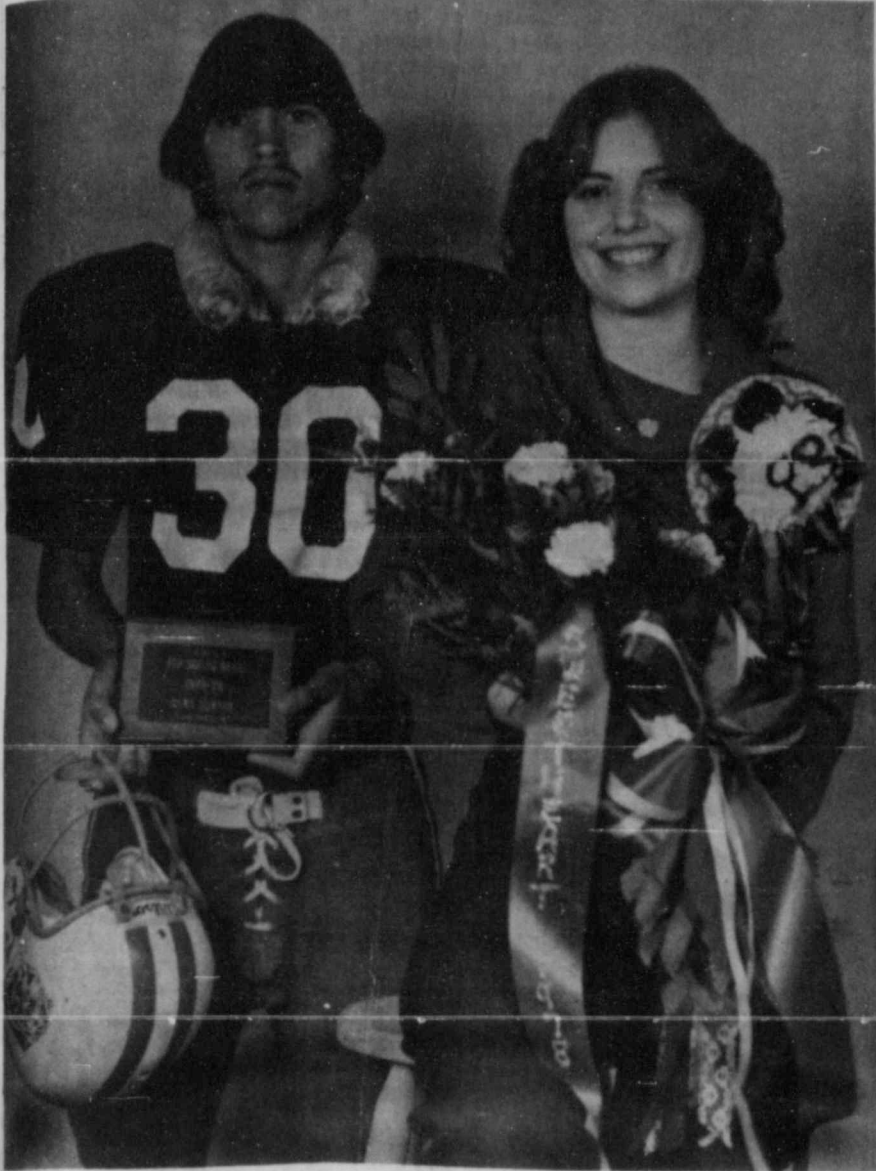

Leath, Clements, Tower Apparent Victors Tues.

Governor, U. S. Senate Spots Extremely Close

Some 1200 total voters turned out in Mills County Tuesday to cast their ballots in one of the state's landmark elections.

Activity on the local level was low, but congressional, senate and governor's races took the limelight.

Democratic candidate for Congress of the 11th district, Marvin Leath of Marlin, won over Republican Jack Burgess, in a hard fought battle that went down to the wire. Leath garnered about 53 per cent of the vote over the district, compared to Burgess' 47 per cent. Leath carried Mills County by a slightly heavier margin, nearly 56 per cent.

Mills County voters, traditionally Democratic, followed that same trend in the U. S. Senate race, voting for Bob Krueger over Republican John Tower. Tower, the incumbent, was ahead at press time Wednesday morning, but by only a small percentage statewide.

The identical situation happened in Mills County in the Governor's race. It appeared late Wednesday morning that Republican Bill Clements had narrowly won a victory over Democratic candidate John Hill for the state's highest office. However, Hill carried Mills County, but only by 31 votes, the closest margin on the local scene.

On the Mills County scene all candidates were unopposed in the election.

County Judge James Ledbetter, County Clerk Walter Bryant, Treasurer Dee Harris, Precinct 1 Commissioner Bill Bishop, Precinct 2 Commissioner Lewis Watson, Precinct 4 Commissioner Hawley Jernigan, and two justices of the peace, E. H. Thorne of Precinct 1 and Anna Lou Schlee of Precinct 6 were elevated to office. All local candidates were listed in the Democratic party column of the ballot.

Goldthwaite City Council Reviews Cable Television Situation Locally

The Goldthwaite City Council spent a lot of time at its regular meeting last Thursday night talking about cable television.

The present system that serves the city, owned by Dean Bagley of San Saba, will be completely renovated beginning immediately, according to Bagley. He told the council that the system will be rewired and many amplifiers will be replaced. Trees will also be trimmed if they touch cable lines.

The Goldthwaite cable company asked for a rate increase about a year ago, but was denied it after one favorable reading because of the reworking not being done. The city has only the rate setting power over a cable vision system such as this. No other input can be made by the city.

G. C. Head of Goldthwaite, who holds a duly approved franchise to do business in cable television here, was also at the meeting. He explained that currently he is having engineers working on estimates of costs for construction and methods. He could not say at the time whether the system would economically work or be practical. It will be very expensive to build and would have to be delivered to about 80 per cent of the homes in the town to be financially sound.

L and W Communications, represented by Scott Witcher of Granite Shoals, told the council that he has been looking at a system for Goldthwaite. He already operates Lometa, Marble Falls and several of the towns around the lakes south of Goldthwaite. He had no concrete proposals to make at the meeting, but was

mostly investigating the possibilities here. In other council business, the ordinance leaving the 1 per cent sales tax on utilities was passed on final reading. The 4 per cent state tax will be dropped in the near future.

City Manager Dale Allen gave the following monthly report to the council: Said that five Goldthwaite volunteer firemen participated in a fire prevention training session in Abilene, and earned credits for the city. They were Fire Chief Roger Horton, Ray Hammond, Buddy Morgan, David Schwartz, and Johnny Blansit.

Discussed the cost of a hydraulic ripper for use at the sanitary landfill. Cost of such equipment would be somewhere in the \$7000 range, and it was deemed too expensive to be practical. Intermittent dynamiting at the trench may be the answer.

Reviewed several items pertaining to the Lower Colorado River Authority, the wholesale supplier of electricity to the city. The first was a letter informing the council that a rate increase request was forthcoming at the Public Utilities Commission. Reason given was the increase in the cost of bonded indebtedness. LCRA also corresponded with the city concerning the pending sewer project. The agency also oversees the water situation on the river, and the city will need to comply with certain guidelines if it is to construct a waste treatment plant in the Colorado basin. The council also approved the contribution of \$230.18 to the 30 Mayor's group to continue

legal action against any future rate increases by LCRA. It was the consensus of the council that the group has been instrumental on several occasions of stopping or reducing the amount of increases.

Told the council of the use of a "ditch witch" to do some digging across streets in the city. It was leased from a Brownwood firm at a cost of \$90 per day. The city may buy one of the machines if use merits the purchase, otherwise it can be leased when needed.

The city is in need of new radio equipment. The citizens band system has been fading in recent years due to age and interference. A "low band" system would be ideal, but would cost several thousand dollars to install. CM Allen is to check the matter further.

The city crews participated for two days in the clean up campaign, sponsored by the Goldthwaite

Garden Club. The Christmas lights have been reworked and are ready to be installed, sometime around Thanksgiving, and will be lighted about Dec. 1.

Five old style of inoperative fire plugs were replaced last month. Repairs to the street sweeper are continuing, and should be complete shortly.

Councilmen Charles Conradt, Tom Cody Graves, Allen Moreland, Frank Bridges, and Charles Childress, along with Mayor J. D. Harper were in attendance. Also city secretary Mildred Taylor and city employee James Knight were present.

Other guests in attendance were Dena and M. V. Horton, Jr., G. H. Cassil, and Bunk Fuller.

The council meets the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. at city hall. The public is always invited to attend.
