Blood Bank "Deposits" Can Be Made On Reg. Basis

An entirely new approach to the local blood recruitment plan will be put into effect on a trial basis beginning July 6, 1978. Dan Connally, Chairman for the Mills County Blood Replacement Program, stated that an agreement with West Texas Blood Services has been made where they will open the blood bank for donors on a regular basis on the same day each month.

The date chosen will be the first Thursday of each month at the Youth Center from 1:00 to 6:00 P.M.

He emphasized as before that West Texas Blood Services that supply our local needs is a non-profit organization depending entirely on volunteers for our blood. As set down in the guidelines of

Some History—

Forehand Ranch 4F Brand-1874

Among the first settlers of 1... Neighbors Creek comnity was the late H. G. orehand, son of J. M. and becca Forehand. He was rn October 1, 1858; was arried to Mary Agnes liller in 1877; and ten ldren were born to this n. All lived to be grown ept one son who died at age of two

The Forehand family lived Senterfitt, and moved to Neighbors Creek comnity before Mills County organized. Shaw Creek Neighbors Creek empinto the Colorado River the Forehand Ranch. The crossing of the river, veen these two creeks, known as the Nichols ssing, where many

The cattle brand used by Forehand was 4F, and was registered in Lampasas County in 1874, and has been in use eighty-three years. The brand is now used by W. T. (Bill) Forehand of Midland, Texas (the year 1957).

In the year 1904, H. G. Forehand, with C. C. Yarborough, put into operation the first irrigation system in this part of the county, on adjoining ranches. Other neighbors were the R. C. Johnsons, A. H. Millers, the Cook and Wrinkle families, and the Rev. D. I. Haralson family. Rev. Haralson, who through his admonitions and spiritual guidance, contributed greatly to the salvation of many of the youngsters, whom he affectionately called "his children".

Many people think a suntan makes them look more attractive. It certainly is the fashion today to have a tan, but it wasn't always so. Fifty years ago Americans prized fair, delicate-looking skin.

Some people think soaking up the sun makes them healthy. In general, this isn't true, according to the Texas Department of Health. State health officials say the benefits of the sun are mostly psychological and are heavily outweighed by the dangers.

Almost all of the 30,000 cases of skin cancer developed by Americans each year are considered to be sun-related. Fortunately, if treated in time, most skin cancers are curable.

Skin cancer has early, visible warning signs. These include a sore that doesn't heal, a

change in size or color of a wart or mole, or the development of any unusual pigmented area.

There is a rare form of skin cancer called melanoma, which accounts for most of the nation's skin cancer deaths each year. Even though, it is not primarily sun-related,

What is the best method to protect your skin from the dangers of the sun? The best answer to that really sounds too simple-just stay out of the bright sunlight if possible. But if you can't do that, then the next best thing would be to wear protective clothing. Wear loose-fitting beach robes, long sleeved

Some people run a greater risk from the sun than others. Blacks are relatively safe because their pigment provides good protection from ultraviolet damage. Among whites, those with olive-toned skin usually tan quite easily. It is those with the fairest skins, notably blonds or those with red hair, who usually don't tan well. These are the people who should take special precautions.

Despite the possible damage to their skin, most people are unwilling to give up their sun-centered life styles. If you are one of these, learn to sun safely.

Sun before 10 a.m. and after 3 p.m., when the ultraviolet rays are the weakest. If this is too restrictive, lie out a maximum of 15 minutes during the danger hours.

What about the multitude of suntan thousand members. lotions and other preparations sunbathers use to anoint their bodies?

In varying degrees, commercial suntan preparations chemicals called sun-screens. These absorb some of the ultraviolet rays of the sun while letting others through. To work effectively, sunscreens should be applied about 45 minutes before exposure and reapplied after swimming or perspiring.

Even sunscreen, a good general tanning program is 15 minutes the first day during high radiation hours. Then, sun five minutes more each day thereafter until you have a good base tan.

Another type of chemical protection is the sunblock, which doesn't allow tanning because it deflects the ultraviolet rays. It is most useful in shielding lips, nose and other extra-sensitive or already burned areas. A well known sun blocking agent is zinc oxide, an opaque white ointment often used by lifeguards.

At least two Texas utility companies told Public Utility Commission examiners they are looking into possibility of remote control equipment to allow them to switch off electrical appliances during peak use periods.

Use of the load management equipment is still far down the road, but various devices are being evaluated.

Facts from a pro on driving to survive.

Q. Is it permissable to move a car that has been involved in an accident before the police get there? - C. J., Yoakum

A. Yes, if it is a serious obstruction to traffic and can be safely driven. If the accident occurred in a main traffic lane, ramp, shoulder, median or adjacent area of a freeway in a metropolitan area, the car must be removed off the freeway. Otherwise it is usually a better idea to leave it where it stopped. If the impact was serious, remember to turn off the ignition to reduce the risk of fire.

Q. I know you can improve gas mileage on the highway by driving at or below 55. But is there anything you can do in town?—C.J., Bronte

A. The simplest measure is to avoid jackrabbit starts and hard stops. Most drivers press the gas pedal down too far, pumping more fuel through the engine than it can handle. Accelerating hard and then jamming on the brakes at the next light wastes fuel and wears out the brakes faster. Don't start the engine until you are ready to go. Many people start it as soon as they get into the car, then adjust the mirror, buckle the seat belt and wait for their passengers to get in. And don't run the engine while waiting for the drive-in bank teller to process your deposit. If the engine is warm, it takes almost no fuel to restart it.

Q. Are there any disadvantages to cruise controls?—D.P., Abilene

A. Not if they aren't treated as automatic pilots. A cruise control can maintain a steady speed better than you can, and that will improve fuel mileage. It also prevents the driver's right foot from becoming cramped, and it allows him or her to give more attention to traffic conditions.

Improper watering can lead to a number of disease problems, such as blossom end rot in tomatos, peppers, squash and watermelons.

This disease which develops more rapidly in acidic soil, starts at or near the blossom end of the fruit. Tomatoes are most commonly affected when they are about half-grown.

The first sign of the disease is a slight, watersoaked area around the blossom end. This area soon darkens and enlarges rapidly as the fruit ripens. The discolored tissues shrink until they become flat or concave. The flesh of the fruit is rotted, brown to black in color, and leathery.

Another disease, Buckeye rot, causes similar symptoms on the blossom end. However, this disease produces concentric rings of alternate light and dark gray areas.

To control these diseases, maintain a constant level of soil moisture. Infrequent





Extension Highlights

Tick populations have increased dramatically this spring and are causing considerable problems for homeowners and their pets.

The pests have been especially troublesome during recent weeks. Abundant numbers of ticks continuously reinfest landscape areas, thus making control difficult.

Ticks many times cause inconvenience and health hazards to both people and pets. The bites of these

blood-sucking parasites may become inflamed and infected due to the toxic secretion during tick feeding. Several diseases such as tick paralysis, tularemia and Rocky Mountain spotted fever may be transmitted through tick bites.

Two most common ticks found in home landscapes in Texas are the brown dog tick and the American dog tick. The brown dog tick is reddish brown in color while the American dog tick is yellowish- brown when unfed and a slate gray when engorged. The brown dog tick is most common in inhabited areas. It hides in debris, cracks and crevices often found on the ears, neck and between the toes of animals. Dogs are the preferred host of the American dog tick, although both types frequently attack man and other animals. When infestations occur, treat pets. home and premises at the same time.

Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Light infestations can usually be controlled with light spot treatments with household sprays containing .5 percent diasinon or ronnel. Treatment of the dog's sleeping quarters, chairs, baseboards and around doors and win-

dows is usually necessary. Outside the home, ticks may be controlled with Diasinon or carbaryl (Sevin) spray or dusts. Carbaryl offers the best residual control. Use 5 percent carbaryl dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre where vegetation is thin. Increase the dose in heavy vegetation. If spray is used, mix 2 quarts of 25 percent diazinon emulsif concetrate in 25 gallons of water (5 tablespoons per gal.). Apply at the rate of one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet of infested area.

Handle all insecticides properly and follow all directions on the label before applying control treatments.

Most tick species cannot survive in cleared areas and mowed lawns where they are exposed to excessive sunlight and predators. So, cutting grass and weeds. removing useless shrubs. and keeping the area clear of debris is important in controlling ticks on home premises and recreational areas.
