

'Buddy' Morgan Finalist In Hwy. Dept. Beautification Award

James A. (Buddy) Morgan, Mills County, Brownwood District, is among the six finalists that have been selected in the annual competition to determine the winner of the 1978 Lady Bird Johnson Award for Highway Beautification.

The former First Lady established the award nine years ago to recognize the maintenance supervisor from one of the 25 districts of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation who has done the most to enhance the beauty of the state's highway system.

The other 1978 finalists include: Waymon J. Sowell, Nolan County, Abilene District; Raymond T. Woodruff, Van Zandt County, Tyler District; Olen F. Tschatschula, Calhoun County, Yoakum District; Troy D. Blankenship, Guadalupe County, San Antonio District; and Raymond Kurtz, Walker County, Bryan District.

The award recognizes the maintenance foreman of each district and all the men in the maintenance section for their efforts to beautify the roadsides and to maintain attractive roadside parks.

The winner will receive a plaque and Mrs. Johnson's check for \$1,000, while the first runner-up will receive Mrs. Johnson's check for \$500. The presentation will be made at a luncheon hosted by Mrs. Johnson at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in October.

Dr. Elo T. Urbanovsky, professor emeritus, director of parks and landscape architecture, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, is chairman of the judging panel. Others selected by Mrs. Johnson to serve on the panel are Glenn Biggs of San Antonio, Dr. Robert Dewers of College Station, Mrs. Jake Hershey of Houston, Mrs. William P. Hobby, Jr., of Houston, Mrs. Marshall Steves of San Antonio, and Roy White of Austin.

This is only the second time in the history of contest that a foreman has placed in this District. Johnny Duncan, District Safety Coordinator, assisted in preparation of the scrapbook presentation.

Salvation Army. The Service Unit of the Salvation Army serves immediate need in the community. This unit provides food, shelter, clothing, rent, utilities, minor medical and dental expenses. They also provide school supplies for indigent children, bus fares for stranded travelers.

Salvation Army mobile canteens from sixteen cities in Texas rush to the scenes of tornados, hurricanes, floods and fires, to provide food, shelter and all other needs to those affected. Local service unit volunteers help coordinate clean-up activities.

In Midlothian, Camp Hobbeltzelle has over 4,000 children and adults during the summer months. Here they may enjoy a camp life of swimming, fishing, boating and other outside activities. Peacock Home in San Antonio provides a home for girls from 10 - 17. Here they receive counseling enabling them to acquire a healthy positive approach to life.

The Salvation Army also sponsors ten Youth Centers, the nearest being in Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco and Austin. They also work with Senior Citizens, two Friend-

ship Houses in Ft. Worth and Tyler aid this segment of our population.

Other services offered are help in locating missing persons, aid to parolees and families of prisoners, and centers for rehabilitating alcoholics.

Last year the Mills County United Fund allocated \$838.42 to the Salvation Army.

Below is the exact account of the wedding of the Steens as it appeared in The Eagle on August 30, 1928.

STEEN-BRIM

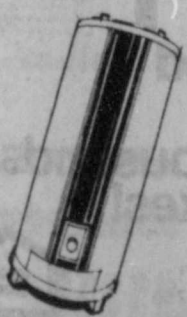

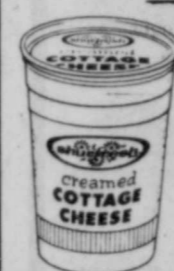
