"The Tax Relief Amendment'

(H.J.R. 1) H.J.R. 1 proposes an imendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature exempt all or part of the personal property home-stead from state and local property taxation.

amendment quires the legislature to provide for the taxation farm and ranch land on the basis of its produc tive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its pro-

ductive capacity. The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence nomestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be in-

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the govern-ing body provides public notice and conducts public hearing. amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment pro-hibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax pur-poses. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.



Texas Sheep & Goat Industry News

Texas bobcat pelts allowed into the export market for the 1978-79 season.

It wouldn't do to become too optimistic, but it appears that the federal regulatory boys are at least temporarily satisfied with the degree of control they've been able to exert over lawmaking at the state level.

As you may recall, Texas was for a time threatened with a bobcat pelt export ban during the 1977-78 season. We eventually managed to work out a 10,000 pelt quota, but it took an executive order from Gov. Dolph Briscoe enabling the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a pelt tagging

The quota is no longer hanging over our heads and

but the fact remains that our state government was coerced into passing management regulations that it most likely would not have passed

The federal agency applying the pressure was the Endangered Species Scientific Authority, another of those mushrooming regulartory bureaus that the politicians keep promising to eliminate but persist in creating instead. Most of the regulatory outfits look for something less than Ivorypure about a product or a practice and then ban it, but ESSA does things the other way around. They have veto power over the international export of certain plant and animal products, and their

ban is automatic unless it can

neither is a threatened ban, be proven to them that such export SHOULD NOT be

Never mind that "quilty until proven innocent" vio lates the most sacred and basic principles of American law and tradition. Those same basic principles prohibit the federal government from forcibly meddling in the internal legal affairs of the states, and we've just seen how the same agency treated Texas in that regards.

Possibly the most galling thing about it is that the proposed ban had a temporarily disasterous effect on the price of bobcat pelts, and for no justifiable end; ESSA acknowledged that its purpose was to force passage of state-level harvest control measures on the bobcat, a predator that is well known
