

John Rufus Mitchell was born to Dave and Laura Mitchell on Dec. 2, 1892, below Ranger Hill in Eastland County, Texas. Mills County Farm Bureau Newsletter

The Texas Farm Bureau continues to do what they can for the farmers and ranchers by keeping in close contact with congressmen in Washington. Whenever they feel the need arises, President Chaloupka goes to Washington himself to help make our wishes known.

Recently Chaloupka and other Texas leaders visited with Cong. Bob Poage about the Emergency Farm Bill, chances of early passage of the bill, and the possibility of Administration action under existing authority to increase set-asides and target prices. Cong. Poage and Kika de la

Garza of Texas are members of the House-Senate Conference Committee, which will continue deliberations on the Emergency Farm Bill as long as needed.

Cong. Poage indicated to the Texas delegation that very serious differences of opinion have developed between the Administration and the Conference Committee. Due to the critical time element involved, the Conference Committee has urged the Administration to act under present law to increase set-asides, make performance payments for the additional set-aside, and

make upward adjustments in loan levels and/or target prices.

The Administration agreed to an increase in the target price for wheat and an increase in feed grain acreage set-aside with performance payments for the increase. The Administration reportedly stated that further action of the Congress would face a veto.

Conference Committee members feel that the administration proposal does not go far enough on wheat or feed grains, and does nothing for cotton. Angry Committee members are threatening to pass the Senate Bill to put additional pressure on the Administration.

Most Committee members feel that the Emergency Farm Bill is an administrative impossibility. It is contradictory in many respects. It would take days or weeks of precious time for the

Committee to agree on and draft a clean bill. Adoption of necessary rules and regulations would take weeks or months, and activating the program at the county level would consume additional time.

The Committee feels that immediate action by the Administration under present authority is imperative. The Administration does not seem willing to take action acceptable to the Committee.

Even though the Farm Bureau is working hard to get the farmers and ranchers relief, it may be a long time before anything happens.
