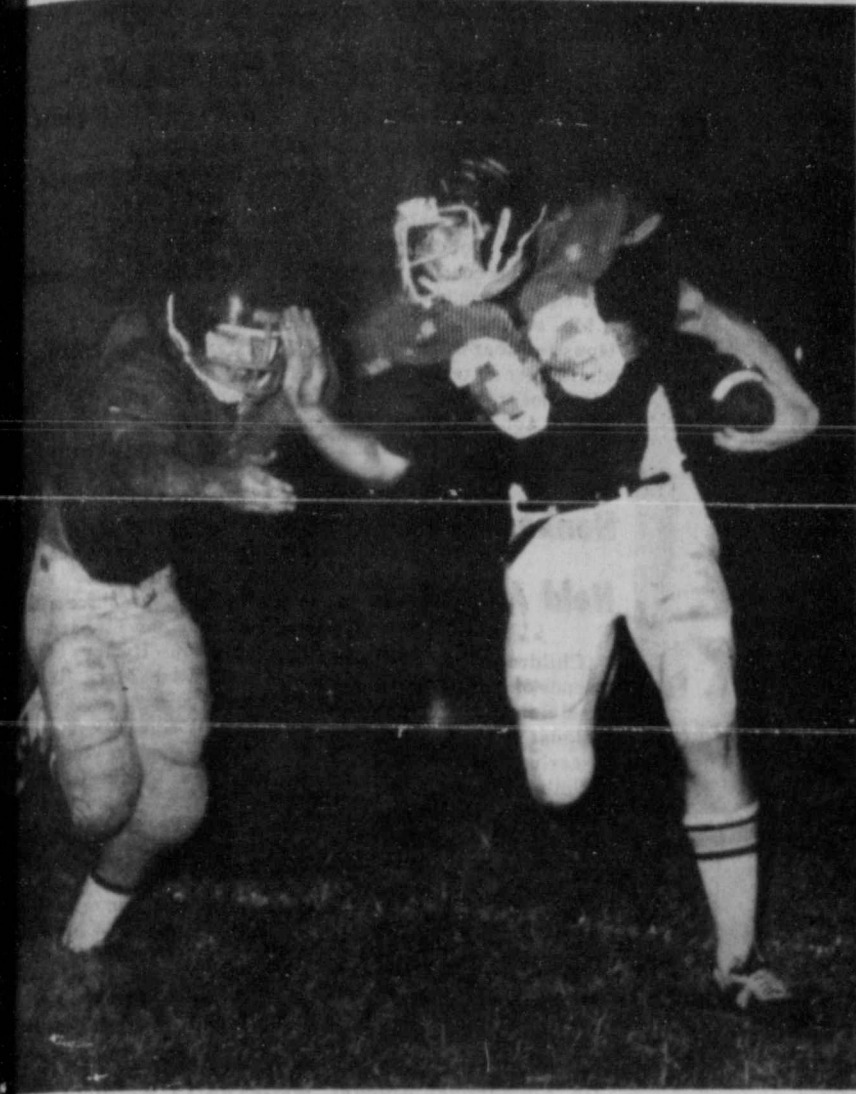

Numbers Seem Good

1978 Dove Season Opens Sept. 1st

Mills County Game Warden Benny Schriver has announced that the annual dove season will begin here on September 1, 1978.

The season will run through October 30th.

Daily times of hunting will be from 30 minutes before official sunrise to official sunset.

Schriver said that bag limits will be 10 per day with a possession limit of 20 doves. Shotguns must be used, 10 gauge or smaller, plugged to hold only three shells, including one in the chamber.

Persons over 16 years of age, or under 65 years of age, who hunt out of their county of residence are required to have a valid Texas hunting license.

Licenses are available in Mills County at two locations: Shelton Lumber Yard in Mullin and Head Hardware in Center City.

Schriver said that the potential for the season looks real promising, but that recent thundershowers and weather conditions may have scattered the doves, limiting concentrations. The numbers of birds should increase as the season progresses.

The Game Warden also pointed out that the 1978 season will bring a record number of out-of-county hunters to Mills County, as leasing of land for dove hunting has been at a fast pace.

Everyone is urged to use precautions and have a safe and good dove hunting season.

Priddy enrollment is down some from last year, with 75 students this year.

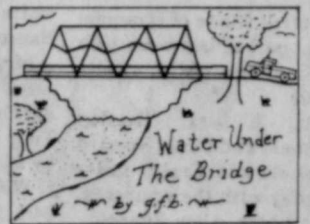
All the football teams have had a scrimmage game and are getting set for a winning season.

First In A Series -

Mills County United Fund Introduces Member Agencies

(One in a series of articles explaining participating organizations of the United Fund of Mills County.)

Cystic Fibrosis Foundation

Every five hours around the clock a child is born with Cystic Fibrosis, the most serious lung-damaging disease of children. It is an inherited disorder, occurring when a child receives a gene for cystic fibrosis from each parent.

Symptoms include recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing, excessive mucous, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite coupled with poor weight gain, and a flapping or enlargement of the fingertips. The disease is still incurable, but the lives of children are lengthened to the mid-teenage often.

CF primarily affects the respiratory and digestive systems. Most CF patients

must take daily medication including anti-biotics, enzymes and vitamins. Lung diseases are second only to cancer in taking the lives of children.

Donations to the CF Foundation are used in two fields - First, in research, CF was first described in 1936. Thus it is a relatively new addition to the medical research field. Research projects are carried out here in Texas at Baylor Medical School in Houston, and U.T. Medical Branch at Galveston.

The second major area is in the funding of CF Centers.

HOLIDAY MONDAY

Labor Day, September 4, will be observed as an official holiday by most of Mills County.

Schools will dismiss regular classes, and most businesses will close.

There are 115 centers in the United States. Those located in Texas are in Temple, El Paso, Austin, San Antonio, Dallas and Houston. They are staffed by physicians and other health care personnel, who are specialists in the diagnosis and treatment of this complex disease. Many CF Centers are able to accept patients with asthma, chronic bronchitis and other lung diseases.

The 1977-78 Mills County United Fund Drive allocated \$188.66 to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation to aid in the further research and health care of this disease.

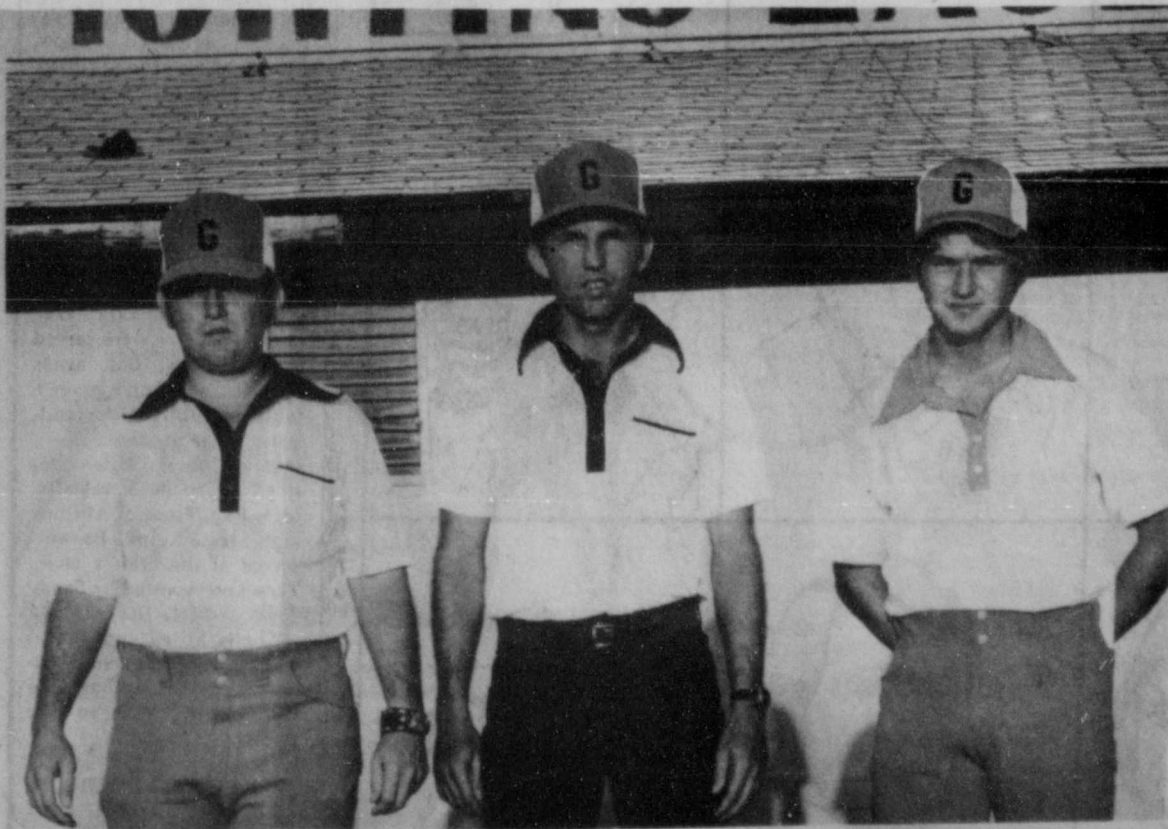
sincere but sinister Inquisitor.

Don't spare the nitrogen on small grains this fall.

Three important reasons why wheat and other small grains need nitrogen at planting, or a short time afterward, are: 1) for early grazing, 2) to help decompose excess residual straw, and 3) for high production of forage and grain.

Sufficient fall growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen at planting. The advantages of early planting and favorable fall growing conditions can be lost if nitrogen fertilization is delayed until the condition of the stand can be determined. Establishing a good uniform stand requires some nitrogen, and most soils are deficient in this nutrient.

To meet nitrogen requirements during the fall growing period, producers can apply the total requirement before planting on

heavy textured soils, or can apply a small amount at planting followed by top-dressing soon after planting.

Of course, fall nitrogen fertilization is also affected by the amount of straw from the previous crop. The bacteria and other microorganisms needed to decompose the straw require nitrogen and can use that already in the soil as well as that applied, thus reducing the amount available during the fall.

The general rule in applying nitrogen has been to increase the rate about 20 pounds per acre for each ton of undecomposed straw. However, a portion of this nitrogen is recovered during the final stages of decomposition so that as much as half of this may be available during the spring months. This means that about half of the "extra" nitrogen could be deducted from the late winter topdressing.

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A TEXAS TRADEMARK—With 15 million head on hand July 1, Texas is still the nation's cattle king, even though herds have declined by over 1.5 million head since last summer. Producers have been reducing their stock as part of the latest cattle cycle, but drought has hastened the process, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Prices, Weather Cut Cattle Herd By 1.6 Million

AUSTIN—Economics and the weather have combined to cut the Texas cattle herd by over 1.5 million head since last summer, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service has indicated in the second of two annual cattle counts that there are 15 million head of cattle and calves in the state, compared with 16.6 million at this time last year.

"Texas cattlemen have been reducing their herds to more profitable levels for the past few years as the latest cattle cycle winds down," Brown said. "However, drought has made expensive supplemental feeding necessary, and many

producers are just not able to hold back as many animals as they would like for breeding stock."

Because of the reduced number of cows available for breeding, the 1978 calf crop is expected to be the smallest since 1971, Brown added. This year's calf crop is estimated at 5,350,000 head, a six-per-cent drop from last year, and could work to keep beef supplies down in coming years.

Brown pointed out that, nationwide, the cattle herd is down by seven per cent from a year earlier. Because Texas is the leading cattle producing state, trends here are strongly reflected throughout the country.

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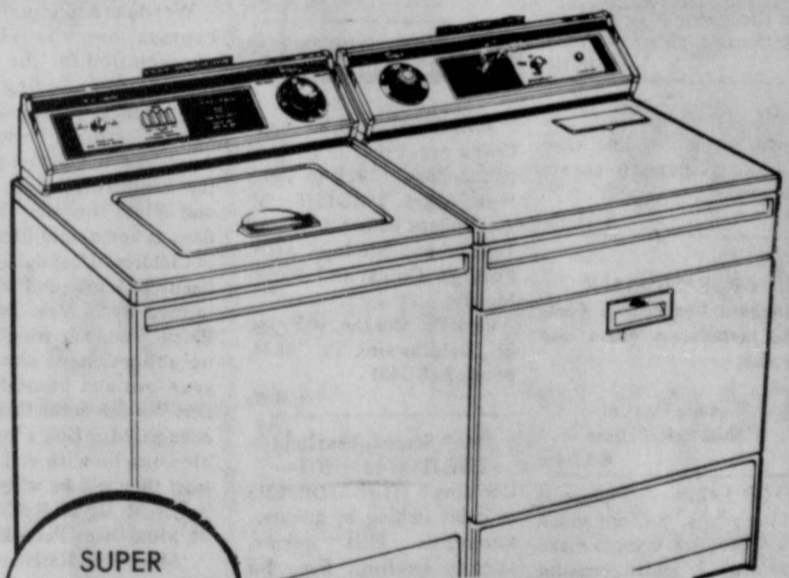

LCRA NEWS

Rainfall and inflow data released August 11 by the Lower Colorado River Authority shows that more than 200,000 cubic feet per second rushed into Lake Travis at the height of the recent flooding caused by tropical storm Amelia.

"Without Mansfield Dam and Lake Travis", says Bill West who heads the Systems Operations Control Center (SOCC), "this massive inflow would have caused considerable damage in Austin and downstream."

West notes that, according to the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, the safe channel capacity at Austin is 30,000 cfs.

By comparison, the 1938 flood at Austin recorded a peak of 234,000 cfs down the channel. Another flood 100 years later saw Austin gauge measurements of 276,000 cfs, resulting in an estimated \$3.4 million in damage. This was before Mansfield Dam was built.



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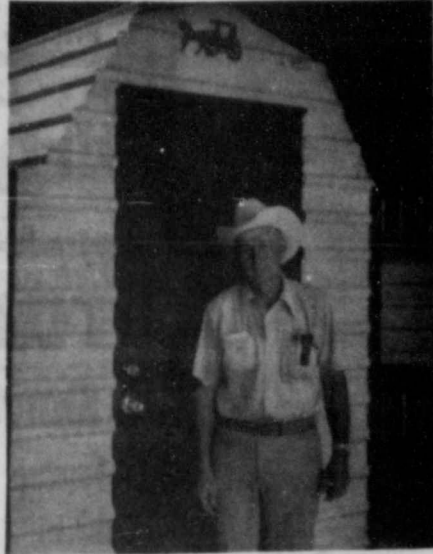

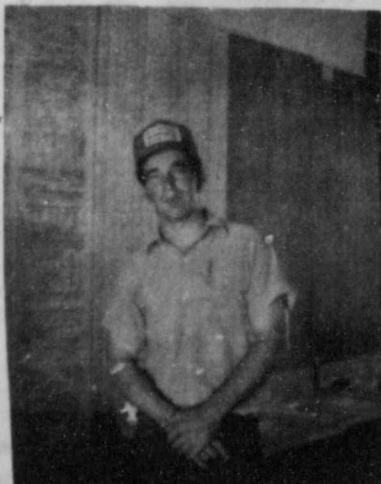

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Sen. Walter Mengden, Houston Republican, announced he will strongly oppose any attempt in the Texas Legislature to ratify the proposed amendment to the U.S. Constitution to give Washington, D.C., two U.S. senators.

"I am shocked and appalled that two-thirds of the members of the U.S. Congress would vote for something so incredibly stupid," he said.

"To give the city of Washington, D.C., two voting U.S. senators—the exact same representation the entire state of Texas has in the Senate—is utter insanity," the out-spoken senator said. Washington, D.C., is not a state, it is a city. If it needs representation in the U.S. Senate, then the people should be allowed to vote for the U.S. senators from Virginia, but not have two all their own," Mengden said.

Clayton Eyes Tenure

House Speaker Bill Clayton's staff is reportedly working on a proposal to abolish tenure for all new faculty members at public colleges and universities in the state. The tenure system would be replaced with 10-year renewable contracts, subject to

review by administrators and faculty members.

A Clayton aide said this does not mean the speaker is committed to pushing the legislation during the next legislative session which begins in January. "The speaker's staff works on proposals of interest to him and House members often pick them up and sponsor them."

Former Gov. Allan Shivers, chairman of the UT System Board of Regents, said he doesn't expect UT to take a position until the proposal is discussed at length.

Yantis' New Job

Hugh C. Yantis Jr., former State Insurance Board chairman, is the new executive director of the National Resources Council. Gov. Briscoe appointed Yantis, 64, to the \$38,592-a-year post after the Senate, during the special session, voted 29-1 against Yantis' appointment to the Insurance Board post. Only Bryan Sen. Bill Moore voted for the confirmation of Yantis after Austin Sen. Lloyd Doggett invoked the traditional "Senatorial courtesy" to block the appointment.

Frank Sheffield, head of the Natural Resources Council since it was created last December, was transferred to a natural resources post in the Governor's Office of Budget and Planning. Sheffield was paid \$30,000 while sitting in the chair now occupied by Yantis.

After only one day on his new job, Sheffield resigned saying that he was "deeply disappointed in the decision to replace me as director of the Natural Resources Council."

Yantis' appointment is not subject to Senate confirmation since 1977 legislation creating the Council states the executive director will serve at the pleasure of the governor. Most observers agree Yantis does not expect to continue in the job after Briscoe leaves office in January.

AG Opinions

A district judge who is eligible for retirement may be assigned as a special judge even though he may have been defeated for reelection, Attorney General John Hill said.

In other opinions, Hill concluded:

—A complaint to a city concerning a subcontractor's administration of a CETA-funded project is subject to disclosure under the Open Records Act.

—The Texas Pawnshop Act is not applicable to state banks which under normal banking practices take possession of tangible personal property as collateral for loans.

—Taxicab financial and usage reports submitted to a city are subject to disclosure under the Open Records Act.

Jarvis Debate

Howard Jarvis, father of California's Proposition 13, called Texas legislators "cowardly" during a speech in Fort Worth. During his Texas stop, Jarvis took on AFL-CIO President Harry Hubbard in a radio debate which became heated at times.

Hubbard's frequent calls for a "more considered approach" to tax matters are causing observers to wonder whether organized labor will oppose the tax relief amendment this fall.

Mondale Visit

Vice President Walter Mondale made a series of stops in Texas last weekend designed to boost the candidacy of senatorial hopeful Rep. Bob Krueger. One of Mondale's stops included Austin where he attended a reception honoring State Democratic Party Chairman Calvin Guest.

Lamb - Wool Referendum

A referendum will be held from August 21st to September 1st to determine whether producers approve of a new agreement for the advertising and sales promotion of lambs and wool. This will be a mail referendum. Ballots will be mailed to known producers of wool or lambs on August 21st. Voted ballots may be mailed to the County ASCA Office or may be returned in person.

Any person who had an interest as owner, or partial owner, in one or more sheep 6 months old or older for at least 30 days during 1977 is an eligible voter.

The new agreement is similar to the one approved in 1974, except that it would authorize larger deductions from producers incentive payments. By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to 2½ cents per pound on shorn wool and 12½ cents per hundred-weight on unshorn lambs marketed. Deduction rates from 1966 through 1977 were 1½ cents and 7½ cents, respectively.

Mrs. Harry Hornby Jr., Uvalde newspaper publisher, has been named to replace her late husband on the State University System Board of Regents.
