New Coach, Ag Teacher Hired

Goldthwaite schools head coach Norman "Smokey" Brisler and Vocational Agriculture instructor J. C. Thomison tendered their resignations last week to the Goldthwaite School Board. They said they plan to enter the cattle business. Brisler's replacement is

Joe Winchell, an Odessa native, who has been coaching at Eastland. Prior to that he coached one year at Denver City. Winchell graduated from the University of Texas at El Paso, and also attended the University of Texas Permian Basin at Odessa.

Regarding his transition to Goldthwaite, Winchell said the enthusiasm of the kids makes it easy. "They show a lot of desire and we expect a real good season from what I've seen so far," he said Tuesday.

Eagle Field has been completely redone this year, having been re-plowed and re-sown.

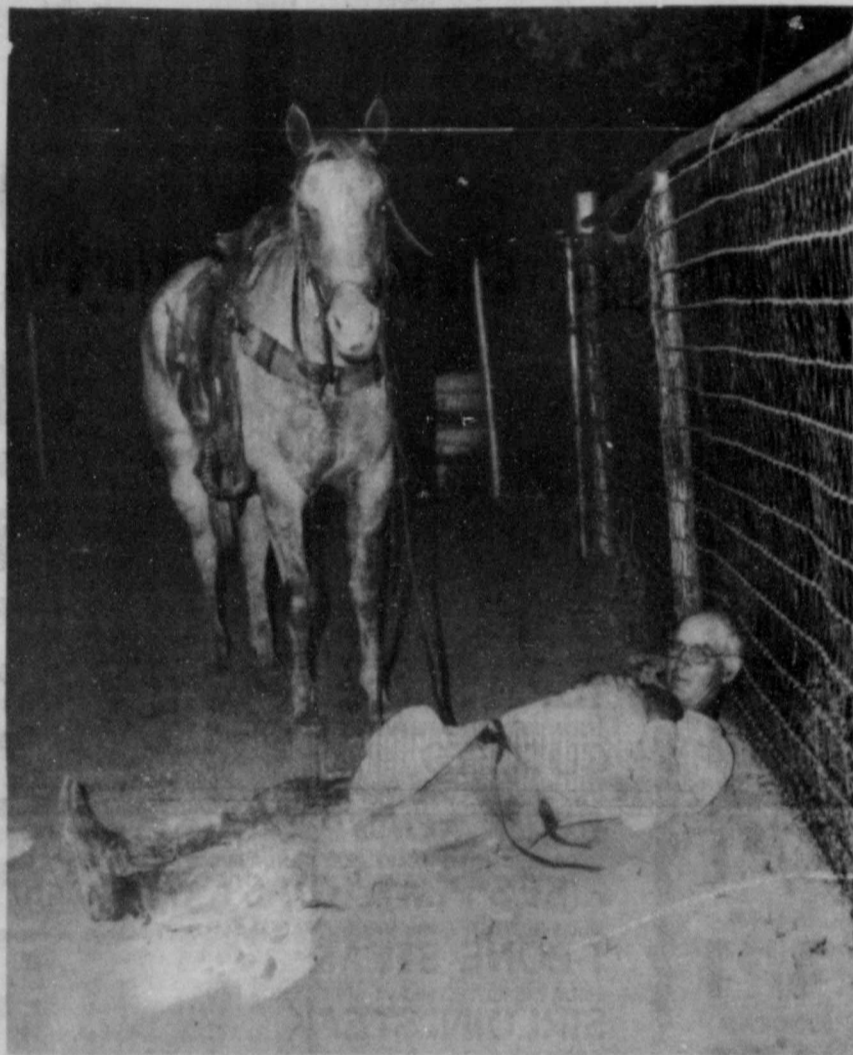
Park Memorial Fund Begun For Samantha Luce

Lamb - Wool Referendum To Begin August 21st

A referendum will be held from August 21st to September 1st to determine whether producers approve of a new agreement for the advertising and sales promotion of lambs and wool. This will be a mail referendum. Ballots will be mailed to known producers of wool or lambs on August 21st. Voted ballots may be mailed to the County ASCA Office or may be returned in person. Any person who had an interest as owner, or partial owner, in one or more sheep 6 months old or older for at

least 30 days during 1977 is an eligible voter.

The new agreement is similar to the one approved in 1974, except that it would authorize larger deductions from producers incentive payments. By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to 2½ cents per pound on shorn wool and 12½ cents per hundred-weight on unshorn lambs marketed. Deduction rates from 1966 through 1977 were 1½ cents and 7½ cents, respectively.

Immunization for children also will be available, as well as adults during the Health Clinic. No appointments are needed for immunizations.

The Texas Angora Goat Raiser's Show and Sale, held at Rocksprings recently, proved to be a record sale with 137 goats selling for \$48,605.00.

The top selling Buck, bred by Roland Trees of Mountain Home, sold to Marty Graham of Rocksprings for \$2,000.

The second high seller, also owned by Roland Trees, was bought by Mike Stewart, a promising young registered breeder from Sonora, for \$1,875.00. The third high selling Buck, bred by R. L. Ebeling of Marble Falls, sold to Larry Funklea of Sonora for \$1,475.00.

The top 15 Does averaged \$312.67 each. The top selling doe, bred by R. L. Ebeling, was bought to Haden Haby of Rocksprings for \$490.00.

Second high selling doe, bred by the late Herbie Ochler of Harper, Texas, went to Linda Brice of Leakey, Texas, for \$460.00.

The two top Doe buyers were C. S. Violet of Danville, California, taking 9 does for \$1,870.00 and Margaret Mauthrabort of British Ontario, Canada, taking 10 does for \$2,690.00.

There were a host of buck buyers. Black Bull Ranch of Mountain Home bought bucks totaling \$3,475.00; W. L. Morris of Sonora paid \$3,225.00 for bucks.

Elastic shirring is a popular fashion detail, especially in sundresses and children's clothes.

Buy preshrirred fabrics or shirr designs at home with elastic thread.

Preshrred fabrics are available from fabric stores. Or, to shirr your own designs with elastic thread, follow these easy instructions:

- * Select good quality elastic thread that will not shred easily.
- * Wind elastic thread on the bobbin either by hand or by machine.

When machine winding, do not place the elastic through the thread guides.

Hold the thread loosely so it winds on the bobbin relaxed, not stretched.

Machine winding may not be possible on machines whose bobbins are wound inside the machine.

- * Use regular sewing thread on top. Coordinate color with fabric. Matching thread gives a subtle effect, while contrasting thread adds a decorative touch.

- * To shirr, simply make rows of straight stitching on the fabric. The elastic thread automatically causes the fabric to gather.

When sewing several rows, sew over paper to make stitching easier. The paper prevents the fabric from gathering.

After all rows are complete, remove the paper to reveal instant shirring.

He married La Juana Ludwig in 1952, in Lawton, Oklahoma. They moved to Comanche from Priddy in 1976.

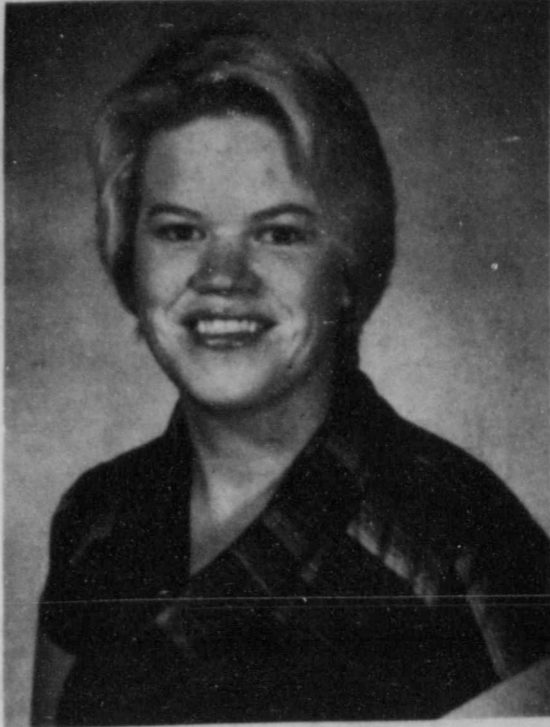

These three officers appoint the chairmen of the two basic committees, the wool and lamb committees. The chairmen and officers, along with directors designated by the National Wool Growers and National Lamb Feeders Associations comprise the council's Executive Committee. This group monitors programs approved by the board of directors, as well as implementation of these programs by ASPC staffers.

Sound complicated? Well, it's complicated enough to assure that everyone has someone else keeping an eye on him. It also assures that even the top brass are aware of what goes on in a sheep pen because they've all been there.

In all, it's a pretty safe outfit to trust with a few cents worth of deductions, particularly when they do so much with them.

Referendum balloting will be conducted by mail under the auspices of the ASCS. Local ASCS offices will mail ballots to all known sheep producers in their areas, and those who fail to receive their ballots in this manner may pick them up at their local ASCS offices.

TS&GRA believes in the council and supported the deduction increase by unanimous resolution during its February meeting.

ASPC is comprised of 20 state and area sheep councils which in turn represent the producers themselves. A total of 102 voting delegates are selected from these councils, and these delegates chose 48 individuals from their own ranks to serve on the ASPC board of directors.

ASCS NEWS

It is the intent of Mills County ASCS Committee to help producers who have had grass loss but it is not the government's intent to pay feed bill of producers who are overstocking.
 Our County Committee has set the recommended stocking rate at 1 animal unit per 10 acres of native grass and 1 animal unit for 3 acres of improved grass. This is the standard by which the Emergency Livestock Feed Program will be worked in Mills County.
 Animals under 6 months of age will not count against your animal unit maximum. We will also give you a 10% overstocking tolerance. If you are overstocked over 10% then the application you filed on percent of grass loss will be reduced an equal percent of the amount you are overstocked.
 Example: Producer has 500 acres native grass that should run 50 animal units, but the producer has 75 animal units. Producer is 50% overstocked. The County Committee will allow him 10% overstocking rate. Producer has 95% grass loss, minus 40% reduce his grass by overstocking, leaving 55% grass loss percentage after penalty.
 After the penalty, we will figure his application on 55% grass loss instead of 95% loss. We are not trying to tell you what number of livestock to run -- this is only for Emergency Feed Program purposes.
 If producers have any questions, contact the ASCS Office.
