Ice Storm Hits; Some Say Worst Ever

Temperature Dives To 5 Degree Mark Tuesday

★ ★ ★ ★

Everyone knew it was going to get very cold, but no one predicted the severity of the storm that hit Texas over New Year's weekend.

MILLS COUNTY was virtually blanketed in a layer of ice, caused by a general rain, then a sudden drop in temperature that sent the mercury on a nose dive that finally landed smack on the five degree level. And parts of the county reported a degree lower than that, making it the coldest in recent history.

The worst ice aftermath, that of driving on the myriad of county highways, caused the most strife. Motorists from all over the county entered Mills County Sunday and Monday, and a few stayed. Some of the particular places where the ice was most dangerous were the steep hills just south of the Mills County line south of Goldthwaite, and the area about three miles west of town. These areas in particular, felt the strains of the ice, and many a car and truck ended up in the ditches following the slippery conditions.

LOCAL DEPARTMENT of Public Safety officers reported that there were no serious



auto accidents during the fracas. Most motorists, the DPS said, paid very close attention to the conditions and did not venture out onto the ice at all.

Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks, who answered calls by the hundreds Sunday and Monday concerning the opening and closing of highways, said a number of good-hearted men braved the cold with their four-wheel drive vehicles to lend assistance at the trouble spots around the county. Ed Ferguson of Mullin, and his trusty wrecker were busy most of the day Monday.

THE ELECTRICAL situation in Mills County was better than in many other parts of the state. Service to the City of Goldthwaite was not lost at all, with only a few isolated incidents of line damage due to the ice accumulation on the wire or because of loaded tree limbs falling and breaking the line.

Customers of the rural electric cooperatives in the area were not so lucky, as many of them were without electrical service for many hours during the cold snap. Hardest hit areas in Texas were the Dallas and Fort Worth areas, where power was still off on Wednesday. Many schools remained closed because no heat could be generated for the classrooms.

Several cases of broken bones due to falling on slippery surfaces were treated at the local hospital on Sunday and Monday, and ice remained a threat to pedestrians in some places even through Wednesday, as temperatures remained below the freezing point Tuesday night.

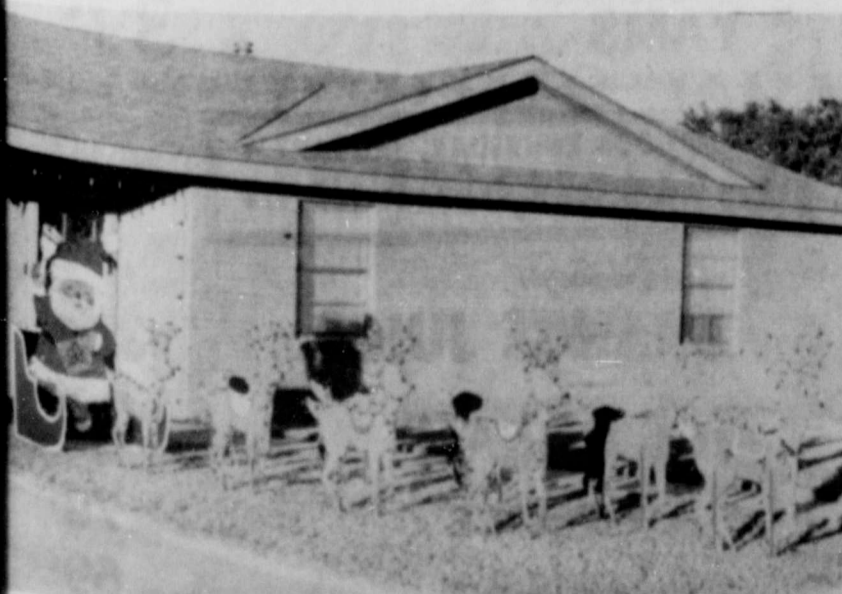

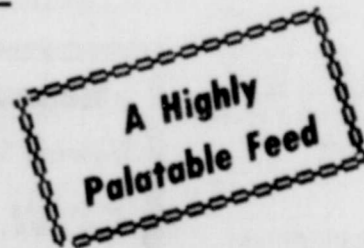

NOTICE

NOTICE TO FAMILIES WHO LIVED IN PUBLIC HOUSING PROJECTS OPERATED BY THE Housing Authority of the City of Goldthwaite, OR LIVED IN PUBLIC HOUSING PROJECTS IN ANY OTHER CITY BETWEEN MARCH 16, 1971 - SEPTEMBER 26, 1975.

If you rented a house or apartment from the Goldthwaite or any other Public Housing Agency (FHA) during the period between March 16, 1971, and September 26, 1975, you may be eligible to file a claim for a refund of part of your rent during that period if:

1. The wife or husband of the head of the household was present and dependent upon the head of the household for support, and/or;

2. a dependent member of your family household was employed.

If you believe your family falls within one of the categories described above, you may wish to continue reading this Notice in order to determine how, and under what circumstance, you may file a claim.

On July 7, 1978, the District Court of the District of Columbia entered a Stipulated Order providing that the definition of family income for purposes of computing maximum rentals for public housing, as contained in a HUD Circular, which excluded spouses from the \$300 deduction for each dependent and excluded dependents from the \$300 deduction for each secondary wage earner, was invalid and violated the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended. The effect of this determination is that certain families who lived in public housing during the period from March 16, 1971 to September 26, 1975, may have been charged too much rent. Therefore, the District Court ordered HUD to establish a one million dollar fund for the payment of claims which current or former tenants of public housing may submit for a refund of any overpayments.

The District Court's Stipulated Order provides that, if valid claims exceed one million dollars, HUD has the option of having the Order dissolved in which case NTO and HUD may negotiate a modified settlement or proceed with further litigation. Thus, claimants should realize that the submission of a claim determined valid by a PHA may result in full, partial, or no payment, depending on the total amount of valid claims submitted to HUD, or the final outcome of any further litigation. Any person wishing to receive a copy of the Stipulated Order or a claim form may do so by making their request known to a local PHA.

Individuals wishing to submit a claim must fill in the claim form made a part of this Notice and must submit it to the Public Housing Agency's address indicated on the claim form, or such other appropriate Public Housing Agency if different from the address indicated, within 120 days from Dec. 7, 1978. No claims will be accepted after the end of the 120 day period, April 6, 1979.

Information provided by the claimant on the claim form must be specific as to the time period between March 16, 1971, and September 26, 1975, for which the wife or husband of the head of the household was present and was a dependent and/or a dependent in the household was employed.

ment was in the Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

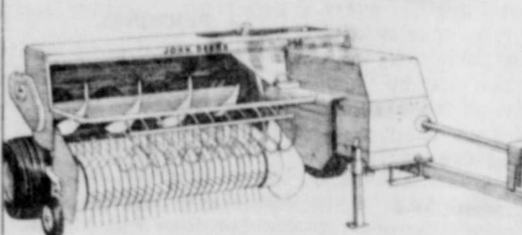
