

1st County Stock Show This Weekend

The 41st Annual Livestock Show of Mills County will be held Friday and Saturday, January 19 and 20, at the County Show Barns.

Plans have been made for the show will be held on Friday morning, according to announcement by Jackie Bridges, president of the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association.

The annual premium sale of livestock is set for 6:30 p.m. Friday night at the Mills County Commission Co.

Jackie Bridges, chairman of the committee invites businessmen and professional people of Mills County to come and support the youth agriculture program by purchasing premiums on this year's quality livestock.

Leaders stated that a complete list of the buyers will be published in the next issue of the Eagle and that buyers should bring their own premium, grand champion and reserve grand champion certificates and projects will be judged with the exhibitor's animal/project in the show.

The Sales Committee stated that the premium sale is the final result of the show and it is, of course, the most important.

Livestock must be in the show barns by 8:30 a.m. on Friday and remain until 5 p.m. on Saturday. All stock must be weighed at the show - Hogs weighed between 8:00 and 9:00 a.m. on Friday. Steers weighed at 10:00 a.m. on Friday. Market steers will be weighed during the show.

State-Ranked Dublin Lions Overcome Eagles - 77-65

1st District Loss For Eagles—

The talented, state-ranked Dublin Lions handed the Goldthwaite Eagles a 77-65 loss before a large crowd at Eagle gym Friday night. Both teams entered the game unbeaten in District 10-A competition.

The Lions erased an early 8-2 Eagle lead and claimed a 12-10 lead after one quarter. In the second quarter, a troublesome full court press by Dublin began to cause numerous Eagle turnovers and gave the Lions easy points. The Lions increased their lead to 28-18 with 3:22 left to play in the half, but two free throws by Kenny Saathoff and a field goal by Jett Johnson cut the Dublin lead to six points. However, the Eagles, who shot poorly the entire first half, could

manage only one point the rest of the half.

The Lions took advantage of more turnovers and opened up a 13-point lead, 36-23, at halftime. Free throw shooting also hurt the Eagles in the first half, while the Lions rarely missed from the charity line, the Eagles could make only 3 of 9 attempts.

The Lions threatened to put the game away when they exploded to a 45-25 lead with 5:50 left in the third period. But the Eagles refused to give in as they trimmed the Dublin lead to twelve points or four different occasions in the quarter but couldn't get any closer.

The fourth quarter began with the Lions jumping out to a 62-47 lead. Johnson then brought the crowd to its feet as he scored 10 unanswered

points. Suddenly the Eagles were within only 5 points of Dublin. The Lions were forced to call a time-out with just over four minutes to play.

The Lions quickly quieted the Eagle crowd as they reeled off 8 straight points of their own to take a 70-57 lead and clinch the game.

Johnson and Saathoff dominated the individual statistics for the Eagles. Johnson scored 28 points, 21 in the second half, and grabbed 11 rebounds. Saathoff scored 18 points, hauled down 17 rebounds, and blocked 6 shots.

Co. Commissioners Deal With Salaries In Called Session

Mills County Commissioners apparently passed additional raises for three county elected officials last Wednesday.

In a split vote, the commissioners raised the County Clerk salary to \$850 per month, the county judge to \$900 per month, and the county sheriff's position to \$950 per month.

At the meeting of last Monday, the three were set at \$825, \$825, and \$850 per month, respectively.

This action was the only item considered in the special called session on Wed. Jan. 10.

Voting on the motion, made by Commissioner William Crawford, and seconded by Bill Bishop, went this way: Crawford and Bishop, yes; Hawley Jernigan, no, and Lewis Watson, abstaining.

County Clerk Walter Bryant questioned the vote, and is seeking an opinion from the District Attorney on

the premise that the vote was not a majority canvass of the commissioners.

Other salary increases approved by the court in the regular session last Monday stood as entered in the minutes.

The salaries are:

Commissioner raised from \$675 to \$725. County Attorney, raised from \$550 to \$600. Deputy sheriff, raised from \$630 to \$775. J. P.'s Precinct 1 and 6, raised from \$460 to \$500. County Treasurer, raised from \$550 to \$600. Custodian, raised from \$460 to \$500. County road hands, raised from \$675 to \$750. Courthouse deputy office personnel, raised from \$550 to \$625. Judge and Agent's secretaries, raised \$30 per month, and Agents raised \$15 per month.

All these raises were approved unanimously by the court. They will amount to over \$28,000 in increased payroll expenses to the county coffers.

Ron Smith Hired As New Co. Deputy

Ronald E. (Ron) Smith was hired Monday, Jan. 16, by Sheriff H. G. Brooks as a new deputy for Mills County.

Ron, age 30, comes to Mills County after a year's duty with the McCulloch County sheriff's department, and a one and a half year stint with the Atascosa County Sheriff's department at Jourdanton.

He was born in Brady, and raised at Hall, located about ten miles from Richland Springs in San Saba County. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon E. Smith still reside in Hall.

Immunization Clinic Here Next Wed. At Sr. Center

A public Health Clinic for immunization against polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus will be held on Wednesday, January 24, 1979 between 10:30 a.m. and 12 noon, at the Senior Citizens Center on Old Priddy Road in Goldthwaite.

At present, children entering school in Texas must be immunized against all of the above listed diseases except mumps; in September of 1979, mumps will also be required for all children through age seven.

As of September 1, 1978, all children between ages of 18 months and 13 years were required to be immunized against measles. After this year, the maximum age of the child requiring immunization will be raised. Parental histories of measles will be acceptable until September 1, 1979, and after that must

be verified by a physician's statement.

Childhood diseases are an ever present danger to the health of our children even though they are not as prevalent as they were in the past. Parents concerned about immunization records need to keep a few things in mind. You need to have an up-to-date immunization record when your child enters school. It should be validated by a licensed physician or public health clinic.

In A Joint Session — City, County Talk About Policemen

A special session of the Goldthwaite City Council and the Mills County Commissioners Court was held at the courthouse Tuesday night. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the city's involvement in the law enforcement picture of the area.

City officials have tentatively agreed that a city police force is not feasible, due to duplication of efforts and finances.

At the meeting of the city last week, a possible second deputy sheriff, paid by city funds, was mentioned to give better protection here, and this set up the meeting with the county.

No definite action was taken at the meeting, with much discussion made about

overlapping county and city funds, and which unit is to pay for law enforcement.

Goldthwaite Mayor J. D. Harper asked that an accounting be made to compare the amount of County taxes paid by Goldthwaite citizens to give him some guidelines as to how the matter will be handled.

The matter will be presented again at the next meeting of the city council for final dispensation.

Members of the council and commissioners court voiced opinions on the law enforcement situation in the county, and all agreed that no serious matters exist, but that continued vigilance and concern should be exhibited by all the citizens of the county.

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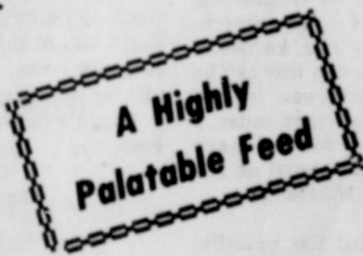

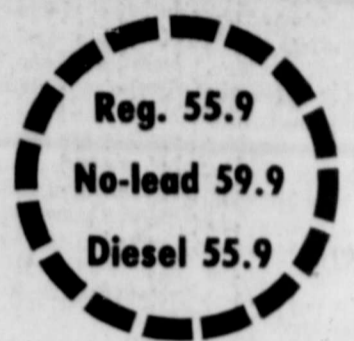

IRS Information

Employers must now file Forms W-2 and W-2P with the Social Security Administration, and NOT with the Internal Revenue Service, the IRS said. Deadline for filing these forms is February 28, 1979.

The 1978 W-2 and W-2P forms are different from the 1977 forms. It is important that the proper tax year W-2 and W-2P are used.

Under the new procedure, the forms will be processed by the SSA, which will then furnish the IRS with all data (including income tax data) on the forms.

For reporting to SSA, employers must remember to attach Form W-3, "Transmittal of Income and Tax Statements", with Copies A of Forms W-2 and W-2P.

Employers are urged to use the pre-addressed labels sent to them with the mailout of Publication 393, "Federal Employment Tax Forms."

For additional information, IRS Publication 15, "Circular E - Employer's Tax Guide", is available free from local IRS offices.

Ewald August Marwitz, of Indian Gap, Texas, passed away January 11, 1979 at Western Hills Nursing Home in Comanche, Texas.



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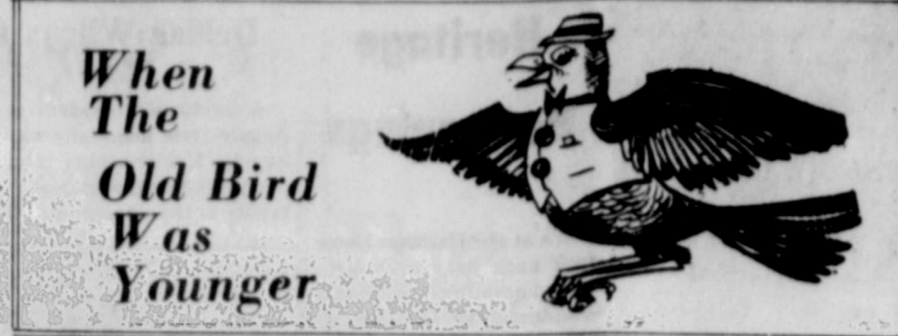

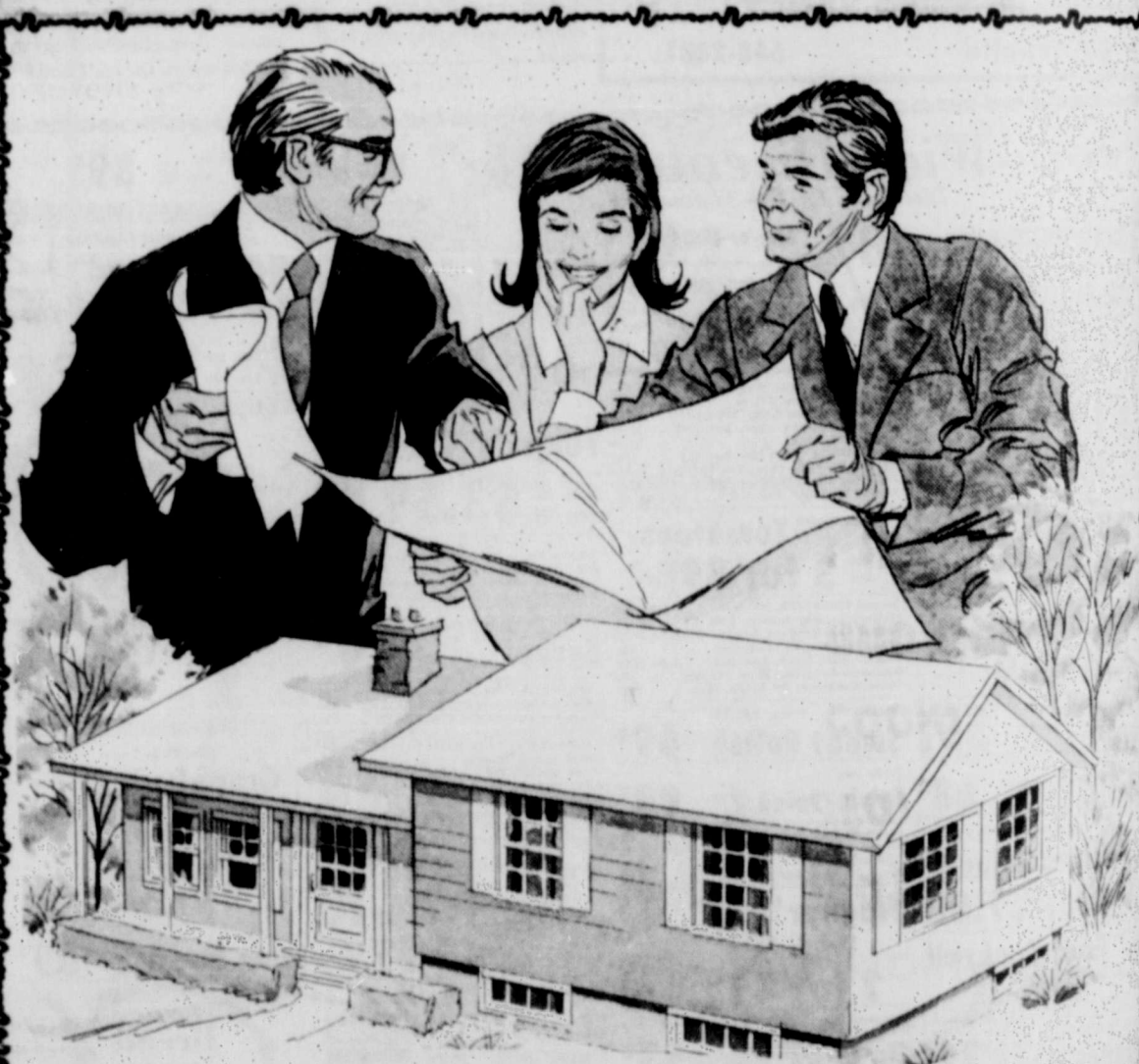
