Elastic shirring is a popular fashion detail, esecially in sundresses and children's clothes.

Buy preshirred fabrics or shirr designs at home with lastic thread.

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CED

Preshirred fabrics are vailable from fabric stores. Or, to shirr your own esigns with elastic thread, follow these easy instruc-

· Select good quality elastic thread that will not shred

· Wind elastic thread on the bobbin either by hand or by

When machine winding, do not place the elastic through the thread guides.

Hold the thread loosely so it winds on the bobbin relaxed, not stretched

Machine winding may not be possible on machines whose bobbins are wound inside the machine.

* Use regular sewing thread on top. Coordinate color with fabric. Matching thread gives a subtle effect, while contrasting thread adds a decorative touch.

* To shirr, simply make rows of straight stitching on the fabric. The elastic thread automatically causes the fabric to gather.

When sewing several rows, sew over paper to make stitching easier. The paper prevents the fabric from gathering.

After all rows are complete, remove the paper to reveal instant shirring.

Sheep & Goat Industry News

Sheep producers who haven't yet given much thought to the upcoming wool referendum would be

The referendum will be August 21 through September 1. The issue? Raising the incentive payment deduction from the current 11/2 cents per pound of shorn wool and 71/2 cents per 100 pounds of unshorn lamb sold to a more inflation-reflective 21/2 cents and 121/2 cents, respectively.

well adivsed to do so.

The money is deducted directly from incentive payments and therefore offers no bookkeeping headaches for the producer, nor is it as noticeable as it would be if he already had the money in his hot little hand.

It's also a good investment. The deductions fund the American Sheep Producers Council, and the Council receives no other funding. The ASPC, based in Denver employs a staff of promotions, advertising, merchandising, education, public relations and sheep production experts. Their job is to create and implement

ASPC is comprised of 20 state and area sheep councils which in turn represent the producers themselves. A total of 102 voting delegates are selected from these councils, and these delegates chose 48 individuals from their own ranks to serve on the ASPC board of directors.

Sound complicated? Well, it's complicated enough to assure that everyone has someone else keeping an eye on him. It also assures that even the top brass are aware of what goes on in a sheep pen because they've all been

In all, it's a pretty safe outfit to trust with a few cents worth of deductions. particularly when they do so uch with them.

Referendum balloting will be conducted by mail under the auspices of the ASCS. Local ASCS offices will mail hallots to all known sheep producers in their areas, and those who fail to receive their ballots in this manner may pick them up at their local ASCS offices






