

Two Juveniles Jailed Following Attempted Robbery Of Motel

No Money Taken

Mills County law enforcement officers apprehended two Coleman County juveniles late Saturday night in connection with an attempted robbery of the Hereford Motel, located at the North Y in Goldthwaite.

The pair, ages 15 and 17, were arrested by Department

of Public Safety officers. According to Sheriff H. G. Brooks, one of the youths pulled a knife on Mrs. Ann Carey, operator of the motel, and demanded her money. Mrs. Carey was able to escape and call the law enforcement officials.

Later she positively identified one of the arrested juveniles as the one who pulled the knife. The other juvenile reportedly stayed in the car at the time of the attempted robbery.

The youths were taken to Brown County jail and were arraigned in Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorne's court in Goldthwaite. Bond was set at \$10,000 on the 17 year old youth and he remains in the Brown Co. jail at this time.

The 15 year old juvenile was released to his parents Monday on administrative probation.

Mills County Taxes Among Lowest In State Of Texas

Mills County taxpayers could pay less property (ad Valorem) tax than any other county in the state, according to the current issue of "County Progress" magazine.

Mills County has an assessed valuation of \$8,421,863 and on the actual basis of assessment at a rate of 5%, and a tax rate of 80c per \$100 valuation, figures among the lowest in Texas.

Land is valued at \$10 per acre under the present percentage. Mills County Commissioners Court has advocated raising it to \$15 next year.

Assessed valuation can vary with the methods of assessment and individual boards of equalization.

Tax payers in Mills County pay approximately 12c per acre county taxes at the current level. Following is a list of surrounding counties showing their assessed valuation, percentage basis of assessment, and tax rate:

Independent Cattlemen's Association President Roy Wheeler and nine other national leaders of the domestic cattle industry met with President Carter July 25 at the White House in a session designed to inform the President of the many serious problems facing agriculture.

It was one of Wheeler's most important actions since taking office in June. Vice President Walter Mondale and USDA Secretary Bob Bergland also talked to the men, allowing for an exchange of information lasting nearly an hour.

The meeting was arranged by congressional leaders concerned that the President should learn first-hand the reasons behind livestock producers' reluctance to rebuild herds due to market instability and the recent increase in beef imports.

Carter last month ordered an additional 200 million pounds of imported beef into the U. S., an action that he said would lower consumer food prices. But agriculture leaders said that the President's action had little effect on the retail price of meat and instead caused a significant impact on the markets of

livestock producers. During the meeting, Wheeler told the President that instability in the market place has taken its financial toll on livestock producers just as it has hurt agriculture as a whole. He said troubled times for ranchers are not over in spite of slightly higher prices received for livestock recently.

"Despite higher prices, liquidation is continuing," said Wheeler. "Many banks are calling in loans on livestock for fear of another price drop. Ranchers are selling because they have the same concerns over the market. Financial institutions are hesitant to lend producers capital because of the instability in the marketplace. There will be no attempt to build herds while market uncertainties exist as they do today."

Wheeler told the President that if ranchers started rebuilding herds today it would take two years for consumers to see any results. He said livestock producers wanted some assurance of what their products will be worth at that time. He warned that with the reduction of herd sizes, the nation could be faced with beef shortages in the future.

According to Wheeler, the President guaranteed he would not let in any additional imported meat THIS YEAR and that he would never place price controls on beef.

Carter told the agriculture leaders that he is studying legislation pending in the House which would revise

the 1964 Meat Import Act to use a countercyclical approach to importing cattle.

Wheeler, owner of a livestock auction in Pleasanton, has returned to ICA state headquarters in Austin where he and other officers continue to work for legislation at the state and national level which would benefit food and fiber producers.

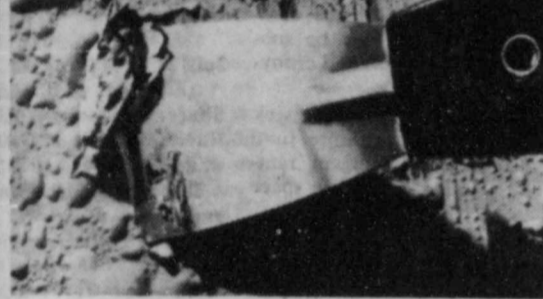

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS
By Lyndell Williams
TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—A preliminary report by the Sunset Advisory Commission staff has recommended major reorganization of the State Bar of Texas. The report concluded the Bar should operate as a private professional group rather than a state agency. Also recommended by Sunset staffers is transfer of the Bar headquarters, the Texas Law Center near the capitol, to the state and placement under the Board of Control for use by appellate courts and administrative offices of the judiciary. Other conclusions of the tentative report: —Bar restrictions on lawyer advertising are too tight. —Complaints against erring attorneys should be centralized rather than handled by 40 local grievance committees which may be subject to "local bias and cronyism." —The Bar failed to seek bids on office furniture, fund depository, equipment rental, printing and office space lease. —Specialization programs for lawyers are too restrictive and limit competition. —The Bar has tended to oppose legislation making it more accountable for its money and easing restrictions on getting into the profession. "The major portion of the State Bar's efforts and resources go to areas other than those concerned with the regulation of attorneys," the report stated. All licensed lawyers now must be members of the State Bar of Texas. The Sunset Commission staff report suggested licensing and discipline of lawyers should be performed under direct supervision of the State Supreme Court and an administrative agency.

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Mills County Extension Highlights

Danny Long County Agent

Fruit trees dying this time of the year may be victims of cotton root rot.

Cotton root rot is a soil-borne fungus that attacks a large number of fruit trees throughout Texas, particularly in areas with alkaline soils.

Infected plants wilt for a day or two and by the third day the foliage is dead. An examination of the root system shows that the outer bark has been decayed and tends to fall away from the inner part of the root.

Cotton root rot attacks a large number of plants. And once it is present in the soil, it will likely remain there for many years.

There is no control for the fungus once it gets in the soil, or once plants become infected. The only thing to do is to remove the plants from the area.

Although there are a few ornamentals which are re-

sistant to cotton root rot, at this time no fruit plant has been found to be resistant to the disease.

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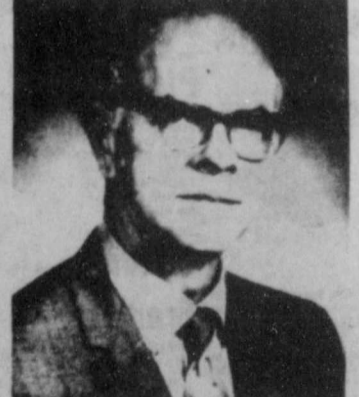
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
