The Rev. Ben Welch, pastor of First United Methodist, Goldthwaite, was elected president of the Mills County Ministerial Association at its regular meeting on Thursday, September 21, 1978. Rev. Welch has served as Secretary-Treasurer for two years.

In other action, Rev. Doug Holtzclaw, pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, was elected Secretary-Treasurer. The ministers approved a Halloween Carnival to be held on Tuesday evening, October 31, on the Tennis Courts at First United Methodist Church. All organizations in the community are invited to participate in

the carnival with a 'booth.' Each participating group will be asked to donate \$5.00 to the Ministerial Association to furnish a free hot dog and drink to every child and youth who attends. Activities begin at 5:30 p.m., when the ladies, with the help of the men, will serve a big meal that they have prepared.

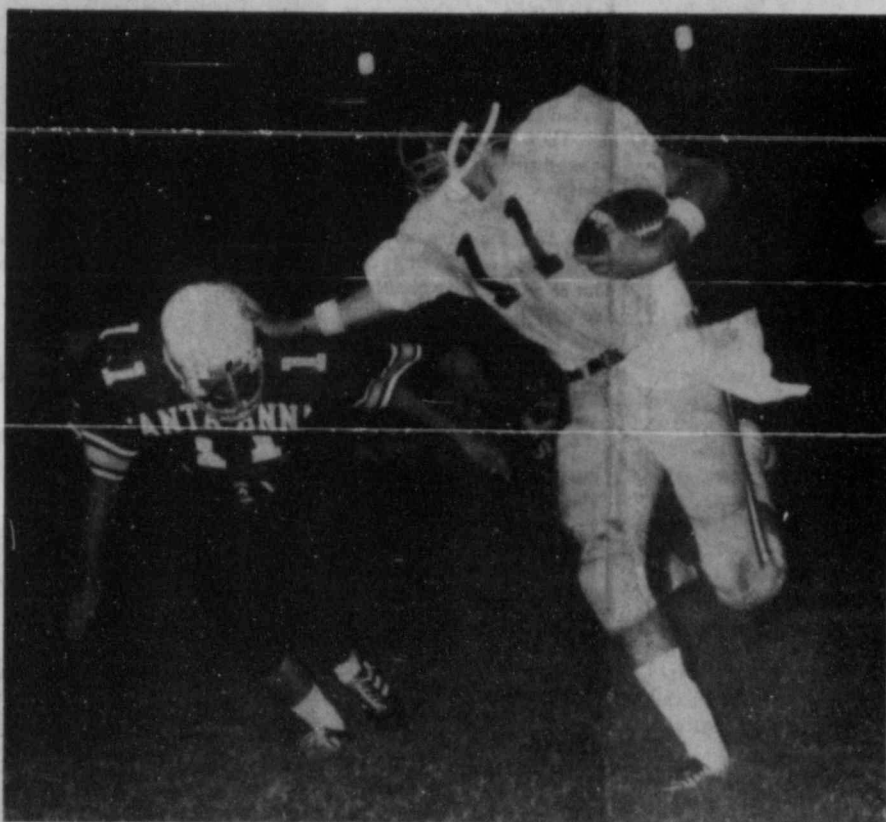
They make items such as quilts, afghans, aprons and various things that will be auctioned off along with other items to be sold. The auction will be conducted following the supper.

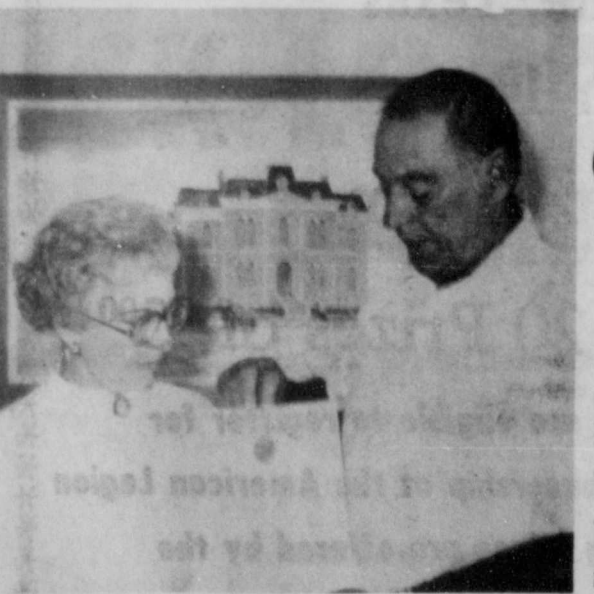

## Santa Anna Topples Eagles; Local Team Open This Week

For the second time in as many weeks, the Goldthwaite Eagles won the first battle but lost the war.

The Mills County boys jumped into the lead against Santa Anna last Friday night, 6-0, but in the final analysis lost by a wide margin, 33-6.

Coach Joe Winchell's Eagles took the opening possession down to the Santa Anna 14 yard line, where a pass into the end zone was incomplete and the ball went over on downs to the Mountaineers.

Even though the Eagles did not score, they moved the ball well against the Class B Mountaineers.

And on the second play after Santa Anna took over, defensive halfback Jett Johnson intercepted an errant Santa Anna pass and returned it nicely to the Santa Anna 38 yard line.

On the next play, Johnson coolly dropped back to pass and hit tight-end Mike

Connally on the letters with a pass and Connally eased into the end zone for the first score of the evening.

It was a fine pass, and a fine pattern run by Connally, but it could not be repeated throughout the remainder of the encounter.

The Eagles stopped Santa Anna the next time the Mounties got the ball, but then the tide seemed to turn. With first and ten from the Eagles 35 yard line, Santa Anna recovered a fumble, and from this point on, the game was in the hands of the boys from Santa Anna.

On the very first play following the fumble, their speedy halfback scampered 35 yards for a touchdown, knotting the score at 6-6.

And then following an exchange of punts, the same play netted another Santa Anna tally, this time covering 45 yards.

Santa Anna also scored on their final possession of the half, and went to the field house at the intermission 18-6.

The Eagles tried in vain to get on the scoreboard in the second half, but Johnson did not have time to pass, as the Santa Anna defensive line poured in like Morton's Salt on countless occasions.

Defensive tackle Scott Ward played well on defense

for the Eagles, as did linebacker Carson Padgett. Running back David Livingston and halfback Tony Corona paced the offense.

### EAGLES OPEN THIS WEEK

The Goldthwaite Eagles have an open date on their schedule this week. They will resume action on October 6th with the opening contest of District 10-A, against arch-rival San Saba. This will be the first time the Eagles and Armadillos have met in District competition. San Saba was lowered to Class A this year. The Dillos are winless in three tries so far in the 1978 season.

Game time will be at 7:30 p.m. at San Saba.

It was reported by the treasurer, Mrs. Vance Cornelius, that a number of memorials to the Garden Club have been received in memory of Mrs. R. Glynn Raley. A letter of appreciation was read from Dr. Raley thanking the club for its memorial in memory of Mrs. Raley, and a minute of silent prayer was held for Dr. and Mrs. Raley. Mrs. Lloyd Laughlin, Courtesy and Ways and Means Chairman, announced the arrival of the calendars, featuring many

It was announced that a demonstration flower arrangement will be presented at each meeting this year. Mrs. Elms announced that the Zone I meeting will be held on November 8, at 9:30 a.m. in San Saba. Refreshments were served and the meeting adjourned.

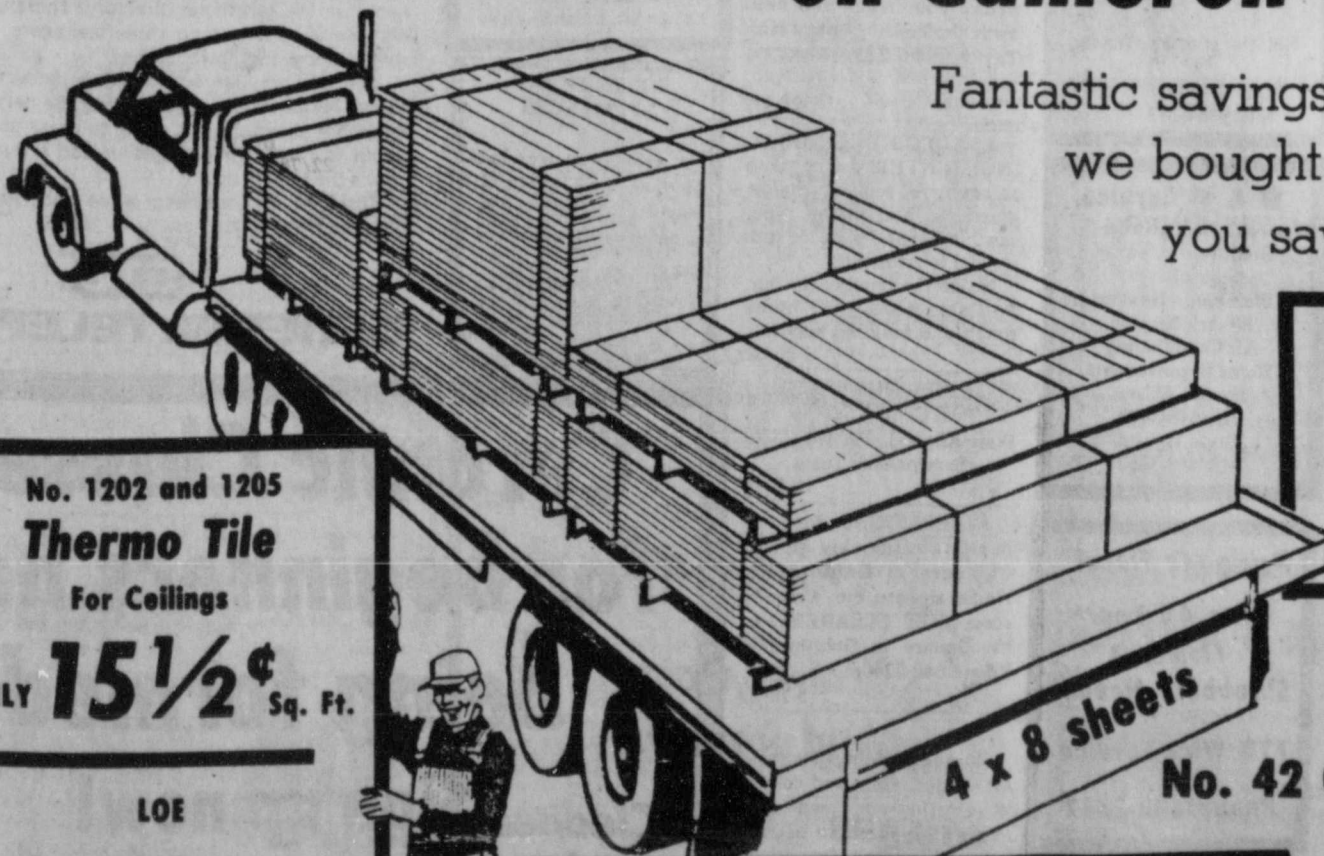

## Mills County Farm Bureau

# Newsletter

"Nearly everyone would benefit from the proposed state tax relief amendment," according to Troy Berry, President of the Mills County Farm Bureau.

"Passage of this amendment on November 7 would also send a message to Austin that Texans are concerned about state and local taxes," Troy said.

Farm Bureau on both the state and county levels supports the amendment and urges all concerned citizens to vote 'yes' on the amendment, the farm leader said.

Troy listed the following ways Texans would benefit:

- (1) Homeowners-- The \$5,000 homestead exemption would reduce school taxes paid by homeowners.
- (2) Elderly-- The Legislature can exempt up to \$10,000 of the school tax value of homesteads of persons over 65 whose taxes may be stabilized.
- (3) Disabled-- Persons on fixed or reduced incomes may be given an exemption up to \$10,000 based on economic need.
- (4) Farmers and ranchers-- Valuation of agricultural land for tax purposes would be limited to productivity.
- (5) City dwellers-- They would receive an unlimited exemption on household goods and personal effects.
- (6) School systems-- The legislature has appropriated \$450 million to reimburse

school districts losing revenue because of the homestead and agricultural-use reduction.

(7) All property taxpayers-- The appraisal of property would be left up to local districts where market values can be better established.

Troy said there would be no reduction in public services if the amendment passes.

He said that future state spending and tax increase would be based on the growth of the state's general economy and that more land would be retained in agricultural production, resulting in lower food prices.

State revenue for school districts would ease the burden of local property taxes, Troy commented.

Failure to pass the proposed amendment, Troy noted, would have adverse effect in many instances. He listed these possible results:

- (1) Some families would have difficulties owning a home.
- (2) Some elderly persons would be forced to sell their homesteads.
- (3) Present tax policy would continue to be a burden on the disabled.
- (4) Some farmers and ranchers would continue to bear unfair tax burdens, forcing many to sell out.
- (5) Local control of property tax valuations could be lost to statewide appraisal in Austin.
- (6) Citizen taxpayers might not be alerted to all types of tax increases by public notices and hearings.

"A negative vote would indicate that the people of Texas are not concerned and have no desire to limit taxes or state spending," president Berry said.

"That's why we're urging a 'yes' vote on Tuesday, November 7, 1978 for the proposed tax relief amendment. Texans are long overdue for a tax break."

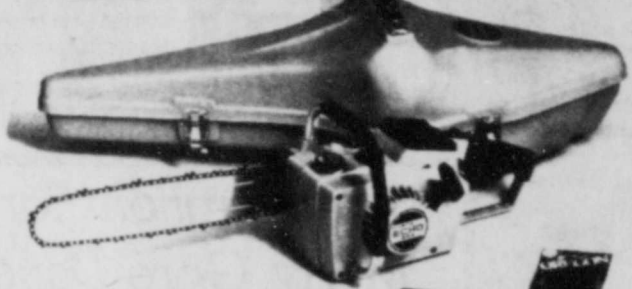

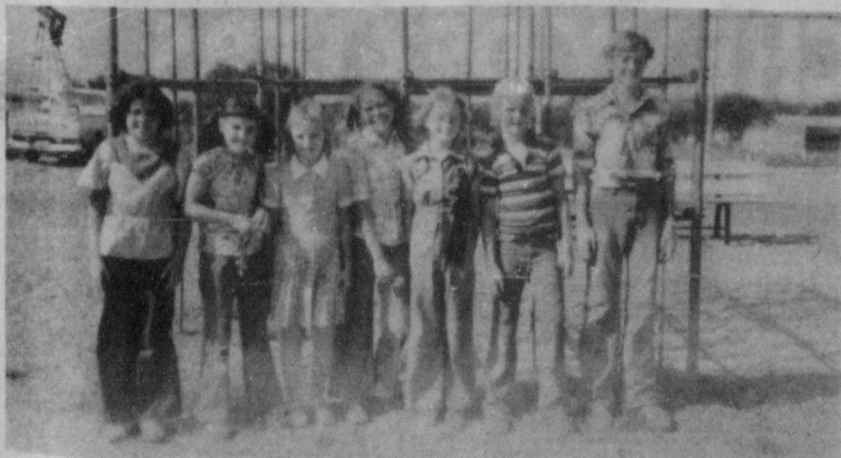

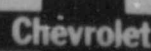
