Although things are getting back to the "hot" normal, the record-setting heat wave took a break over the week end in Mills County.

LAST SATURDAY, the temperature did not reach 100 here, following 20 days of 100 and more degree readings on the mercury machine. One or two of the days saw the thermometer near the 110 mark.

The heat spell set records all over the state, with both individual and cumulative marks being made.

The reason for the break in the heat was a band of scattered thundershowers, invading the area Saturday. Goldthwaite recorded almost an inch of rain that day and the relief in the temperature was almost as good as a blessing as the nice showers.

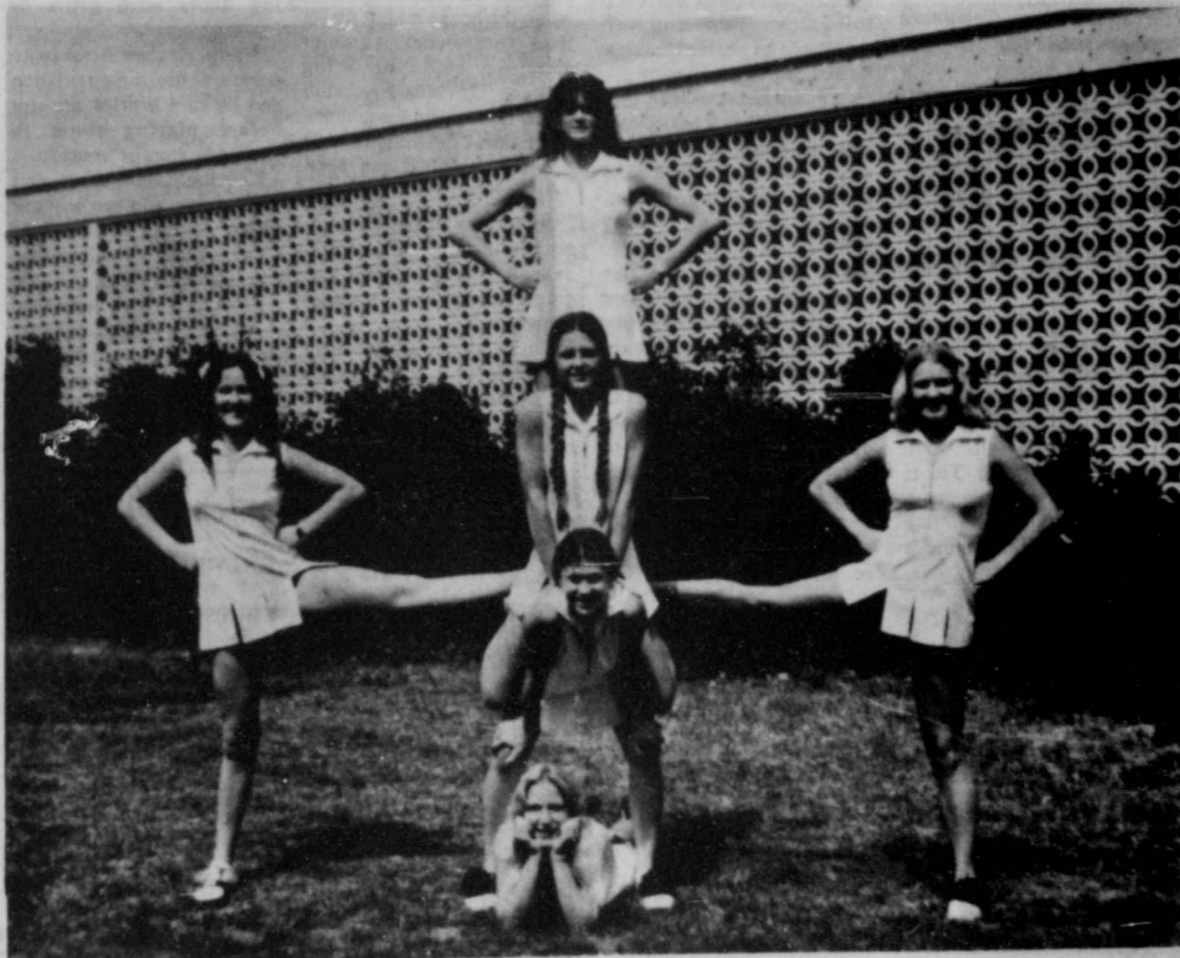
THE RAIN, however, was not county-wide, as some parts of the county received only a trace of rain over the weekend. The western part of the county was the worst

in comparison, receiving only a "dust-settling" shower. Priddy, on the other hand, was the recipient of the best rains, some measuring up to 2 inches and over. Mullin reported anywhere from one-half to one inch of rain.

The chances for rain slipped to none on Tuesday, but the temperature relief was still apparent as it did not reach 100. But don't let your guard down, it's coming again, as forecasts for the next few days reveal more hot and dry weather ahead.

Federal Grant Awarded To Emergency Medical Services

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) in seven Central Texas counties have been awarded a federal grant for \$235,000 to help finance emergency medical care development during the next 12 months.

Mills County is one of the counties that will benefit from this grant.

Nancy Price, EMS Coordinator for the Central Texas Council of Governments, says the grant will assure the continued improvement of emergency care throughout this area.

"This is the 3rd year we've received federal money for our EMS system," she said, "and the impact is obvious. A large part of this year's grant will help pay for communications equipment and training. Both will give long-term benefits in emergency patient care."

The grant was announced

by the Division of EMS, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It was officially given to the Texas Department of Health, which was awarded five such grants for EMS systems statewide. Price administers the grant locally through the Council of Governments.

Other counties that will benefit from the grant are Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam and San Saba.

Funds for development of EMS Systems are available because of the EMS Systems Act of 1973. The Act provides grants for up to five years. According to Price, this is the third year for Central Texas. "By the end of this year," she says, "we will have received a total of more than \$460,000." (EMS grants are awarded for fiscal years that last from July 1 till June 30.)

everyone to stop by and visit and fill up with gas. The establishment is open 24 hours a day. The change in ownership became effective last Friday, July 21st.

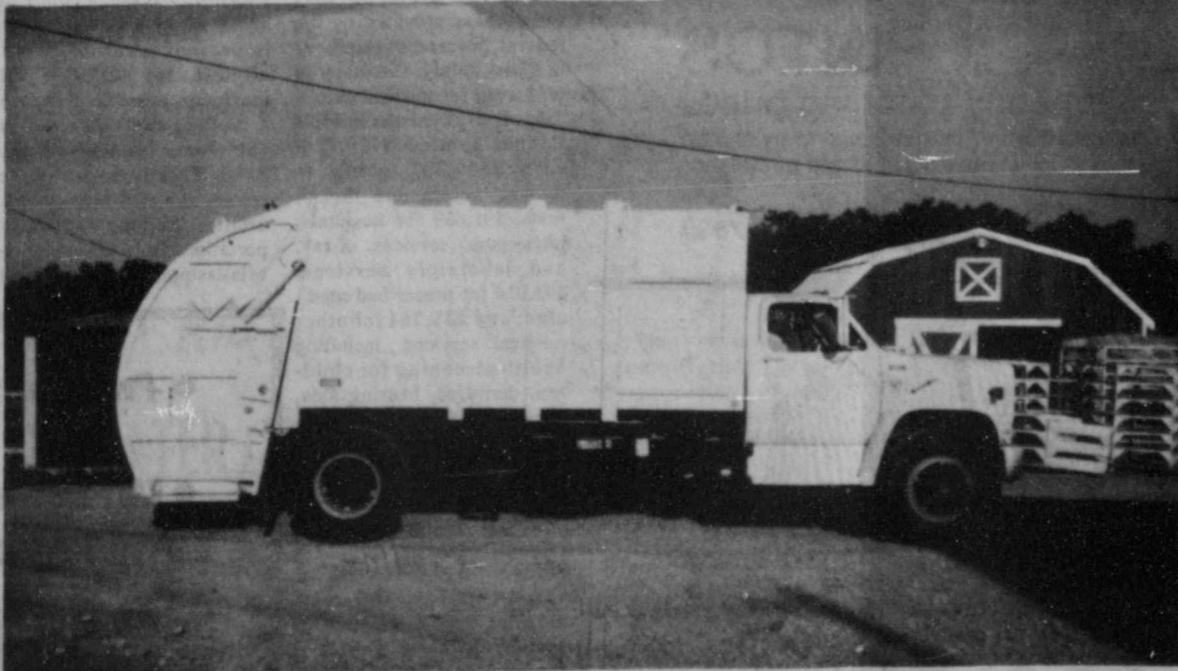

Take measures to prevent mildew--don't wait for the whitish or greenish growths or musty odors to appear.

Mildew is a fungus caused by spores of mold that thrive in warm, humid weather--especially in rooms or houses that are tightly closed.

Some household surfaces and articles will need special care, but, in general, keep things clean, dry and well ventilated to prevent mildew formation.

Keep Things Clean

Keep things clean--closets, showers, dresser drawers, basements and anywhere else damp, warm, poorly aired and poorly lighted.

Soil on articles in these areas can supply sufficient food for mildew to grow when moisture and temperature are right.

And don't forget the vacuum cleaner bag. Empty or change it frequently to prevent mildew growth in the appliance.

Get Rid Of Dampness

Get rid of dampness by removing the cause of the

dampness, by drying the air and by adequate ventilation.

Be sure that kitchen and bathroom fans and the clothes dryer are vented to the outside to prevent moisture condensation in the house, attic or basement.

Cool air holds less moisture than warm air, so properly installed and operated air-conditioning systems can help prevent mildew problems.

Remember, too, that turning off the air-conditioning when the house is shut up for that three-week summer vacation, could be a big mistake. In non-air-conditioned homes and basements, mechanical dehumidifiers or properly installed and operated exhaust fans may help.

Some chemicals also absorb moisture. Silica gel, activated alumina, and calcium chloride are moisture absorbant.

These chemicals are sold under various trade names by some department and drug stores or by building supply dealers.

However, use these chemicals only as directed--some may damage household textiles or plastics and some may rust metals.

Provide For Adequate Ventilation

In addition, provide for adequate ventilation--air movement is critical in removing excess moisture.

When natural breezes are not sufficient, fans may be needed. Select fans of the required type and size for the job and place them properly.

Poorly ventilated closets and storage areas often get damp and musty. Try to improve ventilation by opening doors with grills or louvers.

Hang clothes loosely to permit better air circulation and be sure articles are dry before placing them in closets or storage areas.

Cooking, laundering and bathing may add two or more gallons of water to a house in a day's time unless ventilation is adequate.

Thus, it is often necessary to use some type of exhaust fan in the kitchen, bathroom and laundry to provide adequate ventilation to prevent mildew problems.

Texas Dept. Of Human Resources Reports Past Yr.'s Benefits To Mills Co.

People needing help in Mills County received benefits worth \$811,013 during the past fiscal year, mostly for medical care, according to figures recently released by the Texas Department of Human Resources.

In its 1977 annual report, DHR reports that its total state budget was \$1.1 billion. About two-thirds of that amount was provided by the federal government and, as in Mills County, the majority of it went for medical care.

Medical payments in Mills County totaled \$710,724, with \$540,307 going to nursing homes and institutions; \$91,639 for hospitals, physicians' services, X-ray, and laboratory services; \$43,014 for prescribed medicine; and \$35,764 for other medical services, including health screening for children, dentures, hearing aids, eyeglasses, chiropractic services, premiums for Medicare, and non-emergency medical transportation.

DHR programs also had an impact on the county's nutrition. \$17,951 worth of surplus agricultural commodities were distributed to certain schools, day care centers, nursing homes and other institutions serving poor people. In addition, some 155 food stamp recipients had \$35,332 worth of bonus food stamps added to their food budgets. The bonus is the difference between what a person pays for the stamps and the actual value of the stamps at the grocery store. The federal government pays 100% of

the bonus and splits the administrative costs of the program with the state.

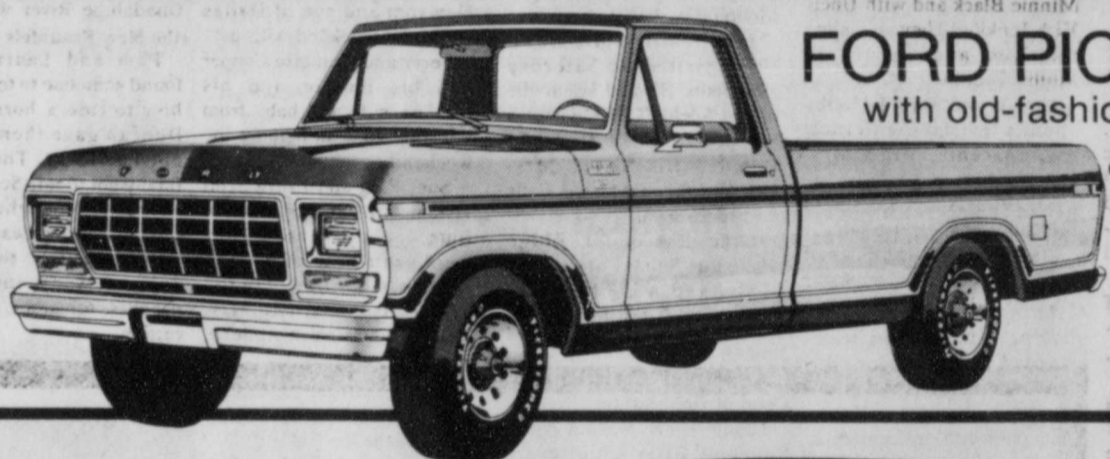
Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), the Department's only cash grant program, contributed \$7,166 to Mills County families with small children deprived of the financial support of one or both parents. In Texas, a family in which an able-bodied father is present is normally not eligible for AFDC. The maximum monthly grant for a mother and one child is \$86; for a family of four, \$140. This is expected to cover, at a minimum, rent, utilities, clothing and transportation. Only three states, Mississippi, Tennessee and

South Carolina, have lower grants.

Contracts to local providers of homemaker and chore services to low-income elderly residents of Mills County amounted to \$39,840. Providers make regular visits to clients to help with cooking, cleaning, shopping, bathing, taking prescribed medicine, and other personal needs. The aim of the program is to allow older persons who cannot take care of themselves to remain in the familiar surroundings of their own homes and avoid the much more expensive care of a nursing home.

Staff salaries added \$18,552 to the county's economy.

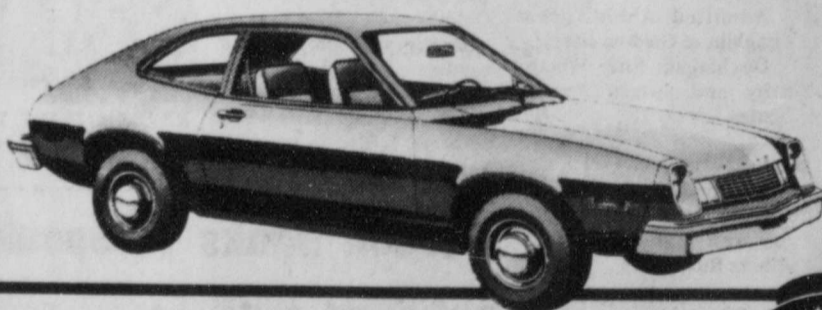

Another school year is about to begin. This will include many activities and work of all students, teachers, parents and community. We all have to work together to get the best education advancement for all our students that is possible. We do know that there are some students that can achieve more than others. We must all do our best to see that each and every student achieves the best for themselves.

Education is one thing that cannot be bought or given. One must develop their brain as you would your body for athletics. A person that has not developed his brain by training will not be able to perform in life as they should.

The state is spending some \$1,300.00 for each child in Texas each year for their education, then the parents spend much more for things that the child must have. Education, like most other things in life, is becoming more expensive all the time. We all feel this is worth the expense - but we must try to give each child the best opportunities for this expense.

To do this we must all work with the children. They need our encouragement and help, also they must do the learning process for themselves.

and graded by other people. There was no grade in our school that was not achieving as high as they should in that grade - most were from one to three years ahead in their achievement. There wasn't any grade that did not make more than one year achievement in the past year. There were some students in each grade achieving below average, but the grade average as a whole was above average.

We have one student who has gone to regional four years in succession in Number Sense. We have students who have received college credit for courses they did not take, because they could pass the test. Other students have also received scholarships because of their work. I could relate many other good accomplishments of our students.

We are proud of all these students; we know they will make good in life. There are other students that do not do as well as we know they can. This makes us want to help these more. They need to have a well trained mind to be able to accomplish and enjoy things in life.

As we start a new school year, let us all work together to have another good year. The effort we will put in for our young boys and girls is the best thing in life that we can do.

The couple are living in Dallas where he is employed at Griffin Mechanics. She is attending classes at Dallas Court Reporter School.

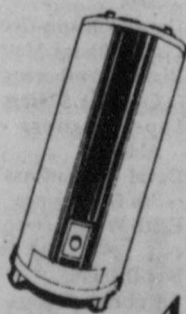

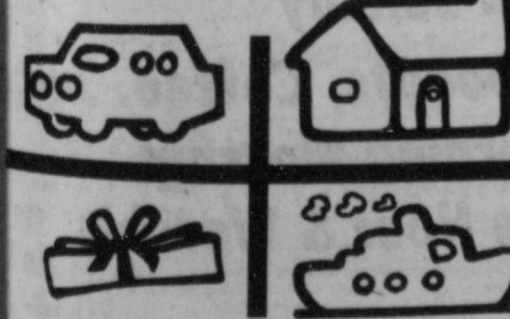

Relax And Keep Cool

Is the heat wearing you down? It's hot in most of the United States in mid-summer. In the desert and in the south it's even hotter. But July and August is hot all over, even in the mountains.
 Regardless of whether you blame the heat or the humidity, it's still hot.
 There's nothing you can do about the outside temperature. Unless you are fortunate enough to have an air conditioned office or shop, home and auto, there's nothing much you can do about it inside either.
 But there are some things you can do to be more comfortable, things that will help you beat the heat, the American Medical Association points out.
 Stay out of the sun as much as possible, especially during the middle of the day when rays are hottest. Wear light, loose clothing, the less the better. The ladies have an edge over the men in this respect. Drink more liquids than usual, but take extra salt only on your physician's advice, particularly if you have liver or kidney trouble or a heart condition.
 Take a shower or dip in the pool once or twice a day to cool off. Get plenty of rest and sleep.



Eat your regular diet and don't go overboard on cold cuts and salads, unless you like them anyway.
 Get up early in the morning to do your heavy work on the lawn or garden. Or work at dusk in the evening. Try to avoid heavy exertion during the hottest hours of the day.
 You need exercise in the summer as well as in the winter, but don't overdo it, especially on extra hot days. Don't overdo physical exertion, whether at work or play.
 The more relaxed outdoor life of the summer months has many advantages to compensate for the heat. Stay relaxed and use common sense, and you can beat the heat—at least somewhat.

Mills County Extension Highlights

Judy C. Beavers

Before shopping for a new refrigerator, do some planning. Start planning now—sales during the next several weeks may offer the lowest prices during the year.
 First, look to the future. A typical family will keep the refrigerator fifteen years—so determine what the family's future needs will be.
 Consider the number of young children and teenagers or whether no children will be in the home during the next fifteen years.
 Also, consider food shortage needs—frequent shopping means less capacity is needed.
 In addition, a large freezer compartment is less important if the family has a separate freezer.
 Next, decide on what features are needed.
 Remember, more gadgets add to the initial cost and to potential repair problems.

Size, Type
 Size and type are the first features to decide on.
 * Conventional refrigerators are available in nine to fourteen foot capacities. These single-door units have a small section for freezing ice cubes and short term storage of frozen foods. The freezer will require defrosting every two to three weeks or before frost deposit is one-fourth inch.
 * Two-door refrigerators with top or bottom freezer compartment are available in twelve to twenty-two cubic foot capacities. They come with semi-automatic defrost or automatic defrost freezer compartments.
 Most two-door semi-automatic defrost units are no larger than thirteen to fifteen cubic feet and will require defrosting before the frost is one-fourth inch deep.
 * Side-by-side models offer two doors the full length of the appliance and come in seventeen to twenty-five cubic foot capacities. The newest side-by-side models feature two freezer doors opposite the refrigerator door.
 These refrigerators usually

offer more freezer space and are only available with no-frost freezers.
Energy Use
 Single-door refrigerators cost the least to operate when defrosted regularly, however they are smaller capacity and have only short term frozen food storage.
 Among the two-door models, the manual defrost costs only slightly less to operate—with an estimated difference in monthly cost between a fourteen cubic foot manual defrost and a fourteen cubic foot no-frost of fifteen cents.
 Some manufacturers are producing "energy-saving" models.
 Some of these models have extra insulation, others have a switchable heater which saves energy when turned off.
 The switchable heater, used when condensation forms around the door, is most efficient in dry climates where condensation will form less readily and the heater will need to be turned on frequently.
Other Features
 Other features that are available include:
 * Automatic ice-maker.
 * ice and cold water dispenser on the door.
 * adjustable shelves and half shelves.
 * dual temperature controls.
 * wheels, and
 * storage bins of various types and sizes.
Comparison Shop
 Wide price variations for the same models make comparison shopping pay off with big savings. Look at discount stores and clearance sales for low prices.
 However, don't sacrifice reliable servicing and repair for a low price.
 Compare warranties for each model and ask what is covered by each warranty.

 Mills County Farm Bureau Legislative Committee, composed of James Wells, Chairman; Patty McCasland, Melvin Doak, W. J. and Anita Hopper, support the Texas FB Board of Directors in a drive to secure action on the following issues:
 1. No new taxation measures without a two-thirds vote.
 2. Elimination of 4% sales tax on utility bills on residences.
 3. Twenty percent reduction on single family dwellings for school taxes.
 4. Giving voters new power to initiate the reduction or increase in any state

taxes by petitioning.
 5. Limiting taxation of agricultural land according to its productivity rather than speculative sales value.
 6. Increase exemption on state inheritance tax.
 7. Increase homestead exemption.
 8. Use state revenue to reimburse local school districts for lost revenue because of reduced valuations.
 Members of the Mills County Farm Bureau Board of Directors have plans to attend part of the session of the Legislature.
 The local legislative Committee suggests that every citizen of Mills County let the State Senator and Representative know your feeling on the eight tax-related issues.

**Budget For Fiscal Year
 COG Adopts \$1.8 Million**

The Executive Committee of the Mills County State Bank, at its meeting on July 20, in Gatesville, approved a \$1.8 million budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1979.

The internal budget of \$1,749,000 will fund staff salaries, travel, equipment, supplies, rent, communication, public relations and other expenses for 10 continuing programs. These programs will come from 10 state and state agencies, more than \$73,000 in step grant funds from the seven-county region.

The external budget of \$1,675,340 will operate the bank's Abuse and Neglect Prevention Organization (AN-DO) and the Section 8 Housing Assistance Program. The grant applications approved by the committee, two of which

included the Texas Department of Health, for a genetic disease control network; and the Central Texas Manpower Consortium for a summer recreation program in the 7-county region.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Legislators moved through their third week of a special session facing a warning from Gov. Dolph Briscoe that he may keep them on the job if they fail to produce "meaningful" tax relief and limitations.

Both houses passed rival versions of legislation to repeal the sales tax on home utility bills and to increase to \$200,000 the inheritance tax exemption, then moved the issue to conference committee.

The Senate quickly completed action on a proposed constitutional amendment to permit tax valuation of all ranch, farm and timber land on the basis of productivity rather than market value.

Main issue raised was whether the tax break should be enjoyed by corporate agriculture and timber growers. Senators rejected 14-15 an amendment to restrict the advantage to small family farmers and ranchers.

Briscoe, two weeks deep in the session, opened the agenda to consideration of the property tax code reform bill by Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange and Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene. Committee hearings advanced the bill in the House and Senate, but controversies remained.

Proclaimed Briscoe, as the legislative pace lagged: "It is essential that we

have some sort of tax limitation. The people deserve this. If it is not done in 30 days, we will have to take a look at what can be done. I will not rule out any potential on how long it will take. It has to be done—the sooner the better."

Allowable Set
While companies complained they are finding less oil available for purchase, Texas Railroad Commission set the statewide production allowable for August at 100 percent.

Spokesmen for Exxon and Amoco explained their lower requests for purchase reflected an effort to bring nominations in line with actual purchases.

Chairman Mack Wallace said crude and petroleum imports were 7,862,000 barrels a day for the four-week average of July 7, a decrease of 697,000 from 1977.

Total nominations for next month came to 3,517,436, a decrease of 4,171 from July.

Flaws Reported
Secretary of State Steve Oaks reported results of his investigation into alleged absentee voting irregularities in five counties to local district attorneys.

The probe centered on Bexar, Brooks, Duval, Gregg

and Van Zandt counties. Oaks said local prosecutors can complete the investigation and file any appropriate charges.

He added he will draft bills for the legislature, setting greater penalties for tampering with election processes.

Irregularities, Oaks said, centered on such things as forgery of voters names on absentee voting applications or ballots, persons other than voters applying for absentee ballots, delivery of absentee ballots when the law requires mailing, and assistance to absentee voters by persons other than designated deputy registrars.

Oaks said there were other allegations of payments for transporting voters to the polls on election day.

Courts Speak
The Court of Criminal Appeals found a San Antonio judge was wrong to force lawyers to represent a man charged with murdering his wife.

The same court ordered dismissal of a criminal contempt charge against Potter County District Attorney Tom Curtis for remarks made in a March 9 pre-trial hearing.

In other action, the court: —Reversed an order previously entered and affirmed a 50 year imprisonment sentence in a 1974 Laredo murder conviction.

—Upheld a life imprisonment sentence in a San Antonio heroin possession case.

—Sent back for possible new trial a Houston aggravated robbery conviction which ended in a nine-year prison sentence.

The Texas Supreme Court refused to order the Board of Law Examiners to permit a young woman already licensed to practice law in California and several other states to take the State Bar exam.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a State Banking Board order allowing First State Bank of Hearne to move to College Station and change its name to College Station Bank.

AG Opinions
Attorney General John Hill said a school district employee is entitled to a copy of a superintendent's memorandum which concerns him.

Do you know someone who has problems coping with everyday pressures? Are you that person? There is help available and all you have to do to take advantage is make a phone call to the Mills County Human Development Center.

Liz Long, Caseworker, is officed at 1012 4th Street in Goldthwaite and says she will go out to see anyone who cannot come to her office for help. She says that the Center offers a wide variety of services to the community. These services are not only for emotional disturbances or developmental disabilities, but also for normal adjustment situations that take place in everyone's life.

Services include individual, family and marriage counseling, work with alcoholism and drug abuse, and help for those returning from a psychiatric hospital or school for retarded citizens to adjust to community life. The Center also offers a wide variety of psychiatric and psychological services such as testing, diagnosis, evaluation, counseling, and consultation. In addition, there is a partial care facility where a client can learn ways to cope with the pressures of home and work.

The cost for these services is based upon a person's ability to pay. "Services are never refused because of inability to pay", Liz Long says. She also indicated that if any civic, professional or church group would like to learn more about the Center's services that they could call her and a program would be presented. She also said that additional information and pamphlets are available at the Center.

The office is open every weekday from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. However, they are available 24 hours a day and can be reached after hours at 948-3546. Texas Industrial Commission will vote this week on 1978-79 advertising campaign promoting Texas' business climate.

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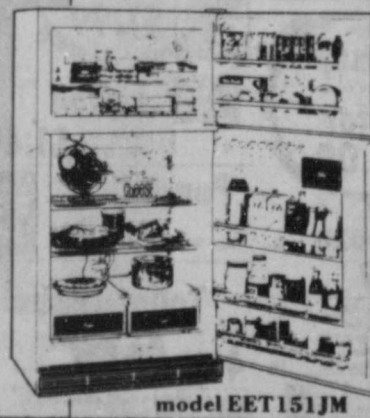
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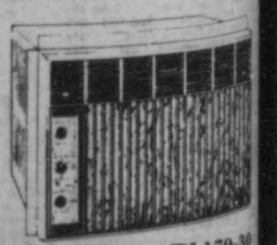
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
