Mills County Farm Bureau Newsletter

Agriculture in this county has a lot at stake in the November 7th vote on the tax relief amendment, according to Troy Berry, president of the Mills County Farm Bureau.

the tax value of agricultural land to its productive value," Troy said. "This is a protective measure not only for the present, but also for the future," he explained. Inflationary pressures and revenue requirements could increase our land taxes

several times what they are now. But, this amendment if approved and implemented would put a limit on taxes. Our farmers would not be forced off the land now or in the future because productivity would be the limiting factor.

The County FB president said that although the property tax was intended as a general tax on all property and all wealth, it has become primarily a tax on real estate. "Farmers and ranchers necessarily own and use more real estate than other types of businesses, and therefore pay an unfair share

of the property tax," Troy said. "We're not seeking favors, just fairness," he added. The county farm leader said that a measure passed by the legislature during the special called session would reimburse school districts for all or part of revenue lost due to reductions from homestead exemptions or agricultural land valuations. Some \$450 million was appropriated for the next two years, enough to offset reductions. This means we would be using surplus from the State's general revenue fund for making up this difference

to schools. The farm leader said that groups which need tax relief the most would benefit from the tax relief amendment; farmers, ranchers, homeowners, the elderly and disabled persons. In addition to these groups, all taxpayers and the general public have a stake in passage of the amendment. "First, there is a limitation making it more difficult for the legislature to pass excessive increases in spending. Also, the truth-in-tax provision insures more citizen involvement in local

government. In addition, there is the exemption on household goods and personal effects. Finally, the amendment says property tax appraisal and enforcement must originate in the county and not be transferred to Austin," Berry said. This may be our last opportunity to correct tax inequities and make needed reform. "Let's send a message to Austin that we will not stand for unlimited taxation and spending," he said.

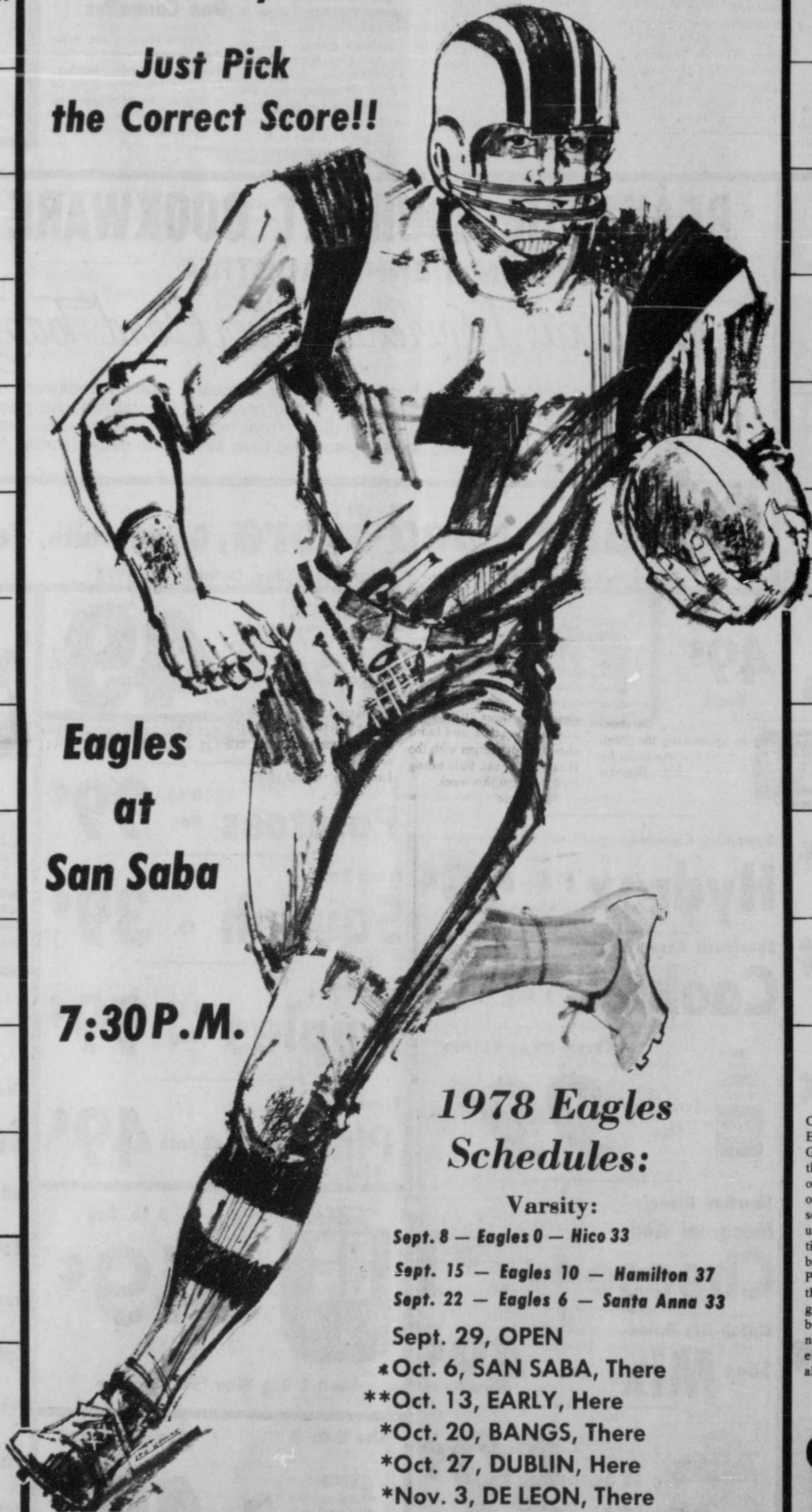

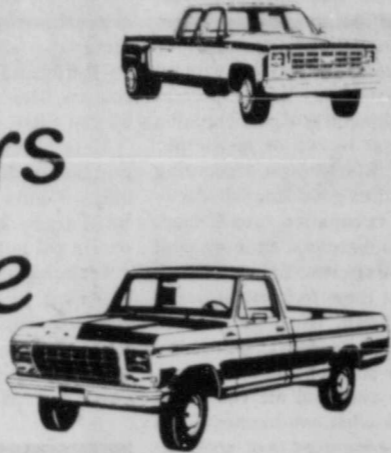

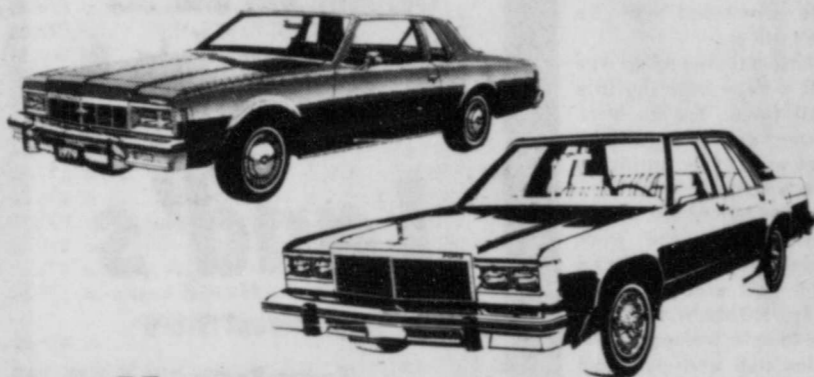

Mills County Senior Center

As the life expectancy continues to increase, the elderly not only become greater in number but also constitute a greater proportion of the total population. Mills County has 1444 older persons.

The Mills County Senior Center is here to help these individuals maintain their independence and enjoyment of life by providing services to help cope with their problems.

The Nutrition program provides 11,700 well balanced meals per year. Transportation is provided to community facilities, health services, and the Senior Center. Among other services provided at the Center are recreation, crafts, fellowship, housing assistance, weatherizing, health clinic, social security and veterans administration representatives, assistance in acquiring medical equipment and other information and referrals.

Working with the Center are 225 volunteers in the Retired Senior Volunteer Program serving in telephone reassurance, friendly visiting, reading, letter writing, mending, transportation, helping with nutrition, and other Center activities. Everyone is invited to come to the Center and see it in action, to offer any suggestions that would help meet the needs of the Mills County Senior Citizens.

Last year the allocation for the Center was \$1,672.87. This was used for utilities and maintenance of the Center.

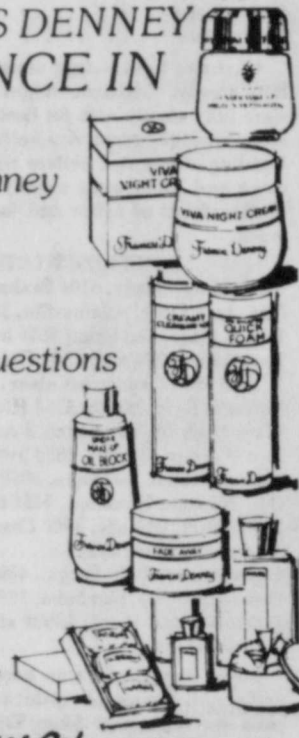
