Open House Set Dec. 15 By FmHA

An open house will be held at the Parmer County Farmers Home Administration office on Tuesday, December 15 from 2-4 p.m. to demonstrate the (new) computer system, according to FmHA County Supervisor, Weldon C. Rainey.

The open house is part of a state and nationwide open house to recognize the completion of the three-year automation project; one of the largest projects of its kind in the country. FmHA installed 264 computer terminals in Texas and over 6,000 nationally, Rainey said.

"We think this computer system is going to be a big help to our borrowers, especially family farmers," Rainey said. "Once we plug basic numbers into the machine, we can help determine which management decisions will be the most beneficial. We'll be able to project annual cash-flow figures quickly and accurately."

"In addition, we can go directly into the FmHA main frame computer in Kansas City," Rainey said. "We expect this equipment will also help us to process applications quicker than we have in the past. Our office will be open to the public between 2-4 p.m. on Tuesday, December 15, and we welcome anyone who is interested in seeing how the new automation system works," he concluded.

The FmHA County office is located at 207 Avenue D in Farwell.

Parmer Co. To Mail Voter Cards

Due to the change in the voting year, voter registration certificates which are normally mailed out in January of even numbered years are currently being mailed to registered voters. The new white certificates will be valid from March 1, 1988 through December 31, 1989. However, you will need to keep your current yellow certificate since they are valid through February 28, 1988, says Hugh Moseley, voter registrar.

If you have moved or if you have changed your mailing address from a box to a street address or vice versa, and have not notified the voter registrar of your change, you will not receive a new certificate. These certificates are not forwardable and will be returned to the voter registrar.

You will need to contact the voter registrar at the Parmer County Tax Office in Farwell and fill out a change card and receive your new certificate. If you do not receive your new certificate and you are still a resident of Parmer County and wish to remain a registered voter, you must make this change.

All certificates that are returned to the voter registrar will be removed from the current voter registration list. It is very important that you report any changes in your voting status.

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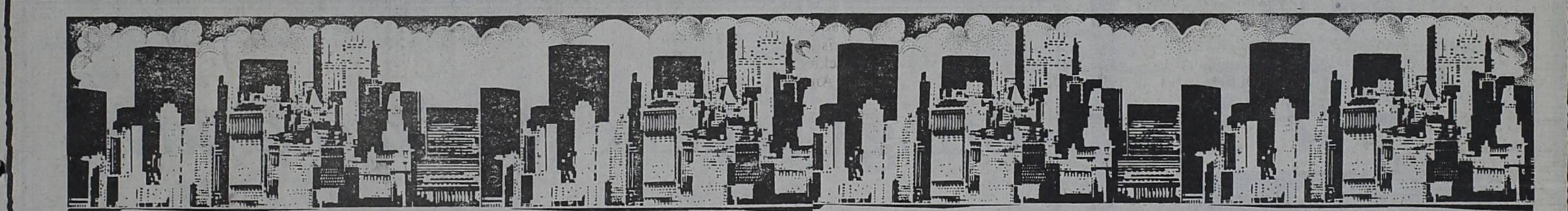

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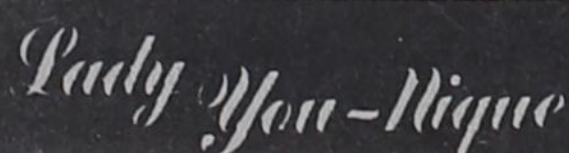

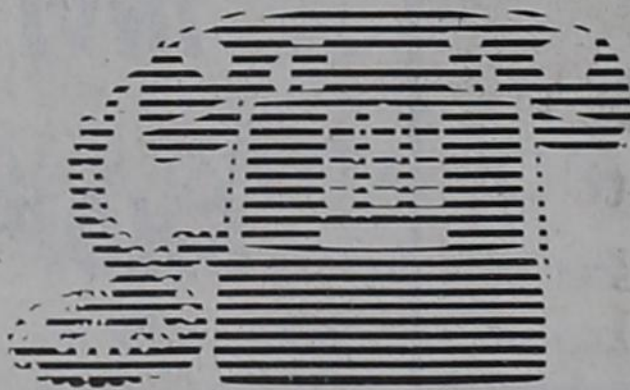
